

MSU trip to China is fruitful

Minot State University and SIAS International University signed an articulation agreement Feb. 17. The signing ceremony capped off MSU's participation in a week-long visit to the People's Republic of China by a delegation from Minot. The Minot group included Mayor Curt Zimbelman, Jerry Chavez, president of the Minot Area Development Corporation and three MSU representatives—David Fuller, president, Stephanie Witwer, assistant vice president for enrollment management, and Yueh-Ting Lee, dean of the College of Business.

The MSU-SIAS accord laid the ground for future exchange of students and faculty, as well as joint research, distance delivery methods, degree programs and cultural experiences. Having the agreement in place is expected to streamline future collaboration between Minot State and SIAS. It is possible that Minot State could host students as early as fall semester.

The Minot delegation visited the SIAS campus Feb. 15

and met with administrators, faculty and students. SIAS International University is a private institution with more than 13,000 students and 500 faculty and staff members. It has about 200 international instructors. Along with being known for its modern and beautiful campus, SIAS holds the distinction of hosting the largest number of American teachers in China.

SIAS International University is located near Zhengzhou, the capital city of Henan Province. The province has a population of 97 million people, with about 7 million residing in Zhengzhou.

The group received a warm welcome from representatives of international visitor contact and international affairs upon arrival in Beijing. Throughout the trip they met government officials and leaders from Beijing, the city of Zhengzhou and Henan Province. The group visited a number of commercial venues to explore economic development opportunities between Minot and Henan Province and its major cities. One highlight was a dinner for the Minot delegation in Zhengzhou, which was attended by more than 100 American-Chinese chamber of commerce members.

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College of Business dean appointed



JOANN LINRUD, Ph.D., Mount Pleasant, Mich., has been named the new dean of the College of Business at Minot State University. Linrud has been the interim associate dean and director of the Master of Business Administration program of the College of Business Administration at Central Michigan University since 2004.

"I am very pleased that Dr. Linrud will be serving as our new dean of the College of Business," said David Fuller, MSU president. "Dr. Linrud brings with her extensive administrative experience and strong academic credentials. As an accomplished leader, she possesses all the qualities we need—a collegial leadership style, a commitment to academic excellence, a keen knowledge of and appreciation for North Dakota, and the ability to work cooperatively with community leaders and businesses from Minot and our state. I look forward to having her join us."

"I'm thrilled to be coming to Minot State as the business dean," said Linrud. "I'm very impressed with what I've learned about the College of Business' emphasis on quality education, the dedication of the faculty, and their concern for meeting the present and future educational needs of the residents of North Dakota. I believe that MSU, and the College of Business, have a bright future that I'm happy to be part of."

While Linrud has been M.B.A. director at CMU, the program developed a new Professional M.B.A. (P.M.B.A.) to be delivered in the metro-Detroit market beginning in May. From 1998 to 2004, Linrud was the chair and a professor in the Department of Marketing and Hospitality Services Administration at CMU. Previously, she was a marketing faculty member at Mankato State University, 1986-1998, and North Texas State University, 1984-1986. Linrud completed her doctoral degree in business administration and M.B.A. at the University of Arkansas. She earned a Bachelor of Science degree in art education from the University of Minnesota and a Bachelor of Arts degree in English from Concordia College, Moorhead, Minn.

Linrud grew up on a farm near Velva and graduated from Velva High School. Her parents and other family members still live in the area. She said being able to move closer to them is "a real plus."

The new dean will be making a return visit to MSU and Minot beginning March 23 and will officially start with the College of Business July 1.

'Now Boarding: Destination Paris and the Colonies'

Staff Senate awards scholarships

Effective January 21, 2000, the Minot State University employees established the MSU Staff Senate Scholarship Endowment Fund. The fund's purpose is to assist staff or their dependents in their educational pursuits at the university. Initially, the fund was started with a \$5,000 deposit. This deposit, raised by Staff Senate through cookbook sales and MSU employee donations, has established an endowment principal to be held in perpetuity.

The fund's interest income supports the scholarships which are awarded though a drawing from qualified applicants. At its Feb 21 meeting, Staff Senate awarded four scholarships to Rachelle Todosichuk, RCJC; Linda Llwellyn, addiction studies, psychology, and social work; Melanie Moore, student health and development; and Shawna Froseth, plant services.

Students approve activity fee increase

On March 8-9, Minot Student University students voted to increase the student activity fee by \$34.72. The increase will be prorated as follows: Swain Hall Fitness Center, \$20.00; Student Activities, \$1.80; MSU Hockey Club, \$2.00; Career Services, \$7.20; Student Publications, \$2.00; Concert Band, \$.75; and Northwest Art Center, \$.97.

Britney Blackmore, Student Association president, said, "These increases will allow students to have a better workout center, enjoy more events on campus, and help students with their future endeavors."

President David Fuller is expected to approve the increase, which will make it official.

MSU promotes Sick as associate registrar

Jennifer Sick of Minot has been promoted to associate registrar in Minot State University's Office of the Registrar. Sick will be responsible for maintaining all curriculum records, assembling the master catalog, preparing term schedules, assigning classrooms, and processing room changes. An important new role will be serving as a campus trainer and subject matter expert for PeopleSoft technology.

The associate registrar position is new. It is the result of reorganization of the records office with the responsibilities being divided between the registrar's office, enrollment services, and other administrative offices and academic units.

While pursuing her undergraduate degree at MSU, Sick has been employed part-time in the records office as a scheduling coordinator. She completed her bachelor's degree in education in December 2005.

Sick and her husband, Wayde, an instructor at Burdick Job Corps, have one daughter. The vice president for academic affairs will continue to supervise the registrar's office. Through the reorganization and along with the addition of the associate registrar, the former director of records position has been changed into the position of registrar. Interim Vice President for Academic Affairs Gary Rabe said that the registrar is expected to be hired soon.

Clark serving as interim library director

Longtime library professional George Clark is serving as interim Director of Library at the Gordon B. Olson Library until July 1. Clark has been employed by MSU for more than 36 years, having joined the staff at Memorial Library in 1969.

It is Clark's second stint serving Minot State in an interim capacity. He was named acting head librarian by President Gordon B. Olson in 1971 and became head librarian about one year later. He served in that position until 1982. At that time Clark left administration and returned to reference, the area he has always identified as his first preference. He was part of the team of librarians involved in planning and construction of the Olson Library, completed in 1992.

In addition to being the senior reference librarian, Clark is head of government documents. As such, he determines which publications of federal and state agencies are retained at the Olson Library in its designation as a selective depository. Clark is also the library's liaison with the Division of Music for collection development and assessment.

Transitions that Clark has experienced at the MSU library include the conversion from the Dewey Decimal System to Library of Congress classification, changes of periodical indexes from paper to CD-ROM to online, and two different implementations of statewide library software.

Clark is serving as interim following the retirement of Larry Greenwood as director, Dec. 31, 2005. Joseph Jastrzembski, a history faculty member within the Division of Social Science, is chairing the search for a new library director. Two candidates interviewed in early March.

Fuller appointed director of North Central Association

President David Fuller was appointed in December to the board of directors of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools. The North Central Association encourages and supports cooperative relationships among schools, colleges and universities holding membership in the association. It provides regional accreditation in the north central region through two commissions, the Commission on Accreditation and School Improvement (CASI) and the Higher Learning Commission (HCL). CASI accredits elementary and secondary schools as well as non-degree-granting postsecondary schools. HLC accredits degree-granting colleges and universities.

Fuller's four-year term will begin July 1, and he will represent the HLC on the nine-member board. Fuller was the designee of James Freer, chair of the Higher Learning Commission.

Fuller has served in a number of capacities related to the North Central Association. He has been a consultant evaluator for the Higher Learning Commission since 1994 and a member of the Corps of Chairs of Consultant Evaluator Teams since 2001, including service as team chair for accreditation visits. From 2000 to 2005, Fuller was a member of the Accreditation Review Council for the HLC. He also served as the institutional self-study coordinator for Northern State University, Aberdeen, S.D., 1994-1996, resulting in re-accreditation for 10 years.

Minot State University has been continuously accredited by NCA since 1947 and was first accredited in 1917. The university's last comprehensive evaluation occurred 1997-1998, with the granting of 10-year re-accreditation. Minot State University's next evaluation will take place from 2007 to 2008, and the accreditation site visit is tentatively scheduled April 2008.

Compensation Task Force reports progress

The Compensation Task Force continues to meet regularly at noon on Wednesday each week, and all faculty and staff members are welcome to attend. The meetings are generally held in the Westlie Room.

The task force has identified the following short-term issues, listed in the order of priority: external equity (market), cost of living, internal equity, gender equity, pay compression, merit pay, value of education/degree, value of time in service/longevity, value of previous job-related experience. The same issues were also identified as long-term priorities but had a somewhat different order of priority.

Most recently, a draft of a proposal for salary administration decisions this year has been written. It was prepared by Wes Matthews and Ron Dorn as a synthesis of the discussions that have taken place thus far in CTF meetings. It is important to note that this is not yet an official proposal by the task force but rather a representation of the work in progress.
