Office of the President Minot State University Report to Faculty, Staff, Student Leaders, University Cabinet, Alumni, the Foundation Board, and the MSU Board of Regents April 11, 2007

Current Issues and Topics

Senate Appropriation Committee Presentation

The North Dakota Senate voted to forward a revised higher education bill to conference committees. The amendments included salary increases of 5%/5% for higher education faculty and staff, and for MSU, the support for Swain Hall at \$6.5 million, the support for the Dome floor at \$387,000, and one-time increased amounts for deferred maintenance needs.

Vision 2013 Action Plans and Teams

Teams have been established to review the action plans proposed by faculty and staff at this year's convocations. A team for each of the seven strategies has been appointed to review, revise, and propose plans to the Planning and Budgeting Council and President's Staff. The plans will be completed by the end of the spring semester.

Artspace

A meeting with the city of Minot officials and MSU representatives focused on the potential for funding the Artspace building and MSU's portion of the proposed building. The city continues to be committed to an Artspace project in Minot. Artspace representatives are working to seek federal, state, and privately raised dollars secured from MSU. Although there was no new news about additional dollars from those sources, the participants at the meeting attempted to outline a number of options, including a lease to Artspace, building MSU's space at a future date, or constructing Artspace at a location downtown.

Master Planning

The master planning architects, including the lead architect, the landscape designer, and the interior designer who designed the Beaver Dam, visited campus for two days to meet with the steering committee, representatives from athletics and the community bowl project, engineers and city officials involved in the North Broadway project, and a group of faculty, staff, and students to discuss renovation plans for the Student Union, Swain, and the general landscaping and signage for the campus. Based on the feedback and additional suggestions from the steering committee, the architects intend to finish the master plan and prepare proposals for signage and landscaping to present to the campus in May.

The Great Plains Conference on Service Learning and Civic Engagement

Minot State University hosted the first annual Great Plains Conference. The conference included presentations by three nationally known keynote speakers on service learning and civic engagement and a

variety of concurrent presentations and discussion groups. The conference provided participants and faculty, staff, and students overviews of workable projects and ideas for projects for the university.

Centers of Excellence Preliminary Plans

Minot State University, the Minot Area Development Corporation, and Info-Tech are discussing a possible COE project to submit for the next round of proposals. The preliminary plans are to involve faculty and students and Info-Tech in a collaborative technology project.

Consideration of New Tuition and Scholarship Models

Members of the President's Staff have participated in a number of full-day discussions about new models for assessing tuition and awarding scholarships and waivers. In light of the new strategic plan and the goal to recruit students from a wider area of the Great Plains and internationally, the staff has been considering options for strengthening recruitment and retention of students from these new areas. The staff is also investigating other options for new forms of revenue generation to support campus operations and new strategic directions. A per-credit charge, a consistent out-of-state tuition percentage, waivers and awards connected to on-campus living, and scholarships tied to specific initiatives in the strategic plan are under consideration. Discussions with the campus and other constituencies will be held.

Studies of the Community and the Environment

Recent conversations and plans for adding distinctive majors and programs have identified a potential program focused on community and the environment. Attentive to Vision 2013's focus on place and engagement, this preliminary plan for this program will incorporate features of civic engagement, service learning, environmental and sustainability studies, field-based learning, and internships.

Commencement on May 11

The Commencement ceremony this year will incorporate new and distinctive features to highlight the university's past, sense of place, the role of faculty and learning, and diversity. The ceremony will include the awarding of honorary degrees, the recognition of a 1930 graduate, a student and alumni speaker, a new faculty line of march, a double-line processional of faculty to congratulate graduates, and a reception at the front of the Dome.

Trinidad and Tobago

Dr. Ron Royer, Dr. Johnny Coomansingh, and Ms. Libby Claerbout, MSU's new director of international programming, traveled to Trinidad and Tobago over spring break to investigate possible collaborations with the university in Trinidad. Upon their return, they reported on the trip and suggested possibilities for student and faculty travel and partnerships in selected programs.

New Board of Regents Members

Minot State University is holding an orientation to welcome 17 new members to the Board of Regents. The orientation will include reports from campus officials, a tour, and a welcoming luncheon. We all welcome our new Regents and look forward to their service of the university.

The event honored our faculty and staff Board of Regents Achievement Award winners, and we recognized the faculty and staff who have served the institution for many years.

Near the end of the spring semester, we're looking forward to warmer weather and our celebration of our graduates at the May 11 Commencement Ceremony. The Commencement honor of our graduates is a fine way to culminate a successful year, because it honors and recognizes the success of our students and the contributions and support of our faculty and staff to our students.
