

Bobylev granted MSU's first patent

In December, Mikhail Bobylev, associate professor of chemistry, obtained a United States patent for a method of synthesis of new agrochemicals and pharmaceuticals. Because of his research, what previously took hours in the laboratory can now be completed almost instantly.

Before coming to the U.S. 20 years ago from Russia, Bobylev obtained 16 to 18 patents in his homeland and one in Finland. This is his first U.S. patent, and Bobylev is the first MSU faculty member to secure a patent.

U.S. News ranks MSU online programs among best

The U.S. News & World Report announced Jan. 15 Minot State University's College of Business online graduate programs and MSU undergraduate online programs rank among the country's best online education programs. Recognizing the growing significance of online



education in the university experience and the unique, numerous factors involved in making online degree programs successful, U.S. News released its annual "Top Online Education Programs" rankings.

Among universities reporting their graduate business program practices, the CoB's online Master of Science in management and Master of Science in information systems ranked sixth in the nation (86.8 points) for "Student Services and Technology." They also ranked 25th (82.3 points) for "Admissions Selectivity," 47th (68.8 points) for "Faculty Credentials and Training" and 57th

(61.4 points) for "Student Engagement and Accreditation."

"Online delivery of our graduate programs is important to the College of Business. We are thrilled to rank so well among our national peers. Our faculty have been committed to online education for over a decade, and our best feedback comes from our students. It's very gratifying, however, to see that we compare well with other universities," said JoAnn Linrud, College of Business dean. "MSU's Center for Extended Learning and instructional technology staff are incredibly dedicated to making online education work for our students."

For the overall performance of its online undergraduate programs, MSU ranked 17th (65.0 points) for "Student Engagement and Assessment" and 41st (76.8 points) for "Student Services and Technology." MSU's online bachelor's degree programs include management, management information systems, marketing, international business, nursing for registered nurses, general studies, applied management and applied business information technology.

According to Linrud, about 16 percent of CoB students take their major business program completely online, while approximately 80 percent take at least one course online.

"When you consider that a majority of our students take some portion of their programs online, we strive to make courses available to them and pay attention to their needs. Our high rankings are attributable to our dedicated faculty and staff. As a pioneer in online education, MSU has finetuned its offerings and procedures," Linrud said.

U.S. News ranked online bachelor's degree programs and online master's degree programs in business, engineering, nursing, education and computer information technology. Programs needed to have at least 80 percent of their course content available online.

"This year has been an incredible year of growth. I see a definite need for nursing advocacy, and I have really enjoyed working with NSA," the Minot native said. "Going into the state competition, I'm honored to be the first male Student Nurse of the Year, or SNOY (pronounced 'snow-ee,' to represent Minot State."

One of three finalists selected by MSU's NSA, Crawford won after being interviewed by a three-judge panel. He will advance to the state competition Feb. 2 in Grand Forks.

"To address an often-expressed community need, we have organized open-studio opportunities," said Linda Olson, Division of Humanities chair. "We look forward to working with community members with an interest in our specialties."

A highlight of the open-studio workshops is "China's Terracotta Warriors: The First Emperor's Legacy" in Minneapolis with Linda Olson, ceramics professor. Participants will meet Saturday (Jan. 19) to visit the Minneapolis Institute of Art and see this special exhibition; a tour of the oriental ceramics and a discussion will be held.

Other workshops include "Ceramics Open Studio" with Olson and Robin Reif, art instructor, in Pioneer Hall ceramics studio on a selected Thursday, Jan. 24 through March 7; "Introduction to Airbrushing" with Bill Harbort, art professor, Feb. 20; "Image Transfers" with Ryan Stander, art instructor, March 6; "Monotype Night!" with Micah Bloom, assistant art professor, March 27; and "Photograms" with Stander April 10. Photograms, or camera-less photography, are images made by placing objects on the light-sensitive photo paper and exposing it to light.

Alumnus John Greenslit to share life's journeys

John Greenslit, alumnus, will visit Minot State University Tuesday (Jan. 22) as part of the Distinguished Alumni Series. His career journey has encompassed the areas of education, government service, business management, marketing and consulting and sales.

"I hope to share with students the need to master communication skills, accept adversity, develop support networks, seek mentors and maintain ethics, integrity and humility," Greenslit said. "I also want to encourage them to never forget the background and support that provided their careermobility opportunities, while recognizing family values."

Greenslit will meet with students in

fitness and physical education classes and tour MSU's campus and its new Student Wellness Center. Within the community, he will present to the Kiwanis, a service club, and meet with Ron Merritt, Minot Park District director.

After enjoying several career avenues, Greenslit was recruited in November 2010 to direct the Eaton County Parks Department, located in Grand Ledge, Mich. He manages nine county parks and over 306 acres at a combination of sites, trails and recreation facilities.

The Morton, Minn., native began his career at Minot State College; following his 1960 graduation, he substituted for a faculty member on sabbatical. During 1960-61, he was head tennis coach, assistant football coach and Minot Model High wrestling coach. He also started an intramural program and operated as the sports information office.

Greenslit taught middle school science and coached track and cross country and wrestling in St. James, Minn., from 1961 to 1963. While at St. James, he completed master's degree coursework at Mankato State University and was named a National Science Foundation Scholar in geology and astronomy, studying at Carleton College.

The alumnus returned to his alma mater during 1964-66 as a health and physical education teacher, intramural director and assistant football coach. He also provided sports information to media and assisted with alumni relations. In 1966, Gov. William Guy appointed Greenslit to his cabinet as the director and state liaison officer for the North Dakota Outdoor Recreation Agency.

Greenslit received a master's degree in health, physical education and recreation administration from Central Michigan University in 1976, after moving to Michigan in 1972.



Mondon examines world's writing systems

Jean-Francois Mondon, assistant professor of foreign language, will present "What All Writing has in Common" Jan. 22 in Aleshire Theater at 7 p.m. as part of the Northwest Art Center lecture series. All lectures are free and open to the public.

Mondon will discuss the similarities of writing systems. He holds bachelor's, master's and doctorate degrees in linguistics from the University of Pennsylvania, focusing on historical linguistics and phonology, the study of how sounds are represented in the brain.

A question-and-answer period and informal reception will follow the presentation.
