Dewayne Domer, assistant professor of business at MSC for 25 years, was honored for service to the college at the Recognition Day Dinner in October.

Domer came to MSC in the fall of 1956 from Berthold where he was superintendent of schools for eight years. He accepted a position at Campus School supervising business teachers which lasted until Model was closed in 1968.

Domer then came over to the business department, teaching methods courses and supervising teachers in outlying schools. He has also taught training courses for driver education teachers during his career here, and

Domer has four daughters who have graduated from MSC, all in business-related fields. "Only one is a teacher out of four, though," says Domer.



"I've always felt students from MSC match grads from any institution in the country and I've felt the education they obtained from MSC is equal to or better than what they could receive from any other place," commented Domer.





Gaylen Brown marks 25 years at MSC

Gaylen Brown, associate professor of history at MSC for 25 years, was honored for service to the college at the fourth Annual Recognition Day Dinner on Oct. 28.

Brown came to MSC in December of 1955 for one quarter, but began his ongoing career in September of 1956 in the social science division teaching, principally, history.

For 10 years Brown served as the Minot Chairman of the International Peace Garden Conference which meets annually with Brandon University students at the Peace Gardens for debates on various subjects that are applicable to young people of both countries.

Brown has been an advisor to Mu Sigma Tau Fraternity for over 20 years, "Through good years and bad years," Brown said. For a few years he was also advisor to the Lutheran Student Association in the days before campus pastors became a permanent part of MSC.

Brown has been president of both the local American Association of University Professors and the local NDEA chapter. He also has been state president of the State Conference of AAUP, and has served as the state president of the Higher Education Association.

Brown comments on his career at MSC, "My years here have been extremely happy, busy, and fast."





Carol Belinskey retires after 31 years

Carol Belinskey, professor of chemistry for 31 years at MSC retired in the spring of 1981 receiving the rank of professor emeritus at graduation ceremonies on May 29. She was honored at a recognition banquet in October.

Mrs. Belinskey said when she came to MSC in 1950 there were many women on the staff; however, there was a differential in pay between men and women. She was the only woman in the science and math division for the past several years.

Serving as the MSC coordinator for



St. Joseph's and Trinity Schools of Medical Technology and Nursing in Minot, Mrs. Belinskey was instrumental in establishing the medical technology and nursing degree programs at Minot State College. "The medical technology degree was the first professional degree program to be granted to MSC by the Board of Higher Education, bringing MSC out of the "teachers college" category," she said. She continues to serve as an advisor to the Trinity School of Nursing.








Minot Opera

The 'Messiah'

Do you often wonder what is meant by Handel's "Messiah"? Handel is the name of a famous German composer. George Frederic Handel was born on Feb. 23, 1685 in Halle, Germany. He began taking music lessons when he was seven years old. By the age of twelve, he was an assistant organist at the Halle cathedral. As a youth, he had a typical Lutheran education and studied law at the University of Halle. His earliest activity as a composer began in 1703 in Hamburg, Germany, which at that time was the center of French, Italian, and German operatic styles.

Between 1706 and 1710, while working in Italy, Handel became one of the most popular composers of Italian opera. In 1710 and 1711 he served as Director of Music in Hanover, Germany. He then moved to England and lived in London until his death.

In 1741, Handel abandoned opera and dedicated himself to composing oratorios. "Messiah" was the first of the oratorios. In 1751, Handel gave up composing because of blindness, but still remained active.

"Messiah" contains no dramatic action. It portrays the foundation of Christianity in a series of musical numbers that parallel the prophecy of Christ's coming, His birth, life, death, and resurrection.

The main reason for the popularity of "Messiah" lies in its glorious choruses. There are more inspired choruses in "Messiah" than in any of Handel's other oratorios. The exciting "Hallelujah Chorus" exhibits Handel as a master of choral effects.

"Messiah" was first heard in the New Music Hall in Dublin, Ireland in 1742. For Minot, the 52nd annual "Messiah" was performed December 6 at 4 p.m. in McFarland Auditorium. The "Messiah" Choir and Orchestra included members from the community, surrounding schools, and Minot State College and is under the direction of Joseph Hegstad.

This year's "Messiah" featured ten soloists from the community: Neil Lemieux, bass; Duke Duhacher, bass; Ken Starr, bass; Joel Schenfisch, tenor; Lewis Hagen, tenor; Joanne Nygard, alto; Char Hanson, alto; Beth Moe, soprano; Lydia Dougherty, soprano; and Sue Olafson, soprano.

There were a few changes to the "Messiah" this year, one of them being the use of more than four soloists and also the audience being invited to sing along to the "Hallelujah Chorus" with the choir and orchestra.

The "Messiah," as it has done for the fast fifty two years, served as the opening of the heart-warming Christmas season for the Minot community.

Hegstad has rewarding twelve years at MSC

Joseph "Doc" Hegstad came to the Minot State music department 12 years ago to be the director of the Vagabonds, the supervisor of music education majors, and a teacher of voice and music literature. His position has since evolved to include the directorship of three singing groups, the Jazz-Madrigals, the Vagabonds, and Concert Choir.

During those 12 years Hegstad has served on numerous committees college wide and departmentally. He has been elected secretary-treasurer of the state Music Educators National Conference and state president of the American Choral Directors Association.

Hegstad has conducted the "Messiah" since 1976. A number of changes have been initiated in its production under his direction. The performance was moved back on campus to McFarland Auditorium which is more hospitable for choral music than is the Civic Auditorium. After its 50th anniversary of performance in the city of Minot during the Christmas season, changes were made in the solo structure, choruses were added and, in 1981, the audience was invited to sing with the Hallelujah Chorus, according to Hegstad.


More creative changes for the "Messiah" are being planned by Hegstad including moving the production to the Dome where a larger choir and a larger audience can be facilitated.

Hegstad has been an active member of the Minot community since his arrival here. He has directed the choir of Zion Lutheran Church for 11 years and has directed the Heritage Singers male chorus since he helped to organize it in 1974. The Heritage Singers have twice been designated the Governor's Chorus.




Dave Richter (captain)

The Beavers' annexing fourth place with 130 points in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) District 12 race at Spearfish, S.D., was the highlight of the year, said Wilson. MSC topped five teams--Dickinson State College, Jamestown College, South Dakota Tech at Rapid City, Dakota Wesleyan University at Mitchell, S.D., and South Dakota College at Madison. Wilson's harriers hadn't beaten DSC, JC and S.D. Tech until the district meet. "I was very pleased. It was an outstanding race," said Wilson.

Commenting on the North Dakota Collegiate Athletics Conference (NDCAC) 8,000 meter race at Jamestown, Wilson said, "We ran as well as we could." MSC etched a fourth

place with 105 points. Valley City State College copped the conference crown for the second straight year and, in addition, claimed the district title.

The biggest disappointment of the season was "the lack of depth," said Wilson. "We were short-handed. We needed 10 to 12 runners and we only had seven."

MSC's harriers included Kari, Francis, Wasser, Mike Brevig, Rod Belzer, Kelly Repnow and Matt Stone.

Wilson said the loss of the three seniors through graduation will "very seriously" affect next year's team performance "unless we recruit four or five outstanding distance runners." The seniors include Kari, Francis and Brevig.

Wilson said, "Belzer was named as the outstanding freshman. Stone and Repnow ran very well for freshmen. And Wasser, a sophomore, was selected as next year's captain."

Wilson foresees MSC to be very competitive next year "if four or five people are added to the roster. We have good returning lettermen with a year's experience under their belts."

Golf team places third in conference

"We had a fairly successful season," said golf coach Larry Treider. "We could have done better at conference. Other than that, we played fairly well all year."

Treider's team took third place with a 322-330-652 in the North Dakota Collegiate Athletics Conference Tournament at Valley City. North Dakota State School of Science's Wildcats led after the first day and maintained the position to capture top honors. MSC held the number two spot, but slid down a notch behind Jamestown College the final day.

About MSC's finishing in conference, Treider said, "We were capable of placing second. The weather was terrible, though. At the same time, we could have played better."

The Beavers claimed fourth in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics District 12 Tournament. The squad carded a 341-353-694 in the two-day event held in Aberdeen, S.D. Black Hills State College at Spearfish, S.D., copped the crown with a 665.

"We did a good job there," said

Treider about the team's performance in the district meet. "We finished as well as we could have. I was satisfied with how we played."

The highlight of the 1981-82 season, according to Treider, was the Bismarck Invitational. "That's where we probably played the best golf, the whole team, that is. We played considerably well for two days." MSC acquired fourth of eight teams.

"The greatest disappointment of the year was conference," said Treider.

Todd Cresap and Randy Hanson, both juniors, were named to the all-conference and all-district teams. Cresap swung a 155 and a 167 and Hanson hit a 159 and a 163 at the conference and district meets, respectively.

Cresap's stroke average for the season was 77.7 and Hanson's was 79.5. Treider said both players were "very consistent."

Other team members included senior Jeff Jore, sophomore Mike Vendsel and freshmen Stuart Glasoe and Doug Johnson.

"Hopefully, we'll be a little better next year," said Treider. "If everyone comes

back and with normal improvement, we'll have a stronger golf team."


Leslie and the team practiced many long hours during the season and because of such dedication and hard work they rose to mark the tenth year as champions!











Grapplers place fourth in NDCAC conference

Minot State College's grapplers completed the 1981-82 season with a 9-5-1 overall dual record and with a 3-3-1 mark in the conference. "I was happy about that," commented Coach Dean Bachmeier on the squad's record. "I felt we had a good season considering the youth of the team."

Four freshmen, eight sophomores, two juniors and two seniors comprised the Beaver squad. Nine of the 16 members were returning lettermen.

"The season's highlight was tying with the North Dakota State School of Science at Wahpeton in a conference dual 18-18," said Bachmeier.

MSC's performance in the Black Hills State College Invitational at Spearfish, S.D., was the "downer of the year," said Bachmeier. "We usually perform pretty well at that, but not this year." The Beavers had but one third place finisher and four fourth place finishers and took last of six teams.

Minot State copped fourth place in the North Dakota Collegiate Athletics Conference Tournament at Wahpeton with 57 points. "I thought we were capable of finishing third and as it turned out, we had a better dual team than a tournament team. I guess it in-

dicates we didn't have any real stars on the team but several capable performers," said Bachmeier.

Terry Brossart, Gaylen Larson and Steve Wisthoff participated in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics Tournament March 4-6 at Pacific University in Forest Grove, Ore. Both Larson, a senior who wrestled at 158 pounds, and Wisthoff, a sophomore who wrestled at the heavyweight division, qualified for nationals by earning runner-up berths in the conference tournament. Brossart, a 150-pound junior, qualified because he won at least 66% of his matches.

"Our kids performed better at nationals than last year," said Bachmeier, "in the fact that they won some matches. However, we didn't place anybody." He added that, "Overall, they were much more competitive than a year ago. As for Steve and Terry, they should have enough national tournament experience, so they feel confident wrestling next year."

About MSC hosting the national tournament in '83, Bachmeier said, "I'm excited about it. I think it will be an exciting event, something that should be great for the school and the city of Minot and the area high school program."

Lionel Sand (190 lbs.)



wins, over 20 wins in a single season. It's always difficult to replace those kind of people," said Bachmeier.


The squad's captains included Larson, Brossart and Smith. "I think the leadership by the captains was adequate







MSC trackmen set records in '82

Wiley Wilson's trackmen have to be given a lot of credit for surviving the '82 season. The injury plague hit the Beavers hard this season. The trackmen pressed on and ended up finishing runner-up in four of five outdoor meets.

The Beavers traveled to Aberdeen, S.D., for the district meet and came away a little disappointed finishing fourth. Bright spots for the Beavers were Brad Zastrow setting a new Minot record in the decathlon with 6,467 pts. Ed Boos won the javelin with a throw of 231'5" inches and Bill Schalow won the tough 1500 meter with a time of 3.58.3. Herb Perry wasn't far behind finishing second in both the 100 and 200 meter sprints. With a couple days rest the track team headed for the conference meet in Valley City. The Beavers sprinted to their best performances of the year. The Beavers won six events on the Valley City track, scoring 123 pts. and finishing second. MVP of the meet, Herb Perry, swept the 100 and 200 meters, Schalow won the 1500, Tom Neff, the high jump, Curt

Kraft, the 400 intermediate hurdles, and the 400 meter relay won with Wayde Nelson, Pat Walker, Herb Perry, and Randy Harmon. Ed Boos uncorked his best throw of the season, 233'9" only to finish second to Mark Fischer's unbelievable throw of 236'9". The Beavers received a second place finish in the 800 meter from Tim Johansen, and thirds from Tom Jeff's triple jump, Curt Kraft's high hurdles and Randy Harmon's 400 meter run. Also scoring third was the 1600 meter relay team consisting of Dean Goodall, Matt Stone, Randy Harmon, and Tim Johansen. Bill Schalow set the standards for the conference meet running in three long distance races, first in the 1500 meter, third in the 800 meter, and fourth place in the 5,000 meter run. This a feat rarely done and with infrequent success.

Bill Schalow was voted the MVP for the Beavers this year and Herb Perry was the runner-up. The Beavers sent two people to the national meet this year, Bill Schalow and Ed Boos.



Warren Allen, chairman of the Division of Education and Psychology located on second floor, says the renovation is slated to be completed by August 1. The entrance to McFarland Auditorium will be modified for better sound control.

On the east half of the wing will be located a suite of professor's offices, a large classroom on the north side that can be divided, and classrooms on the south side, one of which can be divided for smaller conference rooms. All classrooms will be carpeted and the corridors retiled.

The ductwork for an air-conditioning system is being installed in the hope that the \$31,000 compressor can be afforded sometime in the near future. With its full southern exposure, Old Main becomes unbearably hot during summer school.

Long awaited dream is completed

The construction of the MSC field house began with a ground-breaking ceremony on May 10, 1978 and proceeded with no major problems according to Robert Anderson, architect for the project. During the fall months, the footing, foundation, and backfill were completed, finishing all the basic support systems. Throughout the winter, work continued with the pouring of concrete in temporary enclosures. And as spring approached, preliminary concrete work was completed to facilitate the dramatic changes the field house was scheduled to undergo in early summer.

In the summer, steel radial trusses were delivered and put into place, completing the steel span over the field house. Custom-made panels, measuring 45 feet high and 8 feet wide, made of a concrete structure with insulation, were lifted into place by a large crane. That was just a small part of the massive structure that took almost four years to complete. The finishing touches took place over the fall and winter of the '81-'82 school year.

The field house is used for many activities and one is the amateur basketball tournament.




The seating of many people during a MSC basketball game.


The diameter of the field house is 310 feet with the actual floor space adding up to 152,967 square feet and the volume 5,444,160 cubic feet. The height of the building from the basketball court to the trusses is 50.6 feet.

The field house is equipped for almost any type of sport. Since there are no interior obstructions, a multi-purpose area allows four courts each for basketball, tennis, volleyball and there is also four racquetball courts built inside the field house. Surrounding these areas is a six lane 160-meter track. There has also been a four-sided scoreboard donated by three Minot area sponsors.

All this is located on the bottom floor. Second floor contains the physical education classrooms and offices. Also on the second floor is a batting cage and various storerooms. Second floor is often used by students and others in the community for jogging. Third floor is used for gymnastics and has extra room for tracksters and joggers.

The seating in the field house consists of 9,650 retractable seats; 4,450 contoured backseats on the main floor and 5,200 bleacher seats on the top floor.

A special box for the press is suspended from the radial truss roof system. Also a special 1,300 car parking facility has been constructed on the hill north of the building.




The supports for the seat on the main floor.


The area-level seats retract back to the wall for full use of the track and playing surface.

The final expected cost of the project was set at 6.2 million dollars, \$4.8 million which was supplied by the North Dakota Legislature, \$600,000 by the city of Minot, and much of the rest was supplied through donations. Many plaques were presented to various Minot clubs and organizations during the Beaver basketball games in appreciation of their donations.

The long awaited spectators dream has finally been completed. The field house is a wonderful opportunity for any potential athlete or student in the field of health and physical education. It is a convenience, and a much appreciated one, for anyone who wants to get some exercise and also for those who just like to spectate!





