More than 760 undergraduate and graduate students were eligible to cross the stage during the May 10 commencement exercises. Commencement speakers addressed Vision 2013 Strategy VII: "Ensuring Future Institutional Viability, Vitality and Growth."

MSU-BSC honors graduates

Graduates of the Minot State University-Bismarck site celebrated commencement May 16 at Bismarck's Radisson Hotel. The 2009 inaugural reception celebrated the achievements of 29 graduates; this year, that number has nearly doubled to 46 graduates. Melissa Spelchen, MSU criminal justice instructor, served as the mistress of ceremonies.

"Making the student feel important without the original campus environment is key to the success of the university's extended learning programs. It is also important for the student's motivation, success and completion of their degree," Spelchen said. "The MSU at Bismarck graduation reception, started by Dr. (Kristen) Warmoth, CEL dean, and Bobbi Jo Zueger, student services coordinator, is the culmination of this whole process. The level of sincerity in the reception's speakers, as it applies to the pride for the graduates' commitment, achievements and their families, is unparalleled. It is a wonderful celebration to be a part of."

Summer Theatre prepares for 'rocking, fun'

"Shrek, The Musical," based on the Oscar winning 2000 animated movie "Shrek" by Dream Works Animation and book by William Steig, kicks off this year's Minot State University's Summer Theatre season. It retells the nontraditional fairytale of the reclusive ogre, Shrek, and his sidekick, Donkey, and the not-so-helpless Princess Fiona,



as they seek and fight for their idyllic futures. Filled with clever and loveable characters, this production will be a family favorite this season. It runs from June 11 to 16, under the direction of Chad Gifford, Summer Theatre assistant artistic director and Minot High School Central Campus language arts chair.

Other scheduled productions include the musical "25th Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee." This show runs June 26-30.

"The Nerd" is a comedy by Larry Shue about making promises leading to dysfunctional obligations. This show runs July 6 to 10.

After over a decade of absence, "Jesus Christ Superstar" closes the season July 18 to 23. This 1960s rock opera recaps the swift rise to fame of Jesus, his radical teachings and the apostles who supported or betrayed their beloved teacher. Filled with intensity, humor and sentimentality, Andrew Lloyd Weber's memorable score provides an emotionally stirring experience.

"Like every season, I'm really excited about getting the season started. That's the best part. I'm looking forward to good weather, new shows and a great season," said Kevin Neuharth, Summer Theatre director.

Summer Theatre is celebrating 48 years and is comprised of community members and MSU students, faculty and staff. Each year, the company performs four or more shows for over 10,000 attendees.

All shows are in the MSU Amphitheater at 8:30 p.m. Tickets are \$8 for adults, \$7 for senior citizens and children over 12, \$5 for children 12 and under and \$3 for MSU personnel and summer students with current MSU ID. "This institute demonstrates the enduring relationship chamber music has with musicians, as performers of all ages gather to share and experience great music and friendships," said Erik Anderson, associate professor of music.

Generally, chamber music includes any music performed by a small number of performers with one performer to a part. The word "chamber" signifies that the music can be performed in a small room, often in a private salon with an intimate atmosphere.

Minot State University Staff Senate and a student group in the College of Business' leadership development initiative fundraised for Minot's Domestic Violence Crisis Center in April. The two MSU entities designated their financial contributions furnish an apartment in DVCC's transitional living apartments.

MSU Staff Senate spearheaded a silent auction April 8-12. On May 13, MSU Staff Senate members presented a \$1,688 check to DVCC.

"Staff Senate was proud to turn over \$1,688 raised during a silent auction to the Domestic Violence Crisis Center. The money will be used to furnish an apartment in the new transitional living apartment complex that broke ground May 13," Julie Keller, who chaired the silent auction. "DVCC lost its transitional living apartments during the 2011 flood and MSU Staff Senate felt this was a way to give back to the community."

The student group gave \$503, canned goods and toiletries to DVCC. The CoB leadership development initiative, funded by an endowment from alumnus Roger Looyenga, was established to help business students develop a better understanding of self-awareness, selfmanagement, social awareness and relationship management.

American and Peruvian nurses to learn from each other

Six Minot State University nursing students and a nursing faculty member, Dawn Fredrich, arrived in Arequipa, Peru, May 19. As part of a study-abroad tour, they will observe the Peruvian health care system with Universidad Alas Peruanas Nursing Department faculty and students. MSU nursing students will be exposed to differing health care techniques and practices used to serve the population in Peru. The MSU group will return home June 10. This is the second visit for MSU nursing students and faculty. They initially visited Arequipa in May 2011.

"Nurses in Peru go to school for five years and must complete two years internship, one in the hospital and one in rural public health. They are very knowledgeable and study most of the same curriculum we do," Fredrich said.

For the first time, three UAP students and three faculty members will visit MSU and surrounding health care facilities and nursing opportunities June 16-29. They will tour various medical facilities in North Dakota, focusing on the differences in how health care is provided for the citizens and how the nursing profession is different.
