Three candidates interviewing for MSU College of Arts and Science dean

Three finalists are interviewing this week for the position of dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at Minot State University. The pool includes Holly Boomer, Rapid City, S.D., Conrad Davidson, Minot, and David Grettler, Aberdeen, S.D. The campus is invited to attend presentations by each of the candidates. Grettler will present Friday (March 28) at 3:45 p.m. in Main 106. Davidson's presentation was yesterday and Boomer's presentation was this morning at 10.

Boomer is the academic dean for National American University in Rapid City, a position she has held since 2006. Prior to that, she served as chair of the humanities and social sciences department at Oglala Lakota College in Kyle, S.D., for five years. Boomer holds a doctoral degree in English from the University of Nebraska in Lincoln and a master's and a bachelor's degree from Chadron State College, Chadron, Neb. She is currently taking courses in NAU's master of management program.

Davidson is currently serving as interim dean for the College of Arts and Sciences at MSU. Conrad is a professor of communication arts, who joined MSU in 1986 after teaching at the secondary level for 10 years. He was chair of the Division of Humanities from 1997 to 2006. Davidson earned a doctoral degree in English from the University of North Dakota, a master's degree from North Dakota State University and a bachelor's degree from Dickinson State University.

Grettler has been the dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at Northern State University in Aberdeen since 2005 and a history and geology professor since 1993. For two years, he also served as coordinator of the history department. Grettler was a historical archaeologist at the University of Delaware in Newark, where he received his doctoral and master's degrees in American history. He earned his bachelor's degree from Pennsylvania State University, Behrend College in Erie.

The chair of the search process is JoAnn Linrud, dean of the College of Business. She is being assisted by an advisory committee comprised of faculty members, students and administrators. Schedule for HLC team visit takes shape

The Higher Learning Commission evaluation team will be at Minot State University between March 31 and April 2 to gather evidence that the MSU's HLC self-study report has been thorough and accurate. The team's main working location on campus is the Westlie Room, which will be closed to other campus use from March 25 through the week of the visit. Pivotal meetings include:

The HLC team requires that the open meetings with selected constituencies are attended only by members of those audiences. The exit session is open to all, and a campus debriefing will follow soon afterward.

Donovan to introduce 'Women Artists: The Other Side of the Picture' Thursday

To celebrate Women's Heritage Month, Minot State University has been showcasing events based on this year's theme of "Celebrating Human Herstory." These activities highlight the significant contributions women have provided to the world culture.

On Thursday (March 27) at 3 p.m. in the Conference Center of the Student Center, there will be a video presentation called "Women Artists: The Other Side of the Picture" introduced by Andrea Donovan, assistant professor of art and humanities. This presentation will discuss the notable low percentage of women's art in major museums. Including interviews with practicing artists (including Doris McCarthy, Judy Chicago, Joyce Weiland, and Jane Ash Poitras), curators, art historians, and the "terrorists" of the art world, The Guerrilla Girls, this documentary examines the social history of women in the fine arts by looking at the suppression and the marginalization of female artists.

Women's Heritage Month activities wrapping up

On March 31 at 7 p.m. Aleshire Theater, a Women's Heritage lecture called "Missing Voices: Women's Experience in War and Combat" will be given by Christina Weber. The voices of women participating in war and combat have been largely absent in popular culture and historical documents of war due to women's restriction from official combat status. Yet women have played and continue to play a significant role in war, largely as a result of the increasingly blurred boundaries

between combat and combat support. Weber uses interviews with North Dakota women who have served in recent wars to tell of the dangers and hardships women experience in war and the challenges they face reintegrating into home and civilian life. Weber teaches sociology at North Dakota State University, and this presentation is also part of the Northwest Art Center lecture series.

The Women's Heritage Month student poster session will be held April 3 from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. in the Student Center atrium. MSU students will display posters, in any discipline, that focus on women's heritage. Prizes will be awarded for the three highest-scoring posters and also to the poster selected as the popular favorite.

On April 9 Women's Heritage Month activities will conclude with a presentation titled "Women and Hinduism," by J.A. Joshi, an alumna of the University of Wales, Cardiff. Her first presentation will be during a luncheon from 11:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the YWCA, 1020 North Broadway. At 4 p.m., she will speak in the Gordon B. Olson Library Media Center.

An art collection titled "Celebrating Women Artists: Selections from the MSU Collection" will be displayed in the lower level of the library through April 10. Curators are Michelle Borkhuis, Linda Olson, Erin Twomey, Mary Wager, and the MSU art department. Books related to Women's Heritage are also on display in the library.

MSU hosting Native American Honor Dance and Powwow

Native American dancers and drum groups from throughout North Dakota and neighboring states and provinces will compete during the 19th Annual Native American Spring Honor Dance and Powwow at the Minot State University Dome, April 4-5. The celebration will also include special Native American attractions.

This event, sponsored by the MSU Native American Cultural Awareness Club and the university, will honor all 2008 graduates. Two "Grand Entries," the time when the dancers enter the floor of the arena, are scheduled for 1 and 7 p.m. each day.

The "Honor Parade," in which all 2008 graduates are invited to take part, follows the 7 p.m. Grand Entry on April 5.

Dance competitions will be held for men, women, teens and juniors. The competition for men includes traditional, grass and fancy dancing. Women's dance competitions include traditional, fancy and jingle styles. Cash prizes will be awarded.

Drum money will be awarded to the first 10 drums. The host drum group is Eagles Thunder from the Spirit Lake Nation.

The celebration features educational presentations including: Native American traditional games by Marvin Bald Eagle Young Man, Turtle Mountain Band of Chippewa; Native American storytelling by Steve Davis, Turtle Mountain Band of Chippewa; display of Native American and hands-on project by Cassi Rench, Mandan, Hidatsa and Arikara Nation; Native American dance explanation by Greg Holy Bull, Standing Rock Nation; display of a Native American teepee and regalia by

NACA; and performance of songs for student participation by Eagle Thunder drum group.

Schools and organizations are invited to bring school-age children to the educational presentations on April 4 from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. On April 4 at 5 p.m., a traditional buffalo meal will be provided by the Mandan, Hidatsa and Arikara Nation.

The doors open at 9:30 a.m. on April 4 for the educational presentations and at 11 a.m. on April 5 with performances, demonstrations, dance competitions and the sale of Native American arts, crafts and food.

MSU women's basketball team loses quarterfinal heartbreaker

The Minot State University women's basketball team hit an apparent game-winning shot at the buzzer only to have it waved off by the court-side instant replay. The replay saved an 87-86 win for Morningside (Iowa) College in a quarterfinal game at the 2008 NAIA Division II Women's Basketball Tournament on March 15 in Sioux City, Iowa.

"For a minute of my life, I thought we were going to move on," MSU head coach Sheila Green Gerding said. "We had a very good shot at the end. It was such an incredible high at the end only to have it taken away."

The Beavers (21-11) in bounded the ball under their own basket to Lashay Bagsby, who had her initial shot blocked. Brittni Walker grabbed the rebound, scored and the signal was that the basket was good. After nearly five minutes of deliberation the basket was waved off.

Kendra Meyer, the Beavers all-time leading scorer, ended her stellar career with 15 points, four rebounds and three assists. Bagsby had a game-high 30 points and eight rebounds.

The Mustangs (33-3) had built a 16-point lead in the second half, but the Beavers fought back to lead 84-82 with 1:07 to play.

"What a great effort to battle back like we did," Green Gerding said. "Especially with having to play two overtimes (in Friday's second-round game) and how we thought our season was over and everything. We had our chances to win at the end. I couldn't be more proud."

The 2008 tournament marks the best finish for the MSU women's basketball program as an Elite 8 team—two upset wins, a double-overtime thriller, and a potential game-winner against a No. 1 seed.

ND higher ed budget would cap tuition in 2009-2011

Tuition at North Dakota's four-year campuses would be capped at 4 percent in 2009-2011 under a \$441 million North Dakota University System budget that received preliminary approval Monday. Students at two-year schools would see no tuition increases each year of the biennium under the proposal.

The limits on tuition increases are reliant on stable enrollment and the state Legislature funding other priorities, including \$57.3 million in salary increases, utilities and other operating costs. The Budget, Audit and Finance Committee of the State Board of Higher Education gave unanimous approval to the budget proposal during a conference call meeting.

The full board will vote on the proposal April 3. It represents a \$110 million, or 25 percent, increase in base funding for the university system. It also includes \$131.8 million in one-time funding.

Highlights of the proposal include:

- Average annual salary increases of 7 percent for faculty and staff
- \$1.3 million for campuses to hire more security officers and fund an emergency notification system.
- \$20.6 million in one-time funding for other security upgrades, such as keyless card entry, public announcement systems and improved lighting.
- \$18.5 million in equity dollars to narrow the gap between how North Dakota campuses are funded compared to their peers.
