PaiChai University officials visit MSU

Minot State University hosted a very successful visit by officers from PaiChai University in Daejon, South Korea, Dec. 11-12. The purpose of the visit was to establish a partnership between the two institutions. Representing PaiChai were HyeKyung Lee, provost at PaiChai University, and Chang In Lee, director of the TESOL Program at PaiChai University, and Yae Sock Roh, professor of marketing and hospitality at Central Michigan University.

"MSU would benefit by increasing the diversity of students on the campus and because MSU students would have more exposure to students from other countries," said JoAnn Linrud, dean of the College of Business.

PaiChai University, which offers both undergraduate and graduate programs, was established by Christian missionary Henry Appenzeller in 1885. Lee said the institution was a high school when the country was under Japanese rule, but it was revitalized as a college in the 1950s after South Korea gained its independence.

PaiChai's Appenzeller School of Global Business will begin its new program next semester with 40 students: 10 Americans, 10 Europeans, 10 South Koreans, and 10 from

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other Asian countries. They will study for three years at PaiChai and will spend their fourth year abroad. Because the program is just being established, it would be several years before students from PaiChai come to Minot State. PaiChai is also interested in establishing partnerships with other American universities. MSU is one of the universities that has a profile that is attractive to PaiChai officials.

According to Provost Lee, the Korean university is interested in sending students to study at MSU in part because Minot is a good quality university in a nice, safe, moderate-size American city. Lee has found that the English spoken here is good, standard English. In addition, parents of students at PaiChai are concerned about safety when they send their children abroad, said Lee.

The provost, who has visited the United States several times, said that PaiChai is highly globalized, with a number of international students. Many of its students study abroad. Both Lee and Linrud said that international experience is vital for people entering the business field today.

PaiChai University's new business program will be taught in English. Linrud said there could be opportunities for MSU faculty members to teach at PaiChai and for PaiChai faculty to teach at Minot State. MSU already has partnership agreements with SIAS International University in Zhengzhou, China, Kadir Has University in Istanbul, Turkey, and Telemark University College in Skien, Norway.

MSU student to serve on Chamber of Commerce board

Vanessa Anderson, a Minot State University junior from Buchanan, is eager to be a voice for students on the Minot Area Chamber of Commerce board.

Although Anderson will be a non-voting member, she is looking forward to having an opportunity to be a liaison between MSU's student government and the Chamber of Commerce. Her first meeting was Dec. 18.

Fuller, who also serves on the board, said he wants MSU students to become more civic-minded and thinks being involved on the board will be a good learning experience for them. He also encourages students to provide the Chamber with the students' perspective on life in Minot. Above all, he would like to increase the university's involvement within the community as part of Vision 2013, the university's strategic plan.

John MacMartin, president of the Minot Area Chamber of Commerce, said he hopes that Anderson will help the chamber board stay in touch with issues that are important to students at MSU. That perspective will aid the Chamber as it works on community-wide projects and attempts to make the city attractive for young adults.

The Chamber board would also like to find avenues for MSU students to become more active in the community. For example, the Chamber may discuss a proposal to introduce a Roterac Club, the university-level version of the Rotary Club, at MSU. There seems to be a lot of interest on campus in becoming active in such a service organization, Anderson said.

A sociology and German major, Anderson is a student senator from the College of Arts and Sciences. She became interested in serving in student government this past summer because of concerns about security on campus.

"I feel safe on campus," she said, but recent events did bring the issue of campus safety to the forefront. A Minot State University student was murdered in her off-campus apartment last June and the murder has yet to be solved.

Anderson also finds it exciting to be among the first to know about actions the university has taken to improve security, such as adding cameras on campus and removing some trees and adding more lighting along University Avenue.

The junior said one of the things she would like to bring up while she is on the Chamber board is the possibility of building a bigger recycling center in the community. Anderson plans to attend law school and specialize in environmental law. Consequently, she has a great interest in the environment. She said the only thing that can be recycled on the university campus is paper. She would like to see opportunities to recycle grow.

Lecture series discusses 'speaking your mind' and showcases study trips to China and Great Britain

Robert S. Littlefield, professor of communication at North Dakota State University, will present "Speaking Your Mind: Public Oratory and the Performing Arts in 20th Century America," tomorrow evening (Jan. 10) as part of the Northwest Art Center lecture series.

Littlefield's presentation is an outgrowth of research he conducted as a 2006 North Dakota Humanities Council Remele Fellowship recipient. His research focused on public speeches, debates and oratory in North Dakota and other areas of the nation during the twentieth century.

Because many communities were isolated during the early years of North Dakota's statehood, public oratory and fine arts became a cultural tool to draw citizens together. In his lecture, Littlefield compares the development of these activities in North Dakota to similar forensic and performing arts developments in other parts of the United States.

Littlefield has published more than 75 articles on risk and crisis communication, intercultural communication, forensic education and practice, instructional practices, and political communication. He is the author of "Voices on the Prairie," an historical account of speech education, forensics, and theatre arts in North Dakota since statehood.

On Jan. 14, Minot State University students, faculty, and exchange students will present "Horizons Unlimited: Experience and Learning Across Borders and Cultures." This will be an overview of recent and upcoming overseas study tours sponsored by the university.

Presenters are MSU faculty Robert Kibler and Michelle M. Sauer; Chinese exchange students from SIAS International University, MSU's partner university in China; and MSU students who have participated in past study abroad trips. The program will feature study abroad trips to China and Britain planned for May 2008, as well as photos and highlights from previous excursions.

Study tour destinations for 2008 include Ireland, Scotland, London and China. Trips are open to adult community members as well as students. Information on the upcoming tours will be available at the lecture or from MSU's Office of International Programs at 858-4155, or Kibler at 858-3876.

All NAC lectures are held in Aleshire Theater, 7 p.m. Admission is free and open to the public; refreshments are served afterward.

'Messiah' performance raises funds for John Strohm Music Scholarship

MSU alumnus receives prestigious award from NASC

Les Anderson, a Minot State University alumnus and principal at Jim Hill Middle School, was awarded the National Association of Student Councils' Distinguished Service Award at its convention Dec. 9. This is only the third time in the association's 76 years that the award has been given.

Anderson has received a number of awards during his career, but this one was one of the most significant, he said. Anderson began volunteering with the organization more than 30 years ago and has served at both its state and the national level. He has witnessed its growth from a small state conference to one with more than 1,200 participants. Presently North Dakota's student association convention is one of the largest in the United States.

Anderson said he has always believed in the importance of the organization.

"If you're going to be successful, you need to be involved in some sort of community service," said Anderson, who encourages students from Jim Hill to get involved too.

Anderson said the two previous recipients of the award had both been special mentors for him, so he was especially honored to receive the award. Anderson plans to display his plaque in his office along with a book showing the pictures of students who have participated in the organization over the years.
