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The team departed for Mitchell, S.D., on July 11. They will reside on Dakota Wesleyan University's campus during the excavation project at historic Fort James, which is located on property owned by the Rockport Hutterite Colony. Students will receive hands-on instruction in the use of various kinds of field equipment and techniques of excavation and artifact recovery, site mapping, documentation, and record keeping at the excavation site.



The principal investigator for the excavation is Mike Fosha, chief archaeologist, Archaeological Research Center, South Dakota State Historical Society. Margaret Sherve, associate professor of English, and Mark Timbrook are site coordinators and instructors. Eunice Timbrook is assisting in lab operations and health and welfare on site. The MSU team will return July 23.

Kevin Johnson, an alumnus, with 33 years of local and federal law enforcement experience, will speak to Minot State University criminal justice classes Monday morning (July 19) and to the Rotary at noon. A security consultant and private investigator for DynaSec International, Inc., he specializes in cyber crime and computer-related security.



Johnson was a nuclear security specialist with the United States Army Military Police Corps and a deputy sheriff and a patrol sergeant with the Ward County Sheriff's Department. In 1983,

the Federal Bureau of Investigation hired him, and Johnson began his 23-year career with the bureau.

Prizes, including scholarships, will be awarded at each event.



MSU to host InC and JCEMP graduation celebration

In a unique graduation celebration, Minot State University will honor 22 graduates in two programs in Aleshire Theater on July 28, 2-4 p.m. Three students are from the Intercultural Cohort Program, and 19 students are from the Job Corps Executive Management Program. A reception will immediately follow the event.

The JCEMP, a collaboration between Minot State and Job Corps Centers, is the only program of its kind in the country. The 2010 graduating class is the program's ninth group of junior to mid-level Job Corps managers who aspire to be center directors; they come from Job Corps Centers across the country. A U.S. Department of Labor earmark sponsored by North Dakota Senator Byron Dorgan funds the JCEMP.

"This is another excellent year. The students have formed a bond that will follow them throughout their entire Job Corps careers and their lives," said Lorraine Willoughby, director of JCEMP and professor of business information technology. "I have also enjoyed learning more about Job Corps from each one of them. It is a pleasure to have worked with each student."

In its third year, Minot State's on-campus version of the Master of Science in management program has both foreign and domestic graduates. The InC Program combines international and domestic students. Students complete a 12 or 24-month program of study, taking one or two eight-week courses at a time. Students are required to complete applied research projects in intercultural teams. This gives them an opportunity to learn more about each other's culture and business practices.

"The International Cohort Program has been a wonderful opportunity for the American students to interact with our international students," said Gary Ross, chair of the Department of Business Administration and director of the InC Program. "Both groups have grown from the experience and learned about each other's culture."

Minot State granted Year Two status

Minot State University cleared the next hurdle in becoming a National Collegiate Athletic Association Division II program.

The NCAA notified the school July 12 it has advanced into Candidacy Year Two in the membership process.

"This is an exciting time and great news for the university," MSU Athletic Director Rick Hedberg said. "It is kind of like last year at this time when we were notified for the Year One. We want to celebrate this decision and then look to the future."

The telephone call from the NCAA is just another step in the demanding three-year process.

"I think the biggest thing for us has been working on the compliance end. While Assistant Athletic Director for Compliance Melanie DeBoer-Brunsdon has been a key component to that, it really has been a campus-wide effort,"

Hedberg said. "We have had to put a lot of strategies in and that only can come from having a number of great committees."

During Year One, the school hired DeBoer-Brunsdon; it produced a detailed budget, constructed a Compliance Handbook, met with an NCAA Division II institution during a one-day visit to Minnesota State-Moorhead and attended the NCAA National Convention.

"The NCAA seemed happy with our progress. There certainly are some things we have to work on, but we are on the right track," Hedberg said. "Last year was like we were building the car. This year, we have to test drive and fine tune it, and next year, we will need to be ready to go full bore."

Educators attended ISRC/Special Education Summer Institute at MSU

Educators from a variety of disciplines serving children with disabilities attended this year's ISRC/Special Education Summer Institute on Minot State University's campus, July 6-8. The institute's theme was "Cognitive Science Meets Behavior: Brain-based Learning Strategies for Young Children with Disabilities." Holly Pedersen and Johnna Westby, assistant professors of special education, and Alan Ekblad, chair of the special education department and associate professor of special education, were co-directors of this collaborative effort between the ISRC project and the Department of Special Education.

"As a result of this collaboration, students and professionals from across North Dakota learned from networking with each other and from participating in group projects and discussions," Ekblad said. "Overall, it provided a sense of connectedness and common purpose for all participants working in a variety of rural settings."

Prompted by a significant need in North Dakota for trained personnel to work with infants, toddlers and young children with low-incidence disabilities and their families, MSU secured a four-year grant from the U.S. Department of Education to create the Personnel Development to Improve Services and Results for Children with Disabilities project (ISRC) in 2009. The ISRC grant funding will conclude in May 2013.

Originally envisioned to fill a need in North Dakota, ISRC has had a greater impact. A national need exists for trained early intervention personnel, and this project has developed a rural distance training model that can be replicated in other states.

Topics included implementing research priorities, review and applications of standards of practice, recruiting and retaining diverse students and faculty and professional workforce

The Department of Nursing held an internal educational session on their newest high fidelity simulation unit, Noelle and Newborn HAL. This birthing and newborn simulator will allow students to engage in life-like scenarios practicing their ability to critically analyze health events, intervene appropriately, and provide high quality care. Volunteers for NDUSSS committee requested

The North Dakota University System Staff Senate is forming a committee to follow the retirement plan budget woes of the North Dakota Public Employees Retirement System and report to the NDUSSS. Sparb Collins, NDPERS executive director, presented at NDUSSS' June meeting; the NDUSSS membership

agreed to form a committee, which would follow this topic more closely and keep the NDUSSS membership informed of developments. Members of this committee do not need to be a current member of the NDUSSS, but they should be a full-time staff member having Staff Senate experience.

Currently, NDPERS has three proposals, which will go to interim committee this summer. Then, the three proposals will go to the North Dakota Legislature during the next legislative session

The committee's charge is to track the status of the budget shortfall and prepare a recommendation for the NDUSSS. This would include recommending the NDPERS option which best addresses NDUS staff concerns about the fund shortage. The committee would also prepare a final report and make a next-step recommendation to the NDUSSS.

Additionally, the State Board of Higher Education has included a proposal in its budget request to have both the NDPERS and the TIAA-CREF retirement plans increased by one percent for each of the next three years with a one percent staff match.
