Minot State University to host math conference

Minot State University is hosting the second North Dakota Undergraduate Mathematics Conference Sept. 20, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., in Model Hall. NDUMC is a one-day meeting designed to provide an opportunity for undergraduate and high school students to present their mathematical research or projects in a professional setting. Students are strongly encouraged to present in the areas of mathematics and mathematics education. Students who are not presenting are strongly encouraged to attend and learn more about mathematics and potential mathematics careers.

NDUMC will feature two keynote presentations, undergraduate student presentations and a panel discussion about careers in mathematics.

"We are so pleased that we received funding to host the North Dakota Undergraduate Mathematics Conference on MSU's campus," said Narayan Thapa, assistant mathematics professor and conference director. "We are one of approximately 35 sites in the nation to be chosen this year; it is such an honor."

'Black Gold Boom' featured in Northwest Art Center lecture

In "Black Gold Boom," Minneapolis-based journalist and documentary filmmaker Todd Melby explores the recent phenomenon of oil- and gas-producing counties experiencing rapid growth and industrialization, the effects of which trickle across North Dakota. His presentation, part of the Northwest Art Center lecture series, is Sept. 8 in Aleshire Theater, 7 p.m.



A Hettinger native, Melby is the lead producer of "Black Gold Boom," a public media project documenting North Dakota's oil boom. His stories have aired on U.S. public radio stations, including NPR shows. He is a senior producer at 2 below zero, a public media nonprofit, and he has won multiple national journalism awards, including a pair of Edward R. Murrows and Sigma Delta Chi awards.

Futurepalooza set for Sept. 9

Futurepalooza, an annual signature event, showcases professionals and post-secondary schools highlighting career and educational opportunities for high school students. Minot State University will host Futurepalooza Sept. 9 in the Dome. Exciting presentations and informational booths will be free and open to students, parents and community members from 9:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

"Futurepalooza will be bigger this year with some fun additions. We expect more than 800 North Dakota high school students to attend. Kyle Scheele, a youth motivational speaker, will show students how their lives will be defined by the actions they take, the people they help and the lives they change," said Derek Van Dyke, admissions counselor and Futurepalooza organizer. "High school students will have the opportunity to experience what MSU has to offer!"

Sixty-one presenters from 16 career cluster will participate in round table sessions with the students. They will discuss their education backgrounds and the steps they took to achieve professional success.

Post-secondary schools and military branches from across the region will also exhibit at the event. These include 42 colleges, universities, institutes or academies from North Dakota, Minnesota, South Dakota, Manitoba and Montana.

"Futurepalooza could be one of the most important events students attend this year," said Kevin Harmon, assistant vice president for enrollment management. "We have experts from a wide variety of career fields and every North Dakota higher education institution in the same place at the same time!"

Weight loss and fitness research study needs participants

Minot State University's Department of Teacher Education and Human Performance is seeking female participants ages 40 to 65. The participants will engage in a unique experience to explore an emerging new method of delivery and programming for group exercise. An information session with application submission will be Friday (Aug. 28) at Aleshire Theatre at 7 p.m.

"The Transitions and the Circuit Resistance Training studies are two wonderful opportunities for women age 40 to 65 to lose weight, get fit and meet new friends," said Terry Eckmann, physical education professor.

WELLBEATS Transitions is cutting-edge fitness programming designed by Linda Shelton, a world-renowned leader in the fitness industry. Shelton will come to MSU to train students to teach Transitions.

"The Circuit Training Research is a replication of a study MSU students and I conducted 10 years ago," Eckmann said. "The results of the study were quite impressive. The average weight loss was six pounds, the most lost was 15 pounds."



This research project is seeking women age 40 to 60 years of age who have not exercised for three months or exercise sporadically. Women must be 10 pounds over ideal body weight, according to Metropolitan height/weight chart (online) or over 25 percent body fat.

Caroline's Carts have arrived at Minot's Marketplace Food stores

The North Dakota Center for Persons with Disabilities, a Center of Excellence at Minot State University, and Marketplace Foods have collaborated to make Caroline's Carts available at each Marketplace Foods location in Minot.

Caroline's Carts were created by parents who realized their daughter would eventually outgrow a typical shopping cart. Their mission was to make carts available to retailers everywhere to enable individuals with special needs to participate in mainstream society through the common activity of grocery shopping with their family.

Caroline's Carts permits parents and caregivers to do grocery shopping without having the impossible task of maneuvering a wheelchair and a traditional grocery cart at the same time.

Dianne Bossert, Minot Infant Development Program project director, approached Craig Heupel, South Broadway Marketplace Food manager, about purchasing a cart for his store. Recognizing the community need, Heupel was supportive and instrumental in securing a cart for each of Minot's five Marketplace Foods stores. Heupel also promised that Marketplace Foods personnel will meet families at their vehicles with Caroline's Carts so that families will not have to transfer individuals from

their vehicles, into wheelchairs and then into the carts. After receiving a call, Marketplace Food personnel will meet a family at their vehicle.
