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MSO performs 'Animals Galore' family concert

Minot Symphony Orchestra continues its 2014-15 season, "Worlds Colliding," Saturday (Jan. 24) in Minot State University's Ann Nicole Nelson Hall with a family concert titled "Animals Galore" at 7:30 p.m.

The audience will hear the many ways the animal world has been represented with orchestral colors with Saint-Saens' imaginative "Carnival of the Animals" and other pieces. Minot High student Mya Temanson, the MSO High School Soloist Competition winner, will be the featured soloist.

Children can arrive early for the instrument petting zoo. A lecture precedes the concert at 6:30 p.m.

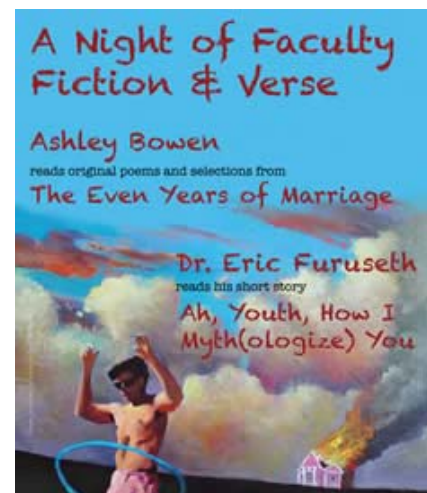
NAC lectures feature short story, poems and film

The Northwest Art Center lecture series opens Monday (Jan. 26) with readings from Minot State University authors Eric Furuseth and Ash Bowen and continues Feb. 4 with an encore screening of Micah Bloom's "Codex," an original film about books affected by Minot's 2011 flood. Both programs begin at 7 p.m. in Aleshire Theater.

Furuseth, humanities associate professor, will read his short story "Ah, Youth, How I Myth(ologize) You." Bowen, humanities assistant professor, will read original poems including selections from "The Even Years of Marriage," his Orphic Award-winning volume.

Bloom, art assistant professor, will introduce and briefly explain the making of "Codex," which premiered in 2013 and went on to achieve national recognition. "Codex" received a first-place award at the Curator/Ruminare Film Prize in New York City and an honorable mention in the Fargo Film Festival, with a March screening slated there.

The lectures are free and open to the public. Informal receptions will follow the programs.

To combat blood cancer, Minot State University Residence Life and Housing office and Student Activities is spearheading Pennies for Patients, its annual fundraiser for The Leukemia & Lymphoma Society. As part of the fundraiser, a Penny Carnival, open to the public, is Jan. 27 in the Dome from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m.



"Last year, MSU raised \$5,044.68, but this year, we hope to raise \$5,500! So, campus departments should display those buckets because the competition runs through March 13," said Camila Van Dyke, residence life coordinator.

MSU students, faculty and staff and community members are encouraged to enjoy and participate in the Penny Carnival. Campus organizations and departments host booths, games or activities for any age. Festivities include bounce houses, face painting, ring toss, cake walks and more. All games will range from 25 cents to \$1. All parking lots are free and open to the public.

"Each year, we try to add a little something extra to make every carnival better than the last," said Aaron Hughes, student activities coordinator. "This year, we are excited to add a main stage act to the event. Ivan Pecel will take the stage at 6:30 p.m. with a comedic juggling act that will be fun for the whole family!"

Affordable Care Act enrollment event slated

Individuals seeking information on the Affordable Care Act Marketplace or accessing health insurance coverage can find help Feb. 5 in Bismarck. Minot State University's North Dakota Center for Persons with Disabilities, the North Dakota Disabilities Advocacy Consortium and the North Dakota Economic Security & Prosperity Alliance are organizing a free, public enrollment event at Bismarck's First Presbyterian Church, 214 East Thayer Avenue, from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Enrollment navigators will be on site to assist attendees enroll through the federal Marketplace, www.Healthcare.gov. The Marketplace is the "go to" place to shop for health insurance coverage.



Anyone interested in applying for health coverage should bring photo identification, income verification and documents showing the citizenship or immigration status of each person applying.

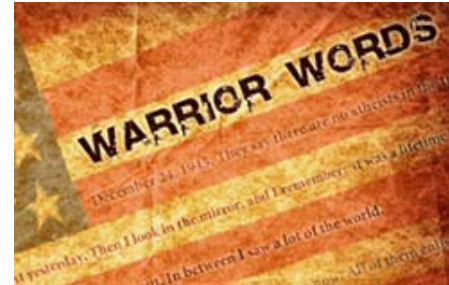
Marketplace open enrollment for 2015 ends Feb. 15; and if individuals enroll by this date, their coverage can begin as soon as March 1. If people do not enroll in coverage during 2015, they may have to pay penalties.

Some individuals may still think they cannot afford health insurance. Navigators can assist them in shopping the Marketplace to see what their options are and if they qualify for lower costs based on their household size and income or if family members might qualify for other insurance programs for children or families with limited income.

Warrior Words II: Veterans of U.S. wars presented monologue writing

Veterans of U.S. wars presented work they completed in Warrior Words Jan. 13 in Minot State University's Aleshire Theater. Warrior Words is a monologue-writing workshop offered by The Greater Grand Forks Community Theatre in four North Dakota cities. Conrad Davidson, College of Arts and Sciences dean, taught the Minot workshop, which consisted of six sessions. Minot presenters included Mike Carswell, Myron Dammen, Charley Epperson, Orlan Hall, Tim Knickerbocker, Lucille Loftesnes, Larry Schoenwald, Alan Waller and Max Zurcher.



"We expected stories about sacrifice, but there was also humor, as veterans from various generations and branches of service shared their experiences," Davidson said.

Warrior Words was open to veterans of any American war or conflict who had an interest in creating work based on their experiences as soldiers. The workshops were funded in part by the North Dakota Humanities Council, a nonprofit, independent state partner of the National Endowment for the Humanities. Additional support was provided by Minot State.

Faculty and staff achievements

Five Minot State University students, **Suzannah Miller, Samuel Olson, Chloe Ondracek, Hriday Thakkar** and **Jordan Torgunrud**, attended the Joint Mathematics Meeting in San Antonio, Jan. 10-13. The five students gave presentations on the undergraduate research they are pursuing under the direction of **Narayan Thapa**, mathematics assistant professor.



Miller presented "Comparison of Numerical Procedures in Water Pollutant Transport Modeling," while Olson discussed "Stability Analysis of Inverse Modeling Problems in Chemical Kinetics." Ondracek elaborated "On the Numerical Solution of sine-Gordon Equation with Method of Lines." Thakkar highlighted "Neural Network Techniques Used to Mine Data in Astronomy," and Torgunrud presented "On the Numerical Treatment of Water Pollution." Thapa also presented a session on his own research, "Frechet Differentiability of Parabolic Partial Differential Equation."

These presentations formed parts of sessions featuring the research of undergraduate and graduate students, university faculty and invited lecturers from around the world. The meeting is hosted by the American Mathematical Society and the Mathematical Association of America and is the largest mathematics meeting in the world.
