## Five at Minot State earn achievement awards

Three faculty members and two staff members received special honors during Minot State University's Annual Employee Appreciation Banquet, March 23. The awards and their recipients are:

MSU Board of Regents Faculty Achievement Award—Ruth Kihm, social work, Shirley Cole-Harding, addiction studies, and David Rochholz, teacher education and human performance.

MSU Board of Regents Staff Achievement Award—Robert Feller, Information Technology Central, and Tammy Wolf, career services.

The faculty achievement awards recognize excellence in the areas of teaching, scholarship and service. The staff achievement awards recognize staff members for outstanding service to the university and the community.



KIHM, a licensed certified social worker and a lecturer of social work, was recognized for excellence in teaching. She initially started at MSU in 1999 as a counselor. In 2001 she began her teaching career, after 13 years of direct social work practice, mostly in the state's rural areas. Her professional experience includes the areas of rural and global social policy, human services administration and delivery, program development and international service learning.

Kihm's interest in global policy and service learning has resulted in her developing an interdisciplinary international service learning class and leading three trips of students to Guatemala. She also places her students into the local community and integrates multiple levels of community experience into her classes. Kihm believes that learning needs to be dynamic and collaborative between the teacher, the student and the world. She sees her role as assisting students to learn to risk and be open to change, to be broad and critical thinkers, and to constantly renew insight about themselves and the world around them.



COLE-HARDING, associate professor of psychology and a faculty member since August 1992, was recognized for excellence in scholarship. Before coming to MSU, she had been a postdoctoral research associate at the University of Chicago and a graduate and professional research assistant at the University of Colorado-Boulder. Cole-Harding is known as one of the most dedicated researchers and scholars on MSU's campus. Her work has been presented in numerous publications and professional meetings. She is tireless in

her research and spends long hours working to provide students with the research base they need to get into graduate school. She was involved with and presented findings from numerous faculty-student research projects. The titles of a few of these projects include:

ROCHHOLZ, assistant professor of physical education and human performance program director, joined MSU in 1987. Rochholz was recognized for service and as a quality model of putting “students first.” He has been instrumental in developing relationships with ten area fitness centers and hospital-based wellness programs to provide MSU students with a wide variety of quality field experiences. His leadership, research, and dedication have led to the development and implementation of numerous academic and fitness opportunities for the student population. A few examples of his work include the development of the bachelor of science in corporate fitness and the physical education concentration in the master’s of education. Rochholz has been the guiding force in the creation of a quality fitness center for students, faculty, and staff, as well as a separate weight room for the athletic teams. In addition, he has served as an advisor for the Minot State Club of Physical Educators (MSCOPE) and as a member of numerous university committees.



WOLF has been with Minot State since November 1993. She currently serves as the secretary in career services and is a key member of that office. Her talents, innovative ideas and organizational skills, have assisted in the expansion of services. Wolf is very professional and provides excellent customer service

to students, alumni, faculty, staff, and the general public. She always remains a calm, reassuring presence despite constant interruptions. For a time, the career services and enrollment services offices were combined, and Wolf was a great asset during this transition. She was reliable and receptive to new ideas and challenges; she enthusiastically undertook additional duties and responsibilities. Friendly, warm, caring, and dedicated, Wolf always looks for ways to be more creative and efficient in providing services to the students.

FELLER, the electronics specialist in Information Technology Central, came to Minot State in July 1977. Over the years, he has participated in the rollout of numerous technology initiatives, including the wiring of



the campus fiber backbone network and the implementation of the Interactive Video Network (IVN). Currently, he is responsible for the customized architecture of the campus “smart” classrooms. These technology-enhanced rooms help create new opportunities for faculty teaching and student

learning. Because of Feller’s skill level in working with multimedia equipment, MSU also hosts many training sessions for outside organizations. His role at ITC requires that he work closely with faculty, staff, and students to orientate them in the use of classroom technology. He makes himself accessible to the campus community; he can be found setting up the electronics in a classroom, troubleshooting in a faculty office, or helping a student set up for a presentation. In addition, he has served two terms as Staff Senate president, and he is an active member of MSU Beaver Boosters.

## Sando Named Distinguished Educator

Robert Sando, professor emeritus of business, was named Distinguished Lifetime Educator by the MSU Faculty Senate at the Annual Employee Appreciation Banquet. The award is made to a retired faculty member who has exhibited outstanding contributions to the university during their employment and after retirement.

Sando retired in 2002 as professor and dean of the College of Business, a position he held for seven years. Prior to that, he served as chair of the business information technology department for ten years. He began his employment with MSU in 1966 and throughout the years served on numerous university committees. He was the first co-recipient of the Burlington Northern Faculty Achievement Award in 1985. With his personal funds, Sando created a special scholarship for MSU business students.

Sando continues to be very active in the MSU Athletic Department and Beaver Boosters. He served on the board of directors for Beaver Boosters for 14 years and was president in 1991-1992. In addition, he was Minot State University’s faculty athletic representative to the NDCAC and helped form the DAC conference.

He has represented the university very well in the community. Especially noteworthy is his service in Sertoma. Sando was in charge of the Christmas in the Park initiative. He was named Sertoman of the Year in 1999 and 2002 and District Sertoman of the Year in 2005. Sando also served

on the Minot City Planning Commission for 15 years, directed the Business and Community Assistance Center, was an ex-officio member of the Minot Area Development Corporation (MADC) and worked closely with the Minot Area Growth through Investment and Cooperation (MAGIC) Fund. He received the MADC Chairman's Award in 1999 for his economic development efforts.

Even after his retirement, Sando remains committed to MSU. In addition to his involvement with the Beaver Boosters, he also participates in the MSU retired faculty group and regularly supports MSU activities and events. In 2003, he received the MSU Alumni Association's Golden Award.

## Discussion on creating book and film and screening of 'Waterbuster' slated today

Paul Vandevelder, author of "Coyote Warrior: One Man, Three Tribes, and the Trial that Forged a Nation," and J. Carlos Peinado, producer, writer, and director of the documentary "Waterbuster," are making two public

presentations at Minot State University today. The first presentation at 2 p.m. in Old Main 104 is geared toward students and will examine the research, writing, and production of book and film. The second session at 7 p.m. is intended for students and the public. It will include a screening of the film "Waterbuster," followed by panel discussion with Vandevelder and Peinado.

"Coyote Warrior" tells the epic story of the three tribes that saved Lewis and Clark's Corps of Discovery from starvation, their century-long battle to forge a new nation, and the extraordinary journey of one man to redeem a father's dream—and the dignity of a people. Author Vandevelder has been an investigative report, photojournalist, and documentary filmmaker for more than 20 years. His award-winning work has appeared in the "New York Times," "National Geographic Traveller," "Audubon," "Esquire," and the "Seattle Times."

"Waterbuster" is the name of the 78-minute film produced and directed by Peinado, an enrolled member of the Three Affiliated Tribes on the Fort Berthold reservation. The filmmaker said, "In the story of my people, water is a force of nature, as well as a force of human history; it is a thing that both creates and destroys. 'Waterbuster' is a film about these forces and how my people have responded to them." Peinado has been a filmmaker and an actor and has worked as a field producer for WNBC, New York.

The events are sponsored by the North Dakota Humanities Council and by MSU organizations including the Department of History, Native American Studies Program, History Club, Intellectual Climate Committee, Student Association, Alumni Association and Development Foundation. The Lillian Wald Award is given to individuals, agencies, or media depicting exemplary public health nursing practice to the public, especially in political, legislative, professional, or interdisciplinary activism. It is presented by the American Public Health Nursing Association and only one award is given each year.

All lectures are held at 7 p.m. in Aleshire Theater and are open to the public. Admission is free.

## **Friday’s social work symposium focus is domestic and dating violence**

Domestic and dating violence is the subject of the Student Social Work Organization’s annual spring symposium “Men as Allies,” April 7, in the MSU Conference Center. Registration begins at 8:30 a.m.; the symposium runs from 9 a.m.-4 p.m., with the awards social following at 4 p.m. The featured presenter is Ben Atherton-Zeman, a spokesperson for the National Organization for Men Against Sexism. He will present two sessions. The 9 a.m. session will cover the myths surrounding domestic and dating violence and the 10 a.m. presentation is titled “Consent: Beyond Yes and No.”

In addition, Atherton-Zeman will perform “Voices of Men,” an informative and entertaining multi-media play, at noon. The production deals with important issues such as sexual assault and date rape, dating and domestic violence, sexual harassment and objectification. The play uses humor, celebrity male voice impressions and video clips to bring

these topics to life in a way that minimizes defensiveness and promotes learning and understanding. The MSU Student Activities Committee is providing free lunch to attendees of this session.

Other presenters and panel members include officers of the Minot Police Department and representatives of domestic violence centers, abused women’s services, and child, adolescent and family services.

Users of ConnectND’s PeopleSoft systems will share information and participate in more than 50 presentations and discussions during a North Dakota Higher Education Users Group conference April 11-12 at Minot’s Sleep Inn.

This event is patterned after the annual conference of the national HEUG, but it will feature topics and information tailored specifically to North Dakota users of PeopleSoft/Oracle products. Individuals from the North Dakota University System's 11 campuses and administrative office will present the sessions and lead the discussions. Topics to be covered include finance, human resource management systems, student recruitment and admissions, financial aid, student records and student finance. Presenters from Minot State University are Debra Chandler, Center for Extended Learning, and Mark Anderson, controller.

The NDUS Inter-functional Team, of which Anderson is a member, will be the primary source for generating changes in the ConnectND system. This team has worked with the various ConnectND user-groups to organize the conference.

## **SBHE authorizes hiring of new ConnectND manager**

On March 27, the State Board of Higher Education voted unanimously to authorize Chancellor Robert Potts to hire a full-time ConnectND project manager. Potts said this position could be filled before the end of May; it would be the ConnectND project manager's responsibility to get the administrative software system functioning fully.

Board members also directed Potts to recruit a new chief information officer to replace Grant Crawford, who is resigning June 30. Both new hires would work on an interim basis for six months to one year and could apply for a permanent position.

## **MSU hosting Native American honor dance**

Native American dancers and drum groups from throughout North Dakota and neighboring states and provinces will compete during the 17th Annual Native American Honor Dance and Spring Celebration, at the Minot State University Dome April 21-22. The celebration will also include special Native American attractions.

The powwow-style event, sponsored by the MSU Native American Cultural Awareness Club and the university, will honor all 2006 graduates.

Two "Grand Entries," the time when the dancers enter the floor of the arena, are scheduled for 1 and 7 p.m. each day. The "Honor Parade," in which all 2006 graduates are invited to take part, begins at 8 p.m. on April 22.

Dance competitions will be held for men, women, teens, juniors and tiny tots. The competition for men includes traditional, grass and fancy dancing. Women's dance competitions include traditional, fancy and jingle styles. Cash prizes will be awarded. Dance specials include NACA street clothes.

Drum money will be awarded to the first 10 drums. The host drum groups are Kawacatose Singers from Regina, Saskatchewan, and Little Shell from New Town.

The celebration will include special attractions, such as a Native American hoop dance exhibition by Terrance Little Tent; a Native American traditional games activity by Marvin Bald Eagle Young Man; comedian performances by Dominic Redwater Jr.; a teepee display by NACA and a youth drum performance by "Day Child" from Dunseith.

Teachers are invited to bring school-age children as educational presentations for them are planned on April 21 from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. In the evening, a traditional buffalo meal will be provided by the MSU Native American Cultural Awareness Club.

The doors open at 10 a.m. each day with performances, demonstrations, dance competitions and the sale of Native American arts, crafts, and food, taking place throughout. Admission to the Honor Dance and Spring Celebration is \$3 for ages 12-55; it is free to children under 14, senior citizens, and MSU students, faculty and staff.
