Max Bray and Olivia Karwin traveled far to play at Minot State. Bray came from Mesa, Arizona; Karwin all experiencing it together. from Gull Lake, Saskatchewan. Both stepped into unknown territory

"Life has taught me things—I know what it takes to tread water," Bray said. "I was thrown to the deep end, but so what? I know how to swim."
