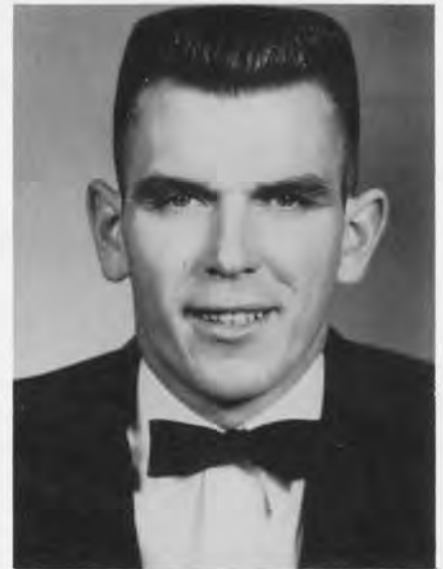


Alpha Kappa Delta

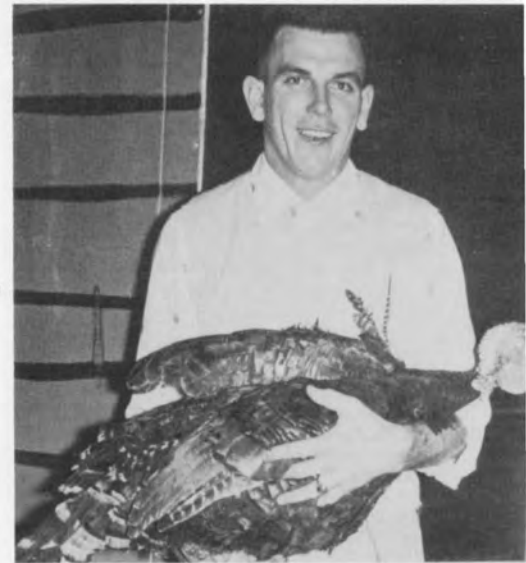

Eight Minot Students and one from Dickinson competed in a nine hole golf match at Washington Golf Course. Jack Worner and Dick Compton

carded 44s, Jerome Jensen 45, Ted Easton (Dickinson) and Rich Anderson 49s, Jack Block and Virgil Breeding 50s, Fred Felber 54 and Leonard Anderson, 59.

Valley City was the scene of the 1955 Conference Track Meet. Frank Berry took 3rd in the 220 and 2nd in the 440. John Black came in 2nd in the 2 mile.

The State Track Meet was held in Bismarck for 1955. Black came in 2nd in the 2 mile, Westlake took 2nd in the discus and Laundt took 4th in the Javelin.
