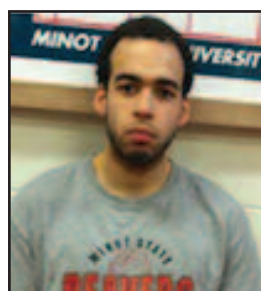

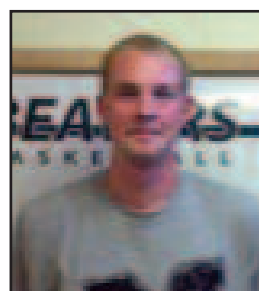

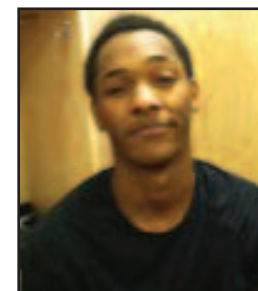

2. In a large bowl, combine flour, baking soda, nutmeg, cinnamon and salt. In a separate bowl, cream together butter and brown sugar with electric beaters (or a

blender). Stir in eggs and mashed bananas until well blended. Stir banana mixture into flour mixture; stir just to moisten. Pour batter into prepared loaf pan.

3. Bake in preheated oven for 60 to 65 minutes, until a toothpick inserted into center of the loaf comes out clean. Let bread cool and enjoy!

This past weekend has been a big one for the Minot State University softball team at Herb Parker Stadium.

Going into the weekend on a high note, as the Beavers faced Bemidji State on Thursday in a double header, the bats would not quit. Minot State outscored Bemidji 17-1 and 11-1. Katie Backes finished with seven hits, going 5-for-5 in game 2, with seven runs batted in and five runs scored. Jen Dixon was 3-for-6 with five RBIs and Melissa Bell was 5-for-8 with five runs scored and two RBIs.

Saturday morning the Beavers were up against the nationally ranked Winona State Warriors. With a first game tied at 1-1, Alyssa Cornejo stepped up to the plate and delivered a 3-run homerun, allowing the Beavers to take game one, 4-1.

The Beavers continued to prove they were the better team in game two when Dixon hit a 3-run homer to put Minot State up 3-0. It was in the next inning that Melissa Bell hit a grand slam to help the Beavers to a 7-3 victory over Winona.

On Sunday, the bats were quiet, however, as the Beavers dropped game one to Upper Iowa 5-3. It was strong pitching by Mindy Lorimor and hot bats from Stacy Fournier and Cornejo that helped Minot finish the weekend with a 4-0 victory over the Peacocks.

The Beavers are now 21-9 on the season, 8-4 in conference play and sitting in 7th in the NSIC standings.

Flatland close to NCAA DII provisional scoring

Minot State University track and field athletes carried their spectacular indoor season performances into the outdoor season, headed by junior Tyler Flatland at the Wayne State College Wildcat Classic March 29 in Wayne, Neb.

"The first meet went well for the team," Flatland said. "Everyone got a good start and will continue to improve throughout the season."

Flatland leaped to first place in the men's 400-meter hurdles in 54.90 seconds, a mere .90 seconds behind the NCAA Division II provisional time. He was the only MSU athlete to take first place in the racing events.

"For me, it was nice to get out and get a time, to try and improve myself now," he said.

Only a handful of other MSU men secured second place at the Wildcat Classics: pole vaulter Kirk Capdeville (Sr.) rose 15 feet and 5 inches, and the 4x400 meter dash relay team with a time of 3:20.55 minutes.

In the men's javelin, freshman Anthony Almeida and junior Phillip Streccius scored seventh and tenth place, respectively. Almeida threw his javelin 159 feet and 5 inches, followed by Streccius' toss of 153 feet and 1 inch.

Gaining the highest place at the meet for the MSU women, distance runner Alli Windish (Jr.) finished third in the 5,000 meter race with a time of 18:32.21. Catie Ledesma (Fr.) finished ninth with her time of 19:18:85.

More than six Beavers earned personal bests at the Wildcat Classic.

Beavers grab first-ever win over SCSU

The Minot State University's Baseball team entered last weekend knowing they would need to play some of their best baseball to hang tight with one of their toughest opponents of the season.

For two games they were able to do just that against the 16th ranked St. Cloud State Huskies. After losing a tough extra-inning affair on Saturday, the Beavers were able to grab their first-ever victory over SCSU on Sunday afternoon.

Playing at home for just the second time in more than two years, Minot State nearly completed a huge comeback in the first game of the series on Saturday, eventually dropping a difficult 5-4 decision in extra innings. The Beavers had trailed 4-1 but suddenly tied the game, courtesy of a massive 3-run homer from AJ Begay. Starter Josh Larsen kept Minot within striking distance with a solid five-inning performance, while relievers Matthew Davis and Austin Zorn kept the Huskies in check out of the bullpen. The Beavers were led offensively by Begay and second baseman Nick Hammerl, who chipped in two hits apiece.

After dropping game two on

Saturday by a 12-2 score, the Beavers finally put together a convincing complete game effort in game three on Sunday, earning a satisfying 6-1 victory.

Sophomore starter Jesse Goertzen was absolutely brilliant while throwing a complete-game five hitter, allowing just a single unearned run. The offence also kicked it into high gear, with Begay blasting another homerun, this time a 2-run shot in the fourth inning.

Head coach Brock Wepler certainly had high praise for his young right-handed starter after the game.

"I thought Jesse was great," Wepler told MSU Sports Information. "He did a good job of keeping them off balance and attacking their hitters. Even when he would get behind in the count he would come back and make a pitch every time he had to. He kept the ball down and had a good feel for the zone today."

The Beavers were unable to nab another game in the finale of the four-game set, dropping an ugly 16-3 decision in game four. The Beavers (3-5 NSIC) will continue their home schedule this weekend with games against Concordia University, St. Paul, on Saturday and Sunday.

Men shoot sub-300, move up to 3rd

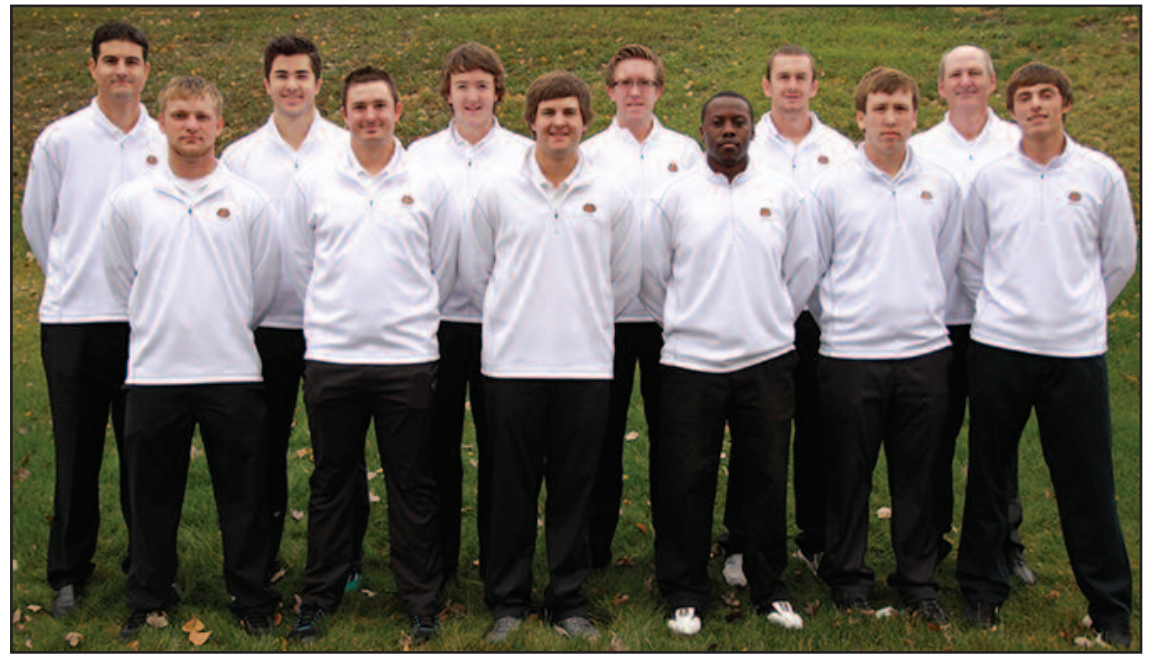

The Minot State Men's Golf team shot a two-round total of 625 last weekend en route to placing third at the Augustana College Quarry Oaks Collegiate.

Kowan O'Keefe, a junior from Blind Bay, British Columbia, finished in second place overall after shooting a spectacular two-round total of 148 (70-78). He had been the clubhouse leader after the first round, but was caught by a strong second round performance from Devin Holmes of St. Cloud State.
