MSU College of Arts and Sciences dean



Conrad Davidson, Ph.D., has been named dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at Minot State University, according to Gary Rabe, vice president for academic affairs. Davidson, a professor of communication arts, has been serving as interim dean for the College of Arts and Sciences since August 15. He will begin his new appointment July 1, 2008.

“The College of Arts and Sciences dean search committee needs to be commended for reviewing the credentials and interviewing several qualified candidates. At the end of the search process, it was clear that we had the best candidate already on campus,” said Rabe. “Conrad has the advantage of knowing the history of Minot State University as well as understanding how the College of Arts and Sciences will play a significant role in helping Minot State University achieve Vision 2013. I am delighted to have Conrad serve as a member of my administrative team.”

“Everyone on campus — staff, faculty, and administration — plays a part in supporting students and faculty as they engage in scholarship, teaching and lifelong learning. I value everyone’s place in that process,” said Davidson. “After 22 years on the campus, I look forward to serving Minot State University in a new capacity in support of that mission.” Davidson joined MSU in 1986 after teaching at the secondary level for 10 years. He was chair of the Division of Humanities from 1997 to 2006.

Davidson earned a doctoral degree in English from the University of North Dakota, a master’s degree in theatre from North Dakota State University and a bachelors degree in theatre from Dickinson State University. He received the 2007 Board of Regents Faculty Achievement Award in service.

Three finalists, including Davidson, interviewed at MSU during late March. JoAnn Linrud, dean of the College of Business, was chair of the search committee.

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the coordinator of the history department for many years and continues to oversee history service learning projects. These public history projects have allowed students to conduct research that contributes significantly to the history and culture of Minot. Examples of projects include downtown Minot, Eastwood Park and the university's upcoming centennial in 2013. Andreasen was instrumental in writing grant proposals for two successful and prestigious National Endowment for the Humanities summer institutes, of which she was the executive director. Her organizational skills, cooperation with colleagues, involvement of students, and her personal involvement with the community make her an outstanding choice for the excellence in service award.

Teaching—Bill Harbot, a faculty member in graphic arts since 1996, is an innovative and engaging teacher. Every project



he assigns to students is designed to be instructive but also fun and possess a unique twist. It is hard for students not to be engaged when they are being intrigued. Harbot exemplifies Minot State University's core value of "Students First." His advice and assistance entails more than just design and degree advising.

Often a bit of advice or just a sympathetic ear goes a long way, and Harbot is always available. His accessibility has been a key factor in the considerable growth that the graphic arts program has experienced over the years. Harbot has brought several guest artists to the university to speak to students and community members. Initially these speakers were individuals that he knew from his employment as a professional in graphic design. In recent years, Harbot has asked former students to speak. In a sense the network he has nurtured grows with each graduating graphic design student and has additional value in helping students find internships and jobs after college.

Teaching—Jerry Stai, a faculty member in the Department of Accounting and Finance, joined Minot State University in



1999. He teaches finance, a discipline that many students find difficult; however, student course evaluations consistently rank his teaching very high. He has a passion for teaching, and his students respect his commitment to facilitating learning for all students. In addition to transferring knowledge, Stai is very

focused on engaging students in the application of that knowledge. His previous professional activities and current business consulting give him perspective and experiences that supplement textbook information. Desiring to grow intellectually so he can give more to his students, Stai is pursuing certification as a chartered financial analyst. He has played an integral role in shaping the finance program. As the internship coordinator for the program, Stai works directly with students to create professional learning experiences.

Jennifer Sick began her employment at Minot State University in August 2003 as a part-time scheduling coordinator



in the records office. At the time, she was a full-time student finishing her bachelor's degree in elementary education and special education; she graduated in December 2005. In February 2006 Sick's full-time position of associate registrar was created. She is responsible for maintaining the undergraduate catalog and term and room

schedules and assists in providing data to various individuals on campus. In the past year Sick has worked to streamline processes with online forms and has provided CampusConnection and policy training to students, faculty and staff. Further demonstrating her professionalism and customer-orientation, Sick has developed training materials and instructional quick guides to make utilization of CampusConnection easier for students, faculty and staff. In addition, she is a full-time student pursuing a master's degree in special education.

As the president's executive assistant, Deb Wentz keeps President David Fuller on track and in the process, does the



same for the rest of the Minot State campus. She interacts every day with students, faculty, administrators, staff and community members and treats each in a respectful manner. Wentz started at MSU in November 2004 after working for over 20 years in the financial industry. She demonstrates MSU's core values by her

Nursing department releases results of two tobacco studies

The Department of Nursing at Minot State University recently shared the results of two new tobacco studies. One looked at the impact of North Dakota's smoke-free law on sales in restaurants and bars, and the second indicated how well businesses are complying with the smoke-free law, according to Kelly Buettner-Schmidt, department chair. Both studies were commissioned by the N.D. Department of Health Division of Tobacco Prevention and Control.

Beginning August 1, 2005, state law required most public places and workplaces to be smoke free with some exemptions.

The first study, authored by Buettner-Schmidt, reviewed taxable sales from 2003 through the third quarter of 2006 for the retail trade sector and for the food services and drinking places subsector. Major findings indicated that sales continued to increase after the smoke-free law was implemented.

“Previous studies done in cities and states that have enacted smoke-free laws have consistently shown that either there is no impact on sales in restaurants and bars or sales have gone up,” said Buettner-Schmidt. “This study indicates that North Dakota is following this positive trend.”

Findings from the second study, the compliance survey showed that overall compliance with the law is high. However, compliance rates were lower in co-located establishments – those located inside or connected to another business. Noncompliance included permitting smoking in areas required to be smoke free; not separately enclosing bars located inside another business, and not keeping doors of co-located establishments closed. The authors said that the high level of compliance with the current law suggests that establishing smoke-free laws to reduce exposure to secondhand smoke would be an effective method to reduce such exposure.

Co-authors of the compliance study with Buettner-Schmidt are Kathleen Mangskau and Clint Boots. Boots is employed by the tobacco prevention and control division and Mangskau was employed there during the time of the study.

Given that the U.S. Surgeon General warns that secondhand smoke causes early death and illness for those who do not smoke and that there is no risk-free level of exposure, the authors recommend that health care advocates and policy makers continue working toward establishing smoke-free environments in all public and employment places so all workers and patrons are protected.

HLC team visit was successful

A Higher Learning Commission evaluation team visited Minot State University March 31-April 2. The HLC team chair reported that the team’s recommendation was that MSU had met all five criteria for 10-year re-accreditation. While the team’s recommendations are preliminary and will not be formalized by the commission for about six months, the initial recommendation was very positive.

Her first presentation will be during a luncheon from 11:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the YWCA, 1020 North Broadway. At 4 p.m., she will speak in the Gordon B. Olson Library Media Center.

An art collection titled “Celebrating Women Artists: Selections from the MSU Collection” will be displayed in the lower level of the library through April 10. Curators are Michelle Borkhuis, Linda Olson, Erin Twomey, Mary Wager, and the MSU art department. Books related to Women’s Heritage are also on display in the library.

As part of Women’s Heritage Month, a poster contest was held April 3. The winners of the poster contest were: Dianne Walbeck, an English major from Minot, first place with her poster “Rosie the Riveter: The Women Behind the Myth;” Maggie Backen, a history and social science education major from Minot, second place for “Women of the Mexican Revolution;” and Jennifer Bloomberg, a history major from Minot Air Force Base, third place for “Nancy Drew.” Walbeck also won the People’s Choice Award. The YWCA provided cash prizes for the contestants. Twenty-two students submitted sixteen posters for the contest this year.

CampusConnection upgrade announced

Attention all faculty, staff, and students! This June, our PeopleSoft CampusConnection system will undergo a required upgrade to a new version. The impacts of this upgrade to you should be minimal and the information you use in the current system will be retained and transferred to the updated version. In fact, you will see some improvements in the look and feel of the system and in some cases you may notice improvements in how you step through a particular function/feature.

The project team, consisting of many technical, functional, and campus staff, has worked on the upgrade for several months and asks that you please review the following important information:

- The current CampusConnection production system will be unavailable from June 13 at about 6 p.m. CDT through most of June 18 while the final upgrade steps are performed.
- Although the production system will be unavailable during that time, faculty and staff will still be able to inquire and look up information in a copy of the system.
- In late April through June, instructional materials and open house informational sessions will be provided; however, please note that the team anticipates that minimal instruction will be required.

News from Minot State University-Bottineau

Minot State University-Bottineau provided the following update:

- The MSU-Bottineau Lumberjack hockey team captured its sixth National Championship in Canton, N.Y., on March 2. They defeated North Country Community College 8-1 in the semifinals, and overcame Monroe Community College 6-1 in the championship game. Three Lumberjacks were named to the All-Tournament team, and Tyson Friesen was the tournament MVP. Coach Travis Rybchinski was selected as coach of the year. (Lumberjack Hockey History: National Champions: 2008, 2007, 2003, 1998, 1991, 1986; National Runner-Ups: 1976, 1988, 1989, 1990, 1992, 1993, 1995, 1999, 2000, 2001, 2004)
- A search committee for an advertising/marketing instructor is reviewing applications and selecting candidates for interviews. Another search committee will be formed within the month to select a new head librarian. The library position will become vacant at the end of the calendar year.
- MSU-Bottineau's Registration Rally will be held from 1 to 4 p.m. on April 3. This event is a retention effort that was initiated in the spring of 2007. Last year it was a success in that significantly more students registered for fall than had done so in previous spring registration sessions. The rally incorporates student extracurricular activities and door prizes into the process and is held in an arena type environment.
- Several faculty members will participate in the "Great Teachers Seminar" in Medora in May. The seminar is not so much a gathering of teachers who are already great, as it is a group of dedicated educators in search of the great teacher within themselves.
- The college has applied for a Recreational Trail Program Grant to fund a walking trail or path through the campus. The trail will focus on native North Dakota plants, grasses and wildlife including individual stations that describe each feature's role in the environmental history of the state.
- The MSU-Bottineau horticulture and forestry departments are working with the City Council on a signage/beautification project for Highway 5 and Main Street. The landscape design will promote the horticulture and forestry programs to tourists and others as they travel through our community.
- A committee of faculty, staff and students is working on developing a new logo for the college's athletic teams. A logo contest will be advertised soon and it will be open to anyone interested.
