MINOT - Minot State's senior center Jake Swirple is getting the chance to showcase his football skills one more time on an exclusive stage.

Swirple has been invited to participate in the 2025 Podyum College All-Star Bowl in Miami, Florida in Januarv

This special event for college seniors is a four-day All-Star festival that culminates in the Podyum Bowl on Sunday, January 19, at Tropical Park Stadium in Miami.

Prior to the Podyum Bowl, invited senior college football players will take part in three days of drills led by professional football scouts, agents, and trainers to evaluate each as they look to make the leap to the next level

Podyum has placed over 3,000 athletes with teams across the world.

A four-year performer for the Beavers on the offensive line who played in 37 games, Swirple was a starter at center the last three seasons for Minot State and a key part of the offensive line that led the Beavers to their best season in NCAA history this fall with a 5-6 record.

Minot State's offensive line also led the way to an alltime single-season rushing record with 2,693 yards this season and tied the all-time single-season record with 30 rushing touchdowns this fall.

Swirple also is a 2022-23 NCAA All-American in wrestling for the Beavers and is currently ranked No. 7 in the country by the NWCA at 285 pounds. He will take time off from competition on the mats to compete in the Podyum Bowl as the Minot State men's wrestling hosts Minnesota State Moorhead on January 16 in an NSIC dual, then competes on January 18 at the Southwest Minnesota State Duals.

Minot State softball picked 6th by NSIC coaches as Beavers prepare for season

Fresh off a trip to the conference semifinals, the Minot State softball team finds itself picked to be one of the league's top programs once again this spring.

The NSIC announced the 2025 NSIC Preseason Softball Coaches' Poll today and the Beavers were picked to finish 6th this season by the league coaches.

Minot State opens the 2025 season hosting its annual Bubble Invite next weekend, January 31 through February 2. The Beavers play a non-conference doubleheader against NSIC rival Minnesota State Moorhead at 5 p.m. on Friday, January 31, then a doubleheader against Black Hill State at 4 p.m. on with 196 points and 14-of-15 first-Saturday, February 1, and a single game against Providence on Sunday, February 2.

Minot State men's basketball up to No. 20/17 in polls

A pair of home wins over the weekend helped the Minot State men's basketball team move back into the top 20 in the nation as the Beavers climbed two spots in this week's NABC coaches poll released today.

The Beavers (20-3 overall, 11-3 NSIC) beat Concordia, St. Paul 92-78 in a battle for second place in the NSIC on Friday, then completed the weekend sweep with a 75-68 win over Minnesota Duluth on Saturday.

then coach, Randy Hedberg '77, who is the older brother of Rick Hedberg '89, currently the executive director of the MSU (Development) Foundation," he said. "It was through the efforts of Randy Hedberg recruiting a group of players from a high school team in Brandon that brought me to Minot State in the fall of 1988."

Over the next four years, the accounting major developed relationships on and off the field, from friendships to mentoring.

"For me, what stands out over the four years was really two things. One was the friendships that were developed that I still have today with individuals, as chance would have it from North Dakota and Montana primarily. No doubt, it was partially through the football team. And the second thing that stands out for me was the honors program, which exists today and actually began during my first year at the University,' Schaeffer said. "It was led by the science department professor, Ron Royer. I had the good fortune of benefiting from the foresight and guidance of Ron Royer through the honors program.

"He was kind enough to take an interest as I pursued my education and while at Minot State."

After Schaeffer graduated with his bachelor's in accounting from Minot State, Royer continued to advocate and encourage him to pursue postgraduate studies.

"He encouraged me to go to law school, and so immediately following Minot State in the fall of 1992, I attended Southern Illinois University. I pursued, at that point, something that was called a joint degree. It was a Master of Accounting and Juris Doctorate joint degree. Normally, a Master of Accounting will take you two years to complete, and a law degree will take you three. You can combine them and do them in four," he explained. "And so, I graduated three years later, in the spring of 1995. It was actually December of '94, but I walked the stage in May of '95 with that joint degree.'

Once finished with his joint degree from Southern Illinois University, Schaeffer started working for Ernst and Young, an accounting firm in St. Louis. With this new experience came another educational adventure.

"When I was with Ernst and Young, I started in St. Louis, then I was transferred to New York for a short-term assignment. While I was working in Manhattan, my peers at Ernst were pursuing gary-MRU. The friendships that I developed over the course of those years shaped me as a person," Schaeffer said. "I still carry those friendships today with colleagues and friends, for example, Randy Conway '92 at Minot State. Just their insights, views, and perspectives that carry along with you. You know, those friends that you establish friendships with at a younger age that don't go to work with you, but they're the same individuals today as I knew back then. They keep you grounded.

"They don't know me as Scott Schaeffer, who works for BP. They just remember me as Scott Schaeffer, who went to school with them at Minot State over the course of years."

While friendships have kept him grounded, Schaeffer's family has been his anchor through the years.

BISMARCK - Minot State junior sprinter Summer Krebsbach continues to do exactly what you hope to do in track and field: Improve each competition.

For the second time this winter, Krebsbach broke her own school record in the women's 60-meter dash finishing 2nd on Saturday in the event at the Marauders Indoor Opener.

Finishing in a time of 7.66 seconds, Krebsbach broke her own NCAA Division II-era school record of 7.78 seconds which she ran last month in the season opener for Minot State.

Her performance led the way for the Minot State track and field teams, who were in action for the second time this indoor season and the first time since taking six weeks off for the holiday break. Joining Krebsbach in leading the way on the women's side were Camryn Adams, who claimed the lone victory on day for Minot State, Emily Mattern, who had two top-5 finishes, and Bailey Wride, who was 5th in the mile. Adams won the women's 200 meters in 26.82 while Mattern was 4th in that event in 27.11 and added a 5th-place finish in the 400 meters in 1:01.00, and Wride finished 5th in the mile in a career-best time of 5 minutes, 7.23 seconds.
