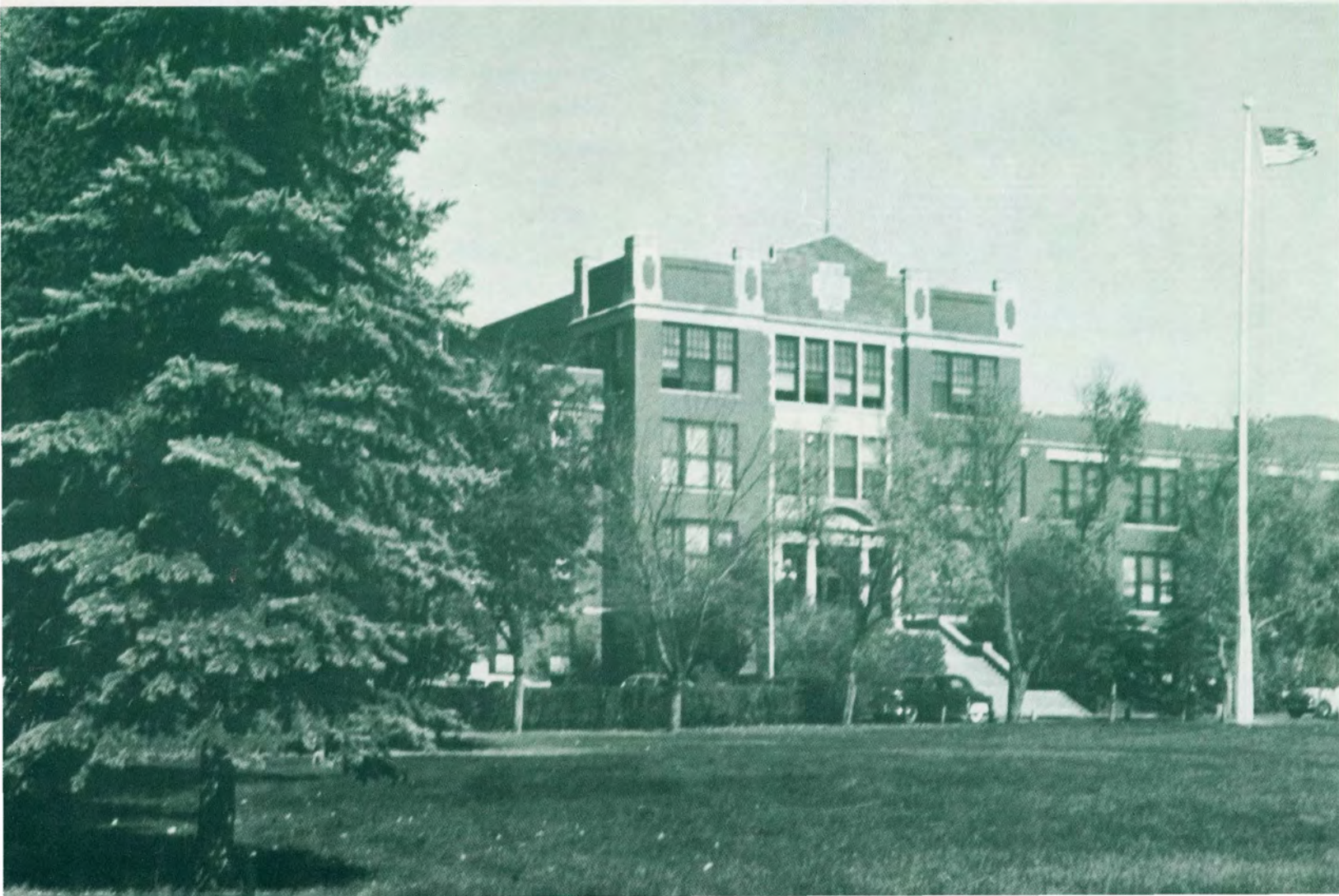

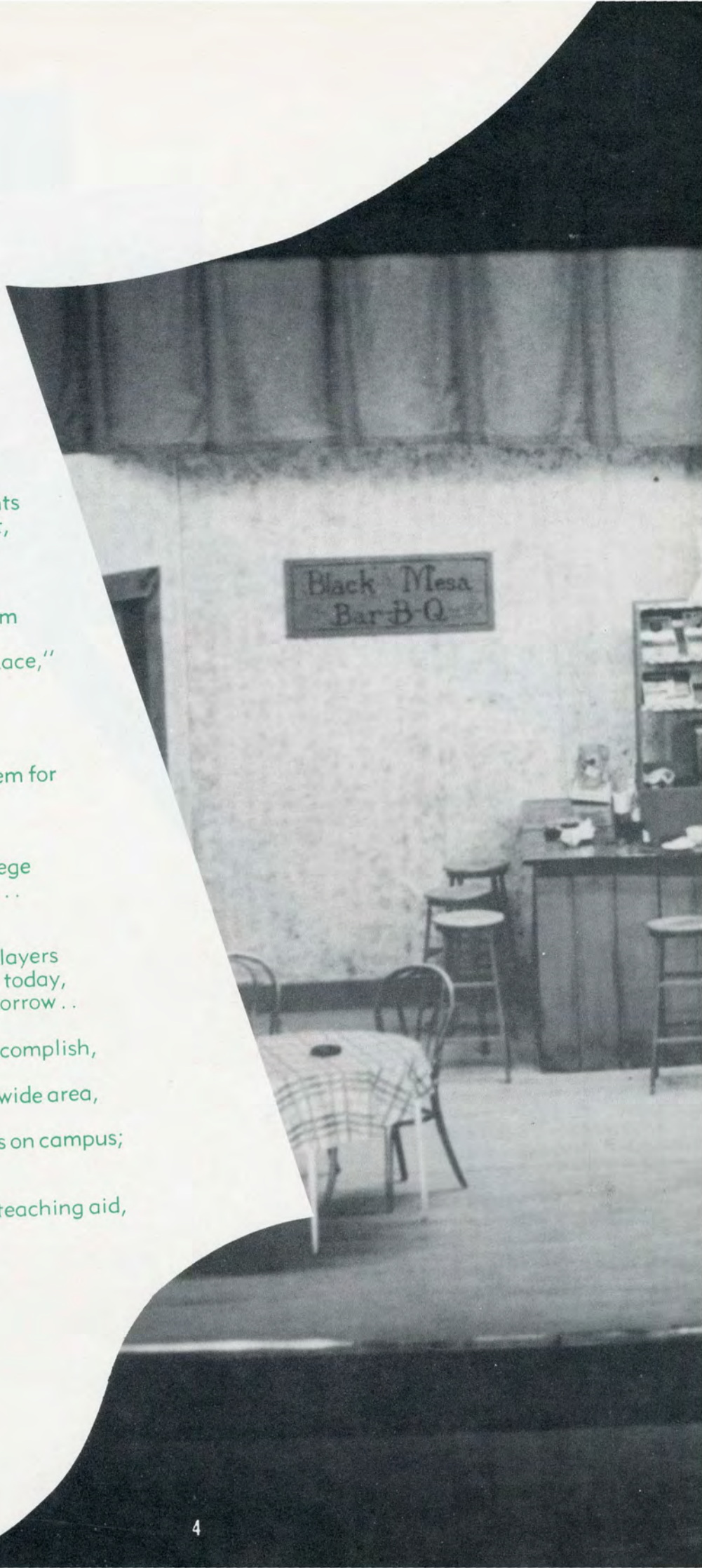

Divisions of Education and Psychology

Professional courses in education and psychology are designed to meet several objectives in preparing students for teaching in rural and urban elementary and secondary schools. Chief among these are the broadening

of professional knowledge and attitudes, teaching techniques, skills and understanding of characteristics of the child and the nature of his educational growth.

Division of Social Studies

Some of the objectives of the division of social studies are to understand and promote democracy; better world understanding and sense of patriotism and good citizenship through study of history, geography, eco-

nomics and philosophy; to develop appreciation of our social heritage; to lay bases for tolerance and insight into social values; to gain skill in use of materials for sifting evidence and drawing conclusions.

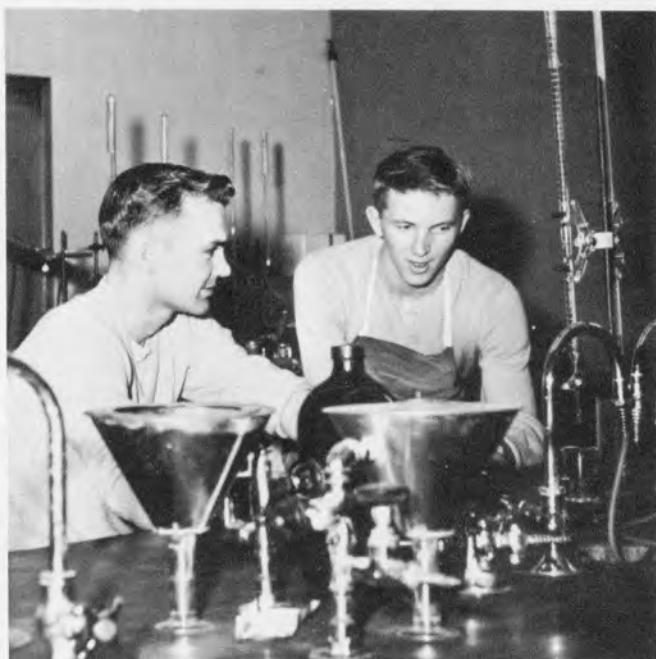
Division of Science

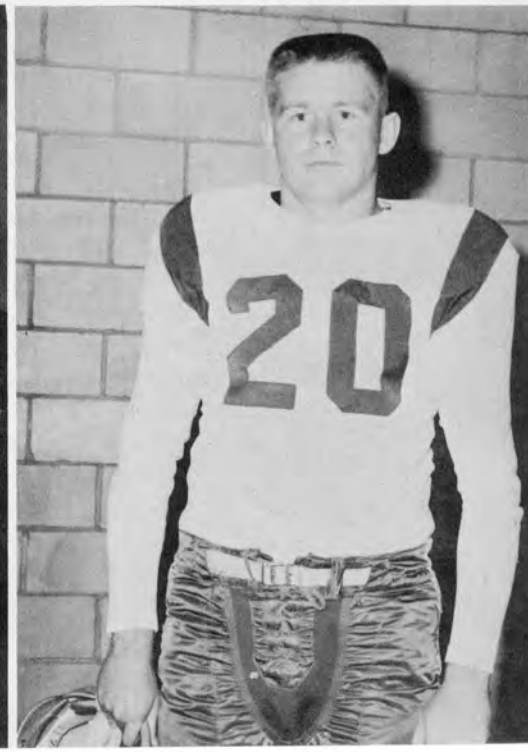
spent most of his time in the opponents' backfields. Others who shone on defense were Don Sleeper, Gary Leslie, Joe Fritz, and Leo Haberlack.

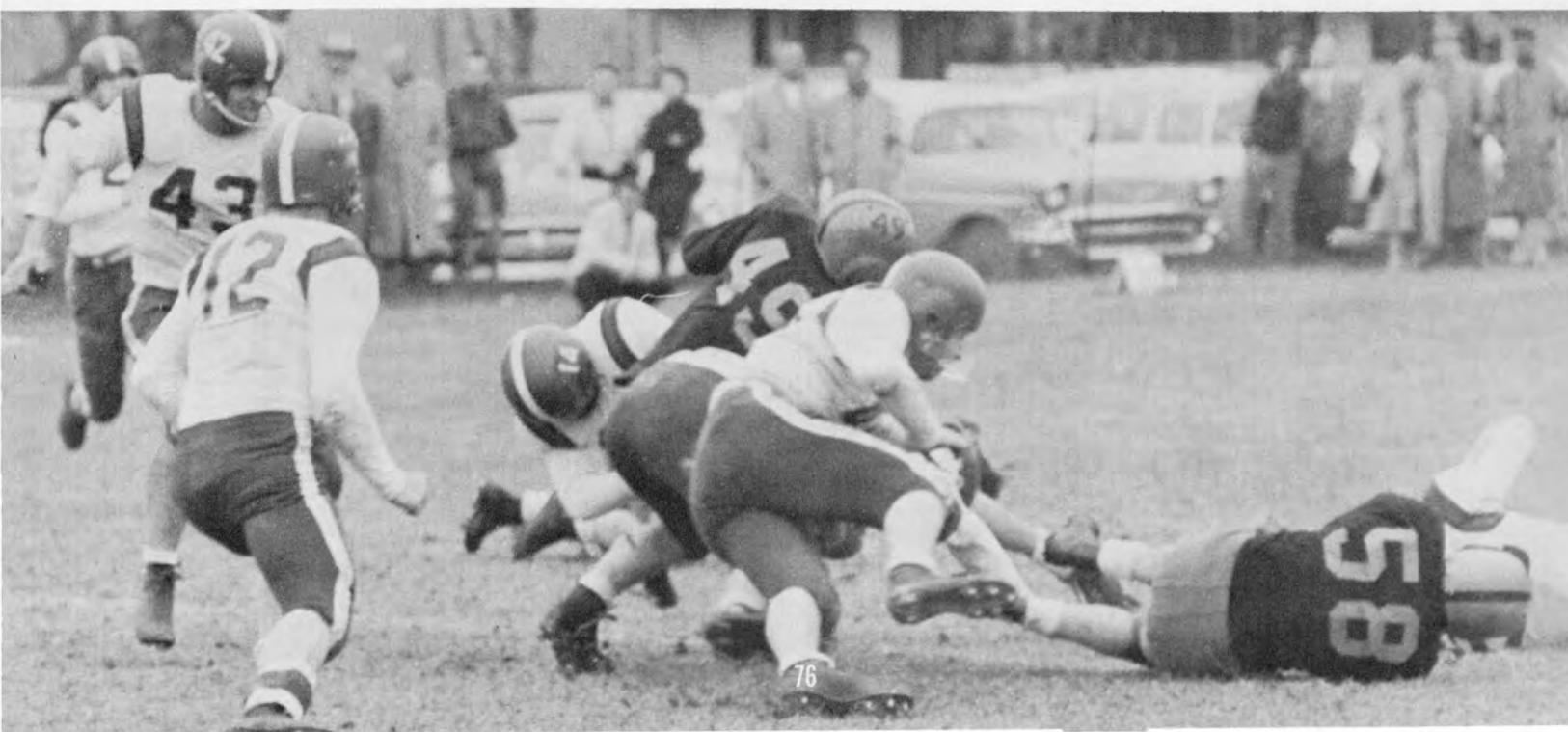

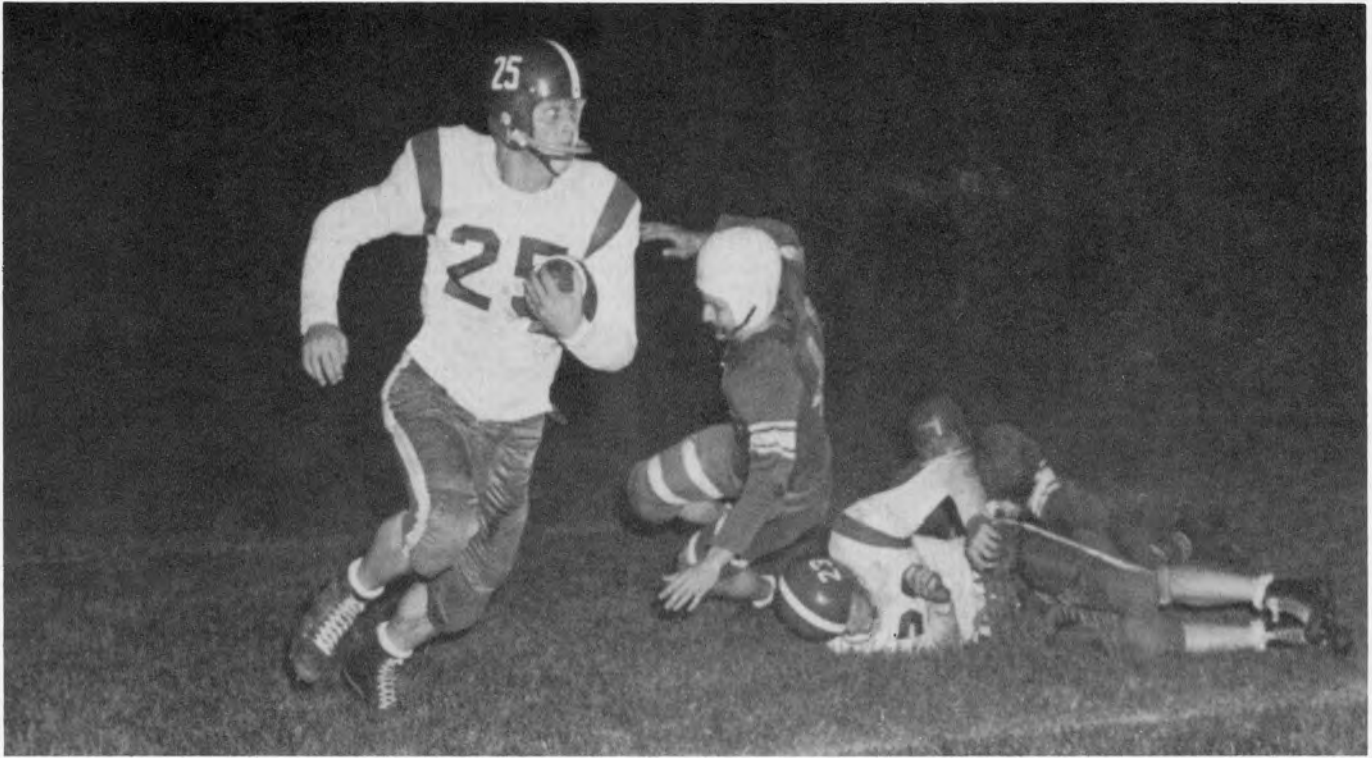
Beavers Defeat Wildcats 7-0

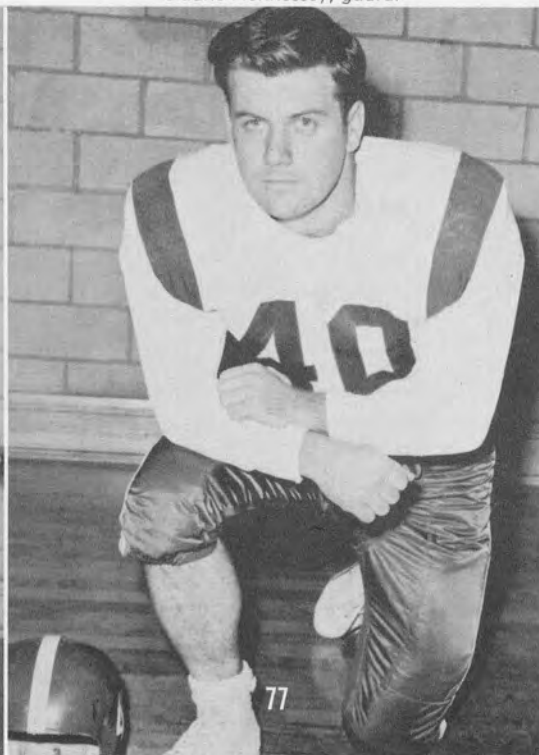

The Dusties threatened several times, but each time they got moving, they would fumble or the defense would catch up with them. In all,

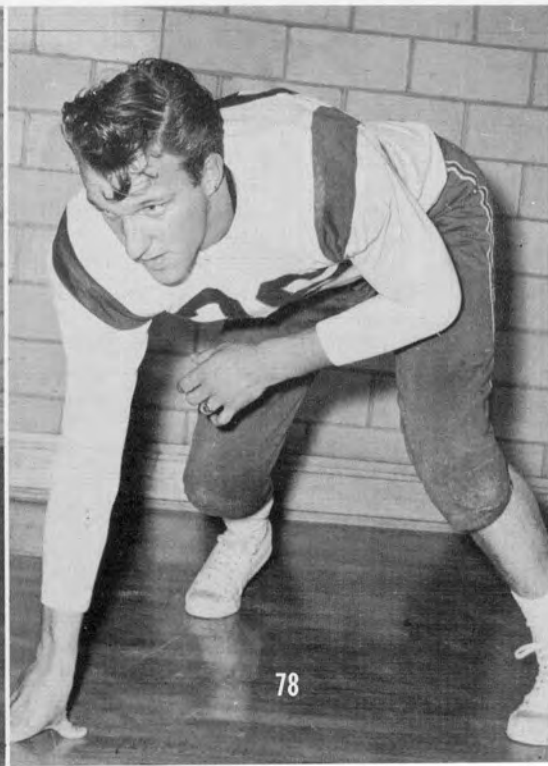
Ellendale fumbled five times. They also had two passes intercepted.

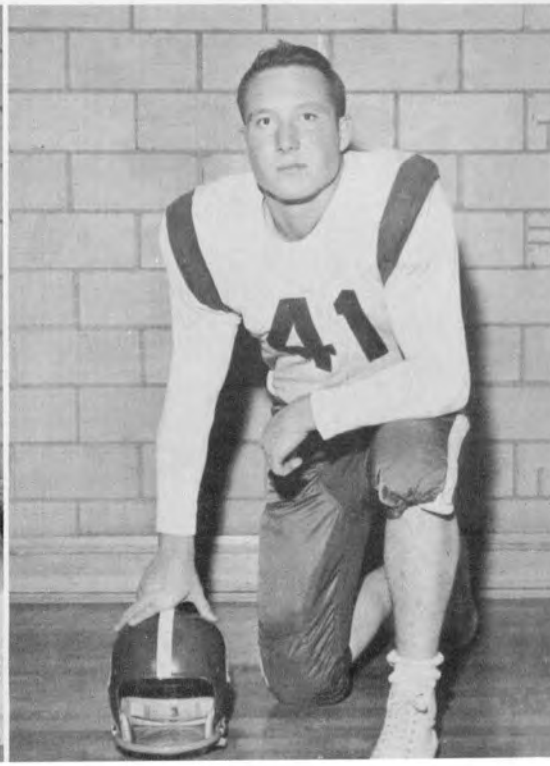

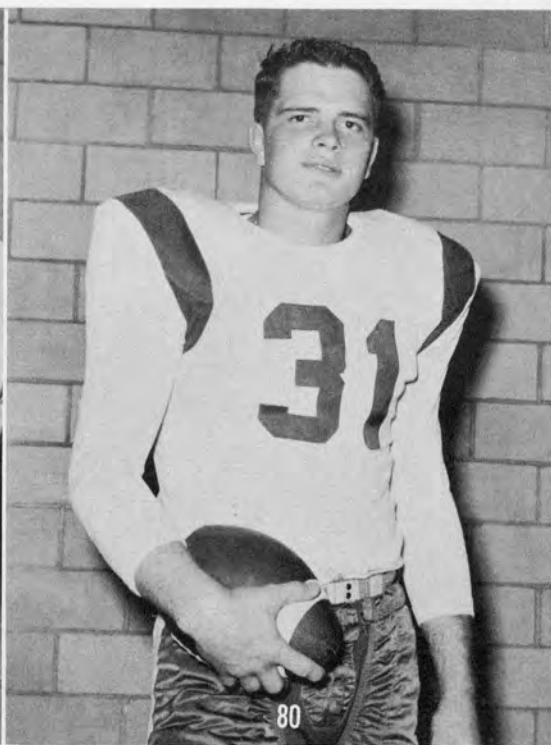
He was on the receiving end of a two yard pass from Bob Bodine and also a 31 yard pass by Ron Bodine.

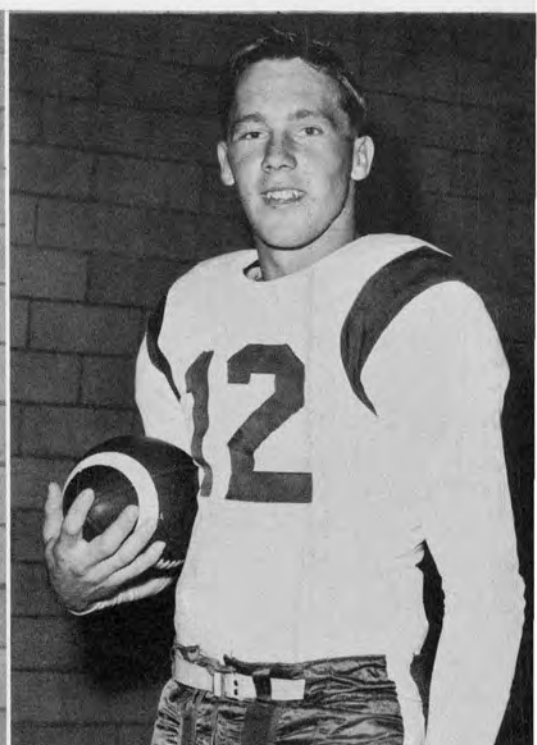

Again in the fourth period, Eastern blocked another Minot punt on the Beaver 45 yard line. Ewing later scored his second touchdown on a plunge.

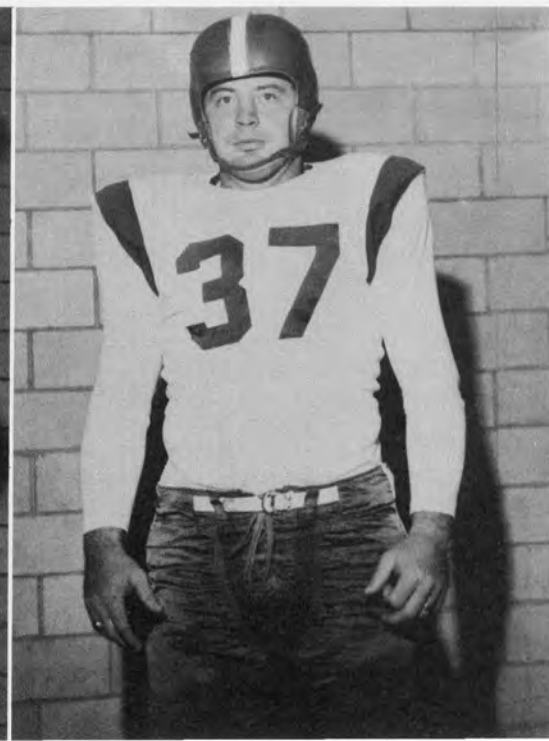

Lose to Northern Montana and BJC

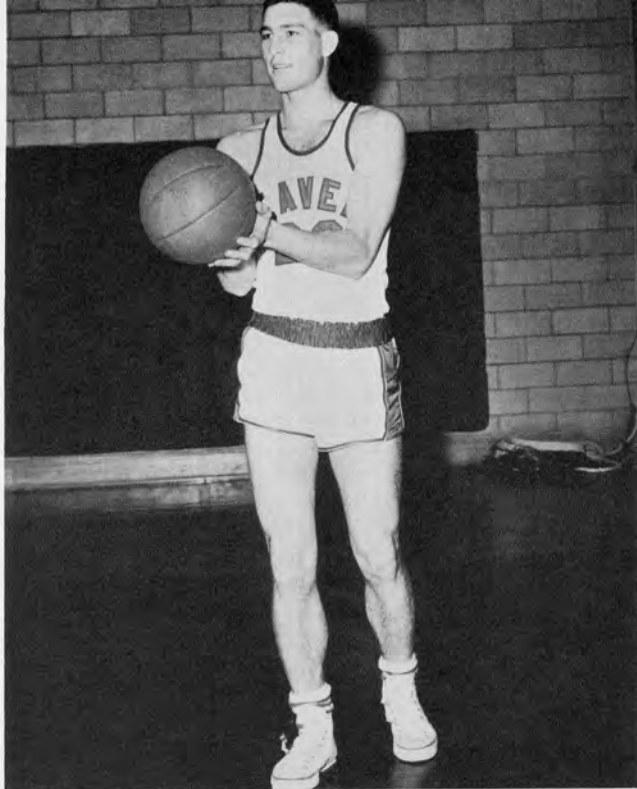

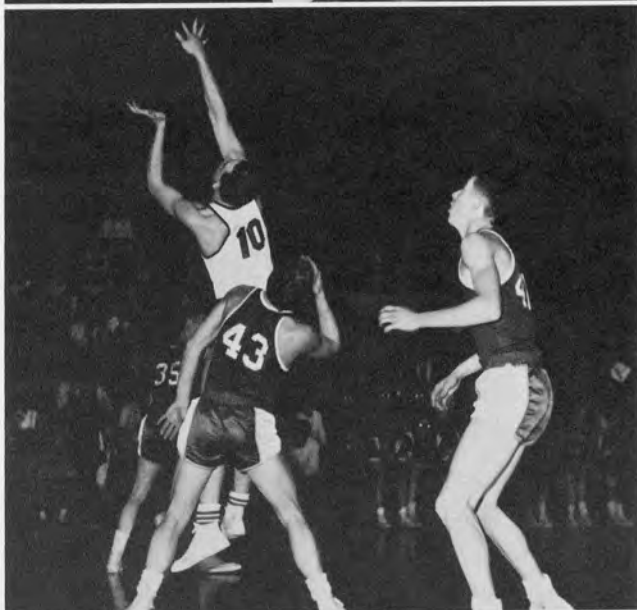

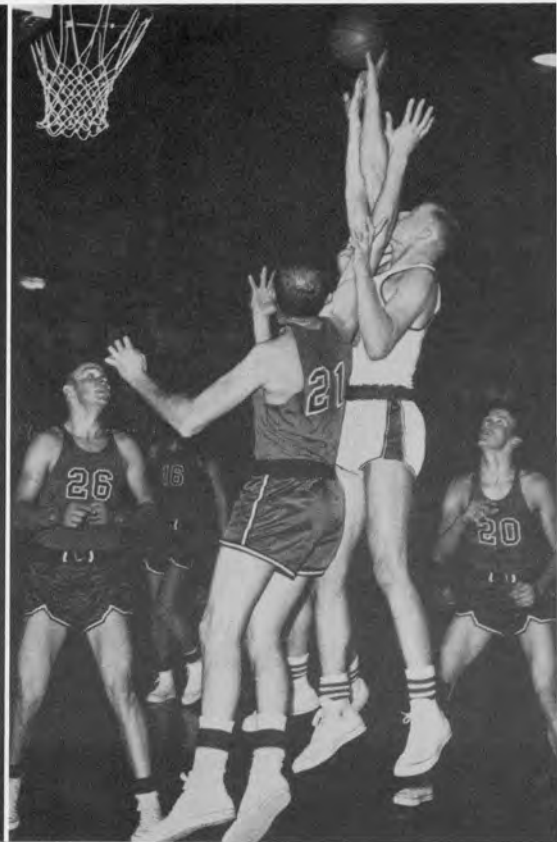

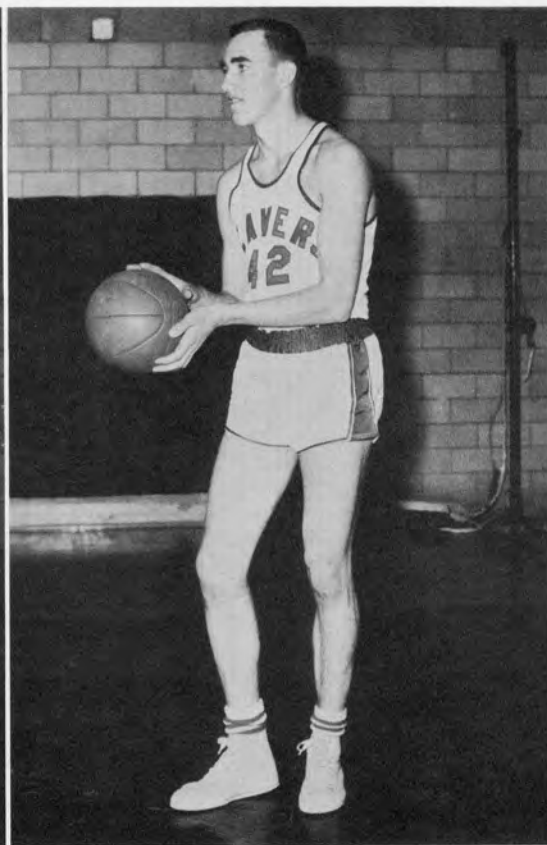

The Beavers took a two game road trip to play at Waphton and Mayville on January 16-17 respectively. At Waphton, the Wild-

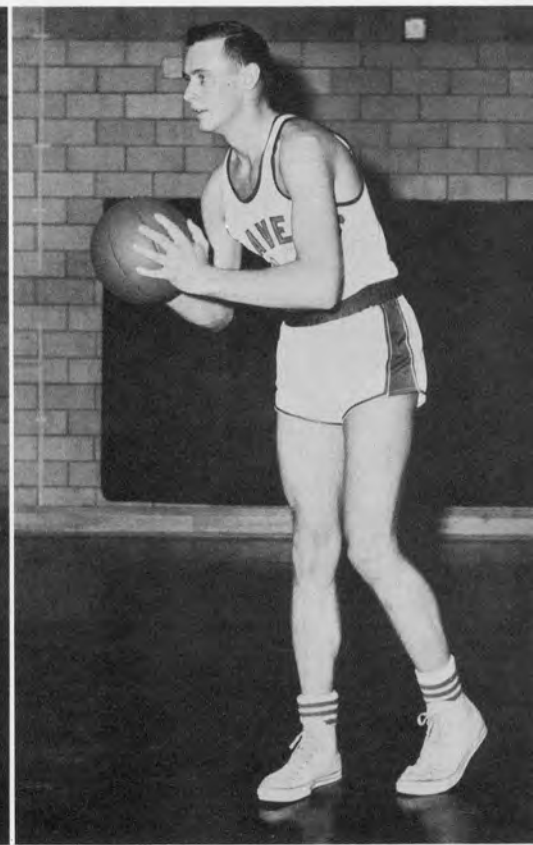

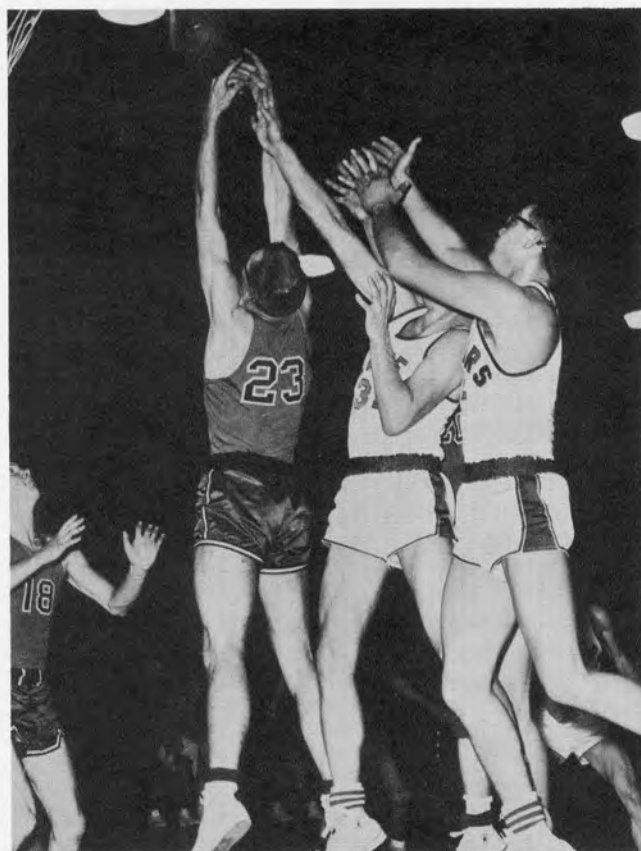

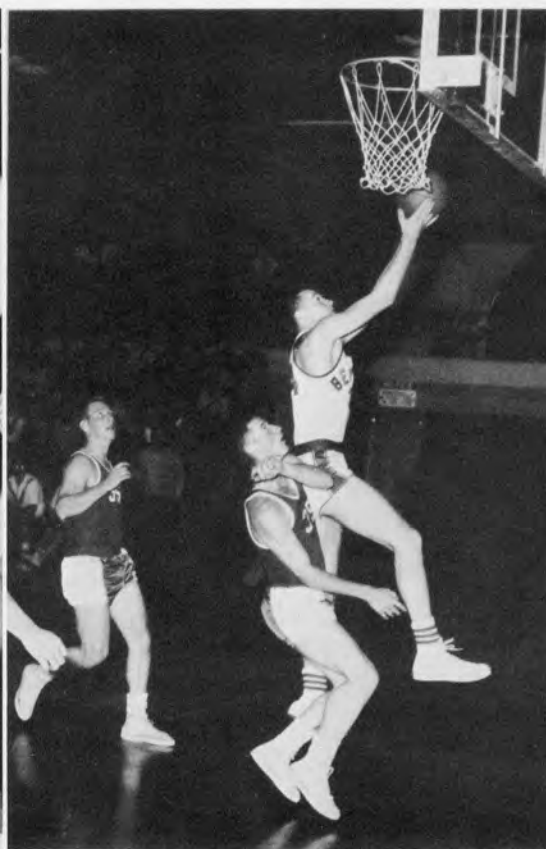

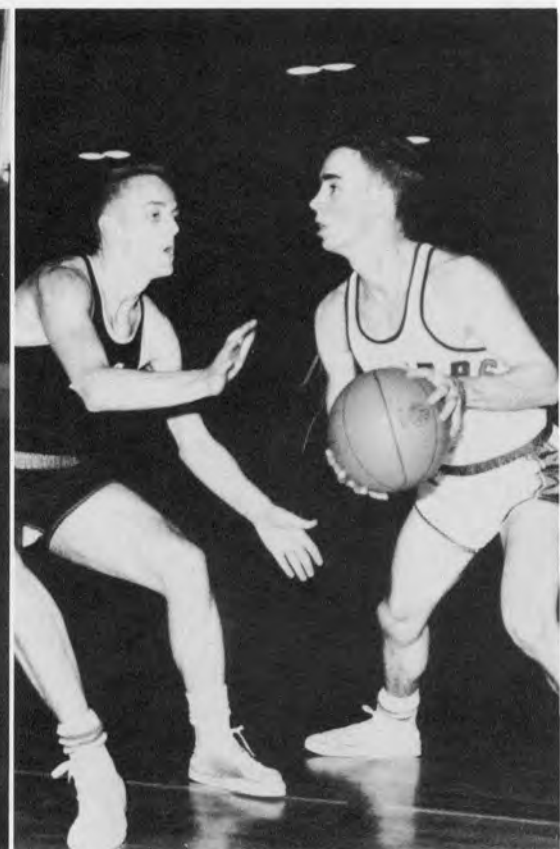

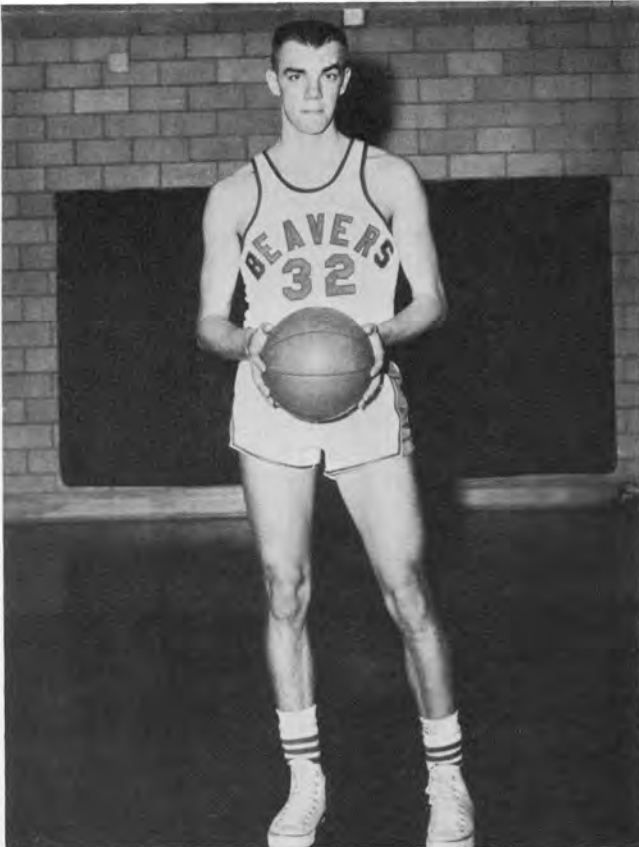
Nelson, Stein and Railing Lead Beavers Past Jamestown, Ellendale and Mayville

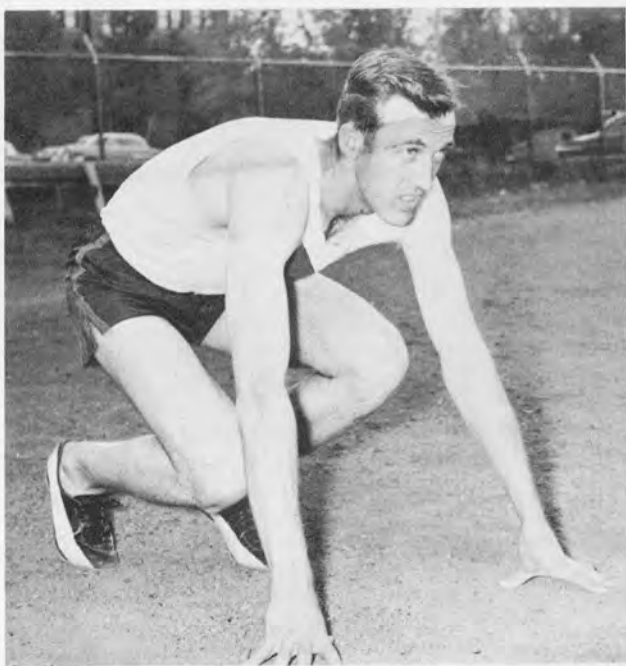


Young Track Team

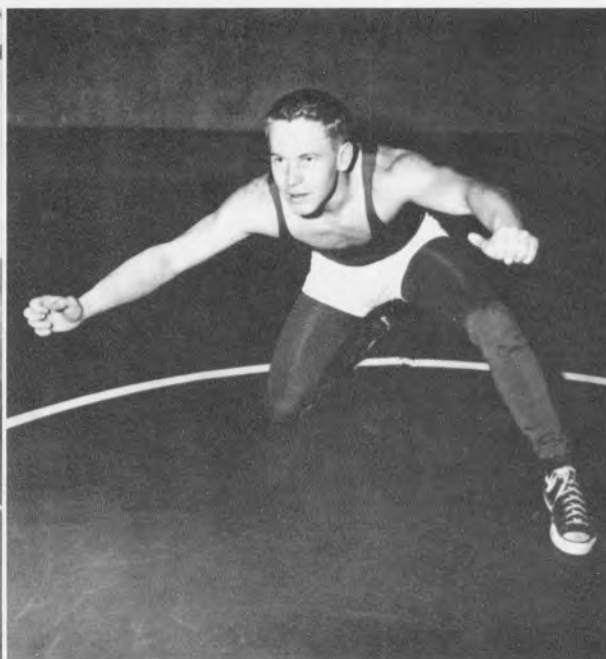

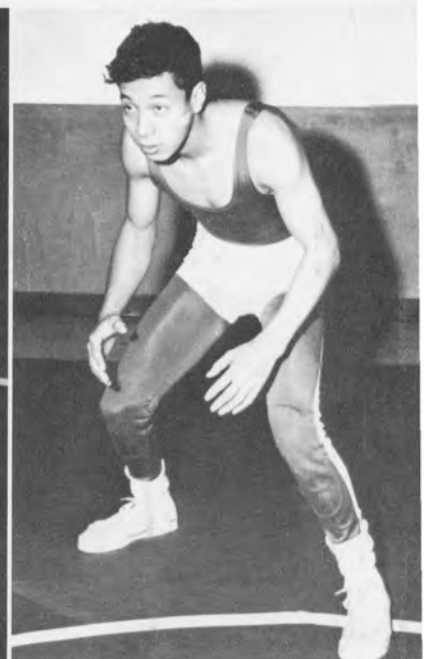

MSTC's wrestling team, in its first year of existence, made a good showing individually despite the fact that there were so few men out for the squad. The season's scoring went:

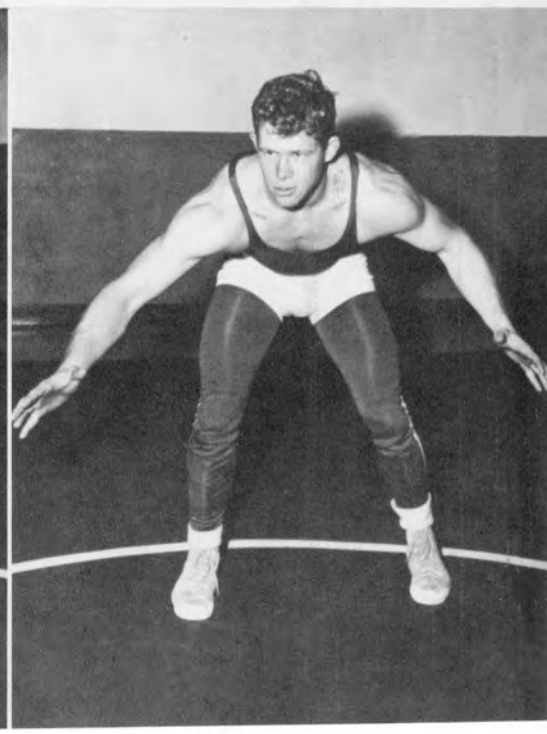
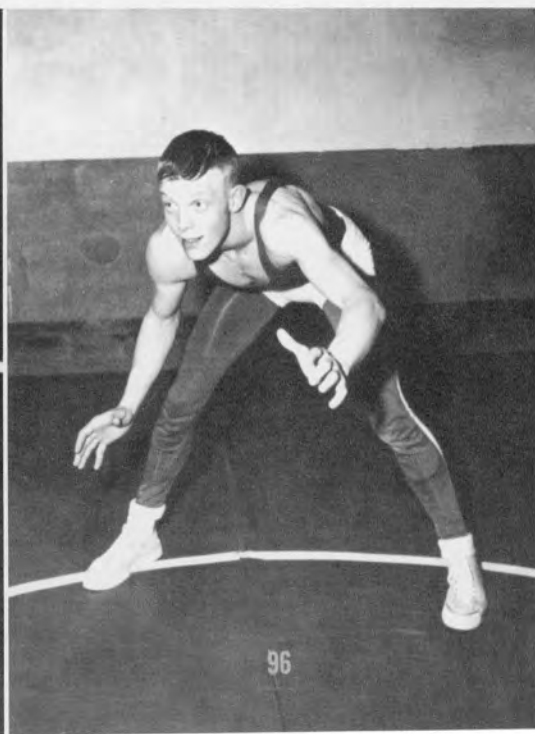

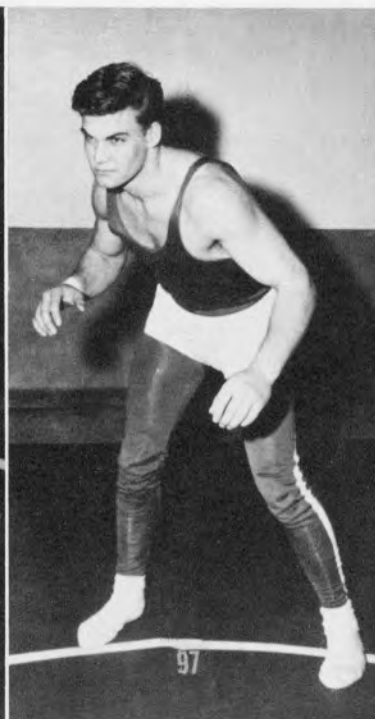
The "Campus Clampers" participated in two tournies; one, the first North Dakota State College Wrestling Meet, and the Moorhead

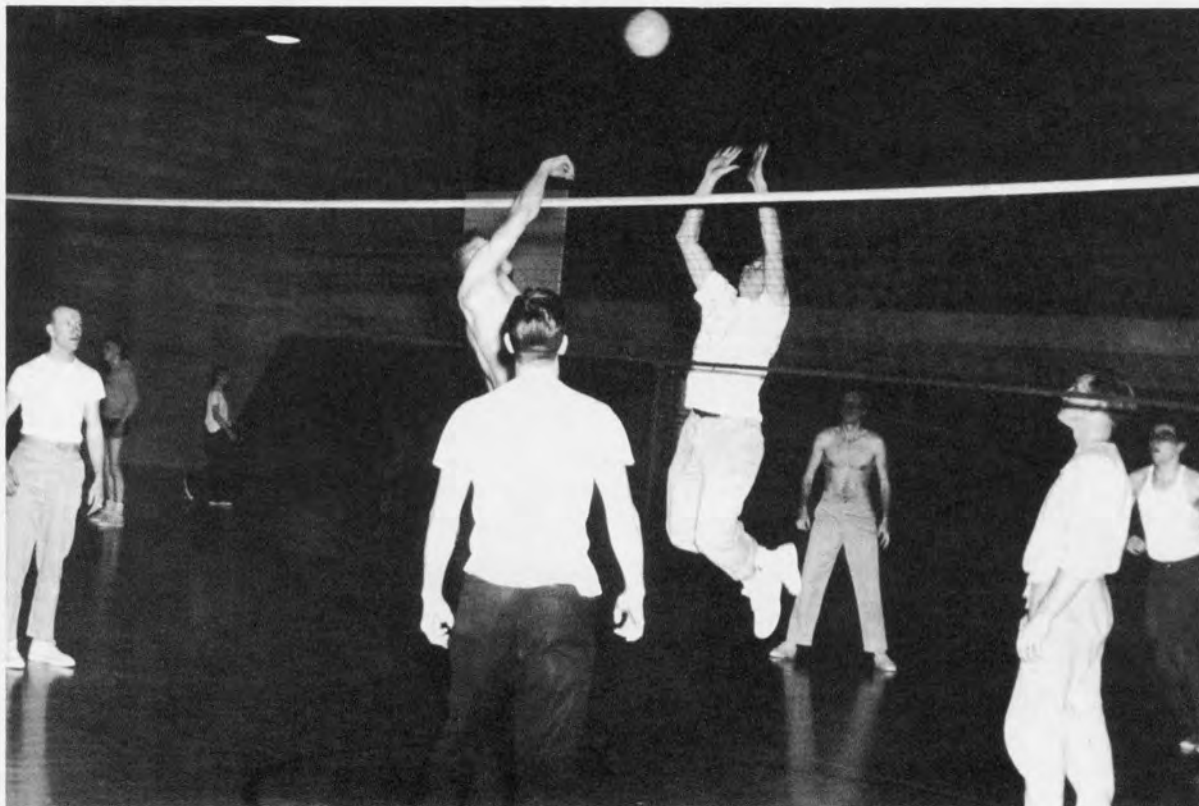

Fifty Girls Sing in Bel Canto Chorus

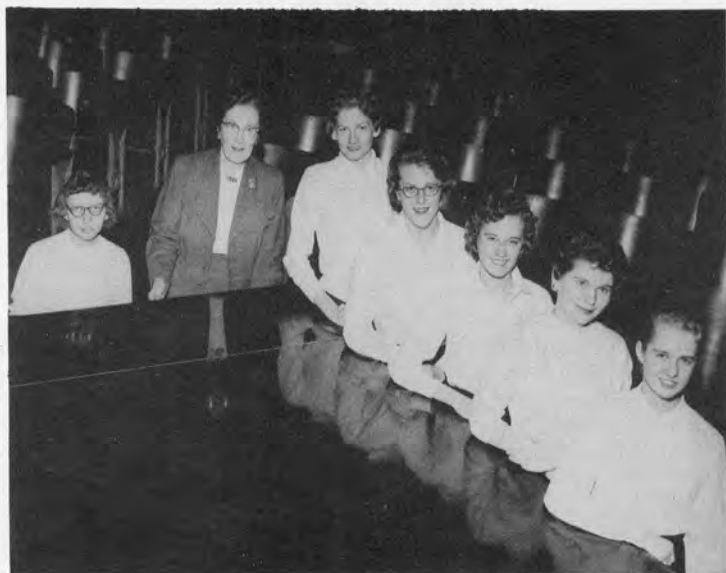

BEAVER STAFF Presents Journalistic

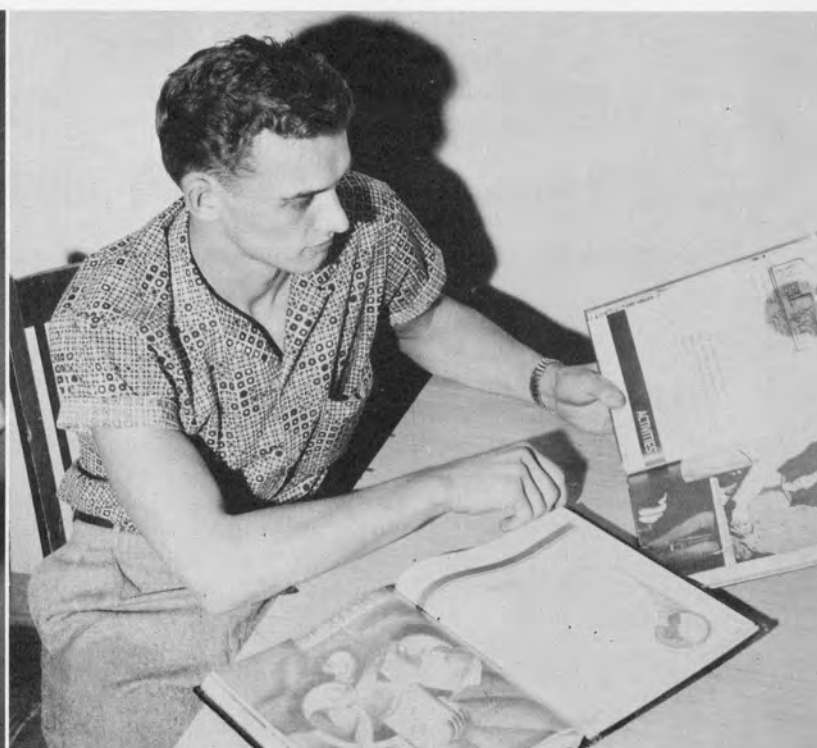

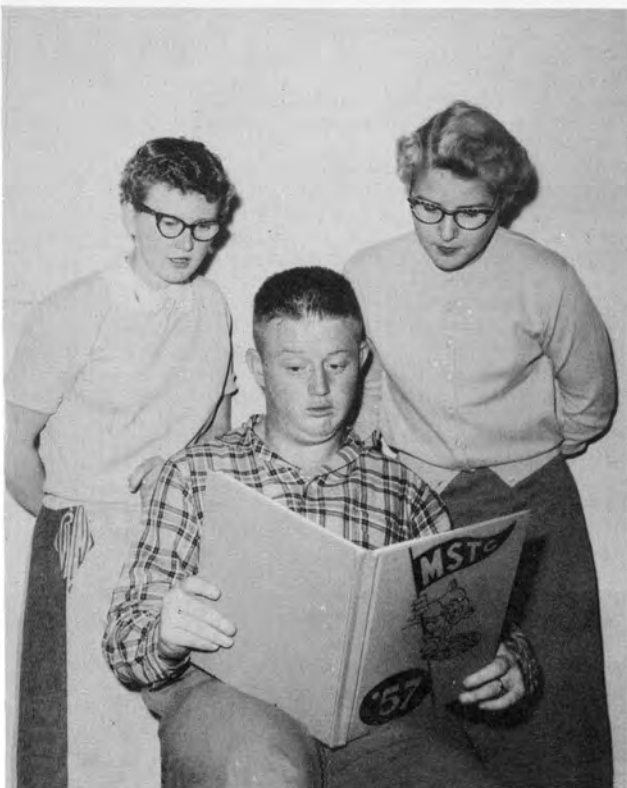

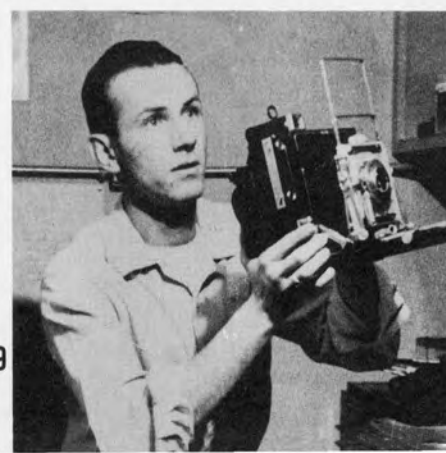

Beta Gamma Phi Science Club

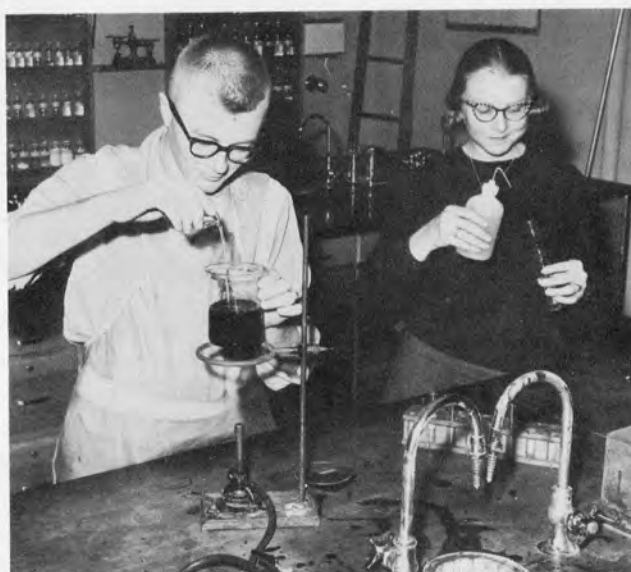

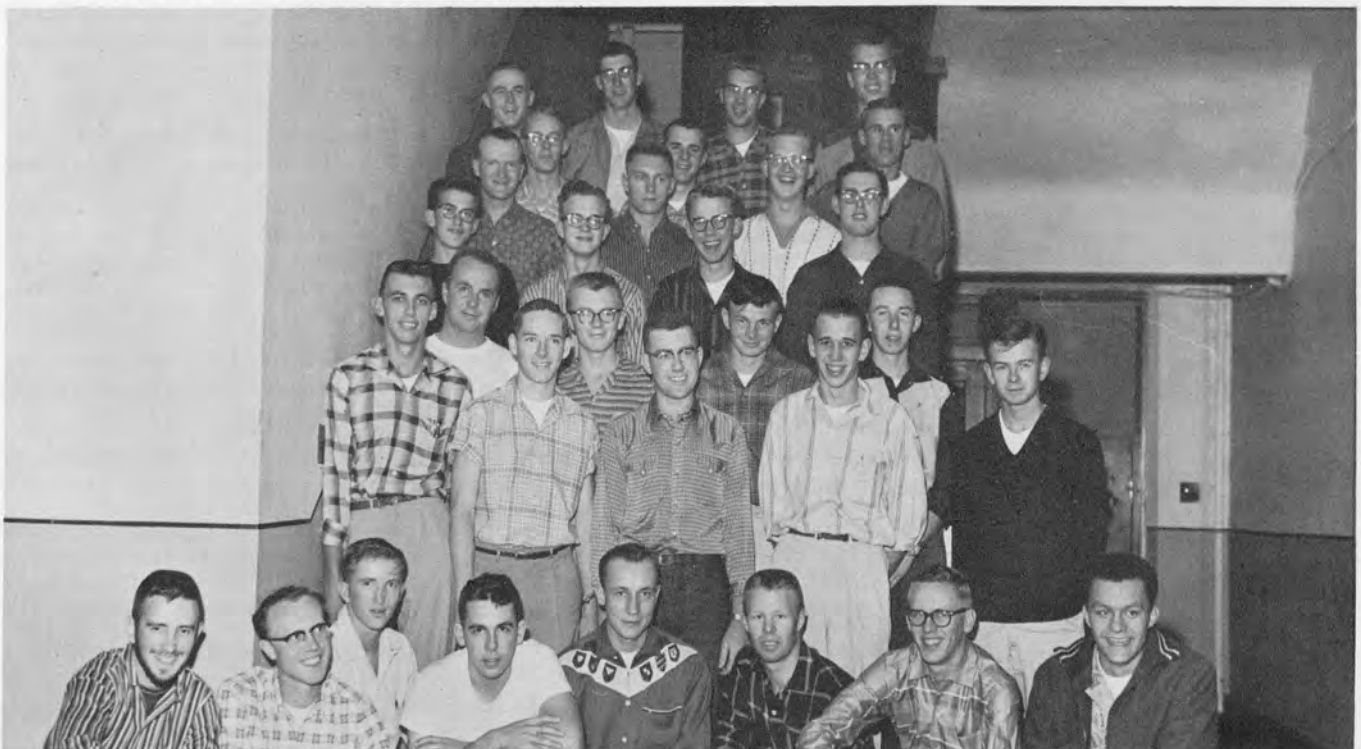

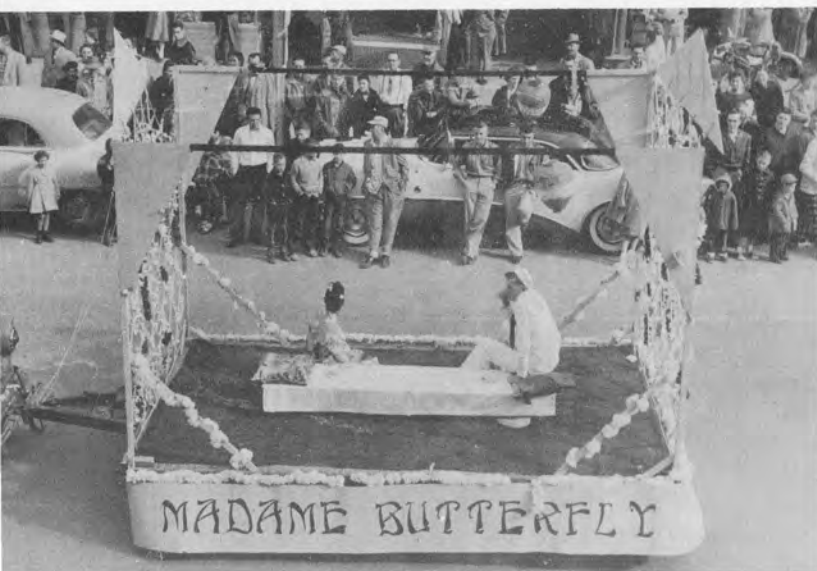

"The Petrified Forest" Electrifies Audience

Some spectators at the Campus Players performance of "Petrified Forest" were astounded at the stark realism of the lines of characters in the Robert Sherwood drama. However, most of the audience seemed to agree that the mature attitude of the cast and theme of the play rose above the cynical speeches used to further the action.

The action of the play took place during an afternoon and evening of a day in 1934 at the Black Mesa Bar B-Q, an isolated gas station and lunch counter in the Arizona desert. The fast action and disturbing ideas posed a sharp contrast against the even tenor of existence at the cafe.

The uneventful lives of Gramp, Jason and Gabby Maple, who owned the Bar B-Q, and Boze Hertzlinger and Paula, who worked there, were interrupted by the invasion of Duke Mantee, a big-time gangster fleeing for his life, and Jackie, Ruby and Pyles, his gunmen. The most important interruption in their boring existence, however, was not the thugs and the lawmen who captured them, but the arrival from nowhere of Alan Squires, an educated vagabond with dreams of a different future. The story moved to a swift and eventful close.

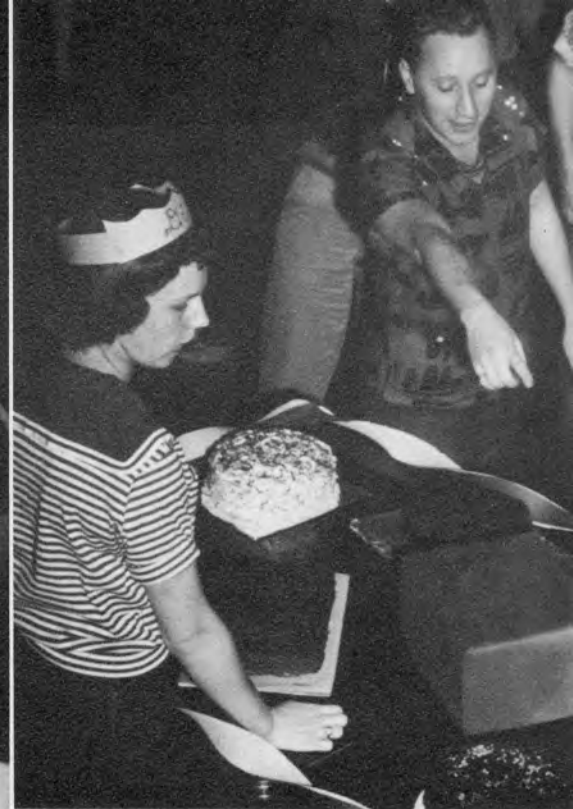

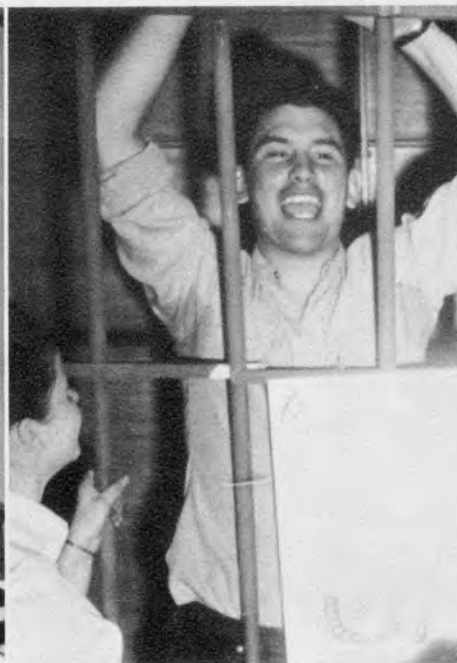

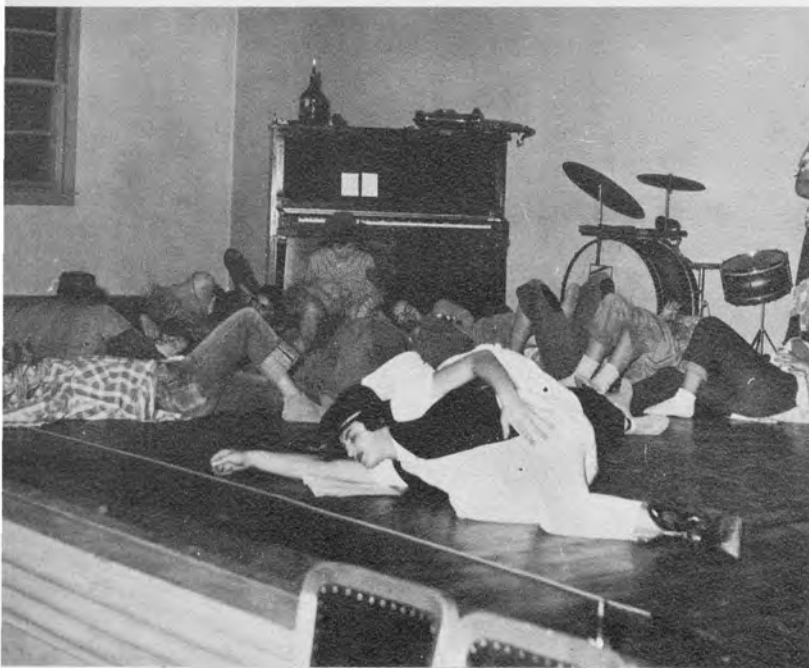
