



MSU commemorates 95th commencement

Minot State University is proud of its Class of 2008 undergraduates and graduates who earned degrees May 9. Approximately 700 undergraduate and graduate degrees were conferred, with about 600 to 650 students participating in the ceremony.

The 95th commencement ceremony honored the university's traditions and set some new precedents as well.

In a nod to its past, this year's graduates honored Gordon B. Olson, president emeritus. Olson was the longest-serving present of Minot State University, having been in office from 1967 to 1992. As its sixth president, Olson led the university through a period of significant growth and change. When Olson arrived at MSU, enrollment stood slightly more than 2,000, but by the 1991-92 academic year, enrollment topped 3,700. He spearheaded efforts to obtain new construction on campus; during his tenure, the Gordon B. Olson Library, the Dome, Hartnett Hall, and Lura Manor were built. He was also the driving force behind the effort to obtain university status, a goal finally achieved in 1987.

In looking ahead to Minot State University's centennial in 2013, the ceremony recognized the institution's strategic plan "Vision 2013." The 2008 commencement speakers, senior Jacqueline Prellwitz of Willow City, and MSU alumnus David Marquart of Boise, Idaho, addressed the theme "Fostering Engaged Learning," which corresponds to the strategic plan's second strategy, "Fostering Engaged Learning and Place for the Benefit of Students."

David Marquart, a 1965 MSU graduate, earned a Bachelor of Science in Education degree, with a major in business education and minor in mathematics. He went on to receive a Master of Education degree from the College of Idaho in 1973.

He retired in 2005 after teaching in the profession for 40 years. He was selected among the top-10 as a national finalist for the first NASA-sponsored "Teacher in Space" program in 1985. For the next three years Marquart worked with NASA at the AMES Research Center in Mountain View, Calif., where he implemented educational space programs for teachers and students in the western states.

Marquart told the graduating students that Minot State holds the distinction of having three alumni who were finalists in NASA's Teacher in Space program. It was the only university in the country that had more than one alumni represented in the program. Marquardt told the graduates that "failure was not an option" in the NASA space program and that Minot State has also practiced that philosophy. Years after he graduated from MSU, he said he received help from former professors when he needed it, including when he was about to teach a new computer class for the first time.

Prellwitz completed a Bachelor of Science in Education degree with a middle school and reading endorsement while earning a 3.897 cumulative grade point average. She was recently recognized as the ATE Outstanding Student in Teacher Education in elementary education. Recipients of the award are selected by the Minot Association of Teacher Educators and MSU faculty members. The award is based on potential as a

successful teacher and professional, interest in teaching as a career, personal qualities and character, accomplishments during college training, and academic ranking.

Prellwitz recalled racing back from a state track meet to attend her high school graduation, still wearing red tennis shoes. She wore a pair of new red high heels for her graduation from Minot State University. She used the analogy that she was like Dorothy in "The Wizard of Oz" and the years in between those graduations resembled the yellow brick road. Along the way, she armed herself with courage, heart and a premiere education, with the help of her instructors. Prellwitz told her fellow graduates that having a college degree does not mean they have all the answers. It means they are better equipped to seek them out along the way.

While Minot State University will be striving to achieve all seven strategies of "Vision 2013," each commencement ceremony for the next five years will carry a theme related to one specific strategy. In this way, each of the following graduation ceremonies will build upon the strategic plan and culminate in the 2013 ceremony, which celebrates Minot State's centennial.

Other features at this year's commencement were the presentation of flags representing the countries of MSU's international students and the performance of a Native American flag song. In this way, the university not only honors the cultures of international and Native American students but also demonstrates its goal to develop and support a diverse and multicultural campus in the near future.

MSU president announces streamlining of appropriated budget

In a May 12 communication President David Fuller updated the campus on efforts to adjust the appropriated budget in anticipation of a projected enrollment decline and deficit in the fall.

Following an April 17 letter to campus and meetings with each senate, University Cabinet and academic college, budget supervisors and vice presidents reviewed and revised recommendations and shared a draft with the departments. As a campus, savings of \$1,316,581 were identified and all recommendations were approved by an Ad-Hoc Budget Review Committee. These approved changes will be reflected in the final budget which must be submitted to the North Dakota University System office by May 30.

The budget number being submitted does not change the Compensation Task Force recommendation for an average 5 percent salary increase, including a 4.1 percent cost-of-living increase for employees with completed and satisfactory evaluations. The budget number is, however, \$183,419 less than the campus target, meaning that budget review will continue following the official enrollment numbers at the fall census date in September.

Fuller emphasized that these efforts are being undertaken in anticipation of continued enrollment and demographic

challenges and increased expenses. The streamlining work this year and next is focused on keeping Minot State University viable, competitive and strong as it continues to focus on the bright future, goal and strategies envisioned in Vision 2013.

Minot State hosts friend-raising golf tour in area communities

Mind/Brain Myth-busters seminar returns by popular demand

Educators from the region have been invited June 12-13 to examine popular myths and realities regarding "brain-based" teaching and learning. Last fall's Mind/Brain Myth-busters seminar was so well-received that some sessions are being repeated and new ones added. Consider whether the following are fact or fiction: Does the brain grow more neurons when we learn? Does exercise make you smarter? Are male and female brains different? What does synaptic pruning really mean for middle school students? So, what is an amygdale anyway? The Mind/Brain Myth-busters seminar in the Student Center Conference Center will help those attending understand what is myth and what is real.

Minot State University's Center for Applied Study of Cognition and Learning Sciences was approved by the North Dakota University System in September 2007 and has been

developing seminars and applied research studies designed to connect findings in research to classroom practice. Eighteen faculty members attended the Learning and the Brain Conferences sponsored by the Harvard Mind, Brain and Education program and others during 2006-2007. MSU faculty members, along with P-12 educators and experts from the community will provide information and interactive discussion on topics such as perception, attention, memory, motivation, emotion, reading, math, substance use/abuse, gender differences, sleep, exercise, left/right, nature/nurture and the like.

News from Minot State University-Bottineau

The education coordinator position on the Minot campus is open and will be posted shortly. Patsy Reike's last day is June 13.

MSU-Bottineau has met with David Brunkow from GFB Consulting to set up a fundraising campaign through our foundation. The goal is to add \$100,000 yearly to the organizations general fund.

Gov. John Hoeven was very well received at our graduation on May 9. We were very pleased in that he stayed to socialize with graduates, friends and relatives until the building was nearly empty.

We recently received \$200,000 from the Center of North American Coalition for our Entrepreneurial Center for Horticulture (ECH) project. It will go toward the match we are working to secure for the \$1,500,000 grant we have on the priority list with the federal government's economic development administration. The grant funding can be used for building construction and the center will attempt to put a structure(s) in place before the end of fall. The type of structure will depend on cost and priority. The master plan for the ECH is to use the northwest quadrant of the campus; a focus of the ECH is organic production.

MSU-B is also submitting a \$250,000 request to the state for a Center of Excellence grant for the same project.

A \$100,000 grant application has been submitted to the North Dakota Parks Department for a walking trail on campus. We have titled it the Forestry Walking Trail and it will focus on our Nature, Technology, and Beyond theme.

Our book read committee has chosen "Walden" by Henry David Thoreau as our selection for the 2008-2009 book read seminar series.

A new marketing instructor and a new librarian have been hired. We need to fill a coaching position and a director of residential life/activities position.

Enrollment of new students for next fall is up 25 percent from last year at this same time.
