# The 1976 Beaver: An Introduction

The 1976 Beaver is dedicated to the history of Minot State College, and to the academic divisions which helped make that history. We want to explain how the book took shape.

This year's staff began with three goals. First, we knew we had to produce a smaller book for less money. Second, we wanted to do that without sacrificing quality or comprehensiveness. Third, we wanted to honor the country's Bicentennial in this special year. We are fairly sure we accomplished the first goal. You, the reader, will have to be our judge on the second and third.

All three were difficult. In order to reduce the size of the book, we had the senior pictures taken in the same size and format as the underclassmen. Having thus eliminated some of the traditional emphasis on classes, we cast about for some new emphasis. We found one in the academic divisions. This seemed to us a worthy experiment, and we were encouraged when we found it had some precedent. The academic divisions are, after all, the heart of the campus. Students do, after all, either come here to study something, or to discover what they wish to study. That is the reason college exists: so that people may learn subject matter.


We recognized, or had it called to our attention, that such an organization of the book could arouse divisional competitive instincts. People might ask the wrong question, which is, "How many majors do *you* have?" We decided to trust that these instincts would be set aside and that reason would prevail. Obviously, some divisions claim many majors through their two-year programs. Obviously, many students in general college graduate as education majors. Obviously, many students who begin in one division graduate in another. Obviously, many divisions with comparatively few majors have large responsibilities (for which they require large staffs) in the general education program. All these things are clear on a moment's reflection, and we ask you all to take that moment now.

Emphasizing the divisions also helped us with our historical theme, since the history of the campus is, to a large extent, the history of the divisions. The history theme itself grew from our third goal, which was to honor the Bicentennial. We began with idle thoughts of dressing everyone in colonial costumes for group pictures, or of lacing the book with quotations from the Federalist Papers. But the more we thought, the more it seemed to us that the basic purpose of the Bicentennial was to remind us of our heritage, and that the national and state committees were doing this far better, for the state and nation, than we could. When we realized that we (and only we) could do this same job for our campus, the idea of an historical book was born.

Our campus is more than 60 years old. Most of the staff and all of the students are only dimly aware of its colorful past. Its history has not been written, and of course we cannot pretend to have done so here. But by asking the divisions to gather their history, by gathering what history we could in the limited time we had, and by including in the book many pictures from old annuals, we have tried to present an outline of MSG's history and to open some windows into its past.

It has been a fascinating project to work on. We hope you find it so to read.






Old Main under construction — 1913

# Minot State College: 1913-1976

## a brief history



Same angle today.



Sometime next fall, a freshman from Max or Harvey, Cando or Bottineau, Seattle or New York, will climb, for the first time, the wide stairs of Old Main, his foot pivoting in the circular depressions worn by the pivoting feet which have climbed before him in the 72 years since 1914. This freshman might, just might, as he reaches the second floor, glance up at the rows of august figures, cast in plaster, which line the halls of the third floor. Possibly he will, like thousands of freshmen before him, wonder who those spectres are and go on to his typing class, never bothering to wonder again. Or possibly, plans now afoot to have identifying nameplates put up will have succeeded, and our freshman will peer up at the names, most of them unfamiliar. Almost certainly, the gentleman on the freshman's right, as he stands at the top of the stairs, the one with the bemused expression and the assertive shock of hair dominating a high forehead, will bear the name and date Horace Mann (1796-1859). Another of the name plates will read Johann H. Pestalozzi (1746-1827). If our earnest freshman sounds out the name, he will get it wrong (unless he has recently arrived from Switzerland), for it is pronounced Pest a lot see, but even so the freshman will have done much toward acknowledging his heritage, for he will have made at least the distant acquaintance of two educators whose vision and energies brought forth the building in which our student, on his way to learn typing, stands.

This much ancient history (two paragraphs more) is necessary. Pestalozzi was a Swiss educator who, in his writings, and in his schools, insisted that teaching was something more than telling, and that some concern for the integrity and structure of the students' minds was as important for a teacher as knowledge of the subject matter. Under the influence of his kindly, though often indefinite ideas, a series of more disciplined thinkers, including Herbart, Forebel and the notorious Madame de Staél, began to develop what might be called a "science of education." And if there can be a science of education, that is, if teaching is a discipline with its own logic and rigor, potentially as difficult and important as the logic of any other field (a claim disputed then, as now), then the business of training teachers becomes a speciality for which special schools are desirable and necessary. Thus the "normal" school was born in France and Prussia, in the late 18th century. And thus, also, the disciplines of education and psychology are wedded at most ex-normal schools, including this one.

In the late 18th century, an American minister named Charles Brooks was traveling in Europe. He met an enthusiastic supporter of the European normal school, and became a convert himself. In corresponding with other masters of normal schools, he developed the slogan "As the teacher, so is the school," from which followed his conviction that "We must have schools for the preparation of teachers." This message he drummed home in a series of meetings at which Daniel Webster and John Quincy Adams were regular speakers, and at which one James G. Carter ("The father of the normal school in America") was a frequent listener. Carter was a Massachusetts legislator who took what he heard and did something with it: he got a bill through the Massachusetts legislature creating the first normal school in America (in Lexington, the same Lexington where the first Americans fell in the Revolutionary War) and something called the State Board of Massachusetts, to oversee the school. The first secretary of that Board was the same irreverent and enthusiastic Horace Mann, whose face now nestles between the clock and the No Smoking sign above the face of our inquisitive freshman.

According to the MS thesis of Agnes McCorkell Stee (from which many of the facts here are taken), Mann believed that "the common school was the greatest invention of man and could only be perfected by effective teacher training." He took his message and his energy to every state in the union. Later he became president of Antioch College, where he ended his last speech with the words, "Be ashamed to die until you have won some victory for humanity." Crane, who had earlier directed some of the summer training sessions at Velva, was selected as the first president, and the early business of the school was conducted from the west bedroom of his home.

One of his first acts as president was not done in his office, though, but rather by dark of night, for another dispute had arisen, this one over where to put Old Main. One group favored a location closer to Ninth. Crane favored a site further back. In a compromise move, the stakes were set halfway, but Crane slipped out that night and moved

the stakes back. In the next few days, he got into his Overland and drove a wide sweep from Ninth, across the prairie past the clandestinely located stakes, and back to Ninth. His wheel tracks became the circular driveway, one of the campus landmarks.

Even after the cornerstone of the building was laid, on July 25, 1913, the South Hill faction rose again and obtained a court order prohibiting further construction on any site except their own. So the half-completed walls sat through the winter of 1913-14 and in the spring, the concrete (evidently defective to begin with) was rotten and had to be replaced.

The next fall, with the South Hill group defeated forever, the faulty walls were torn down and construction began again. The college opened that fall, on Sept. 30, 1913, not in its own building, but in the Armory, a building that still stands, housing the Minot School Board offices, directly across the street from the Central Campus of Minot High School. According to President Crane, writing in the Ward County Independent in 1938, the first student to register was a "red-headed boy in short pants," Glen Holcome from Minot. That claim has since been disputed. Fifty-five students and 11 faculty gathered in the large assembly hall for the first official act of the school, a singing of "America," with Miss Julia McDonough at the piano. The original faculty members, in addition to Miss McDonough, were: Elsie J. Cook, Amy M. Simpson, A. G. Crane, Eula J. Miller, Wm. F. Clarke, Hulda L. Winsted, George Altmann, Hazel McCulloch, and Charles W. Hammond. Miss McCulloch, who resides in Washburn during the summer and California in the winter, is the only living member of the original faculty.

The red-haired Mr. Holcome and his 54 fellow students (they grew to 99 by the end of the year) could take one of five courses of study. A one-year rural school course qualified an eighth grade graduate to teach in the elementary school for two years — a kind of emergency certificate. A four-year course for eighth grade graduates and one-year advanced course for high school graduates earned a two-year certificate renewable for five years, following practice teaching. The most high-powered course of study, a five-year course for eighth grade graduates or a two-year advanced course for high school graduates earned a two-year certificate convertible to a life-time certificate after nine months of practice teaching. There were, of course, no Bachelor's degrees offered. The Normal School functioned as a combination high school and teachers' college.

Tuition was free in all departments. A \$5.00 registration fee covered the entire year. Room was \$18.00 per month and board \$14.00 per month. The 1918 quarterly bulletin advised students arriving on the train to take the bus to the main building and leave heavy packages at the depot "until they are permanently located." There were three bus companies, Minot Transfer, Waverly Transfer and J. B. Reed Transfer. Minot and Waverly both charged 50 cents for the first trunk and 25 cents each for more than one. Furthermore, the bulletin advised that "Young ladies, even tho without reservations at the dormitory will be cared for temporarily at any time, day or night."

That last sentence was, without much doubt, the work of Hulda Winsted, who served the college as Dean of Women, registrar, librarian, geography teacher and Abiding Presence. She was here from the beginning, and she was still here in 1925 when W. D. ("Doc") Allen joined the staff. Allen remembers her as "the only person who could tell the president what to do." "Mr. President, you can't do that," she would say. And the president wouldn't," recalls Allen. Perhaps the president knew that the Swedish-born lady had earned her first dollar, on a bet, by holding a snake without squirming. But the girls under her care are more likely to have seen the side of her that used that dollar to buy a Christmas present. During her tenure here, she published three books of poetry, none of them at her own expense, and one of the many charms of the early issues of The Red & Green is the constant presence of Miss Winsted's poems, including the school song, written by 1915. The last verse is:

From the valley of the river  
Of the Rolling Red  
To the fertile plains and badlands  
Beyond Missouri's Bed:  
"Service First," our normal slogan  
Challenging shall ring  
To our school, our Minot Normal  
Fame will bring.

Of the 11 original faculty, four were assigned to the model school. The building was then leased (later purchased) from the Harrison school district, and thus called the Harrison School. It sat east of the present model school, in the middle of what is now the environmental playground. Hazel McCulloch was critic-teacher for the fifth and sixth grade, and Elsie Cook critic-teacher for the seventh and eighth. They were both handsome women and George Renz, one of the students of the first model school, remembers them as fine teachers who tolerated "no monkeying around." Renz was kept out of school by his father each spring, to work on the farm, and when his accumulated absence threatened his graduation, Miss Cook paid a personal




**Lester J. Hartnett**

Lester Hartnett came to Minot State College in 1928, and taught here until his retirement in 1962. He directed Campus Players for nearly 20 years and started Alpha Psi Omega, the dramatics fraternity at MSC. He one time said that his favorite play was MacBeth. He also recalled that all the scenery was handmade when he was director of Campus Players.

Before coming here, he was associate professor of speech, drama, and radio broadcasting at Wesley College. He had BA and MA degrees from UND and additional graduate study at Yale, the University of Poitiera in France, and the University of Minnesota.

His wife, Eve Hartnett, was chairman of the MSC art department for many years. Lester Hartnett died in August of 1965.



visit to Renz' father to ask him to allow George to attend enough to graduate. Work came first for the Renz family and the request was denied. Renz didn't graduate, but he still remembers Miss Cook's kindness.

Then, even more than now, the Model School was the heart of the college. During the first year, students walked every day from the Armory to the Harrison School to do their practice teaching. Well into the 40's, every issue of *The Red & Green* contains a large section entitled "Training School Notes," detailing the pageants, spelling bees, picnics and progress of the pupils. As Model School enrollment grew, the upper grades moved in the bottom floor of Old Main. In 1926, Doc Allen started a ninth grade, adding a grade a year until the first Model High School graduates were turned out in 1929. The athletic teams from that high school, under Allen's coaching, became something of a phenomenon, winning many championships, and regularly defeating Minot High School — in years when the High School didn't recruit away Model's best players. Model was equally successful in music where that kind of thievery was less frequent.

The Normal School had barely gotten underway when the first World War broke out. Dr. Crane was called to serve, as were many of the male students. Model School students planted "victory gardens" in the space between Old Main and Harrison (now a parking lot), and Red Cross nurses were trained at the College. After the war, Crane returned, but resigned almost at once to take a similar position in Pennsylvania. Later he became president of the University of Wyoming and Governor of Wyoming. The college was guided, during a period of rapid enrollment growth, by two acting presidents, A. G. Steele, and Wm. F. Clarke, and by Levi Beeler, who was president for two years.

In 1922, Dr. George A. McFarland, then 64, was installed as president, and for the next 16 years, until he died in office at the age of 80, he ran Minot Normal, as retired science teacher Charles Hoffman puts it, "with an iron hand." Both Hoffman and Doc Allen remember making suggestions during their early years of teaching, modest suggestions they thought, regarding simple procedural things. Hoffman received a curt note thanking him, but suggesting that in the future he confine his attention to "matters germane to your field of study." With Allen, McFarland was more blunt, saying simply, "We didn't hire you to tell us how to run this college."

At the end of President McFarland's first year (in 1923), the college completed the west wing of Old Main and dedicated it at ceremonies attended by ex-president Crane and marked by a power failure which left the dedicants wandering good-naturedly in the dark for more than an hour. The next year, McFarland told his students that "ever increasing capacity for self-sacrifice, unselfishness and thought for others' interest . . . marks the progress of mankind."

In 1929, the progress of mankind was marked by other things as well, namely a crash and a depression. North Dakota was among those hit hardest, especially when the dry years began. By 1934, the college was forced to cut faculty salaries by as much as 40% and make faculty residence in the dormitory mandatory, even for married faculty and their families. One of President Roosevelt's New Deal programs, the NYA (National Youth Administration) built two buildings on campus — the president's house, still standing, and a student union, which stood about where the present administration building is now. Sixteen of the boys who came to MSC to do that work were recruited by Frank Bauman, then regional administrator for the NYA, and now Director of Student Teaching at MSC.

In 1938, with the clouds of war on every horizon, Dr. McFarland, whom President Crane had earlier described as a "Gentleman, scholar, executive, true friend and manly fighter," died in office. The presidency passed to Carl G. Swain, who left the presidency of Mayville Normal to come here. In 1942, Swain, in an address to his students said, "This is a total war effort and all of us must do what we can to further the war effort." There was no bonfire at the annual homecoming, and *The Red & Green* announced that "Due to the rubber shortage, there will be no parade." The paper also editorialized: "We students of MSTC (Minot State Teacher's College) are among the most privileged in the world — able to go to school while our brothers are in the throes of death with the enemy." Girls were warned against war marriages (alas, by a different Dean of Women than Miss Winsted), and all wool suits were advertised in *The Red & Green*, regularly \$25.00 marked down to \$16.50. The Navy V-5 and V-12 programs brought nearly 600 young men to the campus to learn plane identification (taught by the chairman of the Language and Literature Division, Dr. John Scheffer), navigation (taught by the math teachers), and other subjects. With 600 boys to choose from, the football teams of Coach Allen (who left Model in 1936 for coaching) were what he calls "dream teams."

The Navy men learned their lessons well, and in May of 1946, President Swain declared, "We have just won a great victory for humanity. It remains for us to bring about a solution to the problems of living in an atomic world and age." One of those problems was a cold war. A nationwide poll in 1950 showed that a majority of faculty members believed that "the Communist Party should be prohibited

A. G. Crane became the first president of MSC in 1912. He helped design the campus and its curriculum.

He took a leave of absence from June 1917 to April 1918 to serve in the first World War. Within one month of his return, he resigned to become president of Edinboro, Pa.'s Normal School. He was later president of the University of Wyoming, and governor of the state of Wyoming.

from the teaching field." A commencement speaker in the early 50's warned that there was "little danger of the cold war turning into a shooting war if the U.S. maintains its strength."




In 1954, Swain resigned the presidency to Dr. Casper Lura, who came to Minot from Mayville. Lura has been described by retired faculty members as "diplomatic," "political," and even as "politic." Whatever the term, it was clear that the old-style "imperial" presidency had had its day, and a new style of leadership, based on consultation and compromise, had come into being. The new style, combined with a burgeoning enrollment, was well-suited to expansion, and the 50's and early 60's saw a quantum leap in the physical plant, with a new library in 1958, Crane and McCulloch dormitories in 1960, science building in 1961, the administration building in 1963, and the new student union in 1966. It was about time for a new library. Nellie Swanson, who served as librarian from 1939 to 1963 remembers that the facilities in the Old Main were so overcrowded there were only 16 inches between stacks. "I didn't dare gain a pound," she says. "And why the floor didn't go down in that building I have no idea. Only the good Lord held it up."

The campus "rebellion" of the 60's, like the two World Wars, the depression and McCarthyism before it, affected Minot State College (the word "Teachers" had long since been dropped), but, like those other events, it did not tear it apart, nor push it far out of its path. A dissident English teacher, named James Vizas, gathered about him some equally dissident students and eventually President Lura was burned in effigy on the lawn, the whole thing later chronicled, by Vizas, in a slight and bitter novel called *The Tender and the Green*. But according to Charles Hoffman, Mr. Vizas never had the support of more than 10% of the student body and the uproar soon died down. As Hoffman says, the college was "busy with its own thing. We had a job to do." An underground newspaper sprang up, evidently to protest the use of student funds to purchase blazers for the personal use of student association officers. But as *The Red & Green* pointed out, everything said in *The Independent* could have been said more cheaply and easily in the letters to the editor column of the official student newspaper. After an issue or two, the underground sheet collapsed.

When the 60's had passed away elsewhere, they lingered on at Minot State in the form of two educational experiments begun in 1971. The New Program was an intensive one program in the humanities and English, based on a similar program at Berkeley. The Experimental College was a controversial Earth Science Teacher program based on highly idealistic assumptions about student's abilities to take responsibility for their own educations. The New Program built a reputation for excellence, but could not sustain the necessary enrollment and ended after two years. The Experimental College was able to modify its idealism after one year, but went on, in the next three years, to initiate or test a series of reforms, including broadly-defined general education requirements, mini-courses, and interdisciplinary courses, which were considered or incorporated in the college at large.

Meanwhile, President Gordon A. Olson had been inaugurated in 1967, the draft had been abolished, the Viet Nam war had ended, the recession began, and enrollment began its drop from the high's of 2600 in the mid-60's, down to the present figures, stabilizing at around 2000. "Retrenchment" is a word one hears a good deal now. Science Division Chairman Mike Thompson notes that, "MSC is not the same college of 2000 students that it was six or seven years ago when enrollment was the same as it is now, but climbing."

What kind of a college it is, we cannot, from so close a perspective, be sure. Can it become what it was sometimes called in the go-go years of the 20's, The University of Northwest North Dakota? Probably not, but it can, and should, count its blessings: a long succession of able presidents with long and stable tenures, relative isolation from competing colleges, the essential sanity induced by the agricultural base of the surrounding community. All of these provide what Francis Bacon said a family provided a man: hostages to fortune. Minot State is as immune as any college could be both from fads that can intoxicate and destroy an institution, and from the great cultural tides that can propel an institution into greatness almost against its will. Minot State College is a small ship with a deep keel. Our earnest freshman, staring at those graying plaster busts has a kind of freedom his counterpart at an urban university does not have. Our freshman must work harder to keep from slipping into complacent lethargy, but on the other hand, he need not have his sensibility buffeted about by the paroxysms of culture and counter culture which often grip the urban colleges. Our freshman is free to narrow his vision to the world of the grain market quotation, the whist game and the beer party. But he is also free to make his way, by way of his classes and the library, into that larger world (which illuminates and includes the narrow one), the world glimpsed by the staring eyes of those plaster busts.





# The Pit: 1913-1976

FEATURE STORY ON OLD MAIN

It was, and sometimes still is, called "The Pit." For 60 years, the cavernous area under McFarland Auditorium served Minot State College — as a gymnasium, as a science department, and as makeshift quarters for the Music Division. Now it is undergoing its final (perhaps) renovation, to become new and permanent facilities for the MSC Music Division.

Old Main, which contains McFarland, was built in 1914. The Pit became the home of the Beavers and the Beaver Kits, the model school team. The actual gymnasium playing surface was recessed about four feet into the floor. The fans sat on plank-like bleacher seats and shouted their cheers down into the pit, somewhat like spectators at a bullfight. The teams entered the playing floor on small concrete stairways, visible now that the area has been gutted in preparation for the construction.

Some players considered the concrete boundaries dangerous, so in 1939, Beaver opponents voted to eliminate the Beavers from their schedule unless different facilities could be found. They were, and from 1940 to 1951, the Beavers played their conference games at the old high school gym. The Kits and the MSC physical education classes still used The Pit, however, during the 40's. PE students would line up for roll call beside numbers, still visible, painted on the concrete wall. With the Beavers playing elsewhere, the spectator area began to get carved away for other purposes. One part became a smoking room. Incredibly enough public smoking was not permitted on the campus in the early 40's, by faculty or students.

The Pit had always doubled as the college ballroom, of course, and in March of 1941, Life magazine published a story on a North Dakota Ranch party. The walls of the gymnasium were decorated for the event by MSC student Bob Gray, who went on to become a fairly well-known graphic artist.

In 1952, Swain Hall was complete and all PE activities moved out. A false floor was put in, covering over most of The Pit; partitions were thrown up, and science, until then located on the third floor of Old Main, moved in. Shower rooms became laboratories, and the quiet of the microscope and dissecting tray replaced the roar of the crowd. One part of The Pit was converted to a rehearsal room for the Music Division, which, until then, had conducted all rehearsals upstairs on the McFarland stage.

Music and science shared The Pit for the next ten years, until 1961, when the science building was complete, and science moved to their own quarters. Music then had The Pit to itself, but aside from a few acoustical tiles in a ceiling or two, no major changes were made to accommodate the musicians. The walls, never soundproof, echoed some of the sound and leaked some more of it. The lighting, fine enough for science's purposes, reflected so much glare that the conductor's baton looked like a multiple exposure in a trick photograph. The metal posts, which had been only a minor problem for spectators at the fast-moving basketball games, were a major problem for musicians trying to watch the conductor beat time. Silverfish swarmed out of the woodwork when it rained. But the Music Division expanded, despite the facilities, until it now has one of the most extensive music programs of any college in the state.

Last spring, when Hartnett Hall was complete, music moved some of its facilities there, sharing the third floor with the mathematics professors, their old neighbors from the 50's.

Now The Pit stands empty, stripped to the walls in preparation for the construction. John Strohm, Music Division Chairman since 1961, works over a grand piano littered with plans for the new quarters which will be complete in about a year. Music will retain some office and studio space in the loft area on the third floor above McFarland and some facilities in Hartnett. The new facilities will add eleven practice rooms, two studio offices, a lecture lab, an orchestra-band room, a recording control office, a music score library, a percussion ensemble room, extensive locker space for instrument storage, and a climate-controlled room for the harpsichord. The main entrance to the facility will be through what is now a delivery entrance at the rear of Old Main. All doors and walls and even the ventilation ducting will be acousticalized. The cost of the acousticalized construction is part of \$372,000 price tag for renovation.

"Bids came in a lot higher than we expected," says Strohm, "and we had to give up some things we'd hoped for, like an elevator and air conditioning. But we're still very happy with the facilities we're getting. It will let us expand and improve our program even more."

During construction, the music division is forced to "camp out." One professor has his office in a broom closet, another in a restroom. Rehearsals are conducted in McFarland stage — just as they were for 28 years, from 1914 to 1952.







# Allied Health: 1960-1976

## med-tech was first degree

The Division of Allied Health Professions has three degree programs. These are a Bachelor of Science Degree in Medical Technology, Bachelor of Science Degree in Nursing and a Bachelor of Science Degree in X-Ray Technology. In addition, the Division advises all students in the health related pre-professional areas such as pre-medical, pre-dental, pre-veterinary medicine, pre-occupational therapy, pre-physical therapy and others.

The degree program in medical technology was established in 1960 in the Division of Science. The degree program in Radiologic Technology was established in 1968, also in the Division of Science, and the degree program in Nursing was established in 1969. In 1972, the North Dakota Board of Higher Education authorized the establishment of the Division of Allied Health Professions as the tenth division of the college.

In the spring of 1967, a group of concerned Minot citizens representing the two local private hospitals and their diploma schools of nursing, the medical society, and the college presented to the North Dakota Board of Higher Education a proposed curriculum and a unified appeal for the establishment of a baccalaureate degree program in nursing at Minot State College. The members of the board seemed favorable towards the program, but there was a problem of finances.

In the summer of 1967, a state-wide committee known as the North Dakota Joint Committee on Nursing Needs and Resources was formed representing the North Dakota League for Nurs-

ing, the North Dakota State Nurses' Association, the North Dakota Hospital Association, the North Dakota State Medical Society, as well as other non-official and official groups. Following a year and a half research and study, this committee recommended to the North Dakota State Board of Higher Education the establishment of a baccalaureate degree program in nursing at Minot State College.

The Forty-first Legislative Assembly of North Dakota passed House Concurrent Resolution #13 urging the Board of Higher Education "to implement a four year degree nursing program at Minot State College." Private funds became available to start the program and a Public Health Service Training Grant was awarded April 1st, 1970 for a total project period extending through March, 1974.

The first director of nursing was appointed effective July 1, 1969. With the approval of the North Dakota Board of Nursing, students were admitted to the first year of the curriculum in September of 1969.

The North Dakota Board of Nursing fully approved the program in March 1973, following a two day survey of the graduate implemented program. Seventeen candidates received the degree of Bachelor of Science in Nursing on May 25, 1973. These first graduates all passed the licensing examinations to practice in North Dakota.

The nursing faculty is currently preparing to apply for full accreditation of our program from the National League for Nursing.

# Business Education: 1919-1976

## early courses included penmanship

The beginning of business education at Minot State College was recorded in the early summer school bulletins of the State Normal School which makes reference to special certificates granted after thirty six weeks of study in commercial subjects. No description or listing of these commercial subjects was given.

The first mention of commercial courses was in the 1919-20 college bulletin. Typewriting and school accounting were listed as elective courses in the fourth year of the curriculum for elementary teachers. Both of these courses were designed to assist teachers in fulfilling their responsibilities. The description for Typewriting 41E was stated as follows:

"The aim of this course is not to fit students for commercial positions, but to give teachers a familiarity with typewriters and their operation, so as to enable them to use them to advantage in their school work. Typewriters will be furnished classes by the Normal School. Students taking the course, however, should, if possible, provide themselves with machines of their own and use them regularly in all their work."

The course for school Accounting 43E was equally definite in emphasis on personal use values with a description as follows:

"This course is intended to give teachers an insight into book-keeping sufficient to enable them to handle intelligently all school accounts. It will include a study of school finance and the laws governing the same, so that teachers will be intelligent with respect to school revenues, their sources, their collection, distribution, etc. The practical knowledge thus gained will enable the teacher to give her pupils, valuable instruction in the keeping of everyday accounts and render also a distinct service to the community by

helping the school patron to understand better the nature and importance of school revenues."

In 1920-21 Miss Leona Taylor of the Gregg Business School was the first teacher of these two courses. They were listed under the heading, School of Business, in the college bulletin.

In 1922 the list of courses was expanded to include penmanship, spelling, and shorthand. Three quarters of shorthand were offered. Miss Sabina Kretchman from the Williston Public Schools was the commercial instructor for the 1923-24 school year. The typewriting courses were expanded to three quarters and penmanship methods, a course on techniques of teaching penmanship, made its appearance. The courses were listed under the title commerce.

Special attention was given to commercial subjects as a special curriculum in 1923. Two years of college work was required to obtain a special certificate to teach commercial subjects. Two quarters of typewriting was taught as 1 high school unit, two quarters of shorthand as 1 high school unit, penmanship as 4 quarter hours, penmanship methods as 2 quarter hours, and school accounting as 4 quarter hours. The high school credit could also be used to meet high school graduation requirements.

When the model school curriculum was expanded to include a four year high school program, courses such as shorthand, typewriting, and commercial arithmetic were included. A supervisor of business education at the model school was employed and became part of the college faculty.

It was inexpensive by today's standards to attend Minot State College. However, in 1925, a fee of \$1 per month was charged all students who used a typewriter one hour per day. In this year, the Business Women's (Loan) Fund was established by the Business and Professional Women's Club of Minot. It was open to young women preparing for a business and profes-



sional career. In 1926 the Business Girls Club of Minot also established a loan fund to help students. This fund is still in existence today.

Mr. Alvin O. Anderson joined Miss Kretchman as supervisor and instructor in commercial studies (bookkeeping) in 1926.

During 1927, the Commercial Club, a student society for those planning to teach commercial subjects was established with a membership of eighteen. In 1928 the Club showed a membership of thirty-six students.

In 1927, Paul Seaman from Huron, SD joined the staff and served as head of the department until 1941. The curriculum was gradually expanded to include business mathematics, business English, elementary business accounting and commercial law. In 1931 three teachers constituted the staff and included Edna Hood, Laura Wurtzel and Seaman.

In 1933 additional courses were added to the curriculum including office practice, business mathematics, and salesmanship. Laboratory hours were required of typewriting classes.

The Junior College was expanded in 1934 to include three years for prospective teachers of commercial subjects. Thirty six quarter hours of a special curriculum constituted a major.

By 1941 formal recognition was given to the organization of the college into departments. The Department of Commerce was one of eight departments. During this year retail merchandising and insurance were also listed in the curriculum.

In the summer of 1942, J. Bernard Busse was a new faculty member. Later that year, he was appointed Department Chairman. He also assisted in the V-12 program prior to entering the Navy in 1943. He returned to the College and served as Chairman, until he was named Director of Extension in 1962.

During World War II, emphasis was given to non-teaching business training as a way to assist in the war effort. This emphasis was illustrated in one of the college bulletins as follows:

"There will be many attractive openings in the business world in the future. However, whether one is in business for himself or is working in a business office, col-

lege training will be required in addition to shorthand and bookkeeping. In other words, an educated person is desired. You can get both college education and business training in our Division of Commerce. Remember, there is no extra charge for our commercial work. We offer technical training in shorthand, accounting and office practice."

In 1946, the BA program was offered for the first time with Business Administration approved as a major field of study in 1952. This major required 64 hours with a year sequence of intermediate accounting, income tax and other courses added to the program by that time.

Evelyn and Leevern Johnson joined the business staff in 1948 which also included Busse and Verna Wickim. Miss Clarabelle McDermand and Mr. Bruce Shank joined the staff and have the longest tenure of the present members in the Division. Miss Helen White was a part-time staff member in business and literature and language at this time.

As the division grew after World War II, other staff members were added. Dewayne Domer, presently on the staff, and Art Nelson came to the college in 1956. Harold Schneider and Doris Slaaten joined the business staff in 1957 and Gayle Slobolick and Robert Litschert were on the staff in 1960.

Dale Atwood replaced Mr. Busse in 1962 as division chairman. Adelaide Johnson and Richard Schlapman joined the division in 1963 and Noel Powell followed in 1964.

During the past ten years, a number of curriculum changes were made causing the Division to become multi-purpose in nature. The business administration program was expanded with course additions to include major fields of study in management, accounting, and executive secretarial. The business teacher education program was also expanded to include vocational office teacher education in 1967. Two-year programs were added which included legal secretarial in 1972, and associate degrees in 1974 in accounting, mid-management, and secretarial studies.

Three student organizations were organized and are presently active. They include Pi Omega Pi, an honorary



society in business teacher education organized in 1964, the Business Administration Club, and Phi Beta Lambda.

Up to 1963, the Division was housed on the fourth floor of Old Main. Since that time the Division has occupied the third and fourth floors of the Main Building.

The enrollment has grown from 312 in 1963 to a peak of over 500 students in 1970. There are now over 425 students registered in the Division.

Eleven full-time staff members currently constitute the Division staff. They are Dr. Dale D. Atwood, Mr. Lee Badertscher, Mr. David DeMers, Mr. Gerald DeMoss, Mr. Dewayne Domer, Dr. Adelaide Johnson, Dr. Robert Sando, Dr. Doris Slaaten, Dr. Richard Schlapman, Miss Pearl Stusrud, and Mrs. Mavis Williamson.

Other faculty, no longer on the staff, who once served in the Division of Business include the following: Mrs. Carol Nelson, Mr. John Doering, Mrs. Jewell Vaught, Mr. Dan Boyd, Mr. Maurice Blada, Mr. Mark Pippin, Miss Margaret Morton, and Mr. Thomas Atkinson. Numerous part-time people have been used as the need arose.

A goal of business curriculum revision during the past year was to stress the development of student competencies for assuming leadership roles in teaching, accounting, management, secretarial, and other business professions. Curriculum changes included the adding of several new courses in management in addition to a medical transcription course for students interested in preparing for medical secretarialship. Qualifying tests were also developed in typewriting and shorthand for placing students in the appropriate courses when entering college.

One of the Division goals for 1975-76 was the development of a closer work-

ing relationship with the business society. An Advisory Committee organized in 1974-75 continued to provide valuable assistance to the Division.

The Small Business Institute, a student consulting and educational program for small business firms, was conducted jointly by the Division of Business and the Small Business Administration. Senior level student teams under faculty supervision served as consultants to clients of SBA.

A secretarial conference was sponsored by the Business and Continuing Education Divisions for area secretaries in November, 1975. This workshop was directed by Dr. Slaaten and Mrs. Williamson.

The Business Administration Club for the second straight year sponsored a field trip to Minneapolis. It was a most enjoyable and rewarding experience for those attending. The Minot Chapter of Phi Beta Lambda, Upsilon Sigma, hosted the State Leadership Conference in the spring of 1976. Pi Omega Pi effectively promoted professionalism in business and office teacher education under the direction of Dr. Johnson and Mr. Domer.

The Division staff constitutes eleven full time staff members. Doris Slaaten returned from a leave of absence at Colorado State University, Fort Collins, Colorado with an earned doctorate. Dr. Slaaten became the fifth staff person in the Division to receive the degree.

Mr. David DeMers, on leave during the fall quarter, attended the University of Oklahoma at Norman for a five-week CPA review course. Mrs. Kathy (Domer) Jacobs was his able replacement.

Miss Carol Lovro for the third year served most capably as Division secretary.

# **campus school**

The MSC Campus Laboratory grew out of a 1915 North Dakota session law (ch. 142 sec. 1) which authorized Normal Schools of the State to establish model schools.

The elementary school for the practicum of Normal School graduates was initiated shortly thereafter. Concurrently, Minot State Normal School was conducting preparatory classes for eighth grade graduates who desired to become teachers. This program subsequently developed into a four year high school.

In the early 1920's, President McFarland negotiated a gentleman's agreement (it must have been that, because no documents have been found) to educate the Harrison School District children for an indefinite time period in exchange for the Harrison School building, which stood on the southeast corner of what is now the College Campus.

In 1931, the structure now housing the Campus School was

completed and the intermediate grades and the high school moved in. The original Harrison building contained various portions of the primary grades until it was razed in 1964.

The secondary school became widely recognized for its academic excellence and its outstanding athletic teams. The school served Minot State College as the base for its pre-professional experiences. It was accredited by both the State and the North Central Association until it was discontinued in 1968.

The Campus elementary school has been focusing on concomitant missions of innovation and pre-professional practicum. It was the first school in the area for such innovations as individualizing, opening classrooms into multi-teacher areas, mini labs, learning centers, narrative reporting to parents, parental involvement in student goals, environmental playgrounds, and integration of special education.

Currently, the Lab School is focusing upon developing reporting folios, pre-professional experiences in learning centers, and a year of staff writing and publication.

# Education and Psychology

## College president was first psychology

The beginning of the Division of Education and Psychology is synonymous with the beginning of Minot State College. The Normal School at Minot actually had its conception as early as 1898. At that time, citizens of the Northwest area of North Dakota began pressing for an institution located at Minot to prepare teachers. It wasn't, however, until November of 1911 that the people of North Dakota actually passed a Constitutional Amendment to enable the Normal School to be established at Minot. The school was established in 1913. The first catalog (1913-1914) was only 25 pages long. The very first page of the catalog printed in August of 1913 states: "With the coming of September 30th next, the real work of this school will begin. A work which in the moral worth given to it, will be bigger and more far-reaching than navies, armies, and fortifications. Bigger than the wealth of our fields, mines, and banks. This institution will aim to touch direct by the real life and practical needs of ambitious young men and women . . . Yet, at the same time it will keep steadily in view the greater truth, that character, not wealth or numbers, is our safest and best American ideal."

Concurrent with the opening of the new Normal School was the opening of the Model School. The first catalog states: "Teaching is an art which can be learned only through practice. Learn to do by doing is eminently applicable to the art of teaching."

From the 1898 conception through the fruition of the Normal School in 1913 and for many years after, the purpose of the institution, to later become known as Minot State College, was teacher education. The first curriculum was designed for several types of students. It ranges in programs designed for students with only an eighth grade education who could attend for four years to receive a certificate to teach rural schools to programs for high school graduates to complete a two-year advanced course.

There was a commonality in all curricula. Each program called for a study in psychology and professional educa-

tion which included "practice" teaching. In addition, studies in penmanship, spelling, reading, grammar, rhetoric and literature were required. American history, civics, geography, physiology and hygiene, agriculture and arithmetic as well as "special courses" in music, drawing and physical education were included in all programs.

The entire college faculty of twelve (including the president and the "critic teachers" of Model School) were dedicated to one purpose — teacher education. There was no diffusion of focus caused by myopic dedication to a subject discipline. All disciplines were taught for teacher preparation.

The first professor of psychology when the college started in 1913 was the president of the college, A. G. Crane. The first professor of education was the man who later was to become the second president, Wm. F. Clarke. Eula J. Miller was the first principal of Model School. The field of Domestic Science (Home Economics) was added to the curriculum in the 1914 Summer Session. The instructor was Rhoda Field.

The 1921-1922 catalog was the first to organize the curricula offerings in departments. The education program was simply labeled "Professional Subjects." Interestingly enough, none of the listed departments had designated chairmen. By 1923 the Professional Subjects department became the Education Department with a M. Boardman as head; the Psychology Department, Mrs. Perkett, head; the Home Economics Division, Miss Bryson, head.

As early as 1920, sexism in education was questioned as indicated by a little limmerick written by an unknown author found in the 1920-1921 catalog:

There was a young man from  
Cheyenne  
Who said: "I will teach if I can."  
So he brushed up a bit  
And got a permit —  
Now he's principal — 'cause he's a  
man.

In 1941 there was a uniting of the departments of Education and Psychology. In 1947 the first Dean of the



Faculty was appointed, Dr. O. A. DeLong. Dr. DeLong was also Chairman of the Division of Education and Psychology. From that time until 1961, the Dean of College Faculty was also the Chairman of the Division of Education and Psychology. In 1961 the Division was separated from the office of the Dean and has functioned as a separate administrative unit since. Since 1972, the department of Home Economics has been included in the Division.

It must be emphasized that the "division" of the Division of Education refers only to an administrative unit. Otherwise it is a misnomer. Education and psychology at this college are welded together in purpose and in scope. Not only is there unity within the departments, the Division of Education and Psychology has a cohesive effect for the entire college. It is the one division that crosses all the divisional lines in achieving its purpose.

It ought not to be concluded that the staff is of one philosophy. It appears that the staff is philosophically representative of teachers and society in general. Three general philosophies are evident. The academically oriented motivation which holds that self-realization of the individual is best reached through mental discipline in the traditional subjects; the professional or utili-

itarian motivation; and the socially oriented education. This by no means should suggest a divided staff or a weakness. In an attempt to amalgamate, all emerge with broader understandings and a keener awareness.

There are approximately 42 students majoring in psychology, 115 students enrolled in elementary education and approximately 200 students enrolled in elementary education with a specialization in special education during the 1975 Fall Quarter. Though we do not have an exact count of the number of students registered in all education programs, it is estimated that nearly 60% of the total college enrollment is following some area of teacher education.

The professional staff is called upon by the community, the State and by National organizations to function in a variety of services; ie: psychological evaluations, Title Program evaluators and consultants, diagnostic and prescriptive reading services, national accrediting agencies team members (National Council for Accrediting of Teacher Education, North Central Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges), State educational planning committees, etc. The staff participates in state, national and international professional meeting in areas of competence and interest in order to be continuously updated.




# Fine Art 1927-1976

## Eva Hartnett directed for 34 years

When the college began, there were no divisions. However, Amy M. Simpson, one of the original faculty members, was assigned to teach art, and in that sense, art at Minot State is as old as the college itself. The division was originally housed on the first floor of Old Main, but later moved to Main 201, expanding eventually to rooms 201, 202, and 204.

The division took its next major step in 1927, when two important things happened. First, a new division, called the Special Curriculum, was formed, containing art, music, home economics and industrial arts. Second, Eva M. Walker joined the staff as head of the new division. For the next 34 years, until 1961, Miss Walker (who later became Mrs. Lester Hartnett) directed art activities at Minot State. In 1941, Music split off into its own division and the first art major was offered.

In 1961, Mrs. Hartnett retired and Elwood Averill took over the chairmanship. Two new staff members, Marmo Watia and Mary Jo Williams were added in 1964 and 1963. In 1965, the chairmanship was assumed by Willard Carpenter. The staff then consisted of himself, Rivers Murphy and Morna Nation. In 1967, Robert Schweiger, the present Chairman, was appointed to that position, and the emphasis of the division continued to shift from art education to studio art. In that year too, industrial arts were dropped from the curriculum.

In 1970, the Pioneer Hall ceramic studio spaces were added — in what was originally the college cafeteria, in the basement. Students now throw and fire clay in the room where, as an early catalog put it, students could "secure a warm, palatable noon lunch at a nomi-

nal price." In 1973, Home Economics was transferred to the division of Education and Psychology, leaving the division of Fine Art by itself.

In 1974, the division moved to its new facilities in Hartnett Hall, abandoning the Old Main quarters, but retaining the homey Pioneer Hall studios. The new quarters include the Hartnett Gallery and expanded facilities for drawing, design, painting, crafts, print-making and photography, as well as studio space for the art faculty. Recent equipment acquisitions include a vacuum silk screen and a lithographic press.

According to faculty member Walt Piehl, some of the faculty at first felt themselves "rattling around" in the new quarters, and noted that the old spaces, with three faculty desks jammed into an ex-hallway, had bred a closeness of spirit akin to the physical closeness. But the staff quickly adjusted to the new space, reveling in the fact that very studio had its own sink and that the concrete floors made it less necessary to worry about every spill made by the "action" painters.

The Hartnett gallery is an important feature of the new quarters. Fully carpeted and well-lit, it provides display space for a series of travelling shows from all over the nation, as well as annual faculty shows and displays of student work.

The division now offers the BA and BS degrees with the BA degree expanded to include studio specializations in painting, graphics, crafts, ceramics, sculpture, graphic design and pre-art therapy. There are 92 hours of studio offerings and 19 hours offered in art history, art education and art appreciation.

# Health and Physical Education

## George Altman was first coach

The program of physical education is mentioned as a department from the very beginning of Minot Normal School in 1913. The Normal School's first curriculum was designed to meet the needs of several different types of students.

The programs ranged from those for students with only an eighth grade education who could attend for four years and receive a certificate to teach in rural schools, to programs for high school graduates to complete a two year advanced course.

At that time, the North Dakota State Course of Study required that every student take physical education throughout the years of secondary work. Students who attended Minot Normal School, who did not have two years of physical education, were required to complete two years work.

The first Athletic Coach and instructor of health and physical education was George Altman. It was during the tenure of Carl Bublitz, however, that most of the sports were introduced. The years between 1936 and 1946 saw the addition of tennis and golf as competitive sports, introduced by W. D. "Doc" Allen. In 1957, a new varsity sport of wrestling was added to the athletic program by Dr. Ted Keck.

In 1925, the State Department authorized Minot Normal School to extend its curriculum to four years and grant a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Education. Special curriculums or groups of electives, which could lead to a special certificate, were offered at that time. Physical Education was one of these with a major sequence of no fewer than 36 hours.

The Division of Health, Physical Education and Recreation has undergone some definite and significant curriculum changes since 1925. These revisions have helped to develop strong majors and minors in the division.

From 1925 until the early 1930's, physical education was offered as a minor only. In the middle 1930's a 36 hour major was offered. In 1947-48, the major was increased to 48 hours and in 1952 the 52 hour major was estab-

lished. In the fall of 1973 the non-teaching Bachelor of Science degree in Recreation was offered for the first time.

The Division of Health, Physical Education and Recreation provides students with a varied program based on individual needs, with an opportunity to develop the physical, mental and social aspects of their personalities.

It is the philosophy of the division and has been for sometime; to emphasize, develop, and provide an instructional program to help individuals realize and satisfy their needs in activities which will contribute to physical competence and worthy use of leisure time. Also, it provides a curricular background for men and women who elect to concentrate in the subject with the purpose of teaching health, physical education in elementary and secondary schools, or serving as recreation leaders for schools, municipals, YMCA/YWCAs, churches and industrial recreational programs.

The continuously increasing amount of leisure time, and the growing number of opportunities for using it worthily and beneficially, has changed and will continue to change the living habits of a large segment of our population.

To meet the demands of using leisure time in a worthy manner, increased emphasis has been made by the division in the addition of more health and physical education classes emphasizing the development of leisure time skills and activities.

It is our intention to enhance our major in recreation by adding course work and instruction so that all students are ably qualified to be employed in all areas of the recreation field.

It is planned to broaden the athletic and sports programs to include many more participants, with more emphasis being on individual, dual, and lifetime activities.

With the advent of Title IX Education Amendment Act, which prohibits sex-discrimination for federally-assisted education programs, the role



## Tennis adds to staff racket



## Men's track sets 10 records

In a season highlighted by 10 new school records, Coach Wiley Wilson's Minot State College track and field team finished a strong second place in the annual NDCAC meet last spring. Wilson's team, putting on an inspired show on the new, all-weather MSC track at the college field, rolled up an amazingly high total of 148 points to pressure the highly favored Jamestown team right down to the last event of the day. Jamestown won the meet with a 162½ score.

Three Beavers claimed individual conference titles, including Ed Brezinski (discus throw), Bill Strasser (high jump) and Scott Hanson (400-yard intermediate hurdles). Strasser and Hanson, who captured their titles in the NAIA District 12 meet at Valley City a week earlier, and Brezinski were among the Beaver trackmen establishing new school records. Strasser upped the high jump mark to 6 feet 8"; Brezinski winged the discus 165-11; and Hanson skimmed over the quarter-mile barriers in 53.7.

Other MSC performers turning in outdoor records were Mark Morrison (three-mile in 14:22.2) and the mile relay unit that consisted of Ted Brinkman, Scott Hanson, Tim Henry and Jeff Gray, for a time of 3:21.1.

School indoor marks included Bruce Iverson (50-yard dash in 5.6), Sam Sagaser (50-yard intermediate hurdles — 6.3), Jeff Gray (300-yard dash — 33.1), Steve Gunderson (shot put — 51-1½) and the mile relay team of Brinkman, Hanson, Don Kleven and Jerry Gores — 3:30.6.

Despite injuries and other adversities, the 1975 Minot State College cross country team, under the direction of Wiley Wilson, capped off a successful season with a second place finish in the North Dakota College Athletic Conference meet last fall.

The Beavers were paced by junior Mike Jore's second place showing. Jore, the defending conference individual titlist, was followed in third place by junior Mark Morrison. Other Beavers counting in the MSC total included senior Richard Gaffrey, 12th; Mike Thorson, 14th; and Tim Henry, who placed 19th.

A week earlier in Madison, S.D., Wilson's harriers ended third behind conference champion Jamestown and Northern State of Aberdeen in the National Association of Inter-collegiate Athletics District 12 meet. Jore again led MSC, placing third in a field of 74 runners. Jon Morrison, who fractured his knee-cap during the course of the race, finished seventh, and Mark Morrison, 11th.

Of the eight meets MSC competed in last fall, two resulted in the Beavers taking home first place honors — the Valley City Invitational and the Dickinson Invitational — the latter despite the fact the Beavers were running with-

out two runners because of illness.

Designated by Wilson as cross country lettermen were Gaffrey, the team captain, Mark Morrison, Jon Morrison, Jore, Thorson, Henry, junior Jim Rowell and freshman Ron Jones. Mark Morrison and Jore were chosen team captains for 1976. Jore, who defeated 88% of the runners he competed against, was chosen most valuable runner.

Hedberg was chosen to the second All-Conference team for the second consecutive year.


Other top scorers and their averages were Greg Johnson (281) and Stan Trader (193).



# Women spikers make history



# memorial library



1924

Memorial Library was dedicated at a ceremony on October 14, 1959 by former college president C. C. Swain. The present building is the fourth location of the college library during the history of Minot State.

The site of the first library was a portion of the balcony in the old Minot Armory (which now houses the offices of the Minot Public Schools). When, in 1914, the college was able to move on campus, the library was located in what is now room 201 in the east wing of Old Main. The west wing of Old Main was added in 1924, and the library was moved in to occupy the entire third floor of the new wing (facilities which it filled to overflowing 20 years later). The old Minot Public Library (now the Senior Citizen's Center) was the main library for the college during the first year when classes were held downtown. The Public Library continued to furnish books of general interest and fiction at a branch on campus for a number of years during the early history of the college.

The first college librarian, Miss Hulda Winsted, literally founded the library with a donation of 300 books from her personal library. Miss Winsted, besides her duties as librarian, also taught geography and library science.

There have been three other librarians. Mrs. Mabel W. Etheridge was the

librarian from 1925 through 1944, Miss Nellie Swanson became head librarian in 1945, and she was succeeded by Eugene R. Hanson in January 1964. Mr. Hanson left Minot State in the spring of 1970.

Mrs. Etheridge, in 1934, because of crowding conditions, instituted the "closed stacks" plan in the library. Students were not allowed to enter the bookstacks themselves but were required to present "call slips" at the front desk for books or other material wanted. This system of retrieving library material remained in effect until March, 1964 — for over 30 years.

The present overall physical arrangement of the building dates back to 1969 as does the acquiring of the first non-print collection — 650 recordings from the music division and the first microfilm reader.


The project to reclassify the entire book collection from Dewey Decimal to the Library of Congress system was begun in 1967. The job was completed in 1974 when the last of the North Dakota collection was reclassified. (The public card catalog was split into separate author-title and subject catalogs during the summer of 1974).

The library began its non-print collections in earnest in 1971 when equipment was acquired to transfer the disk recording collections to cassette tapes.

The library's collections of filmstrips, spoken word cassettes and recordings, videotapes, and slide sets were started during the 1973-74 school year.


The first major redecoration of any kind in Memorial Library since its opening in 1959 was done in 1974; carpeting was laid and the walls were repainted in the current periodical and newspaper room opposite the front desk. New book stacks for the reference area were installed during the 1973-74 school year, and many of the institutional gray walls were covered with blue, pale apricot, and white paint during the summer of 1975.

For the future, where the emphasis for libraries will become even more service orientated (with less emphasis on the storage aspects), and where technology will play an increasingly greater role, the library staff is already actively involved. Memorial Library's periodical and serials list has been computerized since 1969. The library has participated in the State Library sponsored Union Catalog since its inception in 1966 and in North Dakota library teletype network since 1971. For much broader coverage and improved service, the teletype network became affiliated in 1974 with the MINITEX System of the state of Minnesota. Large regional and national library networks are also in the offing.



# Music 1919-1976

## auditorium was dedicated in 1933

Minot Normal School's first music teacher was listed with ten other members of the faculty when the school first started in 1913. Teaching both voice and piano instruction, she also taught all of the ninety-nine enrolled students in the music course called "Singing." Practice teaching was begun the first year that the Normal School was in operation. The first men's glee club and women's glee club was organized in 1917. The first music curriculum as such appeared in the 1919 bulletin. Degrees offered at that time included: three year certificate, four year diploma, and five year advanced course.

The first Orchestra was organized in 1921 and the training school orchestra organized in 1924. By 1921 the music staff numbered two staff members, and in the 1922 catalogue, the music department was labeled as such. In 1925, the Music Department was recognized in the bulletin of that year. Eleven courses of music were offered of which seven courses were in theory and four were methods courses.

In 1925, the Minot Normal School became the Minot State Teachers College. With the name change, the college expanded to include both the Junior and Senior college work. The B.A. degree was established. Both the minor and the major in music under the B.A. degree were set up in 1925 granting credit using the quarter system. The Music major requirement was 36 quarter-hours and the Music minor was 24 quarter-hours. The music department was involved in all of the curriculum and school activities by student and faculty performances in the weekly convocations, services, concerts, and graduation exercises. In 1925, "The Mikado" by Gilbert and Sullivan was presented in the Minot High School Auditorium, to be followed by other similar operettas-operas. Faculty recitals were presented.

On March 5, 1925 the State Legislature appropriated the sum of \$65,000 to build McFarland Auditorium, which was one of the finest auditoriums to be found in any of the state institutions. The construction of such a fine concert

hall contributed greatly toward establishing and maintaining the college as the cultural center of the community. As early as 1925, the need for a sizable pipe organ was foreseen by the community and college. A Minot citizen opened the fund with a five dollar donation. With the availability of the new auditorium, the Community Concert Association established a concert series with the college bringing to the community World renowned artists every year since its inception.

In 1929, "The Holy City" by Stainer and "The Messiah" by Handel were presented. The performance of "The Messiah" has been presented by the college-community chorus and orchestra every year since first presentation, with the exception of one time due to a blizzard.

By 1932 only \$2,000 was lacking of the \$12,500 needed for the installation of the pipe organ. The Kimball Organ Company of Chicago agreed to install the organ and carry the balance for two years. Minot business men took care of the deficit. The organ was dedicated on June 9, 1933. McFarland Auditorium was dedicated to President McFarland in June of 1933. The auditorium and the magnificent Kimball Pipe Organ were looked upon as a monument to the idealism and qualities of President George A. McFarland. Twenty-two music courses were listed in the bulletin at this time.

The first band was organized in 1934. There were thirty-three members in this wind ensemble. In 1939 the music major was required to have forty-two quarter-hours to obtain the major. The music minor requirement was 24 quarter-hours.

The next major revision came in 1947. The B.S. degree was established and the major requirement was raised to 48 quarter-hours and the minor was raised to 32 quarter-hours. In 1949, the composite major in music under the B.S. degree was increased to 101 quarter-hours.

1950 witnessed the need for a Training School Band Director, in addition to the already established vocal pro-



gram. The music program in the campus school gained the reputation as being one of the finest in the state of North Dakota.

With the increased curriculum, the additional staff made it necessary to expand housing facilities. Until this time, the music division was limited to McFarland Auditorium, two small rooms to the east and west side of the stage, and practice room in the ticket booths of the Auditorium. By now, the division was expanding so rapidly, it was necessary to look elsewhere for classroom and practice facilities. In 1949 a third floor was added on both the east and west wings of the stage. The construction of Swain Hall in 1951 allowed a modern rehearsal room in the old gym directly beneath McFarland Auditorium. The boards from the floor of the old facilities were taken out, resanded and used again to build the elevated platform for a rehearsal room. The old shower rooms were converted into classrooms to be shared with the Science Division which had moved from the third floor, east wing of the main building. The Art Division was particularly happy to see this transfer because they had been constantly plagued with water pipes breaking from the science division and ruining their classes located directly below. By the fall of 1952, the music groups no longer had to use McFarland Auditorium for their daily rehearsals.

National Conference in Milwaukee. The band program continued to grow and appeared in the Portland Rose Festival, the Rose Bowl Parade, and over national television. The reputation of the Division of Music expanded far beyond the state borders. More chamber music, operas, recitals, concerts, and faculty recitals were being presented. The student chapter of the Music Educators National Conference was the leader in enrollment of all colleges and universities in the state. The establishment of Lambda Chi Chapter of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia in 1963 and the Delta Kappa Chapter of Sigma Alpha Iota in 1964 further confirmed the effectiveness of the music division in the region. In addition to sponsoring music clinics featuring guest conductors of international fame, performing

artists, District and State Music Contests, and state music conventions, the division began the North Dakota All-Stage Band and Chorus. The facilities and dedicated staff made it possible to hold the banner of "Service First" high.

When the new Science Hall was constructed, the music division continued to expand into the facilities vacated by them. With the expanded facilities, growing enrollment, and added curriculum, a new and enriched program continued to develop. A policy to not charge the music student extra fees for taking music courses was instituted.

In the summer of 1965 the campus players and music division began producing the summer musicals. The Minot Symphony Association was formed to give both financial and cultural support to the college symphony. This allowed the Symphony to expand its program to the extent that it has earned an enviable record in the surrounding areas as well as in the state of North Dakota. The Instrumental, Vocal and Music Education programs were all recognized beyond the immediate locale. The college has continued to graduate more music teachers than any college or university in the state. A complete revision of the curriculum took place in the spring of 1971. An electronic laboratory was established and the theory program was expanded.

On November 20, 1972, the college was awarded an Associate Membership in the National Association of Schools of Music. Summer workshops, and the new comprehensive Summer session theory concentrations have helped to further support the forward approach of the division. Beginning the summer of 1975, the acquired area under McFarland Auditorium was gutted to make way for remodeling facilities designed specifically for music instruction. In addition, a classroom housing the electronic piano lab, the Moog Synthesizer room and the division office, plus the division chairman's teaching studio was established in Hartnett Hall. By the summer of 1976, in addition to McFarland Auditorium, the studios on the east and west side of the stage, and the remodeled facilities below McFarland Auditorium, the music division will also expand their facilities to the third floor, east wing of Hartnett Hall.

# Science and Mathematics

## original students were gardeners too

When the State Normal School at Minot opened its doors in 1913, it was primarily a high school with a two year teacher training program. Science courses were taught in Hygiene, Agriculture and Mathematics. It is difficult to tell whether the courses offered were for the high school or junior college students. All courses were taught from a practical point of view. Students enrolled in the sciences worked in the extensive school gardens where they "built character" and grew fresh vegetables for the dormitory.

By the 1920's the science offerings had expanded to include a variety of courses in Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Mathematics and Geography. World War I pointed out the need for trained nurses so a Pre-Nursing curriculum was added after the war.

The 1930's brought the depression and the dust bowl days. The fortunes of the college fluctuated with the economy. The sciences contracted along with the rest of the college. These were dark days. Course offerings decreased with the student body. Faculty salaries were cut as well as some staff positions.

World War II brought to Minot three Federally promoted programs: Civilian Pilot Training Program, Navy V-5 and V-12 Programs. About 2,000 persons trained at Minot during the war years, giving the sciences a needed boost in enrollments.

The late 1950's and the 1960's brought a nationwide emphasis on science and technology. The various programs within the division expanded to meet the growing demand. By the 1970's the Division of Science and Mathematics offered degree programs in 15 areas including Biology, Chemistry, Earth and Physical Science, Environmental Science, Mathematics and Physics with two-year programs in Pre-Wildlife Studies and Pre-Engineering Studies. In addition to the divisional programs, the division provides support courses to the Divisions of Allied Health Professions, Health and Physical Education, Education and Psychol-

ogy and Special Education.

The physical plant has expanded to keep pace with the proliferation of courses and programs. In 1914 the sciences occupied the third floor of the newly completed east wing of Old Main. The laboratories boasted of hot and cold running water and electricity. In 1924, the west wing of old main was completed. A chemistry lab was constructed in the east end of the third floor and a biology lab moved into room 113.

A department of agriculture was established in 1947 and funds secured to construct an Agriculture and Farm Life building. A greenhouse and a machinery and repair shop were added in 1950. The program, designed to give veterans "on the farm training," operated from 1948 to 1958.

During the early 1950's, \$10,000 was approved to remodel the gym in Old Main into a lab for physical science. The Legislature gave final approval in 1955 and the move was made in 1956. The final plans for the basement contained two sciences labs, one lecture room and a stockroom.

In October, 1961 a new science facility was dedicated. Classes met in the present science building for the first time Spring quarter 1962. When occupied, the building had only the first two floors. By 1964-1965 the new science quarters were cramped. A third floor was added and occupied Winter quarter 1968-1969. The greenhouse was added the same year.

The academic year 1975-1976 found Dr. Om Madhok on a three week tour of the Soviet Union including the International Botanical Congress meetings. Dr. V. E. Anderson, University of Minnesota, was the Sigma Xi Bicentennial Lecturer. He spoke on Genetic Control and Human Values. Spring Quarter brought the annual Science Club Open House in the Science and Mathematics building. The Mathematics Department held a Mathematics Track Meet competition for teams from surrounding schools.

# Social Science

## Miss Winstad, college librarian, was first history teacher

It all began with history and geography in 1913, and Miss Hulda Winstad taught both, while she was college librarian. The next year she taught civics as well. American history, "General" history, civics, physical, political and commercial geography were all required for the "secondary" program. In 1915, Herbert C. Fish, scholar and former curator for the N. D. Historical Society was added to help teach a new subject, social science, "If there is enough demand," classes will be offered in elementary sociology and economics. Both had successful enrollment in 1916-1917 along with special method courses and rural economics and modern Europe.

When Mr. Fish left in 1920, Hazel McCulloch, one of the original faculty at the training school was moved to the college history department where she inspired thousands of students in history, sociology and civics until her retirement in 1960. By 1922 Miss Winstad was Registrar as well as librarian.

During the 1920's social science was separated from history, and both doubled in courses and staff. Lee O. Lantis was hired to teach the social sciences in 1923, Julia Rue to help Miss Winstad in Geography in 1924-1933, while she was dean of women.

With the establishment of the B.A. degree in education in 1924, the three disciplines offered majors for secondary teachers, and modernized their course offerings. The Family, criminology, child welfare, rural Sociology, geography of Asia, Africa, industrial and commercial along with Labor problems, state and local government were a few of the additions. Field trips to Europe, Washington, D.C., Yellowstone, Glacier and other interesting places were organized successfully. President McFarland added philosophy, taught it in 1930 and hired Dr. Forest Witcraft to teach it in 1931 and help in social science. Miss Winstad was now Dean of Women.

By 1933, the depression had reduced the class sizes. Quinter Lyon was hired in 1935 to replace Dr. Witcraft. The three departments held their own during these "bad" years. The philosophy

department offerings were increased and courses were added to political science and sociology.

Just before World War II began, the college reorganized into divisions and geography was temporarily put in Science; history, philosophy, political science and social science were now called social studies. W. D. "Doc" Allen was moved into the division from coaching with the resignation of Dr. Lantis in 1944. By 1946, Geography was moved back into Social Studies.

A new young staff arrived in the late 1940's and early 1950's to join "Doc" Allen and Hazel McCulloch. Paul Morrison was hired to replace Dr. Lyon in 1947, and "reigned" as chairman until 1974. Earl Shearer, Nels Manvel Lillehaugen, Tom Davis, Gaylen Brown, William Phillips, Herman Weill, E. R. Manning were hired during this period. By now, the Division had departments of economics, geography, history, philosophy, political science, sociology; and it had changed its name back to social science.

The history department doubled in courses, staff, and students and was selected by the AHA as possessing one of the outstanding small college programs in the country. The senior baby thesis and the comprehensive exam were two requirements that helped secure this honor. An international relations conference was initiated with Brandon College at the Peace Gardens which became the outstanding event of the year with its scholarly student participation. Ralph Hubbard inspired hundreds with his Missouri River Studies and American Indian Lore.

During the 1960's the staff and enrollment doubled in geography, economics, political science and particularly sociology. MSC Student United Nations delegates took "honors" at the Universities of Minnesota and Wisconsin. In Old Main the Social Science staff and students filled to overflowing practically every classroom there including physics labs, sewing rooms, bandrooms, and the gym before moving to the "basement" of the new Administration building. By 1966 a

major was added in economics, thanks to the work of H. Paul Crockett. A two year law enforcement program was instituted with help of a federal grant and Robert Connor's diligent labor.

Students in social science during this decade took over the student association and led mild rebellions against college administration and community leadership. But student surveys under the guidance of Dr. Morrison and Dr. Stockman helped bring the Minot Commission on Aging and the Young Towers into being.

By 1973, under Dr. Wallace Stockman, a major was secured in sociology along with a gerontology program in 1974. By 1975, the law enforcement curriculum had progressed to a four year major in criminal justice under Robert Hubbard.

Fabulous teachers, college professors, congressmen, state representatives and senators, business executives, superintendents, writers, composers, journalists, farmers, housewives, social workers, policemen, "came out" of the division. They remember the courses, the encouragement, soul searching, library research, hard studying, report writing, communicating, growing,

ardent discussion and emoting inspired by the teachers in the division. Most of all the teachers; the rapid lecturer and "Crown Prince," Nels Manvel Lillehaugen, the organized and diplomatic Gaylen Brown, the sly, sharp Paul Crockett, gentle counselor Earl Shearer, the philosophical, harried but smiling, Dr. Paul Morrison, the rebellious, wry enthusiast, Carl Kavelage, as well as tenderhearted old "Doc" Allen, the scholarly Indian, Dr. Reddi, the efficient quiet Lyle Fogel, the builder father-confessor Wallace Stockman, the German schoolmaster Henry DuGarm, the busy Reverend Robert Connor, the enthusiastic inspiring Everett Ballmann, and the Queen herself, Hazel McCulloch to name only a few.

Job practicums in government, business, and social agencies such as hospitals, welfare services, Senior Citizens, Juvenile Homes are now taken by dozens of senior majors. The division is again overflowing, holding classes throughout the campus, and into offices on the bottom floor of Dakota Hall. From one professor seventeen. We hope the next sixty-three years is as rewarding.

# Special Education: 1930-1976

## Division began as a way to help graduates

In 1930 service to college students in need of speech correction were begun on the initiative of President George A. McFarland who asked Miss Gilbert, a new faculty member who had come to teach general speech and children's literature courses, to help three ladies with their speech. He had noted that Miss Gilbert had had some preparation in this field, and the ladies had earned degrees but were finding it difficult to get teaching positions because of their speech. Later President McFarland invited the faculty to refer students for speech help. The case load increased and became a regular part of the teaching load. The philosophy of Minot State College as set by Dr. McFarland was to turn out teachers whose speech would be a model for their pupils.

The first Speech correction class was introduced in 1931. During McFarland's administration there were no divisions and no heads of departments. Each faculty member was responsible directly to the president. The first speech correction class was listed with an English prefix.

Swain organized the college into eight major divisions with a chairman appointed to head each division. Speech Correction courses were placed in the Division of Literature and Language and had *Speech* prefixes.

In 1962 the Congress of the United States passed the first public law providing federal grants to institutions of Higher Education setting up training programs for teachers of the deaf. President C. P. Lura received notice of this from the U.S. Office of Education, conferred with Carl Smith, Superintendent of the State School for the Deaf, on the feasibility of setting up such a program

at Minot State College with the cooperation of the State School for the Deaf. As a result, Dr. Edna Gilbert, Director of the Speech Correction Program, was asked to set up the Education of the Deaf major and make application for the federal grant. The grant was awarded and the major in Education of the Deaf was approved. Federal forms required listing the name of the division in which the Education of the Deaf Program was given.

Evidently several factors caused Dr. Lura and Mr. Sather, the registrar, to decide that the time had come to create a Division of Special Education. The coordination and development of the Speech Correction program and the closely related Education of the Deaf program entailing a great deal of administrative work had both been assigned to a staff member in the Division of Literature and Language, but it was apparent that Education of the Deaf did not belong in that division.

The administration therefore suggested, and the State Board of Higher Education approved, the creation of the Division of Special Education in 1962, and the chairman was directed to hire a full time person, preferably with a doctorate, to head and strengthen the Mental Retardation Program. A full time person was hired in 1962 who strengthened the minor and set up student teaching in the E.M.R. rooms of the public schools.

In 1963 the Master of Science Degree in Speech Correction and in Education of the Deaf was approved by the State Board of Higher Education.

In 1967 Dr. Edna Gilbert resigned the chairmanship of the Division of

Special Education, continuing as Director of the Speech Correction Program, and Dr. Ronald Archer assumed the chairmanship of the Division.

The addition of the third floor to the Science Building in 1967-68 made possible the acquisition of the area in Old Main formerly used for engineering drawing (by the Special Education Division). This area consisted of 1640 square feet that was remodeled to include a language development center with two individual therapy rooms equipped with one-way glass for observation and a sound system; a seminar-conference room and additional office space.

During 1968 the division acquired the space between the stairwells formerly used for lockers and enclosed it to make a video-tape center. This area

is used to store equipment and as a production center for video-taping purposes.

In its 14 years of existence, the special education division has:

produced more than 50% of the Speech Therapists, Teachers of the Retarded and academic Teachers of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing currently serving the state.

produced 61% of North Dakota Speech Therapists trained by North Dakota Institutions of Higher Learning currently serving the state.

produced 77% of North Dakota Teachers of the Educable Mentally Retarded trained by North Dakota Institutions of Higher Learning currently serving the state.

produced 100% of North Dakota Teachers of the Deaf trained in North Dakota currently serving the state.



# The Brilliant (well almost) Beaver staff

The first annual, called *The Magician*, was published in 1916 by the senior class. Lillian Power was the editor. Her aim was to "give a picture of our life here at Normal, and to record those happenings for which we will long remember our senior year."

There were no staffing problems in 1916. Besides the editor there were assistant, literary, society, art, joke, athletic and business editors. The *Magician* staff remained large (30 people in 1924) until 1965, when the staff was reduced to 10. It has been only in the last two years that there are not-enough-staff problems.

The name of the book changed to *The Beaver* in 1926. The editor that year was Warren McElwain.

The 1930 staff did something unusual for the division pages. Artists sketched detailed rugs, blankets or maps depicting events from each section of the book. The artists were Ada Gilbert, Alice Lane, Myrtle Wolla, Nellie Coad, Beatrice Cool, Ruth Lervick, Eva Martinson and Alvina Pfaff.

The 1949 *Beaver* expanded in two ways. First, a number of pages was added to accommodate the increasing number of students and activities that had to be included. Secondly, the book, which was published in an 8" x 11" size, was enlarged to be published in a 9" x 12" format.

In addition to publishing a yearbook, the *Beaver* staff sponsored a formal dance in 1952. The next year the staff sponsored the Miss *Beaver* contest, and had continued to do so, with the exception of this year.

The *Beaver* moved up in the world in 1960, when the staff moved out of the southeast corner of the Student Union to the third floor.

Above all, the aim of each *Beaver* staff has been to publish a book of memories, and in doing so have echoed the thoughts that concerned them most. "Deep in the heart of a college yearbook is a frustrating sense that each portion should be so arranged that it will form a pleasing unit." That is something that all editors have tried to do, and that is what the 1976 *Beaver* staff has hoped to do.

Dr. Richard Bergmann started the Psychology Club in 1966. Upon his departure from MSC Dr. Richard Sheldon took over as chief advisor of the club. In 1974 the name of the club was changed to the Behavioral Science Club to include all of the behavioral sciences at MSC. The door was then opened for special education majors, speech pathology majors, nursing students or any student in any area interested in human behavior.

Activities of the club have been varied. Each year the club makes a field trip to the State Hospital in Jamestown for any interested persons. Other field trips include a visit to the Awareness House in Mandan, The Boys Ranch, The Vocational Workshop in Minot, and any other places or agencies that club members suggest and that the group feels a good place to visit.

Other activities of the club include guest speakers. So far this year speakers have included, Michael Hawkins, drug

and alcohol abuse counselor at the North Central Mental Health and Retardation Center, Ron Berri a counselor for Vocational Rehabilitation in Minot and Mr. Jim Fontaine staff member of the Boy Ranch of Minot. Other speakers that the club had on its agenda this year were Pam Davy, director of ACTION at MSC, Dr. James Brandt, Psychologist and Dean of Students at MSC, Dr. David Bickel, director of the Cooperative Education program at MSC and Dr. Wallace Stockman, sociology instructor of geriatrics at MSC.

Zeta Xi Chapter ranked ninth in the nation through its contribution toward the building fund of the national headquarters building which was erected in West Lafayette, Indiana.

## Duane Dicter Headed First Publications Board

As Fate would have it (for who else could match her sense of Irony?), an almost complete set of minutes of the Board of Publications, from its founding in 1956, up to the spring of 1973, exist, beautifully typed, in the publications office.

Thus we know that the first meeting was organized by Muriel (Foley) Turner, and that the first Board consisted of Duane Dicter, chairman; Dan Kirby, Jeanette Nelson, Marilyn Monigan, Marvel Wurtz. The chief business of the first meeting was to accept Steve Mengel and Pat McLane as editors of the Red and Green and Beaver, respectively. It was decided that "a large poster telling when the school paper was to be put out" would be put in front of McFarland Auditorium to "get interest of stories in Red and Green out before the paper." The March 15 edition of the Red and Green cost \$149.00, a figure which has doubled since that time.

Ten years later in 1966, the board members were Bill Flegel, Chairman, Peggy Loveland, Diane Gefroh, Robert Petersen, and Carolyn Sanderson. Faculty members were Mr. Muriel Turner, Mr. Joel Davy and Mr. Merritt Christensen. Mr. Christensen announced that the *Coup* would be coming out at the end of winter quarter and that a review of *The Tender and the Green* would not be included. In May of the next year, the Board went on record unanimously in favor of the inclusion of liquor advertisements in student publications "for the pur-

pose of boosting revenue in the light of declining advertising sources."

What may have been the Board's finest hour is buried laconically in the minutes for Dec. 10, 1968, a special meeting called to "consider whether certain parts of the *Coup* should be censored." Alan Eidsness moved that the Board support the printing of the *Coup* (which allegedly contained a four letter word for the result of human flatulence) in its entirety "and exactly as it had been written." The motion was passed by a vote of 3 to 2 with two abstaining. Nevertheless, the *Coup* was not published in its entirety, and at the next meeting Diane Zaharakis as editor of the *Coup*, and Mike Zaharakis and Linda Enge resigned as co-editors of the Red and Green.

Since then, things have been comparatively quiet. *The Coup* has still not published a review of *The Tender and the Green*. Editors come and go, more often as a result of transfers of people from MAFB than as a result of protests. One accomplishment of the Board this year was the adoption of a "obscenity guidelines," which might have helped the situation back in 1968. They state that editors are urged to "use due caution in publishing material which a significant portion of the on-campus or of—campus audience would find offensive." But then again, maybe it wouldn't have helped at all.

## Red and Green Founded Without Full Consent

In the fall of 1922, President McFarland, Miss Winsted (the registrar), Mrs. Perkett of the Psychology Department, and Miss McDonough of the English Department all attended a state teacher's meeting in Fargo. By the time they returned, the members of the college rhetoric class had, on their own, decided to publish a newspaper, named it *The Normal Echo*, sold the ads necessary to finance it, wrote the copy, arranged for printing, and distributed the paper.

For this heroic demonstration of initiative and competence, they expected — not praise, but censure for publishing without "the full consent of the faculty." As the initial staff, led by Rose Anderson and Marie Kann, explained, "This is the first, and it may be the last, edition of *The Normal Echo*." But they wished future classes success in publishing future editions "with the full consent of the faculty and a great hope of doing something worthwhile, instead of suffering pangs of conscience and many misgivings."

The first paper was four pages, and had 12 advertisements, two surprisingly high-quality action shots of athletic events, and a picture of some model school girls in white dresses, dancing around a maypole. The copy was crisply written and attractively presented. Most of the news was what would now be called club and class news: a story about the sophomores, the freshmen, the literary societies. Weddings of college students were routinely carried. By the third issue, in the spring of 1923, the paper has changed its name to the present Red and Green, and was able to publish an accolade from President which read in part, "may it not be that 'the Red and Green' is not only a history but a prophecy — a history of the year that is now closing but prophetic of greater undertakings for the future? Has it not shown the way to the publication next year of a monthly, or possibly of a weekly? If not next year, why not the year to follow? How fine it would be by co-operation of all the talented forces of the school, each Friday afternoon a weekly issue of 'The Red and Green' could come from the press, replete with well recorded doings of the school week! Shall we gird ourselves for larger undertakings for next year? I say yes."

Throughout the 20's the paper continued to be published by the rhetoric class and sold for 5 cents a copy. By 1935, the paper had expanded to five columns, and acquired an adviser. By 1942, the paper had acquired basically the look it does now: multi-column heads, large pictures, six and eight page issues, printed on newsprint, and the inclusion of some investigative reporting. Sometime in the 40's the paper began to have chronic not-enough-staff problems. In 1942, there were 23 people on the staff. By 1952 there were 12, and the standard "please come to work for us" items began to appear regularly. Advisers over the years have included Julia McDonough, M. L. French, Helen White, Muriel Foley, and George Slanger.

Following Mrs. (Foley) Abelseth's death in 1973, the paper tried a year without an adviser. The experiment, while not altogether a success, did establish that the student newspaper was not an extension of some mythical "administrative point of view," and brought to the staff a maturity which hopefully has been reflected in the publications of subsequent years.

This past year, the Red and Green has tried to live up to the stirring phrases of President McFarland, written 55 years ago. Beginning winter quarter, the paper did become a weekly. Two previous efforts to maintain the weekly schedule had failed, but the current one, under the editorship of Mike Vaughn, at this writing, was holding firm. The paper has not yet found the secret to tapping "all the talented forces of the school," as McFarland had urged. Whether the paper is "replete with well recorded doings of the school week" is a matter of some dispute, but it tries to be just that. Certainly it is girding itself for "larger undertakings for next year." The newly leased compugraphic photo-typesetting machine will allow the paper to set its own copy, and the projected purchase of a machine for setting display type would allow the paper to do all its own pasteup, at a considerable saving of money, and increase in flexibility. Possibly (we can state it no more strongly, for the optimism which came so easily in the early 20's is gone, probably forever) all these things are "prophetic of greater undertakings for the future."

## First Student Association Headed by Fernando Torgerson

The efforts to organize the students of Minot State College into a governmental body was instigated by the Philosophy Club late in 1938. They drafted a tentative constitution which was submitted to Dr. Carl Swain, president of the college, who in turn appointed a committee to finalize one. This constitution was then submitted to the body for their rejection or approval. It was approved.

Campaigning for offices followed with elections being held in February 15, 1939. The first man elected to the office of president of the Student Association was Fernando Torgerson. The officers were inaugurated on February 20 and the first Student Senate meeting was held on February 21, 1939.

Designed to promote student involvement in college life, the founders of the Senate took their first infantile step. Thirty-seven years later the Student Senate continues to operate on this, now inane, concept.

# Women's Recreation Association Traces History Back to 1921 Mecca for Pep

In 1921 the organization from which Women's Recreation Association evolved, Mecca For Pep, was started. 




