## Mentorship program being launched

Minot State University is starting a new student mentoring program, coordinated by career services, which will supplement the role of the academic advisors. Mentors will support first-year freshmen with their transition to Minot State University by promoting on-campus involvement, providing guidance, and fostering personal growth. During the 2006-07 academic year a select group of incoming freshmen will be invited to apply, and faculty and staff are invited to volunteer to serve as mentors.

Debra Chandler has been hired as a student services advisor and the coordinator of the mentor program. She assures those interested that they will have all the information they need to be a successful mentor. You do not need to be an expert in serving students; you just need to be willing to develop a mentoring relationship with new students and help them navigate through their first year at MSU, according to Chandler.

Responsibilities of mentors include: attending a mentor training session Aug. 8, serving as a leader for your group of students at orientation Aug. 18, setting up one-on-one contacts with each of your students three times per semester, getting to know your assigned students' needs and directing them to available services, attending social/campus events with your students as a group once per semester (sporting events, Student Association activities, lecture series, etc.), and assisting students with completing requirements of

# Required student orientation is Aug. 18-19

The Aug. 3 registration deadline for new student orientation is approaching soon. Orientation is compulsory for all first-time Minot State University students because it is an important tool to help them be successful in their college experience. After meeting faculty, staff and other students and getting to know our campus and its services, students are better acclimated and more comfortable at MSU.

A sampling of orientation topics includes "Team Building," "Health Center and Counseling Services," "What to Expect of Faculty, Class and Honors Programs," and "Diversity and Safe Zones."

Parent and family orientation is set for Aug. 18, the first day of student orientation. College may be a new experience for a family, and the adults in a student's life play a crucial role in their success. Parent orientation is not required but highly recommended. Hotel accommodations have been made with the Grand International Inn located north of the MSU campus.

Students must register for orientation by filling out the orientation form and submitting the fee of \$30. An additional \$5 will be charged after the Aug. 3 deadline. ### 'Seussical' closes Summer Theatre

"Seussical the Musical" wraps up the Summer Theatre season and continues through Saturday (July 29). This full-length musical incorporates 17 of Dr. Seuss' children's books. The Cat in the Hat acts as emcee and Horton the Elephant is a central character. The show, directed by Conrad Davidson, boasts a huge cast of 53 that range in ages from 3 to the mid-50s. The show also has a larger than usual musical accompaniment, a nine-piece group featuring woodwinds, brass, drums and keyboards. # Chancellor Potts accepts severance agreement

North Dakota's State Board of Higher Education approved a buy-out of North Dakota University System Chancellor Robert Potts' contract, which will pay him \$214,750 during the next year to resign and remain available as a consultant.

On July 20, SBHE members authorized the severance agreement, which was negotiated by board member Richie Smith and Pat Seaworth, the system's attorney, after Potts announced last month he intended to leave his position.

Potts is resigning as chancellor because of differences with the SBHE over the scope of his authority as the system's top administrator. During his tenure, he had disputes with Joseph Chapman, the president of the North Dakota State University, and the chancellor felt the board had not taken steps to resolve them. Potts signed a three-year contract in March 2004, and he began work as chancellor the following July. A former Alabama university administrator, he said he did not regret taking the job. "Even given the differences of opinion we've had, we would do this all over again," Potts said. "This is a great state; it's a great university system. It's going to go forward, I know, in a wonderful way." —partially excerpted from the Minot Daily News/ Associated Press

## Two finalists selected for interim chancellor

On Tuesday a search committee named two finalists, Eddie Dunn and Lee Vickers, to be forwarded to the State Board of Higher Education for consideration for the position of interim chancellor. Dunn is the North Dakota University System's vice chancellor for strategic planning and executive director of the College Technical Education Council. Vickers has been president of Dickinson State University since July 1999.

The interim chancellor will replace Chancellor Robert Potts. Board President John Paulsen said the board will have a special meeting July 28, when they likely will choose the interim chancellor. That timeline agrees with the board's hope to have an interim chancellor in place by Aug. 1, when Potts' resignation becomes effective.

Other candidates for the position included: Charles Cheney, former superintendent of West Fargo public schools; W. Jeremy Davis, dean of University of North Dakota's law school, 1983-2002; Phil Harmeson, senior associate to UND President Charles Kupchella; William Isaacson, consultant and retired chemical engineer at 3M Co. and former SBHE member, 1998-2002; Paul Markel, associate professor of psychology at Minot State University; James Schobel, president of Mayville State University, 1973-1993; Earl Strinden, former executive vice president of UND's alumni association and the UND Foundation and former Grand Forks Republican legislator; and Richard Tschider, former president of St. Alexius Medical Center in Bismarck.

Vickers previously was a member of the search committee and participated in its first meeting July 14, but he resigned after a number of supporters put his name forward for the interim chancellor position. Members of the committee voted to accept Vickers' committee resignation July 17. He was replaced by Ellen Chaffee, president of Valley City State University, later in the day.

Committee members also voted unanimously to extend the likely tenure of the interim chancellor from less than one year to between 18 months and two years. Paulsen said this would keep the next permanent chancellor from starting work during

or shortly before a legislative session. Potts was chancellor for only about two years. Paulson said knowledge of the university system and the legislature would both be taken into consideration in choosing an interim chancellor. – partially excerpted from the Grand Forks Herald and Fargo Forum
