



# DEDICATION


I am very pleased to have this opportunity of greeting the student body of Minot State College through the pages of the 1963-64 Beaver yearbook.

This division is headed by Dr. Warren G. Allen. Included in this division are testing services available to many.



## English Division Enjoys New Area



Dr. John D. Scheffer, head of the division, also has a departmental library adjoining his office; and the humanities section has a permanent place to keep their slides, screens, and other equipment which they have.

The language laboratory is a definite asset. Plans are being made to teach a full year of German this summer. The number of majors and minors graduating from this division has increased greatly, and each graduate can be sure that a position is open no matter what the date of his graduation might be.

## Special Education Offers 5th Year

Working with the young and old is the youngest division at MSC of which Dr. Edna Gilbert is head. Three broad areas of specialization can now be had at MSC in this division; they are speech correction, teaching of the deaf, and training of the educable mentally retarded. The division was created in 1962 by the State Board of Education because of the great need in these three areas.

Recently under former President Kennedy's influence, federal scholarships have been granted in order to encourage more students to help meet the great demand of teachers and therapists in special education. The youngest division should be commended for being the first division to offer a fifth year program at MSC which is obtainable in speech correction.




# 'Fitness First' Keynotes This Division

Put into practice now at MSC is a new method of student teaching called team teaching; a method which is definitely limited to a laboratory school. The aims of team teaching is toward better control and greater freedom of the teachers. The undivided group is taught by a team of teachers consisting of one master and two strong cadet teachers. Lesson plans are made together so that each knows what material the others will cover.

While one is conducting the class, the others help to keep discipline in the classroom and assist students with their problems. The advantages of this system are that the children learn more, interest is aroused and strong teachers are required. At the present time, over 300 schools in the United States are using this system in laboratory schools.

The laboratory school at MSC enables college people to observe students in actual school situations and to learn the principles concerned with education.



fallout shelter, eat in the slop shop, and they find the recreation room very entertaining.





Mr. and Mrs. John Strohm and their family are the head residents at Pioneer Hall. Their two children, Shelley and Kirk,


add a bit of zest to the fellows' lives.







on what Fulton Lewis Jr. had to say and news concerning students, sports and faculty.



The adviser is Mrs. Carol Belinskey and the Chaplain is Father Donald J. Fischer.









245 yards, running 82 plays from scrimmage. Minot's winning margin was a pair of two point safeties forced by the defensive team.


### 40 ELLENDALE 14

### 13 MAYVILLE 18





## Students Find Varied Activities in I-M


Assisting the male populace of the campus in keeping physically fit, the Intramural Program provides some sort of activity in which every man on campus can participate.



After a spirited early season sprint, Minot played only fair ball during January to drop seemingly far out of the title picture. However the Beavers came back strong and had a shot at the title until the final week of the season.


The team opened the season with a display of offensive and defensive power as Minot slammed BJC 83-51. The bench strength came through with Monte Rutten and Dan Hilligoss scoring 18 and 14 points respectively. At Mitchell, South Dakota, the Beavers saw their eight point lead dissolve as Dakota Wesleyan rapped in 16 straight points. Minot pulled within four points but lost 79-70. Roger Bowles was a hero the following night as he sank a bucket and two freethrows in the closing seconds to lead his team to a 73-70 triumph over a battling crew from Aberdeen.

Entertaining at home for three consecutive games, the Beavers looked very good as they won decisively in all the games. 

Winning for the first time on the road, the Beaver team used a second-half surge to post a 76-60 victory over the Ellendale Dusties. Hopes of overtaking Mayville were strengthened when Dickinson invaded and lost 87-72. Scoring 51 points in the second


half, the Beavermen hit over 50 per cent from the floor. Paul Soderberg scored 25 points in his top effort of the season. The win put Minot into a tie for second place.


Entering the last week of the season, Minot's dreams of a climactic title game against Mayville were smashed when the Comets sneaked past Valley City and took the title outright.





At season's end, Minot's NDCC conference record was 6-0





## Johnson Forecasts Season Accurately








Vance Spencer nears a pin as the referee watches proceedings carefully.


Minot was the site of the state tournament to end the season. Beaver matmen took third with 70 points. Defending




Legs flying, a visiting grappler is about to find himself on his back.






## Tennis Team
