Mr. & Ms. MSU Pageant to be held

Student The Activities Committee (SAC) and Residence Hall Association (RHA) are partnering to hold a Mr. & Ms. MSU Pageant on Thursday, April 19, at 7 p.m. in the Beaver Dam. The pageant is the first of its kind at Minot State University. Amber Penrose, RHA president, and Kelsey Ramos, RHA vice president, are spearheading the event.

"We wanted to create an annual event that would be interesting and different," Penrose said. "Kelsey brought up that she had been involved in something like this in high school, and we all agreed that holding а Mr. & Ms. MSU Pageant would be fun for contestants and entertaining to audience members!"

The pageant planning committee has selected various categories for the competition to make it unique to Minot State. They include an opening number, school spirit, on-stage interview, fitness competition, talent or green wear and evening wear.

The opening number will feature the contestants in a choreographed routine. The school spirit category allows contestants to get creative with their attire and perform a cheer with their partner. The on-stage interview will require the male contestant to tell his best pick-up line, while the female rejects it.

During the fitness competition, contestants will go head-to-head with a contestant of the same gender on the Wii. The contestants will then have the option to choose to present a talent or participate in green wear. The green wear will feature outfits made completely out of recyclable materials. Contestants will finish out the competition in their evening wear, and the event ends with a crowning ceremony.

The program includes breaks between categories to allow for outfit changes. During this time, audience members, selected at random, will come on stage and battle an opponent on the Wii.

Organizers ask students to bring non-perishable food items for the Minot Area Homeless Coalition. For every non-perishable food item MSU students donate, they will receive a ticket for a chance to win a 32" TV. The more items donated the more chances of winning.

Letter to the Editor 'Nightshade': Don't eat the berries

There is a plant that can be found in dry waste areas throughout North Dakota that looks a little like a tomato plant. Although its nickname is "Wild Tomato," this is not a plant to be eaten. Late February/early last month, Martin, a 17-year-old, African-American male, was walking, carrying a bag containing Skittles and tea, from a convenience store to his dad's fiancé's house one evening in Sanford, Fla., when he caught the eye of the half-Hispanic Zimmerman, a selfappointed neighborhood watchman. Zimmerman called the police, reporting a suspicious person walking around. After that call, Zimmerman followed Martin in his vehicle, and then on foot.

Martin chose not to run.

Somewhere along the line, a struggle ensued. Zimmerman shot Martin with a 9 mm, afterward claiming his actions were in selfdefense.

However, evidence suggested

that Zimmerman may have initiated the attack. The Martin family's lawyer told various news outlets that on the day Martin was killed, he was talking with a female friend of his, saying he was being followed. The call also caught the struggle as it began, but it ended abruptly.

Trayvon Martin: One issue remains

Zimmerman still hasn't been arrested, much to the chagrin and outrage of special interest groups and the Martin family. Some have claimed that Zimmerman's actions were racially motivated.

While issues of race complicate things, a law in Florida that's been on the books since 2005 complicates things a bit further. The Stand Your Ground Law allows for citizens to defend themselves if attacked outside of their home, even if it means using deadly force. Critics of the law have argued this extends the "Castle doctrine" (a man's home is his castle) to the streets, and that something like the Trayvon Martin case was bound to happen.

However, there is still one issue that remains, and that is the issue of Zimmerman's actions. When he called the police he was explicitly told not to follow Martin, yet he did it anyway. If he was a legiti-

mate member of a Neighborhood Watch program, he would know that he doesn't have the power to approach suspects, and that he is not allowed to have a weapon on his person when keeping watch, even though he had a concealedweapons permit. (In fact Chris Tutko, director of the Neighborhood Watch for the National Sheriffs' Organization said in an article published in the Orlando Sentinel that the aforementioned items were two cardinal rules Zimmerman broke.)

Also, I implore you, the reader, to look at the pictures of Zimmerman and Martin. Does Martin look like someone who could put up a fight with Zimmerman? No. Zimmerman was twice as big as Martin. That's like a heavyweight division UFC fighter going up against a child in the octagon. It wasn't even a fair fight to begin with.

The fact is, Zimmerman called the police and went after Martin based solely on suspicion. Just because we humans, as a species, have gut feelings about something does NOT mean that we're right, and at times acting on our gut feelings can push us further in the wrong.

The Dakota Chamber Musicians Quartet is a relatively new group on campus, having started in the fall semester. In that short time of being together, four musicians have bonded to bring their love of chamber music to students on campus and off.

The DCM Quartet is a traditional string quartet with two violins, Erin Neumann and Josh Bussard; a viola, Kate Dalbey; and a cello, Ivan Luza.

The MSU students formed the group after attending last summer's 15th Dakota Chamber Music Annual Workshop for strings, winds and piano.

As described on MSU's website, "DCM provides intensive chamber music through training for pianists, string and woodwind players, ages high school through adult." This rigorous training includes daily rehearsals, coaching sessions and master classes, while the students polish musicianship, techniques and rehearsal strategies.

The DCM quartet has shared its love of chamber music on campus through performances in Ann Nicole Nelson Hall during small ensemble concerts and Music Major Performance labs. Off campus, the students have traveled to public schools to introduce chamber music to children.

"As a group, we have put in the rehearsal hours to be able to travel all over the state and in neighboring states to share chamber music with students and other people who may not get the opportunity to hear or see a string quartet, or other chamber music," Nuemann said. "In North Dakota, we have traveled to Devil's Lake, Grand Forks and Fargo. We have also traveled to Moorhead, Minn., Billings, Mont. and Rapid City, S.D."

The group says that traveling

growth within the quartet, and is just another perk of being involved. The benefit of travel goes both ways.

"I love that we get all the classroom experience," music education major Dalbey said. "As a future teacher, it's really fun to get to interact with a lot of different grade levels on a fairly regular basis."

Bussard, a freshman majoring in music performance and biology, said traveling to N.D. schools also means re-connecting with hometowns.

"I started playing violin about 11 years ago in the Devils Lake, N.D. public school system. Traveling to and performing in Devils Lake has been my favorite memory from our group so far. It was great to see and share with previous teachers and old friends what we had been working on," he said.

"The DCM quartet is special

because of the grant that was received to start the student quartet program," Neumann said. "Through that grant, our group is able to travel to cities and have educational outreach concerts, and also perform concerts in different venues around our and neighboring states," Luza said.

The DCM Quartet is an active body which represents what MSU has to offer students. They encourage everyone to take advantage of all performances on campus – music, art and drama.

Changes made to student aid programs

As a result of recent legislative changes, you should be aware of a number of new requirements for the federal student aid programs that will be effective for the 2012-13 school year.

Federal Pell Grant Program -Duration of Eligibility

Once you have received a Pell Grant for 12 semesters, or the equivalent, you will no longer be eligible for additional Pell Grants.

• You are eligible to receive a Pell Grant for up to 12 semesters or the equivalent. If you have exceeded the 12-semester maximum, you will lose eligibility for additional Pell Grants beginning in 2012-13 school year. Equivalency is calculated by adding together the percentage of your Pell eligibility that you received each year to determine whether the total amount exceeds 600 percent.

Direct Student Loan Changes Direct Subsidized loans will not

be eligible for an interest subsidy during the six-month grace period. •Subsidized loans are loans for

which the borrower is not responsible for the interest while the student

is enrolled in college on at least a half-time basis, when the loan is in the six-month grace period after the student is no longer enrolled at least half time, or if the loan is in a deferment status. This provision eliminates the interest subsidy provided during the six-month grace period

for subsidized loans for which the first disbursement is made on or after July 1, 2012, and before July 1, 2014. If you receive a subsidized loan during this timeframe, you will be responsible for the interest that accrues while your loan is in the

grace period. You do not have to make payments during the grace period (unless you choose to) but the interest will be added (capitalized) to the principal amount of your loan when the grace period ends. This provision does not eliminate the interest subsidy while the borrower is in school or during eligible periods of deferment.

All subsidized loans made to undergraduate students on or after July 1, 2012, will have a fixed interest rate of 6.8 percent.

•Note: In the President's FY2013 budget request, the Administration has proposed maintaining the interest rate on subsidized loans at the current rate of 3.4 percent for the 2012-2013 school year, but no action has been taken on that proposal at this time.

receive the results by the April 15 priority funding deadline. Students meeting that deadline will be eligible for all federal student aid programs, including the Federal Pell Grant, Federal Direct Loan, Work Study, Perkins Loan and Supplemental Education Opportunity Grant programs.

Funding may be limited to the Pell Grant and Direct Loan programs if applications arrive after receive subsidized loans for payment periods that begin on or after July 1, 2012; however, graduate students will still qualify for unsubsidized loans. Review Your Student Aid History

•To determine how much of your Pell Grant eligibility you have used so far, to review the amounts and types of Federal Student Loans you have borrowed so far, or to determine who your loan servicers are, log onto the Financial Aid Review link at www.nslds.ed.gov, using your federal PIN number that you use for signing your FAFSA. If you don't know your PIN, you can request a duplicate PIN at www.pin.ed.gov.
