President wants MSU nationally recognized



Minot State University President David Fuller envisions the university becoming known nationally as one of the premier public, regional institutions in the "great" Great Plains. He would like MSU to be identified as an attractive option for out-of-state students seeking a high-quality education.

"We need to be nationally recognized," Fuller told faculty, students, and staff at the annual convocation Aug. 16.

North Dakota, which faces continuing declines in high school graduation numbers could absorb some of those outof-state students, he said.

Fuller said the New York Times recently ran an education supplement which included an article, "Off the Beaten Track," highlighting quality institutions outside of the arena of Ivy League schools. The supplement noted the extreme difficulty in getting accepted into the "top-tiered" colleges and universities and recommended that students and parents look elsewhere for educational quality and choices. The article cited a 1999 study that concluded that there was little difference in how much graduates of those institutions and the Ivy League schools earned. The study concluded that the student's motivation and drive mattered more than their choice of college.

Fuller said that MSU faculty compare favorably to the quality of faculty in "elite" institutions or the distinctive institutions listed in the New York Times article.

At the convocation, he also outlined a draft of the university's strategic plan, Vision 2013. This plan will guide MSU in planning for the future. It was developed based on open forums and focus groups held during the past two years and includes input from students, faculty, staff, alumni, community members and others.

Some major goals outlined were to recruit and retain quality faculty and staff, to promote diversity and multicultural programs on campus, and to encourage civic engagement and involvement in Minot and the surrounding area. An emphasis is to be placed on academic achievement and student engagement in campus life.

Fuller stressed that a "sense of place" should be promoted. He emphasized the uniqueness of Minot and MSU and its placement on the Great Plains.

"The Great Plains is a great place to be and not a great place to leave," he said.

Copies of the strategic plan draft were distributed for review to those in attendance. Fuller invites comments and suggestions and has scheduled open campus forums Sept. 7.

Minot State University promoting itself at mall

Minot State University is promoting itself at Dakota Square Mall. The university is establishing its presence in the mall by "adopting" the food court as part of its marketing efforts. President David Fuller and MSU personnel were joined by the Minot Area Chamber of Commerce Ambassadors for a ribboncutting ceremony in the food court Aug. 10.



The area now displays an abundance of red and white, the colors being used in MSU's marketing and advertising campaigns. Patrons of the food court will be greeted by five large banners promoting MSU hung near the ceiling. Table tents advertising MSU will appear a minimum of four times per year on the 150 tables in the area. Minot State will also partner with Dakota Square four times during the year for special promotions in the mall involving students, athletes, employees and academic programs. Two large events calendars will be displayed in adjacent areas.

In addition, Minot State advertising materials are featured in three mall directories and in permanent signing located in the mall wing stretching from the food court to Sears. Establishing a Minot State University presence at Dakota Square was the idea of President Fuller and an initiative completed by the university's marketing committee.

"Dakota Square estimates that 10.7 million people visit the mall each year and it is the primary shopping destination in northwest North Dakota," said Fuller. "Coupled with the fact that Dakota Square is open 363 days per year and people can be reminded about MSU every one of those days, the partnership is a win-win situation for both parties."

Fuller saw a similar promotion at the mall located near Cedar Rapids, Iowa, where the women's basketball team competed in the NAIA national tourney. The partnership is a contract between Dakota Square Mall and Minot State.

Campus reminded of smoke-free policy

Minot State University became a smoke-free campus effective June 1. Smoking on university property, indoors or outdoors, or in university vehicles, is prohibited at all times. Prohibition includes smoking in personal vehicles parked on university grounds. This policy applies to all employees, students, and visitors. The policy also applies to external individuals or companies renting space with MSU and should be reflected in all agreements/contracts with such individuals or companies. For purposes of the policy, "smoking" means carrying or having in one's possession a lighted cigarette, cigar, pipe, or other object giving off smoke.

A student in noncompliance should be reported to the Vice President for Student Affairs. An employee in noncompliance should be reported to his or her supervisor. Noncompliance by a student may result in disciplinary action as outlined in the Student Conduct Policy Handbook. Noncompliance by employees may result in disciplinary action as outlined in Section 25, Job Discipline/Dismissal of the North Dakota University System Policy Manual. Organizers of events are responsible for communicating this policy to attendees and for its enforcement. Visitors who persist in noncompliance must be directed off university grounds. 'Freedom from Tobacco' classes start Sept. 14

Has MSU's smoke-free policy got you thinking about quitting smoking (or chew)? A new series of cessation classes will start on campus Sept. 14. By teaming up with the First District Health Unit, the class is free and NDPERS will pay up to \$500 of physician and medication costs. There are no up-front costs for participants because FDHU provides patches and gum and bills PERS. Enrollment management assistant VP leaving

Gary Rabe, vice president for academic affairs, has accepted the resignation of Stephanie Witwer, assistant vice president for enrollment management. Witwer started at Minot State University as director of outreach in 2001 and was promoted to assistant vice president one year ago. Witwer has accepted a position in nursing administration with Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn. Her new position gives her the opportunity to move back into the health care profession. Witwer came to MSU from Trinity Health and had been a vice president at UniMed Medical Center in Minot. Witwer earned a master's degree in nursing and administration and a bachelor's degree in nursing from the University of North Dakota. She was an instructor in the MSU College of Nursing, 1984-1987.

Rabe said he was happy for Witwer, but that it will be a challenge to replace her on his administrative team. "Stephanie's leadership and vision were central to the growth and success of the Center for Extended Learning and distance education at MSU," said Rabe.

Witwer also oversaw the newly created Enrollment Services Office, which has primary responsibility for recruitment and admissions. The search for a replacement will begin following a review of the organizational structure of CEL and enrollment services. Witwer's resignation is effective Sept. 13.

College faculty vote 95-1 against supporting NDSCS president

Faculty at the North Dakota State College of Science gave a 95-1 vote of no confidence for Sharon Hart, their president, Aug. 17.

The faculty council plans to send a letter to Hart, the State Board of Higher Education and North Dakota University System Chancellor Eddie Dunn. The council said they lack confidence in Hart's leadership. They said they do not trust Hart, and they are upset about June promotions she made to her administrative team. In an e-mail, former Chancellor Robert Potts had told Hart those promotions were creating substantial concerns on her campus and in the community. In 2002, faculty voted 58 to 41 rejecting a vote of no-confidence for Hart.

Hart told faculty and staff Aug. 16 that she plans to talk to Dunn about an exit plan from the college presidency, but she did not mention resigning or state a specific timeline. Copies of a petition are circulating asking Hart to resign, and the NDSCS Alumni Foundation has expressed concerns about her leadership to the SBHE.

Dunn, who succeeded Potts as chancellor on Aug. 4, said he's agreed to meet with representatives of the alumni foundation, who have said Hart's leadership is hurting their fund-raising ability. "I am very much in the information fact-gathering portion of this," Dunn said. "She has not said to me that she definitely is wanting to depart or is announcing she's departing on any date." The chancellor said he wants make sure the process is fair to everyone who's affected, including students, the college and Hart. Marquardt planned to present the petitions asking for Hart's resignation to the SBHE by Aug. 22.

Potts has said Hart had his full confidence and support. He and previous chancellors gave her positive evaluations.
