Minot State offers many activities that students can take part in throughout the semester.

## MSU musicians compete for national prize

The Music Teacher's National Association (MTNA) is putting on its annual competition on Oct. 22, and current MSU musicians are competing. If they win, they could get up to a \$5,000 prize. MTNA is a national organization, but MSU students will start in Valley City for the state-wide level, and hopefully moving up to regional and potentially, national levels.

Kevin Vandall, a sophomore pianist, will compete against other pianists in the state. He is competing in the young artist's solo division, his first time qualifying in this specific division.

Although there is no prize money at the regional level, that's not the goal of the competition.

"It provides an opportunity to play for other artists and get feedback from other coaches besides who I'm used to," Vandall explained.

The specific competition date offers

another goal, a designated timeline, to work towards.

Competitors need to prepare at least two pieces of contrasting time periods. Contrasting periods refer to pieces written in different style periods. Vandall will perform pieces by Bach, Ravel, and Prokofiev, which are from the Baroque, 20th Century, and Neoclassical styles, respectively. These pieces need to be memorized and then performed live in front of judges.

However, if there aren't enough contestants in each category, musicians have to record their performances. Vandall says he prefers playing the pieces live. Musicians often perform live, and although he might be nervous, competing live gives him an opportunity to practice working through those nerves.

MSU piano professor Dianna Anderson is the MTNA club advisor on campus. She has years of experience coaching, judging, and accompanying

various performers.

She feels that this experience is beneficial for students in many ways.

"The date motivates practice more than if there wasn't a date on the calendar, they can use that repertoire all year long as they add more to it, and getting some feedback from another teacher is a great benefit," she said. "And it's beneficial seeing students from other schools doing the same things they're doing."

MSU's music department is not large; sometimes a student might be the only one studying their instrument.

The competition is still relatively small in North Dakota. The whole competition occurs in one day, whereas in a larger place, like Texas, the competition can last three days. In Vandall's case, he will compete against only one other pianist at Valley City.

If the MSU students make it past the state round, they will submit a recording

to be sent in for the West-Central regional level. After that, if they move on, they will perform live at the national competition, which this school year will take place in March in Reno, Nevada.

The Division of Performing Art's MTNA is planning on having a showcase concert on Oct. 9, right here in Ann Nicole Nelson Hall.

This will give the students a chance to practice performing their pieces in front of people and will allow them to perform the pieces in their entirety.

The concert is at 7:30 p.m. and should be live-streamed on the Ann Nicole Nelson Hall YouTube channel, which can be found at [minotstateu.edu/music/calendar.shtml](http://minotstateu.edu/music/calendar.shtml).

## Non-conference football in the NSIC

The NSIC is the biggest Division II conference in the country. It stands above with 14 teams, while most conferences across the country have 10-12 teams.

These smaller conferences are given the opportunity to play non-conference football games to open up their season, but the NSIC has a rule against non-conference games. There are 11 games in a DII college football season. The NSIC originally believed that since the conference was bigger, it made more sense to play all 11 games as conference games. The NSIC is no longer bigger than the rest of the other conferences in Division II.

Back at the end of the 2019 season, a rule that all NSIC universities were required

to have football was changed.

This resulted in both Minnesota State University Crookston and Saint Cloud State University cutting their football programs. Now there are only 12 teams in the conference with football. This opens the door for at least one non-conference game to start the year, and I think the NSIC should strongly look into this.

Every other sports team in the NSIC plays at least one non-conference game. There's no reason football shouldn't do the same.

Many positive opportunities could come from it. The NSIC is often debated about being the toughest football conference in DII, why not allow the teams to go prove that against non-conference opponents early in the year?

It also would be huge for recruiting. With Minot State for example, a heavy portion of the team is from the southwest, including Colorado and Arizona.

Imagine the team playing a Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference (RMAC) team like Colorado Mesa and being able to get their Colorado recruits to watch them play with minimal travel. There is a big opportunity and the NSIC needs to jump at it and take it.

## How to win your fantasy basketball league this year

The National Basketball Association will kick off its 77th season on Oct. 18. The two opening night games will see the Philadelphia 76ers visiting the Boston Celtics and the Los Angeles Lakers visiting the defending champion Golden State Warriors.

With the NBA season starting soon, fantasy basketball leagues will be starting soon as well. Whether you are a seasoned professional or a first-time fantasy player, there are certain tricks that will help you compete in your fantasy league.

Be active: This should be obvious, but it is often a forgotten task.

Unlike the NFL, there are NBA games every single day. That means that you will have to update your lineup every day. Doing that will help you capitalize on all your active players. Too many people forget about their lineups and will have them filled with players that are not playing on that given day.

Draft stat sheet fillers: No fantasy basketball league is the same.

That means that scoring will always be different from league to league. However, it is smart to fill your team with players that fill up the stat sheet. Everything will be worth at least some sort of positive point. If a player can get multiple rebounds, assists, blocks, or steals, they can still be a solid fantasy player regardless of how well they can score points.

Draft elite rebounders/defenders: This one is self-explanatory.

Players that can average double digit rebounds per game are almost guaranteed to score solid fantasy points. Depending on how a league is scored, rebounds can be worth at least a point each which means 10 rebounds is 10 fantasy points. The same philosophy can be used for defensive players. Steals and blocks are both worth points, so they are just bonuses on top of the players

actual points. Of all statistics, steals and blocks are normally worth the most points individually. Get players who frequently get multiples per game.

Draft efficient players: In a lot of fantasy basketball leagues, a missed field goal attempt will result in lost points.

So, a player can score 35 points in real life, but if they only make eight of their 24 shot attempts, they can almost hurt your team more than they will help it. Made field goals are positive points, so try to get players who make more shots than they miss.

Use the waiver wire: The waiver wire refers to players that were not drafted or were released by other fantasy managers.

Often, there will be solid players on waivers throughout the season for one reason or another. If a player on your team gets hurt or just is not playing well, do not
