Prellwitz and Marquart speak at commencement

In looking ahead to Minot State University's centennial in 2013, Friday's ceremony will recognize the institution's strategic plan, "Vision 2013." The 2008 commencement speakers, senior Jacqueline Prellwitz of Willow City, and MSU alumnus David Marquart of Boise, Idaho, will address the strategic plan's second strategy, "Fostering Engaged Learning and Place for the Benefit of the Students."

Prellwitz from Willow City has completed a Bachelor of Science in Education with a middle school and reading endorsement while earning a 3.897 cumulative grade point average. She was recently recognized as the ATE Outstanding Student in Teacher Education in elementary education. Recipients of the award are selected by the Minot Association of Teacher Educators and MSU faculty members. The award is based on potential as a successful teacher and professional, interest in teaching as a career, personal qualities and character, accomplishments during college training, and academic ranking.

David Marquart graduated from MSU in 1965. He earned a Bachelor of Science in Education degree, with a major in business education and minor in mathematics. He went on to earn a Master of Education degree from the College of Idaho in 1973.

He retired in 2005 after teaching in the profession for 40 years. He was selected among the top-10 as a national finalist for the first NASA-sponsored "Teacher in Space Program" in 1985. For the next three years Marquart worked with NASA at the AMES Research Center in Mountain View, Calif., where he implemented educational space programs for teachers and students in the western states.

Minot State University to confer degrees Friday

President David Fuller will confer more than 700 undergraduate and graduate degrees during Minot State University's commencement exercises on Friday (May 9), in the MSU Dome beginning at 10 a.m. Commencement speakers are going to address Vision 2013, Strategy 2: Fostering Engaged Learning and Place for the Benefit of the Students.

Faculty members who intend to march in the processional should dress in academic regalia and arrive at the south end of the second floor of the Dome at least 10 minutes prior to 10 a.m.

All staff members are strongly encouraged to attend the commencement. If student assistance is not available during the two-hour block from 10 a.m.-noon, offices may close to allow staff members to attend this important event.

President Fuller invites all members of the MSU community to celebrate our student's achievements and the completion of their academic programs.

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Incoming freshmen from states and provinces within the Great Plains were invited to apply, and they had to achieve a 3.65 or above grade-point average in high school and a composite ACT score of 30-36 or a combined SAT score of 1340-1600 in order to qualify. The selection process also required students to submit an essay that demonstrated their civic engagement or their contribution to a sense of place.

To be eligible for the initial award and subsequent renewals, students must be enrolled in 12 credit hours and maintain a GPA of 3.3 or above. The scholarship will be paid in increments of \$3,500 per year, in equal installments each semester, for four consecutive undergraduate years provided all renewal criteria are met.

For clarification, once a staff senate representative has completed a two-year term of service, the individual is eligible to serve another two-year term.

NDCPD garners \$180,000 grant

Minot State University's North Dakota Center for Persons with Disabilities recently received a three-year \$180,000 federal grant from the Health Resources and Services Administration, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, to develop the Rural Health Network for Family Support. The purpose of the grant is to establish the RHNFS as a self-sustaining network to help rural families who have children with special health care needs. The network will strengthen its capacity to serve this population by achieving the grant outcomes in collaboration, training, system navigation and leadership.

"This grant will provide the resources for participating agencies to come together and create something that is difficult for any one organization to achieve alone," said Cathy Haarstad,

project director. "Network activities will benefit not only families and providers but participating network agencies as well."

To develop this rural health network, NDCPD will partner with Family Voices of North Dakota, the North Dakota Center for Rural Health, and several other family support organizations. RHNFS will serve families whose children meet the Maternal and Child Health Bureau, a bureau of the Heath Resources and Services Administration, broad definition "those who have or are at increased risk for chronic physical, developmental, behavioral, or emotional conditions who require health and related services of a type or amount beyond that required by children generally."

In March 2007, NDCPD received a one-year strategic planning grant to fund the North Dakota Family Support Coalition Project. This project's personnel focused on rural families with children with special health care needs who may have limited or no access to necessary specialized supports for ongoing health care. Over the past year, they completed five regional and statewide focus groups to access existing need and to develop a preliminary strategic plan to guide forming the RHNFS.

"The process, supported by and completed through the one-year planning grant, led to applying for a grant for what is the logical next step – establishing a self-sustaining network," explained Haarstad. "We couldn't be more pleased that the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services agreed."

The goals of the RHNFS are to operate a rural health network, to increase collaboration to enhance family support, and to secure the sustainability of the network. The project will support development of a new non-profit organization and board that will direct the network's efforts.

Haarstad said that through the year's work, the project's leadership has been able to overcome several significant trust crises and forge a positive working relationship that can serve as a model for other partners. The result of this effort has been that several additional agencies have signed a memorandum of agreement to join the network.

Summer Theatre prepares for another great season

"City of Angels," the first of four plays to be performed by Minot State University Summer Theater, will run from June 10 to 15. The other scheduled productions are: "Shakespeare in Hollywood," June 24-28, "Side by Side by Sondheim," July 8-12, and "Kim Me Kate," July 19-20 and 22-26.

Summer Theatre has been a tradition at MSU for more than 43 years. The company is made up of a variety of people including community members, MSU students, faculty and staff. Approximately, 8,000 -10,000 theatergoers attend the productions every summer.

All shows are in the MSU Amphitheater at 8:30 p.m. Tickets are \$8 for adults, \$7 for senior citizens and children

over 12, \$5 for children 12 and under, and \$3 for MSU personnel and summer students with current MSU ID. Reservations may be made by calling the Summer Theatre box office at 858-3228.
