






Yes, it is a stage and you are the actors upon that stage. Life is the drama being enacted.


But what is your role in all of this? Who are you? What are you doing? Where are you going?






What is it?




President outlines various plans for MSC



President Gordon B. Olson, in his second year at Minot State, is coordinating many programs for expansion, changes and advancement.

Plans and projects being worked on include a liberalization of the B.A. degree curriculum so that foreign language can be selective rather than required as it is at present. Expansion of the fifth year program is also in the planning stage.

In the immediate plans for building is the amphitheater. Legislative authority to build the amphitheater was sought after the students approved the levy by vote.

Also in the stage of prearrangement is an addition to the Administration building. A \$600,000-\$800,000 addition is sought.

In the long range building program, a humanities center has number one priority. Number two on the list is a physical education classroom building. Non-state funded building is marked for married student housing. Builders are also looking towards a new women's dormitory and a new men's dormitory.

Campus beautification plans were expanded this year with the planting of numerous trees and shrubs and the decoration of the campus grounds with flower beds.

The substantial enrollment gain of this year will most likely continue. The 1968 fall quarter enrollment was 2,459, while the 1967 fall quarter enrollment figure was 2,143.

A study has been undertaken to reorganize the administration and staff of the college.





Serving as the governing body for the state-supported institutions of higher learning in North Dakota, the State Board of Higher Education meets monthly on the various college and university campuses. The Board decides on such operating matters as buildings, finances, budgets, and curricula. Providing for facilities and staff, made necessary by the increasing enrollments, is one of their many tasks. Leaders

As the first North Dakota governor to serve for four terms, William L. Guy has established a progressive record as an administrator.

The Governor is a native North Dakotan. During his undergraduate years at North Dakota State University, Mr. Guy served as editor of the college yearbook, as president of Blue Key, as a member of the Athletic Board of Control, and as president of his fraternity.

After World War II he continued his studies at the University of Minnesota where he received his Master's Degree in Agricultural Economics and Business Administration.

Mr. Guy was elected governor in 1961. During that year he helped to establish the Midwestern Governors' Conference and served as chairman for two years. In 1967 he was elected chairman of the National Governors' Conference. This group worked closely with President Johnson to create a new system of state-federal communication and relations.

Characteristically Governor Guy advised, "I have found that good politics and good government are one and the same. They offer challenging and interesting careers for those who are motivated by a desire to help mankind. There is no best time to become involved. The sooner a citizen becomes active in politics and government, the longer will be that citizen's career in this field. I invite college students to consider politics and government as a life's work or as a life's hobby."



A new emphasis . . .

With the closing of grades 7-12 in the Campus School a year ago emphasis was placed on an individual curriculum.

Grades 1-4 have this individualized and small group instruction. This system is the present trend in education and will probably become prevalent within a decade.

Also introduced this past year was a two-year pre-school program under the direction of Mrs. Lola Dokken. Mrs. Dokken formerly taught the first grade at the Campus School.

The objectives of this pre-school program are 1) to develop the student's attitude and skills which will aid them in their formal education; 2) provide the student with an edge in maturity to enable him to make important decisions in later years of school; and 3) to prepare the student for individualized curriculums.

Other innovations at the Campus School were the introduction of conversational German in the fourth grade taught by Miss Joyce Zimmerman of the college division of literature and language, the addition of a special education classroom, and the reorganization of a string instrumental program directed by Miss Sandra Schjeldahl with the cooperation of the division of music.

There is a vocal music program in all the grades. Length of daily instruction varies with the class level. A special choral group was instituted in Grades 4, 5 and 6.

Tapes get wide use

A year of innovation characterized the division of special education.

The Speech and Communications center was added and has taken responsibility for testing the speech and hearing of all new students and referring those with problems to the speech or hearing clinic.

Another facet of the special education development is the addition of the video tape studio. This studio provides tapes for the aid of those working with the handicapped child. It is also used for the taping of lectures by visiting professors.

Eventually this studio may be able to exchange tapes with other institutions making it possible to bring to classes lectures and demonstrations of experts in their fields.

New divisional offices and the language developmental center are on the first floor of Old Main. The language center has the latest electronic equipment to help the new child who is hard of hearing or has language impairments.

For office education

A teacher training program for office education coordinators has been added to the business education curriculum. To become a certified coordinator a student must have a major in business education and an additional 16 quarter hours of vocational office education courses.

The purpose of education for office occupations is to provide the trained man-power needed to staff the offices of the nation. Office procedures, which are constantly becoming more complicated, require skilled workers.

Technological advancements have aroused automation of the past decade. Potential business managers and educators are faced with a new and constantly changing field.

To increase the occupational effectiveness of business students, several courses in data processing and office technology are now being offered.

Additional offerings in this area will need to be made as the need increases.

The division of fine and applied arts added a new drawing studio and work area which helped overcome the spatial problem they had in previous years.



The number of students enrolled in home economics courses indicates the need for a major in that field. There are probably enough courses for the major, but as yet Minot State cannot offer this.

To prepare teachers

One of the largest divisions on campus, the division of education and psychology, has 80-85 per cent of the MSC students enrolled in its curriculum. The division has continued its work in preparing adequate teachers for the state and nation by constantly revising the curriculum to keep abreast of new techniques and approaches to teaching.

Students in the teacher education program are continually screened on the basis of health, personality, scholarship and professional aptitudes. This screening keeps the students alert, for admission to the division does not guarantee continuation in the program.

Before a student can do his student teaching, he must complete approximately 20 quarter hours of professional sequence courses in the backgrounds and methodology of education.

A Reading Clinic conducted by Miss Bertha Okland is one of the far reaching services offered by the division. This clinic is for the training of elementary teachers who will help children with reading problems.

The psychology major which was added last year is developing rapidly, with growing student interest in the field.

Changeover goes on

Memorial Library is continuing the process of changing from the Dewey Decimal to the Library of Congress system of book classification. About 26,000 books have been classified so far. The main purpose for the change in systems is to reduce the cost and time involved in processing books.

In order to increase both upstairs studying space and bookshelf capacity, the books are being moved downstairs and the periodicals upstairs. This is expected to be completed by the end of this summer.

Current book acquisition rate of new titles is over 6,000 a year. The library has approximately 102,000 books, subscribes to over 1,000 periodicals, and has nearly 1,800 microfilm reels of past newspapers.

The library added some new equipment this spring. Included are a coin-operated photo copying machine and electric typewriter. They are self-supporting and for the overall convenience of the students.

Wide world of sports

The division of health and physical education at Minot State led the sporting world in northwest North Dakota with sportsmanship as its keynote.

Women's Recreation Association sponsored a playday for high school girls from the area last October. WRA presented the physical education program to the girls attending the playday. Another activity and meeting session took place in Dickinson last fall with the college WRA participating.


Sports rules clinics along with athletic conference meetings were part of the year's work.

The annual high school girls track meet was a feature of this spring's work. This track meet, under the supervision of physical education majors and minors in the track and field class, promotes feelings and competitiveness among the participants.

An amphitheater too

Anticipation in the form of a new theater prevailed in the division of literature and language this year. Last fall in a special election students approved a fee assessment for this amphitheater, to be constructed in a natural location north of the college.

If completed in time, the amphitheater will be used for part of the summer theater, formerly the tent theater, productions.

Drama presentations will not be the only use made of the amphitheater. Choral, instrumental, forensics, high school speech meets, student rallies and others will also utilize these facilities.

Faculty committees worked during the year on curriculum revision for all courses in the division. Course work needed to be revised and altered to fit into the change from quarter to semester plan proposed for the fall of 1970. New syllabi were also written for all courses.

In this division the B.S. degree prepares one to teach on the secondary or junior high level. The B.S. degree enables one to do further work in English and has numerous applications in fields such as advertising, communications and journalism. The English minor can be used well as a supplement for work in another area.

Computer courses in

The division of science and mathematics has requested numerous course additions in its efforts to supply updated teachers. Two courses were requested in computer science and plans call for a minor in this field in the near future.

There are also course additions pending in the mathematics department. New advanced calculus and statistics classes are necessary to update the curriculum.

A degree in radiological technology is also pending. This degree is similar to the medical technology program except more physics is required. Students in this curriculum would attend three years here and intern a year at an approved hospital.

Building facilities have also been expanding in the science division. The addition of a third floor, acquisition of a new telescope, and construction of a greenhouse all expand the utility of the science programs. The greenhouse will be used for growing plants for botany classes and for botanical research. Remodeling of the microbiology laboratory was also completed this year.

The zenith in the social science division was the installation of the Minot State College chapter of Pi Gamma Mu, an honorary social science fraternity during winter quarter. Requirements for admission are a minimum of 24 hours of social science courses plus a 3.00 average.


The division is literally bulging at the seams. With over 2,000 students enrolled in the division, many classes must be held in buildings other than the Administration building, and other classes have over sixty students enrolled.

Seniors taking the senior problems class are writing histories of local communities. Other classes are taking a survey of the aged to discover the problems of senior citizens.

Experimentation with team-teaching in History 125 is conducted by five teachers. Under this arrangement, students are lectured by all five teachers interchangeably. Plans also include the introduction of video tapes in some classes.

Thirty students attended the International Relations Peace Gardens Conference in September. They met with students from Brandon College to discuss topics concerning the general unrest of students as portrayed by their involvements in riots and other displays of student dissension.

The third annual All-State band and chorus was at MSC again this February. In May the division of music presented with the drama department a musical.











The Minot State College Beavers football team placed second in the North Dakota College Athletic Conference with a 4-1-1 conference record and a 5-2-1 overall record.


The Beavers made it to the conference championship game against Jamestown as they had expected but the Jimmies downed Minot 32-14 by capitalizing on a few key plays.



Following the Mayville victory the team traveled to Jamestown to play the Jimmies for the conference title. It was a hard fought game but Jamestown came up on top 32-14.


Minot State finished the season in top style by defeating St. Vital of Canada by a score of 61-6. The Beavers completely dominated the game on both offense and defense.







Season ends grapplers' championship reign

Minot State's 1968-69 wrestling squad under Coach Dean Bachmeier experienced its toughest competition in the school's wrestling history. The Beaver grapplers completed the season with an 11 and 4 win-loss record and a disappointing third place in the North Dakota College Athletic Conference.


The Beavers opened the wrestling season December 5 winning a triangular meet from Wahpeton and Ellendale by scores of 29-13 and 32-12 respectively. December 14 the Beavers traveled to Bozeman, Montana, to take on Montana State and Washington State. Minot won the dual with Montana 17-12 but dropped the match with Washington State 23-11. The team returned to conference action December 18 and downed Mayville 22-19. Following the Christmas holiday the Beavers went to Jamestown and dumped the Jimmies 30-8.

Washington State gave the Beavers a good match but January 24 when the squad traveled to Bemidji, they discovered that the University of Northern Iowa and Bemidji State of Minnesota were pretty stiff competition also. Northern Iowa defeated the Beavers 22-9 and Bemidji defeated them 16-15.


January 31 the grappling squad traveled to Spearfish, South Dakota, and downed Black Hills State College 26-17. The Beaver fans did not see a home wrestling match until February 6 but the match with Valley City State which was not decided until the final match proved to be worth the waiting. Minot won the match 18-15. In the final dual match of the season February 13 the Beavers lost their only conference match to Dickinson 23-13 and ended the season with an 11 and 4 dual record.

The Beavers placed third in the NDCAC Tournament held in Wahpeton with 65 points. Valley City had 66 points and Dickinson won the tournament with 95 points. The tournament defeat ended Minot's four year reign as conference champs.

The Beavers had three conference champs and one second place winner. The champs were Willie McCollum at 137 lbs., Willie is a three time conference champ; at 167 lbs. Jim Byron; and at hwt. Dwight Farrell. Farrell was the 191 lb. champ last year. Tim Walsh placed second in the tourney at 145 lbs. These four wrestlers represented Minot State at the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletic Tournament March 6-7-8 at Omaha, Nebraska.







town and Mayville. The games with the Vikings and the Jimmies were lost by two points each.



By defeating Dickinson for the second time and then trouncing Jamestown, the Beavers closed the season on a winning note.













The Beavers placed second at the Dickinson State Invitational behind Jamestown by one point. At the Jamestown Invitational Minot dropped down to 4th place.


At the North Dakota College Athletic Conference tournament Hank Hettwer's netmen placed 4th, but only three points separated them from the championship taken by Jamestown.


Golfers build team to better records


The men's team, though not faring as well, managed one second place finish and three third place finishes against such teams as Dickinson, UND, NDSU and Eastern Montana State.



Coordinating faculty, administration and student representation, the MSC Student Association serves as the students' vocal organ in all college related affairs, be they academic or social.

SA has promoted an increased social program by sponsoring numerous dances, movies and coffee houses, in addition to at least two big name acts per quarter. It has also supported a movement to extend dorm hours for women.

To boost student representation in school affairs, SA has obtained student memberships

with full voting rights on faculty committees as well as an increased Student Senate role in academic matters.

SA has purchased a printing press for college and student publicity which has been instrumental in promoting its various functions. Last fall, the student body approved a referendum to finance the construction budget for an amphitheater with the aid of Alumni Association funds. Said cost of this theater was approximately \$85,000. This, with the subsequent endorsement of the state legislature, was largely the result of the active support of the Student Association.



This spring the Vagabonds performed two extended choral works: **Alto Rhapsody** by Brahms, and Flor Peeters' **Te Deum**.



To limit membership to interested and qualified individuals, the group requires participation in at least one play performance. In addition all members must keep themselves available to work in all aspects of the productions.


Forensics honorary



They train to debate

Fundamentally an extension of literature and language, the area of forensics deals chiefly with public discussion, argumentation and oral interpretation. The practical application of the forensic art is typified by the Minot State debating team.

Those who participate in forensics believe that they are doing more than just taking part in another collegiate event. Debaters are trained to discern between the real facts and the trappings of an issue, to prepare a sound case and to present that case with clarity and with documented evidence.

Whereas the general public can believe in an issue, a person trained in this field can defend his position and attack that of the opposition. Because a debater prepares his case so well, he is able to defend either the pro or the con, a major feature in competition. A debater uses all the facilities available to him, giving invaluable knowledge of various sources that will aid him later in life.

This year forensics fielded a team which competed in two major meets in Billings and in Dickinson. They faced competition from Minnesota, North Dakota, Montana, Wyoming and Idaho. March 31-April 4 found four members of Pi Kappa Delta, the honorary speech fraternity, representing Minot State in Phoenix, Arizona, attending the national convention and debate tournament.


Minot's Phi chapter conducts its business meetings on the first Monday of each month. These meetings' activities are directed toward dealing with education and its related problems.


The year's activities were comprised of practical, politically educational programs.


Young Democrats conduct a varied and active social program during the year. Numerous dances can be numbered among these.



Delegates attack student unrest problem

"A Decade of Protest" was the concern of the 17th annual International Relations Peace Garden Conference the weekend of September 27-29. Gaylen Brown, adviser to the International Affairs Society, accompanied the delegation of 25 Minot State College students who attended the conference. Approximately the same number of students from Brandon (Manitoba) University were present. The conference was at the American lodge in the International Peace Gardens.

To work for the cause of Christianity on campus and to promote the feeling of a true Christian community are the main purposes of Newman Club.





The primary goal of United Campus Christian Fellowship is the development of a fellowship that can be of effective and valuable service to the college and its supporting community.




A varied sports program



Basketball was just one of the sports participated in by WRA girls.




