Appointment to be Effective July 1, 1954

These were the headlines on the Red and Green on January 4, 1954, soon after the announcement had been made by the Commissioner of the Board of Higher Education. The students knew Casper Lura was only 52 at that time, that he would bring with him his lovely wife and nephew, that he was a native North Dakotan, that he had a fine background to be president of our college.

Mystics Down Beavers 25-7







Beavers Tame Cats 13-6






In the opening game at Swain Hall the Beavers had little trouble with Northern Montana of Havre and wound up on top 63-31. The Minoters were pretty spotty in this first showing but were tough on the boards and controlled the ball throughout the game. They shot .317 from the field on 26-82 and amassed a .647 percentage from the charity line as they flipped in 11 of 12 chances. Henry Milkey paced the attack with 18 points.

In another tune-up game the Wolves of Northern Teachers of Aberdeen, South Dakota, invaded Swain Hall. Minot led 33-29 at half time but their defense stiffened in the second half and they pulled away to a 70-54 win. Milkey again paced the winners with 24 counters. Jim Walker and Gene Groninger added 12 apiece.


For the inauguration of the conference schedule the Beavers traveled to Bottineau and wrapped up a 91-54 win. Dale Brown led the Minoters with 19 points. Ron Nelson and Groninger tossed in 15 points each and Milkey added 11.

Five Beavers tallied in double figures as they rolled over Bismarck Junior College 97-76. Minot had 28 point leads twice and used the reserves extensively in the second half. Nine cagers scored. Milkey pumped in 23 points while Brown, Groninger, Nelson and John Fisher added 17, 16, 10 and 10 respectively.



HENRY MILKEY bowed out brilliantly in his last year as a Beaver. He scored in double figures in 21 of the 22 games and led the team in scoring 17 times. His season output was 473 points for a 21.5 average. He was second in conference scoring with 324 points. His .806 free throw percentage also topped the team.





DALE BROWN earned his fourth basketball letter netting 307 points and rebounding and feeding brilliantly. He totaled 223 markers in conference action and averaged 13.9 in the 22 games. He paced the scoring attack twice and was in double figures 18 times.

A red hot .507 shooting display moved the Beavers out over the Dickinson Savages 89-70. Minot's fast breaking and rebounding were at their best as they tossed in 36 shots on 71 attempts. Milkey was again the pace setter with 24 points. Brown caged 15, Groninger, Whitey Aus and Jim Walker dropped in 10 each.

The Holiday Tournament in Minot opened with Moorhead dropping Valley City 81-67. In the second game of the evening Minot pulled steadily from behind and edged out the Concordia Cobblers 69-67. Minot got the permanent lead at 48-46 with 10:36 to go. Neither team was effective from the field but both were hot from the line, the Cobblers netting 27-34 and Minot 23-35. Milkey picked up 31 points and Art Johnson of Concordia 28.

5' 8" Ken Reitan of Moorhead whipped in 32 points for 15-25 fielders to pace the Dragons as they handed Minot their first loss 92-90 in a white hot shooting exhibition. Moorhead hit 40 fg's in 86 chances for .465 and Minot 34 of 81 for .420. There were 12 lead changes in the second half. Besides Reitan the big factors were Moorhead's rebounding and quick defense. Milkey led Minot with 30 markers including 10-12 freethrows. (19-21 for tournament).





In the Beaver's worst game of the season, Dakota Wesleyan outlasted Minot 80-68. Beaver fouling hurt tremendously as Dakota tossed in 38 free throws while Minot outgoaled them 25-21. Minot pulled to within six with five minutes left but Wesleyan pulled away handily. Milkey and Brown paced the losing effort with 18 and 15 points.

In the game for third place in the Snow Queen Tournament Minot and Valley City locked horns in a high scoring contest that



Minot won 109 - 107. The 216 point game was the new record for the auditorium in Aberdeen, including many pro contests there. Valley led at the midway point 62 - 47 and once held an 18 point advantage until Minot closed in at 81 apiece. The Vikings netted 42 goals to Minot's 35 but the Beavers dropped in free throws at a .867 clip on 39 - 45. Milkey tallied 28 points, including 22 in the second half. Brown had 27, Walker, 22, Groninger, 15, and John Fisher, 13. Aberdeen downed Dakota Wesleyan 86-81 for the championship.


Back in conference action Minot tipped Ellendale 92 - 66 after trailing 14 - 13 after 8 minutes had elapsed. The Beavers scored the next 22 points and it was all Minot. Minot pumped in 30 of 64 from the field for .469 and 32 - 42 charity tosses for .762. Twelve Beavers were in the scoring column paced by Milkey and Walker's 16.



JOHN FISHER drilled in field goals at .464 rate to lead the Beavers in that department. His deft maneuvering under the basket aided the team and he was the best Beaver in the "clutch." He totaled 254 points for an 11.5 average. He was in double figures 13 times.

GENE GRONINGER capped his four year career as a Beaver with 265 points for a 12 point average. He netted an even 200 in conference play and tallied over ten 16 times. He led the team three times.





The Dickinson Savages were the next invaders to fall before the Minot quint 79 - 62. Minot's 25 point margin was whittled to six with 2½ minutes left but Milkey took charge with nine straight markers and put the game on ice. Walker and Brown were especially effective on the boards. Milkey's total was 25. Fisher tossed in 15, Brown, 14, and Groninger, 10.

Six Beavers scored in double figures in an exceptionally fine team effort over Bismarck 96 - 67. Minot's control of rebounds and fast break were big factors in a rough contest from the field the Beavers steamrolled in 40 of 73 chances for a percentage of .548. Milkey's 20 was tops while Groninger, Brown, Ron Nelson, Walker and Fisher pitched in 15, 13, 11, 10 and 10.


In an all important road contest the Beavers dropped Valley City 93 - 79 on the strength of good balance and depth. 

CARL LONG, another junior, netted 91 points for a 5 point average in 18 games and totaled 67 points in conference play. Carl is a strong rebounder and the only southpaw on the squad.

CLARENCE CHRISTENSEN, the third three year man averaged 3 points in his games with 44 points. A good floor man and a deadly shot, he hit 42 of the points in the conference games.



After another slow start the Beavers salvaged an 87 - 64 win over the Jimmies from Jamestown. Minot led most of the distance but Jamestown was still in contention until the Minoters moved out with 7:30 remaining. Brown and Groninger's feeding looked good as well as Walker and Brown's rebounding. Milkey and Fisher topped the scoring with 24 and 18; Walker chipped in 11, Brown and Groninger, 10 each.

The Wahpeton Wildcats were the next victim, 96 - 68, in a raggedly played contest which saw 59 fouls committed. The last ten minutes of the game Minot played real well as Gene Groninger poured in twenty points that period but the rest of the game saw little good basketball. Brown chalked up 18 and Carl Long 11 to aid the Minot cause considerably.

A nine game winning streak and a string of 15 at home came to an end when Mayville invaded and nipped the Beavers 69 - 68 on the strength of a bril-


liant comeback. Minot set the pace and were ahead 49 - 34 at the break. Mayville tallied 20 of the next 24 to gain their first advantage 54 - 53 with 10:15 remaining. There were nine lead switches after that with Harvey Keene's two free throws with 28 seconds left ending the scoring and the win skein. Brown, Groninger and Fisher pumped in 16 apiece and Milkey 14.

All Minot's championship hopes were snuffed out when Valley City avenged the two earlier Minot wins and downed the Minoters 69 - 67. Minot led by 3 to 5 points until Valley tied it at 53 all. At 10:05 Jerry Kringlie popped in a set shot that gave the Vikings their first lead 57 - 55. WHITEY AUS, the sixth senior on the squad, was instrumental as a rebounder and scorer as he banged in 74 points for 18 games for an average of 41.



Minot took some of the sting out of defeat in the next trip to Wahpeton as they tamed the Cats 107-72 in a brilliant team effort. Minot shot a 55% clip and the second team flipped in 43 of the points.

All ten players scored six or more points. Milkey's 25 was high followed by Carl Long's 13, Brown's 12, and Fisher's 11.

Another fine team performance gained the Beavers an 87-62 victory over the Bottineau Forresters in the last home game of the year. Minot out rebounded, out-played, and out maneuvered the invaders and whistled in 36 of 88 fielders for a 409 percentage. Groninger's score of 16 was tops, Brown and Mil-

key's 13, and Fisher's 12 followed. The team's four year record at Swain Hall was 33 - 6.

Minot shot close to 70% in the first half and coasted to a 106 - 75 win over Ellendale. The Minot fast break was most instrumental and the strength of the reserves was once more impressive. Milkey piloted in 31 points, including 8 of 9 field goals in first half. 16 for Fisher and 13 for Groninger followed. Star Ellendale forward, Bob Morehouse, set a new conference scoring record in the game as he dropped in 29 markers to eclipse Luther Aamold's old mark of 404 by eight.







Track








The purpose of this organization is to create professional interest in its members so they in turn can go out into the teaching profession carrying a desire to improve the profession to which they will devote their lives.


Nineteen attended the state conference of the Methodist Student Movement in Fargo, November 2, 3 and 4. Erv Ely was elected state president at this time.


Alpha Kappa Delta

With all these honors, the AKD's feel they have had a very successful year and look forward to a bigger, better and more successful one to come.



The Mu Sigma Tau fraternity wishes at this time to thank patronesses, patrons, and advisers for their help, encouragement and guidance through the past successful year.





World Affairs Discussed at International Peace Garden Conference


