MSU wins against flood waters



The Souris River reached a crest of 1,561.72 feet at 11 p.m. on June 26. Minot State University reopened July 5 after fighting off the flood waters of the "Mighty Mouse."

MSU's dry and beautiful campus is bustling with activity. The Beaver Creek Café remodel, College for Kids, athletic camps and Summer Theatre continue. Construction crews will be drilling holes for phase one of MSU's geothermal conversion, the football stadium fitted with new stadium seats, steel beams are in place to form the foundation for the new Wellness Center and the residence halls provide respite for emergency and cleanup crews.

Minot State's campus, buildings and services were spared. The university is preparing to start classes and host many events and activities in the fall semester.

Area educators attending NPWP

More than 20 North Dakota educators are on both Minot State University's campus and in Bismarck for MSU's annual Northern Plains Writing Project Summer Institute and Advanced Summer Institute. The Summer Institute runs July 5-29, while the Advanced Summer Institute is from July 5 to 22. NPWP is in its eighth year of instruction.

"The Writing Project is an intense experience for many teachers. Each year, teachers from across the state come together to discuss what they do in the classroom, experience the joy of writing and share educational theories and practices that shape and improve what they do with students that build their students' writing," said Ron Fischer, associate professor of English and NPWP co-director. "The daylong activities really help them bond and build a network that lasts throughout the year."

"After teachers go back to their schools, a change begins. They start to teach and interact with their students differently. As a result, the students end up benefiting the most."

As one of two National Writing Projects sites in North Dakota, NPWP receives funding from the university, the state and the federal government. This year, stipends pay for a majority of the teachers' tuition, credits and housing. All 200 Writing Project sites across the nation bring about educational reform by following the model of "teachers teaching teachers."

And, thank you countless numbers of volunteers for your selfless giving. These generous acts contributed to MSU's service to its students, employees and community.

Minot State advances to NCAA Provisional member

Officials at Minot State University were informed July 8 the university was granted National College Athletic Association Division II Provisional member status by the governing body.

MSU will spend this year as a provisional member of the NCAA and looks to complete the four-year process in July 2012. MSU will be an NCAA Division II independent for the upcoming school year, but it has been selected as a member of the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference beginning in the 2012-13 school year.

"The NCAA personnel who called indicated that they view Minot State University as a very solid DII institution," said Rick Hedberg, athletic director. "That's exciting to hear because our entire campus has worked very hard at this process. Our coaches, student-athletes and everyone across campus have done a wonderful job of embracing this move. Their attention to the requirements of the NCAA during this transition has been outstanding and the committee was very aware of that."

The university began the transition to NCAA Division II rules and regulations during its second year of candidacy but will now be required to meet all regulations and abide by all rules during the provisional status. MSU will also be required to

submit any violations to the Northern Sun office. The university will go through a compliance blue print review this fall, serving as a follow-up to the NCAA membership committee site visit that took place in April.

"This is one more step toward Minot State University realizing its goals within Vision 2013 on becoming a premier institution in the Great Plains," Hedberg said. "This is an exciting final step in our transition."

JCEMP and InC Graduation Celebration slated for July 27

In a unique graduation celebration, Minot State University will honor 20 graduates in two programs in Ann Nicole Nelson Hall on July 27, 2-4 p.m. Fourteen students from the Job Corps Executive Management Program and six students from the Intercultural Cohort Program will earn a Master of Science degree. A reception will immediately follow the event.

The guest speakers this year, Cadd Rosborough and Martin Dahl, represent alumni of the first cohort in both groups. Rosborough, a fellow in the inaugural JCEMP cohort, came to the program as the business community liaison at the St. Louis Job Corps Center. She presently serves as center director at the Fred G. Acosta Job Corps Center in Tucson, Ariz. Dahl enrolled in the first InC cohort in 2007. He joined 15 students from China, two from East India and nine domestic students. He is currently the McLean Electric Cooperative's chief executive officer and general manager.

MSU and Job Corps collaborated to create the JCEMP, the only program of its kind. The 2011 graduating class is the program's 10th group of junior to mid-level Job Corps managers who aspire to be center directors; they come from Job Corps Centers across the country. They will possess master's degrees in management or information systems. A U.S. Department of Labor earmark sponsored by former North Dakota Senator Byron Dorgan funds the JCEMP.

"This is another excellent year. The students have formed a bond that will last their entire Job Corps careers and their lives," said Lorraine Willoughby, director of JCEMP and professor of business information technology. "These fellows not only survived the course work but also survived the historic Mouse River flood. This is a testament to their determination to not let anything stop them from succeeding. I am very pleased to have the opportunity to share MSU, the College of Business and North Dakota with this excellent group of fellows."

In InC's on-campus version of the Master of Science in management program, students complete a 12 or 24-month program of study, taking one or two eight-week courses at a time. Students are required to complete applied research projects in intercultural teams. This gives them an opportunity to learn more about each other's cultures and business practices.

"The International Cohort Program has been a wonderful opportunity for the American students to interact with our international students," said Gary Ross, chair of the Department of Business Administration and director of the InC Program. "Both groups have grown from the experience and learned about each other's cultures."

First NDUS staff advisor named to SBHE

The North Dakota University System Staff Senate has appointed Janice Hoffarth, an administrative assistant in the University of North Dakota Department of Music, to serve as the first staff advisor to the State Board of Higher Education.

Approved by the 2011 Legislative Assembly, HB 1213 provides for the addition of a non-voting staff advisor to the SBHE. Hoffarth will serve a one-year term ending June 30, 2012.

"North Dakota University System staff members are integral to the success of higher education in our state," said Jon Backes, SBHE president. "The staff voice will be a valuable addition to our board discussions. We welcome Janice Hoffarth as the first staff advisor to the board."

An Esmond native, Hoffarth was one of six statewide winners of the 2010 Governor's Award for Excellence in Public Service. She was the 2008-09 UND Staff Senate president. That same year, she was elected the first president of the SSS, which was convened in 2008 with the approval of Chancellor Bill Goetz. Each of the 11 campuses has at least one SSS representative. The group represents more than 8,000 full and part-time NDUS employees.

Hoffarth will join John Girard, Minot State University professor of business administration and business information technology, as an advisor to the board. On July 1, Girard began his second oneyear term as the non-voting faculty advisor to the SBHE. He recently was reappointed to this position

by the NDUS Council of College Faculties. A third campus representative also serves on the board; a student from one of the 11 NDUS campuses will be named by Gov. Dalrymple to serve for the 2011-12 term. As an appointee of the governor, the student representative is a voting member of the board.

Minot State saddened by death of Wiley Wilson

Minot State University athletics lost one of its most storied coaches June 15 with the death of longtime track and field and cross country coach Wiley Wilson.

Wilson was a head coach at MSU from 1968 until 1997. He guided 17 NDCAC Conference and District Championship teams in track and field as well as cross country. During his tenure at MSU, he mentored 10 NAIA All-Americans and 240 individual conference and district titles. He was elected into the Minot State Hall of Fame in 1998.

Wilson was born in Tennessee in 1931, but he grew up in Stanton. Wilson attended Dickinson State University and served four years of service in the U.S. Air Force before earning an undergraduate degree at DSU. He earned his master's degree in physical education from the University of North Dakota and then began teaching and coaching in the northwest part of the state.

In 1965, Wilson began working at Minot Model High School and within three years was at the helm of the track and field teams at Minot State. He reinstated cross country at MSU a year after coming to the university.

A funeral service was held June 18 in Fargo. In lieu of flowers, the family prefers memorials to the Wiley Wilson Endowment Fund at Minot State University. Memorials can be sent to the Advancement Office.

Northwest Art Center receives arts grant

To provide regional arts programming, Art Friends of the Northwest Art Center secured a \$7,355 institutional support grant by the North Dakota Council on the Arts.

The Institutional Support program benefits artists, arts organizations and the general public. The program provides general support for qualifying arts and cultural organizations that have proven they have strong management and leadership, quality artistic programming and services, and are an important part of the arts infrastructure in their communities.

The grant will provide funds for the Northwest Art Center's two galleries, the Hartnett Hall Gallery and Gordon B. Olson Library Gallery. It will also finance programming for the Northwest Art Center lecture series.

"The Northwest Art Center is a valuable educational and cultural resource for northwest North Dakota," Avis Veikley, Northwest Art Center director, said. "School groups from throughout the area take field trips to our galleries, and our lecture series draws audiences from the community at large as well as the university."

The galleries focus on exhibitions by contemporary artists. About 20 exhibits are presented each year, featuring a cross section of local, regional and national talent. Lecture series speakers include university faculty, regional lecturer, and visiting scholars. All exhibitions and lectures are free and open to the public.
