Minot State University to confer degrees Friday

President David Fuller will congratulate more than 650 undergraduate and graduate students, as they cross the stage during Minot State University's commencement exercises on Friday (May 14), in the MSU Dome beginning at 10 a.m. Commencement speakers will address Vision 2013, Strategy 4: Building a Diverse and Multicultural University Climate.

Faculty members should arrive at the south end of the second floor of the Dome dressed in academic regalia by 9 a.m.

All staff members are strongly encouraged to attend the commencement. If student assistance is not available during the two-hour block from 10 a.m.-noon, offices may close to allow staff members to attend this important event.

President Fuller invites all members of the MSU community to celebrate our student's achievements and the completion of their academic programs.

Graduate and USAF colonel to speak at commencement

In looking ahead to Minot State University's centennial in 2013, this year's commencement will highlight a key goal within the institution's strategic plan, "Vision 2013." On Friday (May 14), graduate students will participate in a hooding ceremony at 8 a.m. in Ann Nicole Nelson Hall. The commencement ceremony for graduate and undergraduate students will begin at 10 a.m. in the Dome.

Minot State alumni Tom and Gloria (Urness) Myhra will be special guests at commencement. The relationship between Gloria, an Alkabo native, and Tom, a Crosby native, blossomed while they were college students, and they married in August 1955. In June 1957, they were the first married students to receive their degrees at the same Minot State commencement ceremony. The Myhras had very successful teaching careers. Now retired, they live in Fridley, Minn.

The 2010 commencement speakers, senior Jillian Cenaiko and Colonel Robert M. Walker, the 91st Operations Group commander at Minot Air Force Base, will address Vision 2013's fourth strategy, "Building a Diverse and Multicultural University Climate."

"Commencement marks one of the biggest transitions in our lives. While some of us are pursuing further education, others are beginning careers," Cenaiko said. "Nonetheless, Minot State University has prepared us all to be competent, ethical and successful professionals."

Cenaiko, a native of Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, has completed a Bachelor of Science degree in communication disorders within

three years, while earning summa cum laude distinction. As part of the communication disorders program, she received clinical experience in pediatrics. She exemplifies student engagement with her involvement at the university and within the community.

Cenaiko participated in the National Students Speech Language Hearing Association, the MSU Dance Team, the MSU Cheer Team and Red Alert, a new student group established to ignite school spirit and rekindle tradition on the Minot State University campus. In the community, she worked as cheer coach for Surrey High School and the Minot High School junior varsity team. During last year's flooding, she also assisted in the sandbagging effort.

In fall 2010, Cenaiko will begin working toward a master's degree in speech-language pathology at State University of New York at Geneseo.

At Minot Air Force Base, Walker is responsible for the safe, effective operation and maintenance of 15 Minuteman III intercontinental ballistic missiles from 15 remote missile alert facilities and seven UH-1N aircraft used in support of missile-field activities dispersed over 8,500 square miles.

Walker entered the United States Air Force in August 1981, and he has served in a number of operations and staff positions to include test and evaluation, officer assignments and joint operations. His test and evaluation experience includes assignment to Vandenberg Air Force Base, Calif., in Strategic Air Command's Top Hand program. As chief of the Space and Missile Officer Assignment Team at Randolph Air Force Base, Texas, Walker led the space and missile career field during the most dramatic period in career field history.

Walker's operational experience includes missile combat crew duty at Whiteman Air Force Base, Mo.; a tour of duty in the National Military Command Center, Pentagon, Washington, D.C., in space operations, nuclear command and control, contingency operations and as Single Integrated Operational Plan advisor to the deputy director for operations, NMCC. He commanded the First Aces, 10th Missile Squadron, Malmstrom Air Force Base, Mont., and served as deputy commander, 460th Operations Group, Buckley Air Force Base, Colo. Walker is a fully qualified joint specialty officer. Prior to assuming his current position, Walker was the chief of the Operationally Responsive Space Division, Directorate of Requirements, and Headquarters Air Force Space Command.

Moen appointed interim academic vice president

Selmer Moen, professor of mathematics and computer science, will serve as interim vice president for academic affairs at Minot State University, according to President David Fuller.



Moen, a longtime faculty member at Minot State, started his career at Mount Union College, Alliance, Ohio, and Friends' University, Wichita, Kan., before joining Minot State as an assistant professor in 1978. He was promoted to full professor in 1996 and was the chair of the Department of Mathematics and Computer Science from 1998 to 2004 and Faculty Senate president from 1986-87. His level of administrative experience, deep understanding of Minot State University, his attention and his care to academic issues and student needs will serve him well as interim vice president.

Moen will begin his new position on Aug. 1, while working on the transition with Gary Rabe, current vice president for academic affairs, before that time. A national search for a vice president for academic affairs will begin this fall, with an expected start date of July 1, 2011.

Minot State Registrar Jennifer Sick will resign effective this August to accept a position with Minot Public Schools. Sick started with Minot State as a student in 2003 and became registrar in August 2008.

“While it will be tough to replace Jennifer, we are glad to see her pursue her desire to be involved with special education,”

said Gary Rabe, vice president for academic affairs. “Jennifer earned her master’s degree in special education, and we wish her the best as she applies her knowledge from that field into the classroom. Jennifer was a key leader in many new initiatives at MSU. She has been a progressive and respected leader on campus.”

The registrar is responsible for the oversight and management of registration and student records.

Sick began her employment at Minot State University as a part-time scheduling coordinator in the student records office. At the time, she was a full-time student finishing her bachelor’s degree in elementary education and special education; she graduated in December 2005. In February 2006, Sick received promotion to associate registrar. She earned a Master of Science degree in special education from MSU in 2009 and was a 2008 recipient of an MSU Board of Regents Staff Achievement Award.

“I’ll miss a lot of the individuals that I’ve worked with over the years, yet, I am very grateful for the responsibilities I’ve been given and the chance to grow and learn,” Sick said.

As registrar, Sick oversaw a team whose tasks included maintaining the undergraduate catalog, scheduling courses and classroom space, maintaining records, advising students, assigning advisers, evaluating transfer credit, providing official and unofficial transcripts and training users of the PeopleSoft student database.

Brown assists graduate students with scholarship opportunity



A financial assist from well-known alumnus, Minot native and longtime basketball coach Dale Brown will go to provide a local student with a scholarship for graduate school at Minot State University. In a classic pay-it-forward response, Brown has provided a graduate school scholarship in memory of James Norton, the Minot businessman who personally financed Brown’s master’s degree.

“What Jim Norton did for Dale Brown five decades ago is truly remarkable,” said Marv Semrau, vice president for advancement. “At a time when Brown was unable to find a bank willing to loan him the money to attend graduate school, Norton went out of his way to approach Brown with a personal loan to take care of classes for Brown.”

Now, Brown is giving back in the form of a full-tuition scholarship to help a Minot State graduate student achieve their educational goals.

Brown said without Norton’s financial gift, he does not think he would have earned the college education he was looking for, and in turn, he may not have ended up as successful in his career endeavors. Well known for the 25 years he spent as the head basketball coach of the Louisiana State University Tigers, Brown became the second “winningest” coach in Southeastern Conference history.

Norton was born and raised in Minot and enlisted in the U.S. Army after graduating from Minot High School in 1947. After earning his bachelor’s degree in business administration, he worked in Fergus Falls, Minn., Fargo and Williston before returning to Minot in 1955. As a businessman, Norton organized the opening of the First Western State Bank in Minot and later purchased Minot Restaurant Supply before retiring in 1992. He was a strong supporter of Minot athletic events and was active in civic affairs and multiple community organizations. Norton died May 4, 2002.

The Minot State University Graduate School offers advanced degrees in subjects such as education, math, science, music, criminal justice, information systems and management. To be eligible for this scholarship a student needs to apply before the June 1 deadline, be currently or previously from Minot and planning to attend classes on campus as a full or part-time student.

Minot State names Peter Stewart as men's basketball coach

Minot State University has named Peter Stewart as its 14th head men's basketball coach, Athletic Director Rick Hedberg announced April 26 at a press conference.

"Peter has a variety of experiences, from playing at the NCAA Division II level at UND to the playing and coaching at a professional level overseas, to the last seven years at Peninsula College," Hedberg said. "He has a great outgoing personality that connects well with student-athletes and community members and that's real important as we move forward to NCAA Division II."

Stewart has been the head coach at Peninsula College in Port Angeles, Wash., for the past seven seasons. He led his team to the North Division Conference Championship three times, the most recent in 2007-08. Stewart was named the conference coach of the year twice, first in 2003-04 and the latest in 2007-08. His Peninsula College team has played in the postseason six of the past seven seasons and has placed in the postseason four of the past five years.



Stewart has coached at all levels of basketball, including stints at MSU-Bottineau (now Dakota College at Bottineau, 1987-88), Adams State (1992-93), Minot State (1993-94), the Malaysian Professional Basketball league (1995) and the Australian Professional Basketball League (1989-1996 as a player and coach). He coached his team to the 1995 Malaysian Basketball League Championship.

A 1989 graduate of the University of North Dakota, Stewart played four seasons for the Sioux, being named team captain and selected as the North Central Conference Academic Player of the Year. He is pursuing a master's degree in exercise physiology, sport and leisure science through Adams State College, Alamosa, Colo.

Hedberg believes Stewart will be an important part of the Beavers move to the NCAA.

"We have some challenges ahead of us with our move to DII, but I am confident that Peter will be able to meet those challenges," he said. "We are excited about the future of our men's basketball program and excited about our department. We have a good group of coaches in place."

Stewart, a native of Parshall, is married to Julie Ann Stewart, and they have three children.

Stewart was named as the head coach after a national search began in March.

NDATE names Elaine Larson 2010 Distinguished Educator

Elaine Larson, associate professor of education and director of teacher advisement and field placement at Minot State



University, received the North Dakota Association of Teacher Educators Distinguished Educator Award at the 2010 Institute for Educational Leadership Conference on April 16. The distinguished educator award recognizes demonstrated leadership skills as an officer or committee chair in the local organization, active

participation in the local organization, demonstrated leadership skills as an officer or committee chair in NDATE and proven experience of having supervised student teachers or practicum teachers for a minimum of three years.

As the teacher advisement and field placement director, Larson has served as the human interface with hundreds of teachers, supervisors, administrators and students on Minot State's behalf. Her work, which has extended across the country and internationally, has helped North Dakota maintain a reputation in the educational community for the highest quality new teachers. She has been active in the local, state and national ATE, holding many offices and serving on many committees.

Larson believes learning is a life-long process. After graduating from Makoti High School, she received a bachelor's degree from Minot State. Larson went on to complete a second

bachelor's degree and a master's degree at North Dakota State University, Fargo. In 2006, she acquired her doctorate degree from the University of North Dakota, Grand Forks.

NDGA members chosen for National Teacher Leadership Academy

The National Geographic Society recently selected Julia Koble, David Norton, Nolan Spooner and Joe Super to attend their National Teacher Leadership Academy. The team of four are North Dakota Geographic Alliance members and Minot High School Central Campus biology teachers. Koble, Norton and Spooner are also Minot State University alumni. The four MHS teachers will be part of a 60-teacher consortium selected from across the nation that will study ways to use research-based pedagogical techniques and will receive materials to implement ocean sciences in their classrooms the next school year.

“Ocean education on the plains may seem far-fetched. This workshop will help broaden our sensitivity and knowledge of ocean science,” Super said. “National Geographic is one of the most respected sources of researched-based education. This leadership institute will provide our department with instructional material to bring our students and community a global view of our unique position here in North Dakota and how we are connected to the ocean.”

The “2010 Summer Geography Institute: Ocean” is the first phase of the program. It is a weeklong residential Institute in La Jolla, Calif., on the Scripps Institution of Oceanography campus from July 10 to 17. Teachers will learn to integrate “Ocean” content into their high school biology courses.

Wellness works

Skin cancer is preventable

Skin cancer is the most common form of cancer in the United States. The two most common types of skin cancer, basal cell and squamous cell carcinomas, are highly curable.

Skin cancer begins in cells. When the orderly process goes wrong, cells develop when the skin does not need them, thus, forming a mass of tissue or tumor.

Melanoma, the third most common skin cancer, is more dangerous, especially among young people. It is much less common than other skin cancers, but it is far more serious.

Signs and symptoms to watch for include:

- Skin — any change in the skin especially in the size or color of a mole.
- Appearance — scaliness, oozing or change in the appearance of a bump or nodule.

- Color — spread of pigmentation such as past the edge of a mole or mark.
- Change in sensation, itchiness, tenderness or pain.

People with certain risk factors are more likely to develop skin cancer. Risk factors vary for different types of skin cancer, but some general risk factors include lighter natural skin color, a family/personal history of skin cancer, excessive sun exposure (ultraviolet rays) through work and play, a history of sunburns early in life and multiple or atypical moles.

Skin cancer is preventable. The best way to lower skin cancer risk is to “choose your cover” by seeking shade from UV rays (especially during the midday), covering up to protect exposed skin, wearing a hat with a wide brim, grabbing shades that block both UVA and UVB rays and rubbing on sunscreen, of at least SPF 15 or higher and possessing both UVA and UVB protection. For the best protection, individual should reapply sunscreen every two hours.
