






## Growth, Progress

Greetings:


A college is people— younger and older— engaged in the important activities of learning and teaching in the broadest sense and including social as well as academic and professional pursuits.

## GREETINGS!





## Parasitic Tapeworm Found in Foxes

Outstanding discoveries are made at MSC and of major interest this year was the finding of a tapeworm, the *Echinococcus multilocularis*, which is a parasite that has never previously been reported in continental United States. Six of nine red foxes in Ward County, North Dakota, were found to be infected with the adult cestode. The parasite goes through a sylvatic cycle of fox to rodent to fox; however various species of domestic animals can serve as hosts. There is reason to believe that in future years this tapeworm can be the cause of brain tumors in humans. Individual research is being stressed among the science faculty to find out more about the newly discovered animal in our country and area.

## Clinic Highlights Division's Year

Despite the threat of inclement weather, the division of music was able to hold its music clinic last fall after the disappointing cancellation last year. Carl Orff's *Carmina Burana* was presented by the massed voices of the college Concert Choir and Women's Chorus, the Minot High Symphonic Choir, and the Children's Choirs of Lincoln and North Plains schools accompanied by the college Community Orchestra. Guest soloist for the clinic was distinguished clarinetist Dwight Dailey from Tulsa, Oklahoma.

The division headed by John Strohm helps to prepare people to teach music by involving them in musical activities both on and off campus. Springtime brings the annual tours of the Women's Chorus, Concert Choir and Concert Band. Members of the division also help with the annual district music festival in the spring.

## Team Teaching in Effect at Campus School

Put into practice now at MSC is a new innovation of student teaching; used primarily at the Campus School. The aims of team teaching is toward better control and greater freedom of the teachers. The undivided group is taught by a team of teachers consisting of one supervising teacher and two outstanding student teachers. Teaching units are planned together so that each knows what material the others will cover.

While one is conducting the class, the others observe the instruction and whenever necessary assist students with their problems. The advantages of this system are that instructional facilities are utilized more fully, the children learn more, interest is aroused, and more children can be taught with fewer teachers. At the present time, over 300 schools in the United States are using this system.

The Campus School at MSC enables college people to observe students in actual school situations and to learn the application of professional methods in education. It provides for junior students, a novice experience in teaching, an individual child study experience and a number of classroom observations. During their senior year about one third of the graduates do their student teaching in the Campus School.



## Alumni Further 'Service First'











# First Win Does Not Set Precedent for Season

Under the direction of head Coach Rod Caufield, Minot won its first game of the season in a non-conference affair with Bismarck Junior College 78-64 at home November 24.

December was a bad month for the Red and Green, winning only 3 of 9. A two-game series at Spearfish, South Dakota, saw the Yellowjackets cuff the Beavers 92-57 and 83-67. Weakness in free-throw shooting was largely responsible for the losses. A hard fought, last minute win by the Northern Wolves of Aberdeen ended 70-67 at home December 9. At Mandan, BJC squeaked by 92-89 for their first win over a Caufield squad in 11 frays. The conference opener brought Wahpeton a last second victory rallying to 75-74. Dakota Wesleyan University of Mitchell next lost by the score of 89-80.

Participating in the Red River Classic at Concordia College in Moorhead, Minnesota, the locals made a fine effort while losing to Moorhead State 69-64. The unbeaten Dragons led in field accuracy while Minot was better in rebounds and field goals. In the consolation event St. John's fell to a pressing attack 63-60. Mayville nearly came out on top in a close 58-57 Red and Green triumph for fifth place honors.

Although January was a mediocre month with only two wins against five losses, three of the setbacks were by seven points or less. Powerful Valley City tripped the home


team 77-70 in conference play. The Vikings combined sharp offense, zone defense and excellent shooting. Ellendale fell 83-73, losing the lead in the last 13 minutes. Dickinson smashed MSC by 86-62 on the Savages' home court January 12.

An upset by Jamestown for the first time in 18 appearances here ended with an 84-81 mark. The hard fought overtime wasn't decided until the last minute of the extra period. Mayville squeezed through by 74-73 in a January 21 road game. Minot's next victory was at Wahpeton's expense to settle the earlier defeat. The score was 75-67 as the buzzer sounded. Valley City clubbed the Red and Green 76-62 for the fifth straight time on their home court.

February began with a 65-55 win at Ellendale. On the 8th Dickinson State staged a comeback at Swain Hall to drop Minot 63-56. The battling Beavers never relinquished the lead until 3:06 left in the game. Jamestown's Jimmies led continually in an 83-72 victory on the Jimmies' home court.

From a 34-34 halftime tie, Mayville's Comets stamped over the hosts. The game ended at 83-58. Four seniors, Belisle, Hepper, Soderberg and Rutten, bowed out in the season finale on the 18th.

The prospects for the 1965-1966 season are very promising. In addition to the returning cagers, many freshmen and transfer students are expected to come out for the squad. The experience gained this year could be used in a championship team next year.





This year's Minot State varsity wrestling team became the first to have an undefeated season since the 1946 football team did so. The Beaver grapplers went on to win the NDCC title by edging defending champ and host Valley City by the score of 66-65. Dave Stewart at 130 won 4-2, Leo Kinsella at 137 won 8-2, Keith Flygare at 191 got a pin in 4:29 and Larry McDaniel at heavyweight won by 3-2.

Coach Hank Hettwer, assistant coach of national cham-

pion Moorhead State last year, did an excellent job in guiding his men to the title this year.

Stewart has grabbed four consecutive titles, while Flygare has also taken four and placed 4th in the 1964 NAIA meet held at Spearfish, South Dakota. It is the first crowns that Kinsella and McDaniel have snared. The four new champs will go to the 1965 NAIA to be held at Terre Haute, Indiana, March 18-20.







## 1964 Cindermen Set Conference Records

One senior and eight other lettermen helped start the Minot State track squad on a record breaking season. One conference and nine school records were established by the fleet cindermen. Talented Harold Doerr set a conference record in the pole vault with a leap of 13 feet 3 inches and a school mark in the discus with a 148 foot 1 inch toss. Mike Hepper took the broad jump and hop-step-jump with leaps of 21 feet 11½ inches and 41 feet 4½ inches. Bob Sundberg threw 47 feet 2 inches in the shot put.

The 440 yard relay was grabbed by Gerald Hovland, James Bleth, Darnell Blackwell and Dave Anderson in record time of 43.5 seconds. Bleth, Hanson, Blackwell and Doug

Sanford turned in a 1:31.4 time in the 880 yard relay. A 3:23.6 was good enough for Sanford, Hovland, Blackwell and Hanson to cop the mile relay. Blackwell, Bleth, Hanson and Paul Soderberg used 3:52.5 while snaring the spring medley. Soderberg won the 330 yard intermediate high hurdles in 42.9.

Despite a fine Beaver effort, Dickinson roared over all competitors for their fifth straight track championship—four in the old NDIC and one in the new North Dakota College Conference. Dickinson garnered 70 points, Valley City had 50 for second and Minot was third with 45 in the conference championship meet at Dickinson.






