Slaaten Center Dedication

The former Sigma Sigma Sigma House is now the Slaaten Center. University House, formerly the SSS sorority house, was dedicated as the Slaaten Center during homecoming week in September.

"The new name better identifies the purpose of the property," said Garnet Cox, dean of students. She said the house may accommodate special university guests or become the location of other university functions.

Located at 822 10th Ave. N.W., the house was constructed in 1962. The sorority occupied the house on a contract basis until 1975 when the sorority purchased the property.

The MSU Development Foundation purchased the 1,900-square-foot house from the sorority in October 1987 for about \$31,000 and renovated it to provide living quarters for female graduate and older-than-average students.

Doris Slaaten, professor emeritus of business, taught at MSU for 27 years before retiring in 1984. She was a member of the Tri-Sigma sorority when she attended MSU in the 1940s and served on the sorority's alumni board when the property was acquired and the house was built.

Slaaten has long been involved in community and professional organizations and efforts in support of the university. She was instrumental in establishing the Slaaten Learning Center in the MSU College of Business and worked with the MSU Development Foundation to create the Doris A. Slaaten Foundation, which was funded through her personal estate.

Homecoming week ended with a thrilling MSU football victory over the University of Mary, 28-24.

With Mary leading 24-21 in the fourth quarter, Beaver quarterback Chad McNally hit fullback Shawn Auck with a short screen pass. Auck weaved his way downfield for 60 yards and the winning touchdown. His teammates helped along the way with four key blocks.

"That was a great run," said Coach Randy Hedberg. "He cut back a couple of times; it was a well-executed play."

MSU also scored on a 7-yard run by quarterback Mike Page, a 30-yard pass from Page to Mike Bergman and a 11-yard run by Lenny Rodin.

Auck led all rushers with 67 yards. Brad Nissley added 52 yards and Bergman 41.

McNally completed three of six passes for 87 yards, and Page hit five of eight for 73 yards for the Beavers.

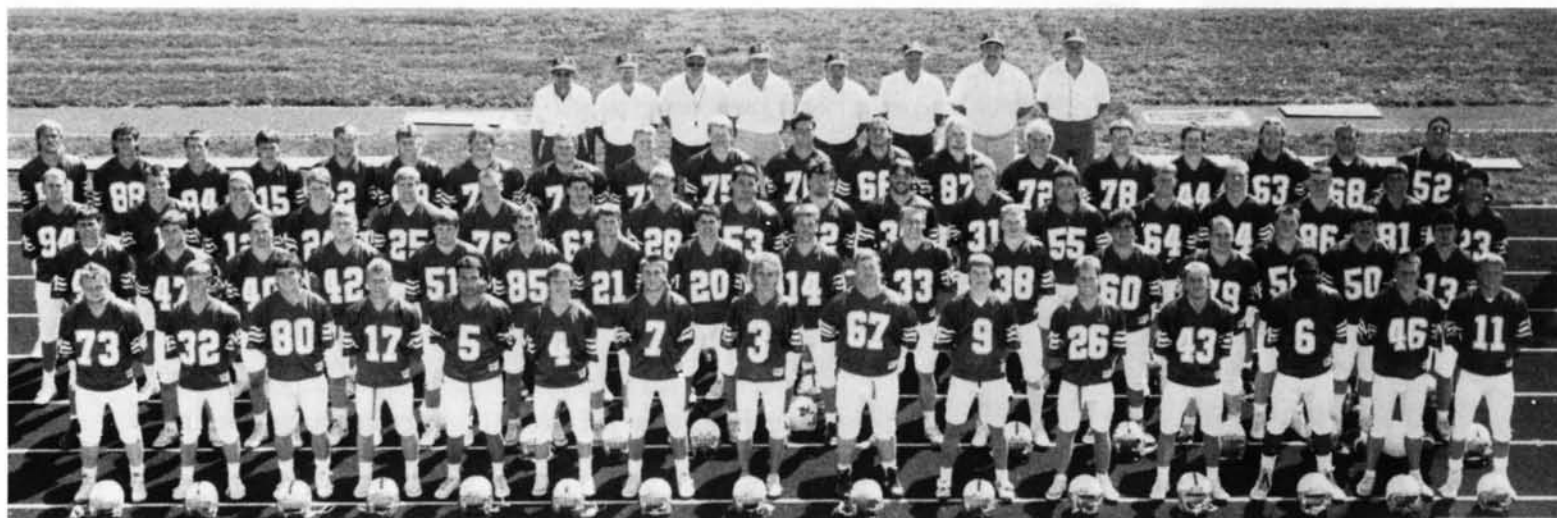

Seniors being lost this year include Dave Eide and Craig Johnson.

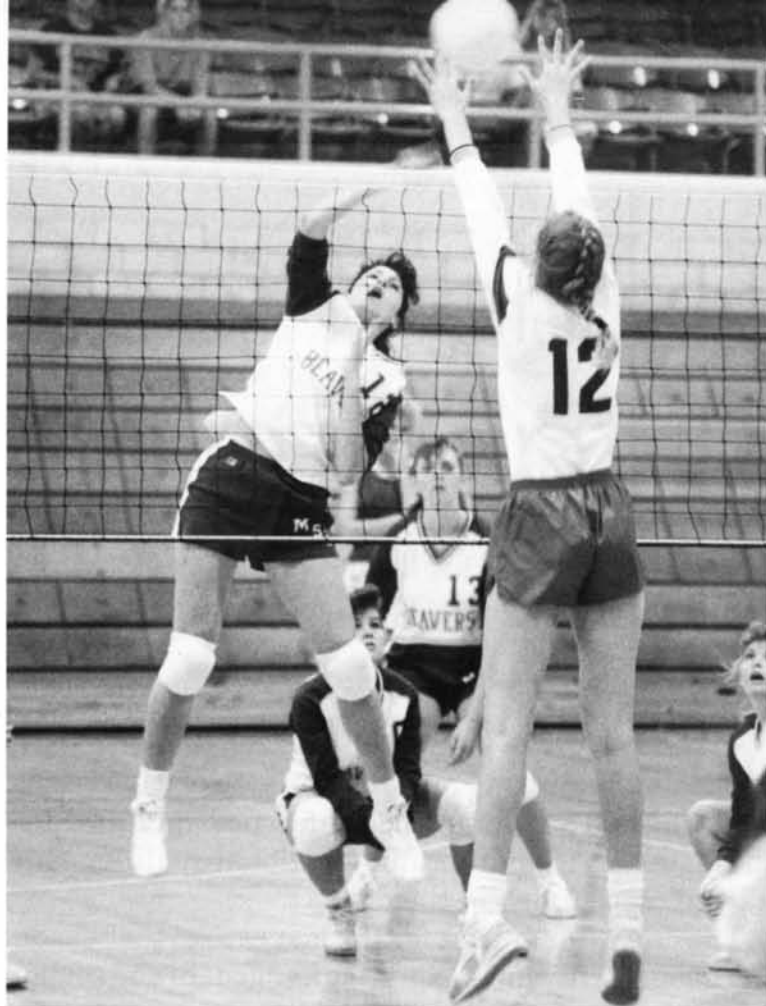
All in all, Limke said that 1989 was a very rewarding and positive year for golf at Minot State.

MSU Volleyball serves up a 11-22 season

The Minot State University Lady Beaver volleyball team finished their season with a record of 11 wins and 22 losses, which is an improvement over last year's record of 7-24, according to Coach Terry Voiles.

The two best matches were against Northern State College of Aberdeen, S.D. They met for the first time in September, with the Beavers winning the match by taking three out of four games. Their second meeting was during the sub-district tournament in October. The Lady Beavers again won the match, but this time they went down to the fifth game to do it. They went on to lose three games each to Mayville State University and Jamestown College in the tourney, however.

"I was very pleased with the sub-district tournament because of the mental approach of the players," said Voiles

The Lady Beavers will lose four seniors next year: Susan Schryvers, Sara Tufton, Karen Stead and Cheryl Bertsch. Voiles considered Bertsch to be the most consistent hitter, which will leave the strength of the front line hitters somewhat uncertain next year.

Of the returning players, junior Michelle Sabistina is considered the strongest hitter. If she continues to progress, she'll be considered one of the key players for the upcoming season.

Wiley Wilson, Minot State University's cross country coach, said that the women's team had to compete most of the season as an incomplete team. After injuries sidelined senior Carla Rodin and freshman Tawnya Gefroh, the women's team competed short-handed and consequently scored poorly.

The team's most valuable runner was freshman

Nan Nelsen, who was an individual champion at two meets and had an overall winning rate of 94 percent. Nan finished second in the conference, qualified for the district meet and became a national qualifier with a third place finish in the district.

The only runners left for the last race of the season were Nelson, freshman Sherrice Langedahl and sophomore Marsha Strietz. Wiley Wilson said they had a fair season but was sorry to see so many conflicts with classes and injuries. "It's always so hard to find good female distance runners," he said.

He added that he had some strong freshman runners this year who will make next year's team stronger.

Men's Cross Country

The men's cross country team had a so-so season this year, but they're looking forward to better things in the future.

In seven meets during the season, the Beavers competed against 35 opponents, defeating 19 of them and losing to 16. The team finished third in the NDCAC conference meet and fifth in the District 12 NAIA meet.

"We were in the middle of the pack," said Coach Wiley Wilson. "With the people we had we were quite happy with our season."

Jarret Baker, a senior from New Town, was named the team's MVP. "Jarret won it for the fourth time, but not consecutively. Starting back in 1983, he's had four MVPs. He was out of school a few years in between," Wilson said.

Baker was team MVP in 1983, 1985 and 1988.

The coach said Baker won two individual meets and had a winning percentage of 97. "It means that for every 100 people he ran against, he beat 97 of them,"

he explained.

After running for MSU from 1983 to 1985, Baker took two years off from school. He worked for his brother and joined the National Guard. But the lure of competition was too great.

"I enjoy cross country and that's one of the reasons I came back here to school," Baker said. "Coach Wilson is another reason. He's done a lot for me, and I wouldn't run for a different school, even if I had the opportunity."

The veteran runner said he will miss certain aspects of his favorite sport. "Cross country isn't enjoyable while you're racing, but when you finish, it feels good to be done," Baker said. "I've met a lot of new friends through cross country. And it is a team sport. A lot of people think it isn't, but it is."

Prospects for next year's cross country team are good due to a strong nucleus of returning runners. "We return four people who at one time or another were all-conference, which means they finished in the top 10 in the conference meet," Wilson said.

HENRY LEE SUMMER

Rock star was loved by concert goers at the Dome

If forced to describe Henry Lee Summer in one word, it would have to be "energetic." Summer thrashed and pranced around the stage to the delight of a crowd that he dubbed "crazy." The native Hoosier sang a half-hour encore and feigned jump shots in his Minot State University T-shirt.

Summer was equally hyperactive before the concert. He hosted an entire gambit of questions from his conservative religious roots, to his basketball scholarship, to the time he spent as an apprentice blues musician. Summer seemed excited for the concert and impressed by Minoters. "People are very nice here," he said. "It's rare that you walk into your hotel room and find a big sign saying 'Welcome to Minot, Henry Lee.' When you play all over the country, five or six nights a week, you find that some places are more friendly than others."

When asked about his insistence on producing his own albums and videos, Summer had this to say: "By doing things my own way, I have stifled my career. It's really hard to stick with anything in this business. Even the Boss (Bruce Springsteen, to whom Summer has been compared) has to compromise." Summer then went on to tell a story about the shooting of his latest video. "I have nothing against scantily clad women, but that's not my style. They don't belong in my videos," he said.

Summer grew up on a farm in Indiana and had what he described as a "sheltered, strict upbringing." Although his

mother burned his record collection when he was a teen, he says she is a big fan of his music now. "My mom knows all the words to my songs," she said. "She'll even dance to my records." Summer then jumped up and did an impression of his mother dancing.

According to Summer, music was always the most important element in his life. He received a basketball scholarship, which he said he didn't really consider, because "I am from Indiana. Everyone in Indiana plays basketball, and it has nothing to do with my music."

"I am the world's biggest music fan," Summer said and listed influences from Otis Redding to Elvis to the Beatles. Still, Summer's experience playing throughout the South with various blues artists had a lasting effect on his music. He learned not to imitate the

blues, but to write and play his own. He was told to sing from his own perspective, about what he knew. "I don't have a blues bone in my body, I had to do what came natural. Some of my songs lean too far toward pop," Summer said. He concluded by adding, "I paid my dues, but I loved it."

The crowd in the Dome loved Henry Lee Summer. Especially when he pulled SA Secretary Will Dowdell on stage for a duet during a cover of The Rolling Stone's "Satisfaction." At Summer's suggestion, the bleachers were emptied and the floor was filled with dancing people.

Maury Terry draws thousands to the Dome

Maury Terry came to Minot State University last September to discuss his book "The Ultimate Evil."

Thousands of people jammed into McFarland Auditorium in anticipation. But since McFarland only seats about a thousand people, everyone was escorted to the Dome where all could hear about the chilling investigation that led to Terry's book.

Terry began by discussing satanic cults: who joins them, why people join them and where they are situated. While these cults are much more common than many people realize, Terry assured everyone that it is not an epidemic.

He went on to discuss his investigation of one of the biggest mass murder cases in history. The Son of Sam murders that occurred in New York City in the mid-1970s were considered solved with the

arrest of David Berkowitz. Little did anyone know but the murders were the crimes of a cult, a cult with connections to this area.

It is not often that North Dakota is connected with a national murder case and such a notorious one at that. The facts are unnerving and the connections to North Dakota and more specifically, Minot, are shocking. Terry uncovered the story with the cooperation of the Minot Police Department.

Terry was an excellent speaker and everyone enjoyed him from the edge of their seats. The intrigue he created made the promotional aspect of his visit a success; stacks of books were sold at the Dome that night. Most left with a copy of "The Ultimate Evil" in hand, with a sense of wonder yet also with an eerie sense of awareness.

"Jesus Christ Superstar" born again

Minot State University's fall production of "Jesus Christ Superstar" was 10 years in the making.

Kevin Neuharth, the show's stage director, and Gary Walth, the production's music director, began discussing the possibility of staging the rock opera 10 years ago when both were teaching at Minot High School. When both ended up at MSU, they rekindled their common interest in the play.

The show, written by Andrew Lloyd Webber and Tim Rice, describes the last week of Christ's earthly life, culminating in his sacrificial death. Popular songs from the late-1960s production include "I Don't Know How to Love Him" and "Jesus Christ Superstar."

Neuharth said the play was based primarily on the Gospel of John. "He was more precise in pinpointing the conflict between Jesus and Judas," he said.

He said the conflict between these characters is at the heart of the play. "There is no buildup to it. We see the conflict in the first song, and by the third song the boundaries are set," he said.

Pat McCurry portrayed Jesus, and Kip Ireland played Judas. They were supported by a cast of 30

performers and an orchestra of 15 musicians.

Neuharth said that because the words and music carried the show, he built a simplified set of various platforms and levels. He noted that special effects came through the lighting. Costumes for the production derived from the 1960s.

The director said the play may have been controversial when it first opened, but it isn't anymore.

"There are questions that the show raises, but we're not trying to change anyone's belief. Hopefully, someone's belief isn't so soft that it changes because of seeing a show."

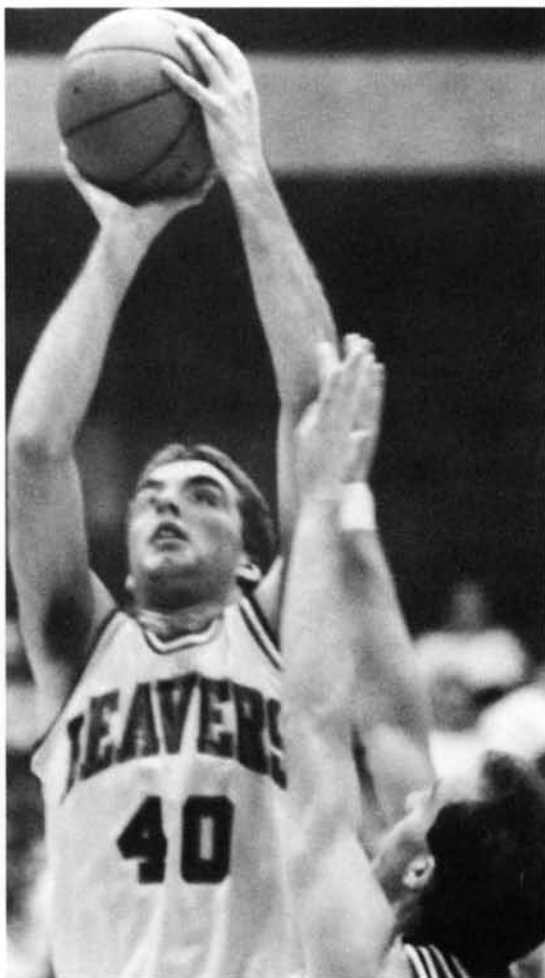
Forward Mike Hendrickson, who averaged 12 points per game, said, "We played a lot of games that could have gone either way; unfortu-

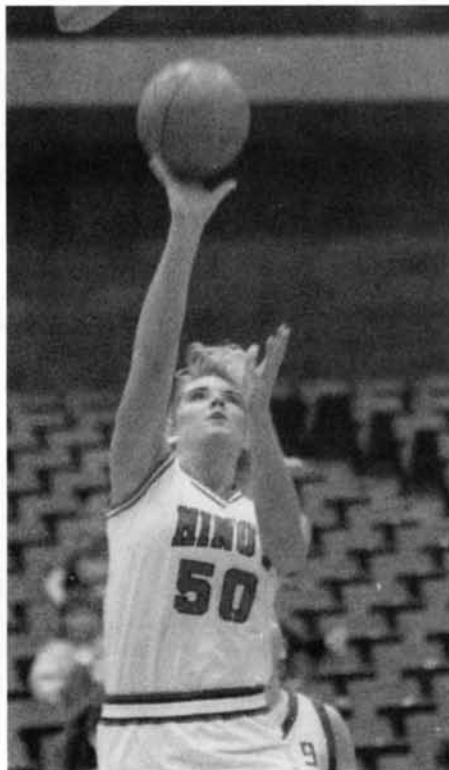

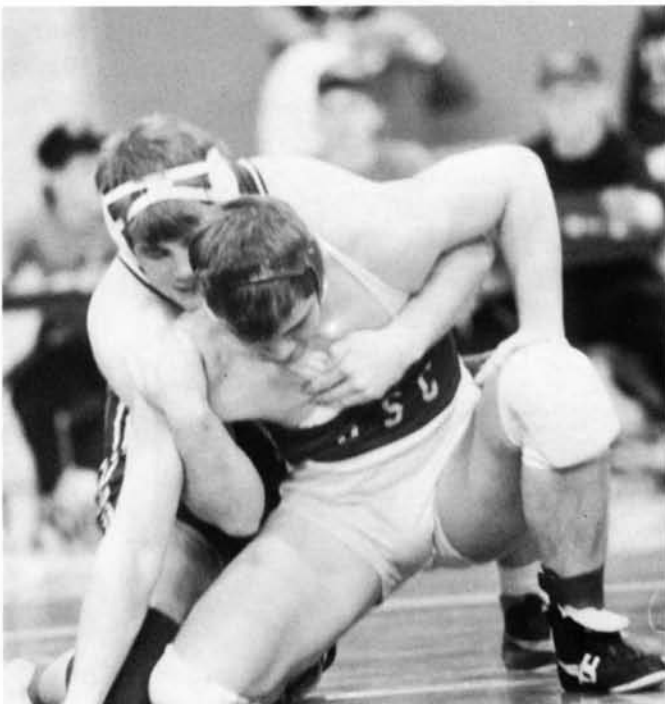

Bachmeier is sad to see MSU wrestling end after 22 years. "It is hard to stop with nothing to look forward to," he said. He feels sorry for the freshman wrestlers in the area who wanted to attend MSU to wrestle and go to school, but feels they will go elsewhere.

Bachmeier is very proud of his team's ability to rise above the loss of its program and turn in a good season. Most of the wrestlers are disappointed in the loss of their sport. Three or four will be transferring to other schools, so they can continue to wrestle and get an education.

The savings realized by the cut of the wrestling program will be \$8,000 a year (1989 figures) and a \$7,000 savings in the scholarship budget. Wes Luther, MSU athletic director, said the athletic department plans to meet the scholarship obligations for those wrestlers who plan to stay, based on conditions established between the department and the athlete.

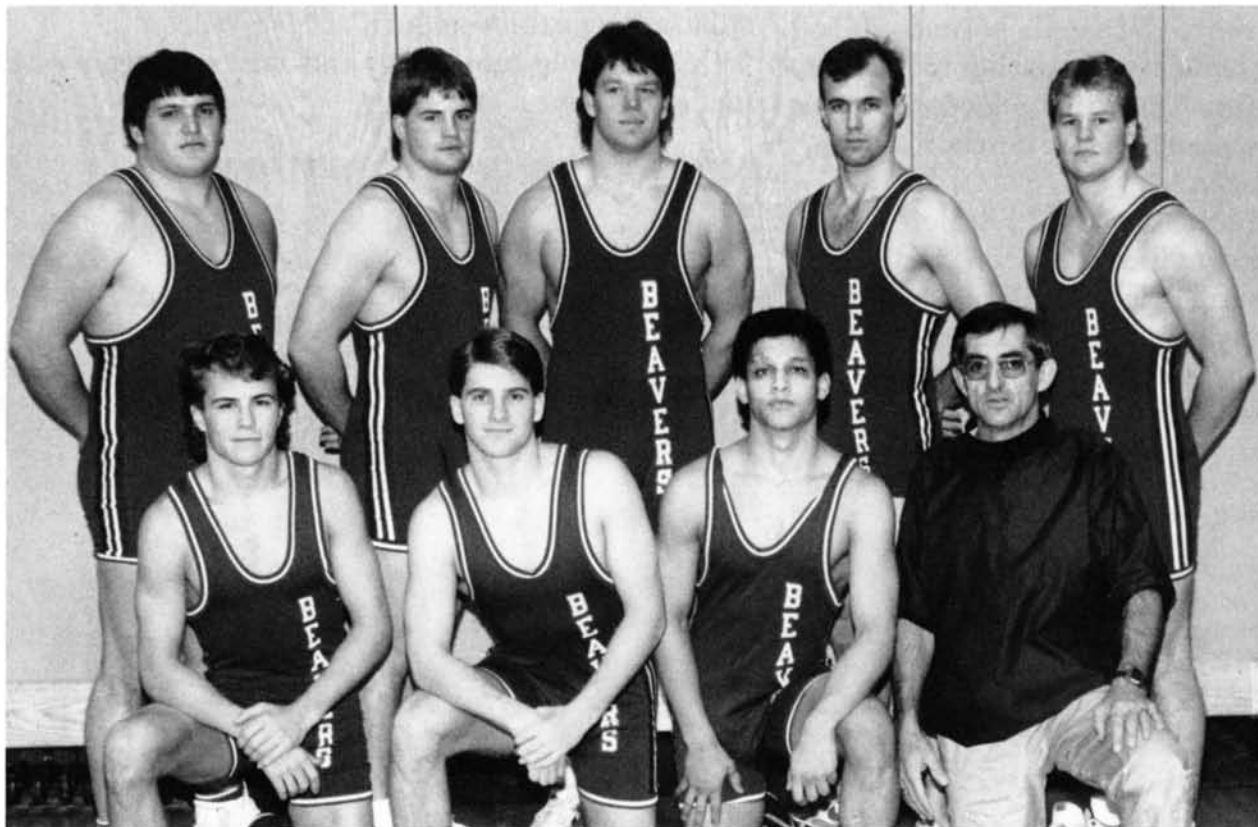

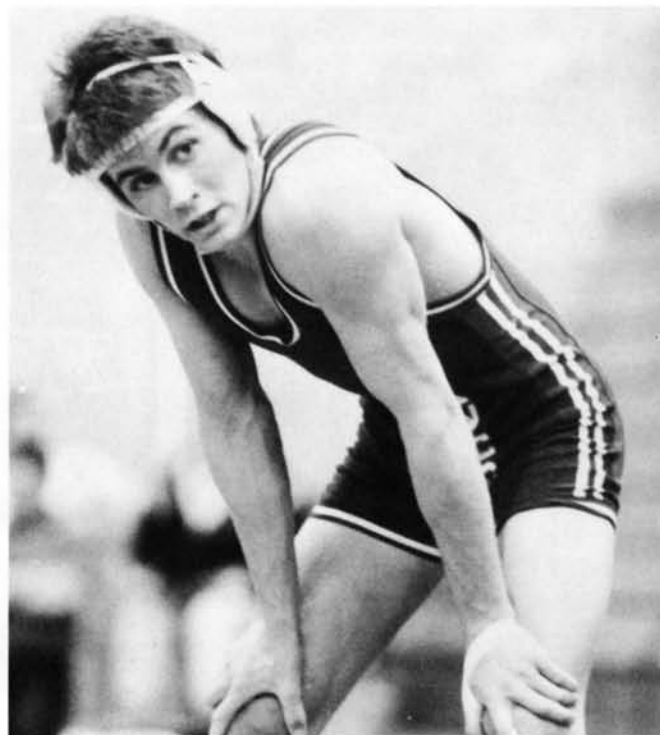

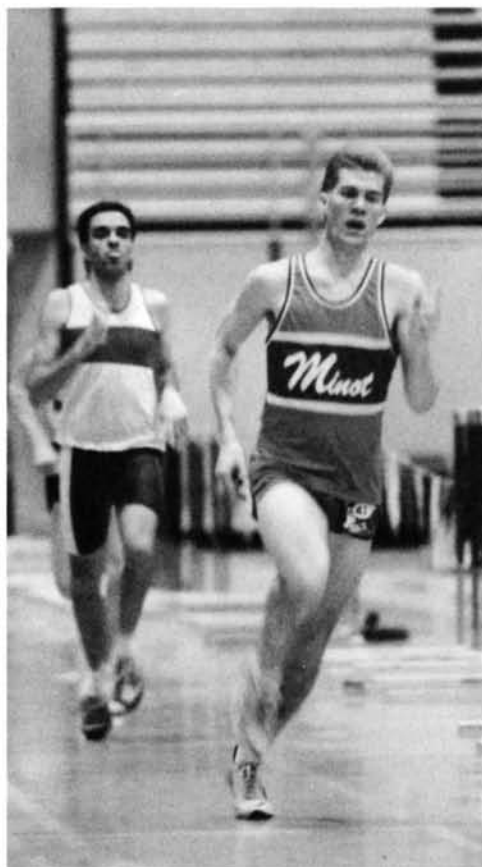

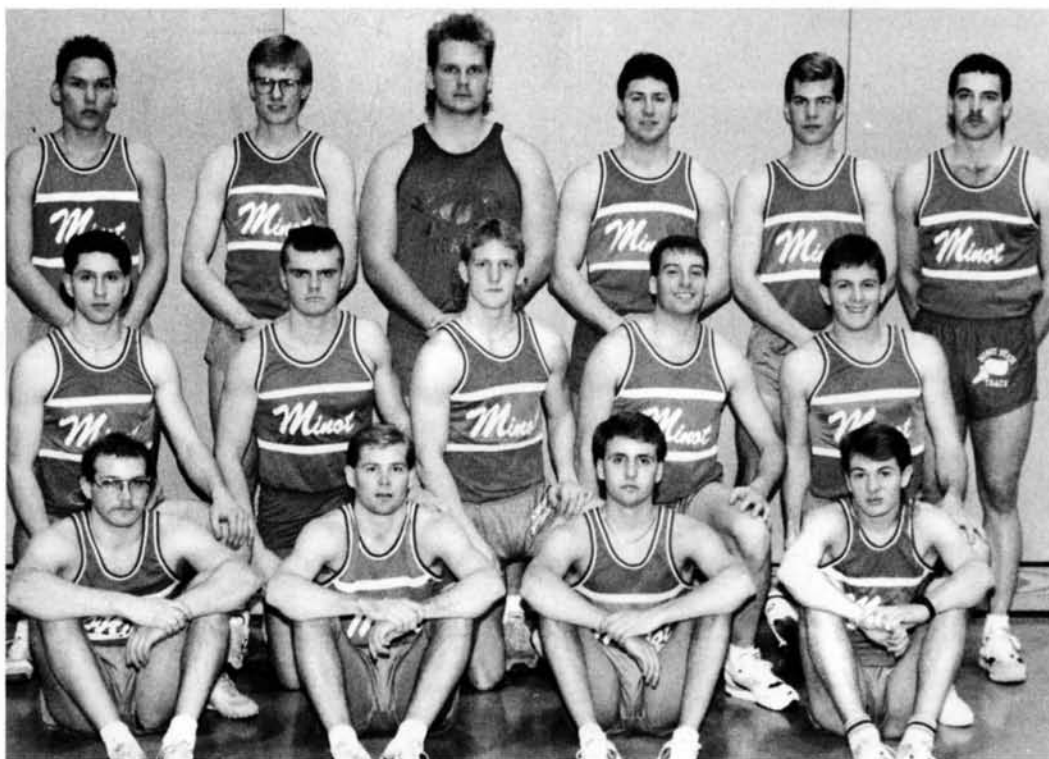

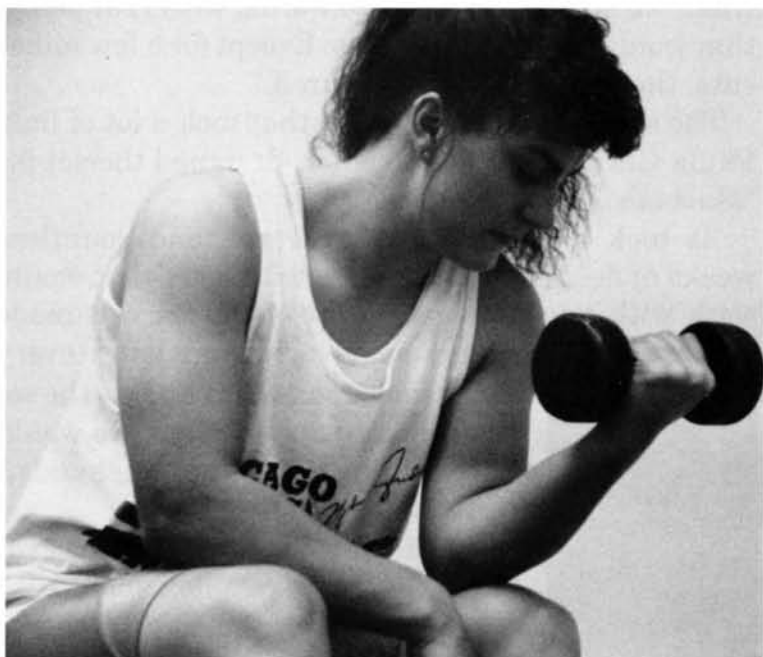

The set design was an issue that took a lot of flak. Paula Crawford, a MSU senior, designed the set for "Macbeth."

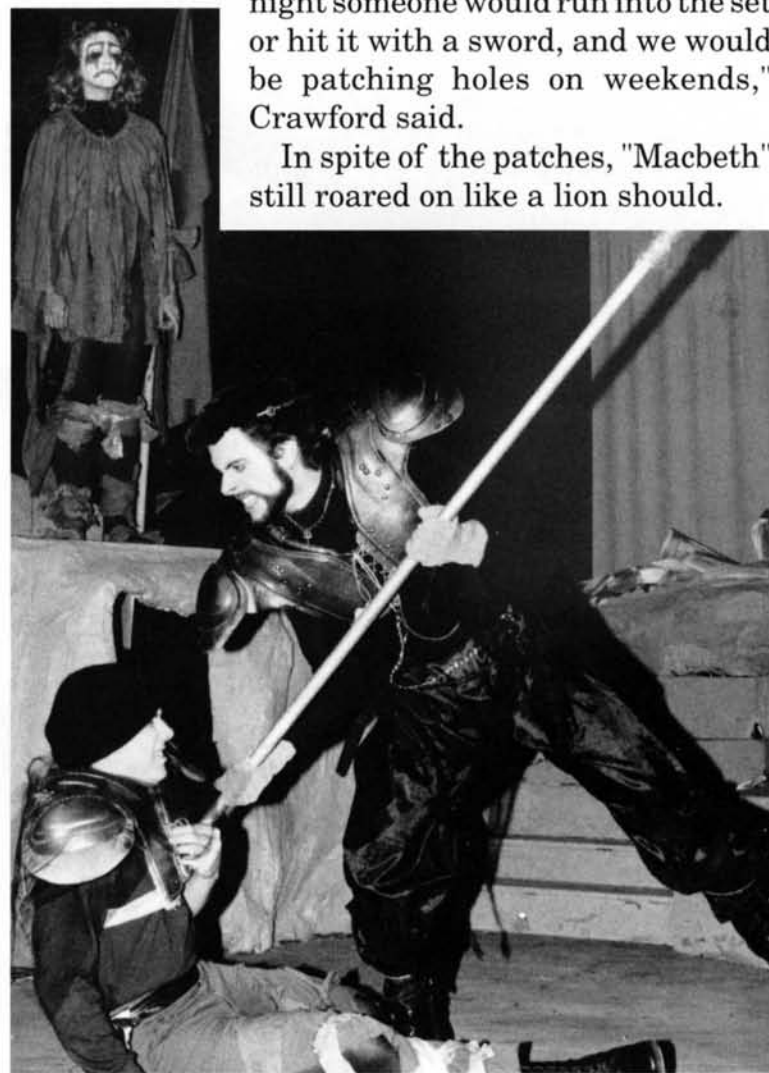
"It took many hours of research and countless weeks of designing to come up with a set that would work with a low budget. Most of the set was made from chicken wire and paper maché. Almost every

"I needed that character to be big. I knew Karen could do the job well," said Blomquist about the role of the Ghost of Christmas Present.

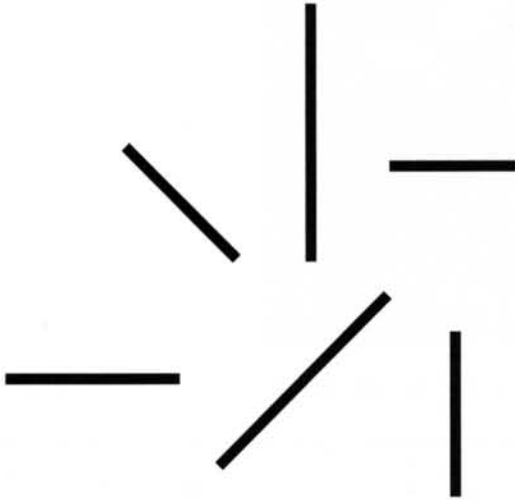

Goodbye to Campus Lab

The Minot State University administration surprisingly announced this year that the 60-year-old University Laboratory School would close its doors effective July 1, 1990. This "bombshell" was the direct result of the tax referral vote in December 1989.

The principal at the Campus Lab School, Joseph Wax, said, "The region has lost a valuable resource as this was the only school of its kind in the region. This closing will be a detriment to education in general."

He went on to say, "Research is vital for the foundation of any human endeavor. This resource has now vanished from MSU, the Minot area, the students and the teachers of this once fine institution."

Wax felt the students leaving the school will probably adjust better to their new school environment and philosophy than will the teachers leaving the Campus Lab School.

Joann Proctor, a MSU senior majoring in special education said, "The students will experience many problems adjusting to the more structured atmosphere of the public school."

At the Lab School, two hundred and fifty MSU students per quarter were provided the chance to observe teaching methods and other pre-professional experiences.

Negotiations for these required pre-professional experiences have been under way with the Minot Public School system. Wax reported good cooperation from both parties but said the students involved will suffer. This same sentiment was echoed by Campus Lab School counselor Russell Harth.

Four of the 13.5 tenured instructors will be absorbed as professors at Minot State University. However, the balance of the teachers face the grim task of relocating to a different school in a declining job market.

The building itself may be used for MSU classroom space, probably education and psychology. A building committee was appointed to decide the building's destiny.

Optimists hoped the Library/Media Center could be preserved. The center houses Apple computers, much software applicable to studies in education, and some 10,000 volumes of educational information.



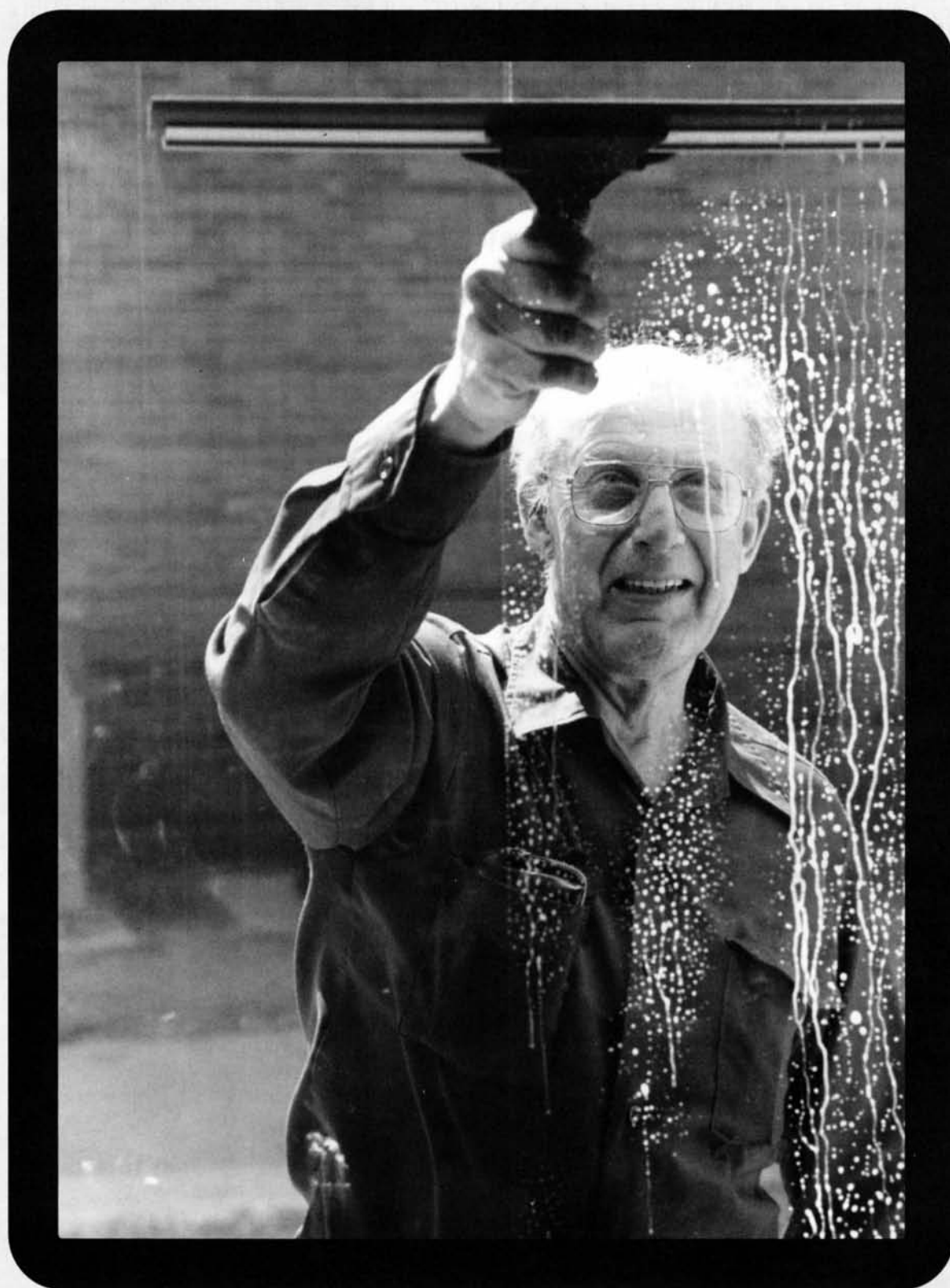

This year the return engagement of the Johnny Holm's Band started at 4 p.m. and featured hot-rockin', be-boppin', high-steppin' music.

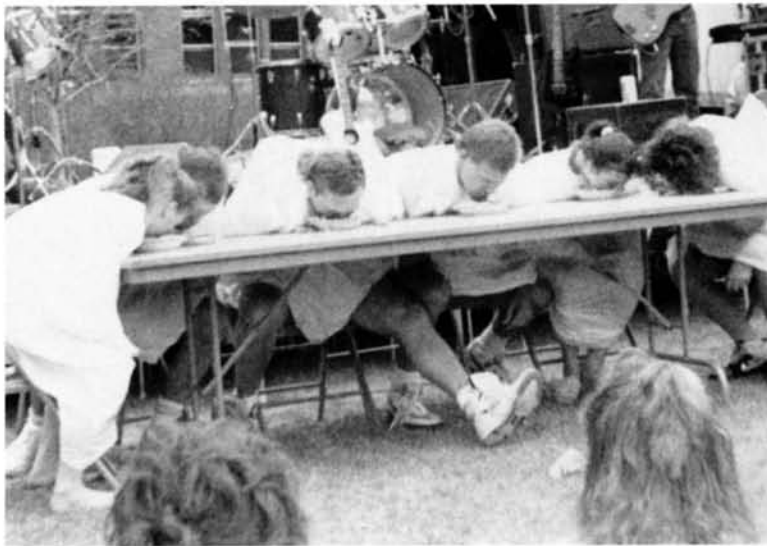
Students in the colorful garb of spring brought blankets to lay on the grass in front of the campus fountain and chatted with their friends while they watched the festivities.

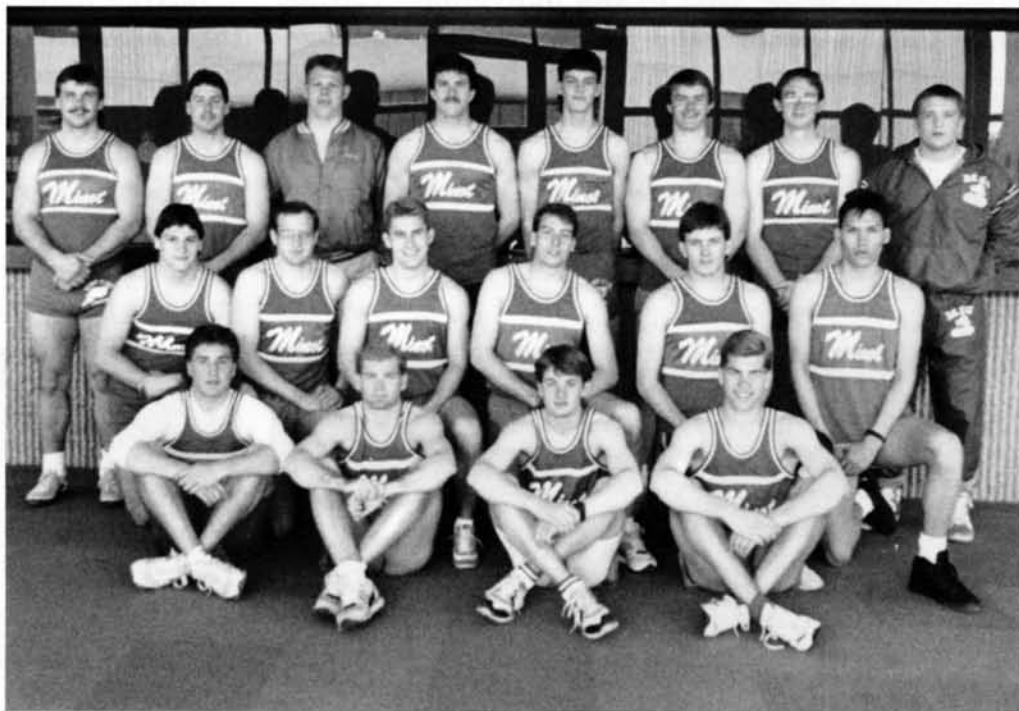

"This year's team had a lot of depth with at least three players of comparable skills. That helped us in the long run," said Galgerud.

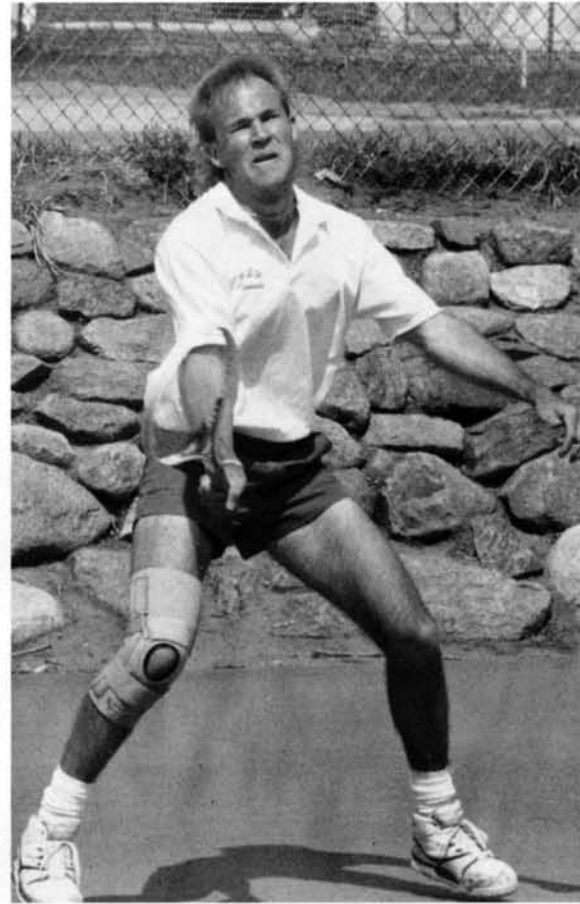
"I expected a lot from Aaron Garmon and Stuart Duke this year," he said. "They both had previous experience and are tough players."

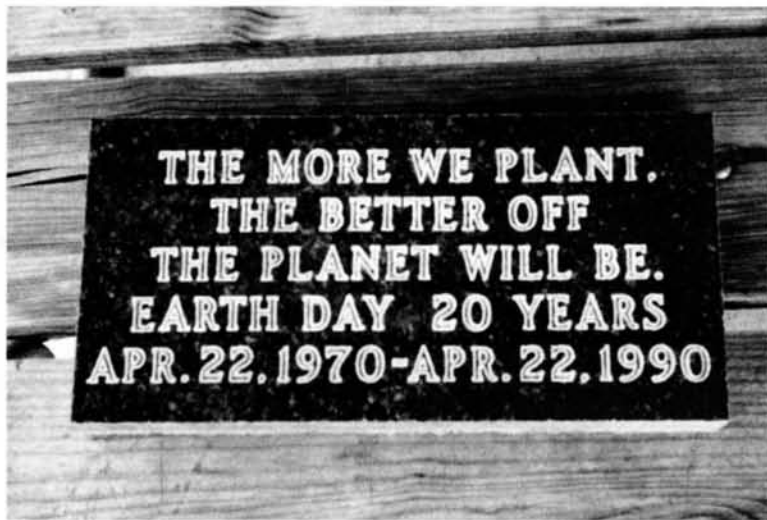

"North Dakota is the cleanest state in the U.S. and has the second cleanest air (after Alaska)," said Oja.

Presently, aluminum is the only item recycled in the Minot area. Oja would like to see a paper and plastic recycling program started at MSU.

The Student Association gave Oja funds to print flyers explaining some of our environmental problems. Several instructors, including DeWayne Martin and Everett Ballmann, distributed the flyers to their classes. Three Minot area churches also placed announcements in their bulletins asking people in the congregation to participate in the day's events.

Laurie Escott, a MSU junior from Indian Head, Saskatchewan, was present at the park. She said the forestry farm next to her home provides several million trees a year for soil conservation. "Canada is a little bit ahead of the United States in the study of environmental problems," said Escott.

Super Stores in Canada promote "green products" that are biodegradable. "You can be fined \$500 for letting a tissue blow out the window of your car in Canada," she said.

More than one-half of Canada is wilderness; this tends to make them more aware of the environment and what can be done to protect it.

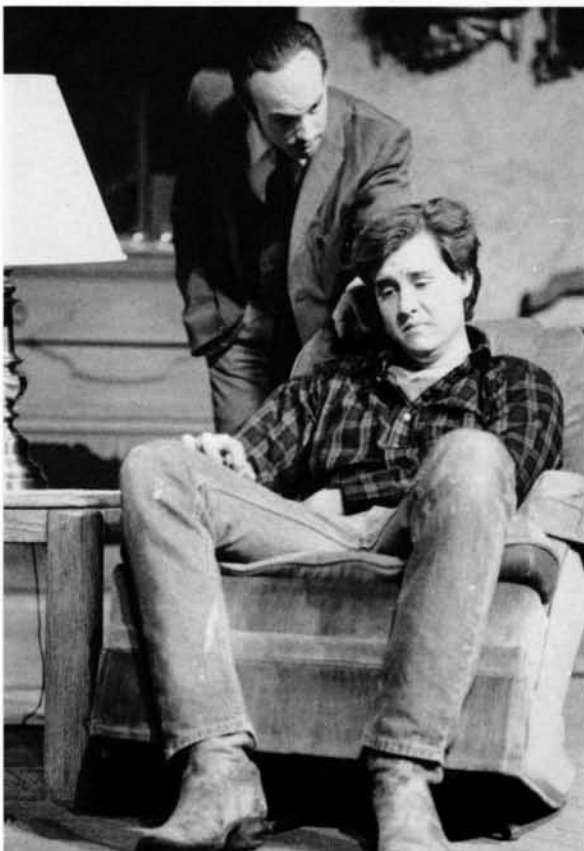

On April 23, 1990, the newly remodeled Snack Bar in the Student Union's lower level officially reopened with fanfare and a ribbon-cutting ceremony.

Students found a snack bar and beauty shop with the sleek look of a modern shopping mall, complete with a fountain and a designated smoking area.

However, completion of the project left the noise level higher than it was in the old version. The biggest contributor to the increase in noise was the fountain located in the center of the snack bar. In no time at all, complaints were heard and the SU staff took action by shutting off the fountain. Students responded with loud cheers each time this happened.

Richard Jenkins, vice president for student affairs, explained that since Minot doesn't have many fountains no one was aware how loud it would be. "We are trying to find an agreeable solution," he said. The installation of smaller water jets in the fountain will hopefully solve the problem. The upholstered chairs that failed to arrive in time for the opening should also help absorb some of the noise.

The first floor of the building, excluding the bookstore, was closed down Dec. 22 and construction work-

ers moved in to begin the process of change. The first crew had to have the walls knocked down by Jan. 2, so the second group could come in and re-do everything. Throughout the next few months, students anxiously awaited the project's completion. Progress was monitored in the school newspaper, and the current status was recorded on a thermometer-type graph. Reports filtered back that there would be a delay in the opening and students wondered if work would ever be finished. The project was scheduled to be completed on April 1.

One of the reasons for remodeling was the battle between smokers and non-smokers. Many students were concerned about the smoke level and how it would affect their health. The remodeling included a ventilation system to eliminate this problem.

According to Jim Froeber, Student Union director, total cost of the remodeling was \$329,000. The heating and ventilation system cost \$100,000 of that amount. "The new ventilation system seems to work well," he said. "It is confining the smoke to the smokers' area."

In spite of the bugs in the system, the new atmosphere provided by the project greatly enhanced student social gatherings.

KMSU operates on a carrier-current radio frequency; that is, the signal is carried through the electrical system across campus to all the dormitories, the Student Union, and the administration buildings. Students can hear KMSU by tuning a plugged-in radio to 790 AM.

A one-credit leisure-time class, broadcast activities, also came into being. It taught students from any field of study the inner workings of the radio station. Students learned everything from selling advertising to producing commercials and public service announcements to doing on-air shows as disc jockeys.

John Vigested, adviser and instructor in the broadcasting department, said he was pleasantly surprised with the interest shown by the students. Enthusiasm abounded from the first quarter as the students explored the technical side of a radio station. "Before we started, I thought we might have a problem filling all the DJ slots. Instead, we had to expand the hours we

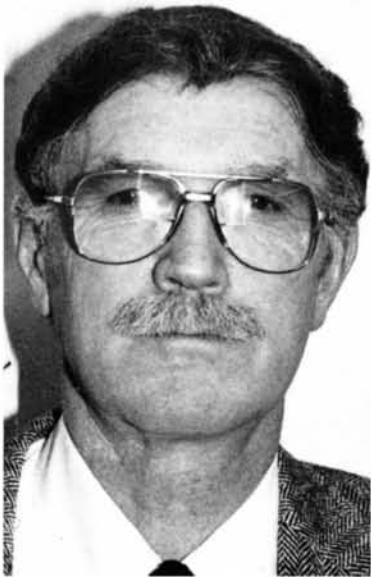
Literature on the homeless was placed at various places on campus and raffle tickets were also sold to raise money for the cause.

The Student Association reported a good turn-out to all of the events, and they hoped their efforts were successful in raising awareness about this problem.

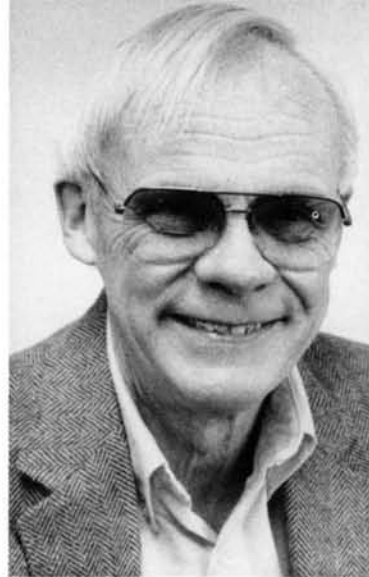
MSU says goodbye to retiring professors



Anative of the Minot area, Dr. Lyle Fogel, professor of economics, joined the Minot State University faculty in 1968. He was the chair of the Division of Social Science from 1975 to 1984. During that time, programs in social work and criminal justice were developed, and he was responsible for establishing one of the three North Dakota Centers for Economics at MSU.



Dr. Robert Lipe, professor of biology, came to Minot State University in 1967. Lipe taught anatomy and physiology at MSU, served as chair of the Division of Allied Health Professions, and participated in computer workshops across the campus. His publications include a laboratory manual for anatomy and physiology, and a workbook for microbiology.



Dr. Jerold Sundet, professor of music, came to the Minot State University campus in 1966. He was awarded a study grant in England at the University of Sussex in private study with Leon Goosens and Lady Evelyn Rothwell Barbirolli. Sundet taught double reeds and music history at MSU and served as conductor of the Minot Symphony Orchestra for 15 years.



Tom Turner, associate professor of communication arts, has taught at Minot State University since 1965. He developed the MSU summer theater program and conceived and planned the current amphitheater. Turner created the historical display of MSU theater in Hartnett Hall. He also wrote an original full-length play, "They Died With Their Hats On," produced in 1986.

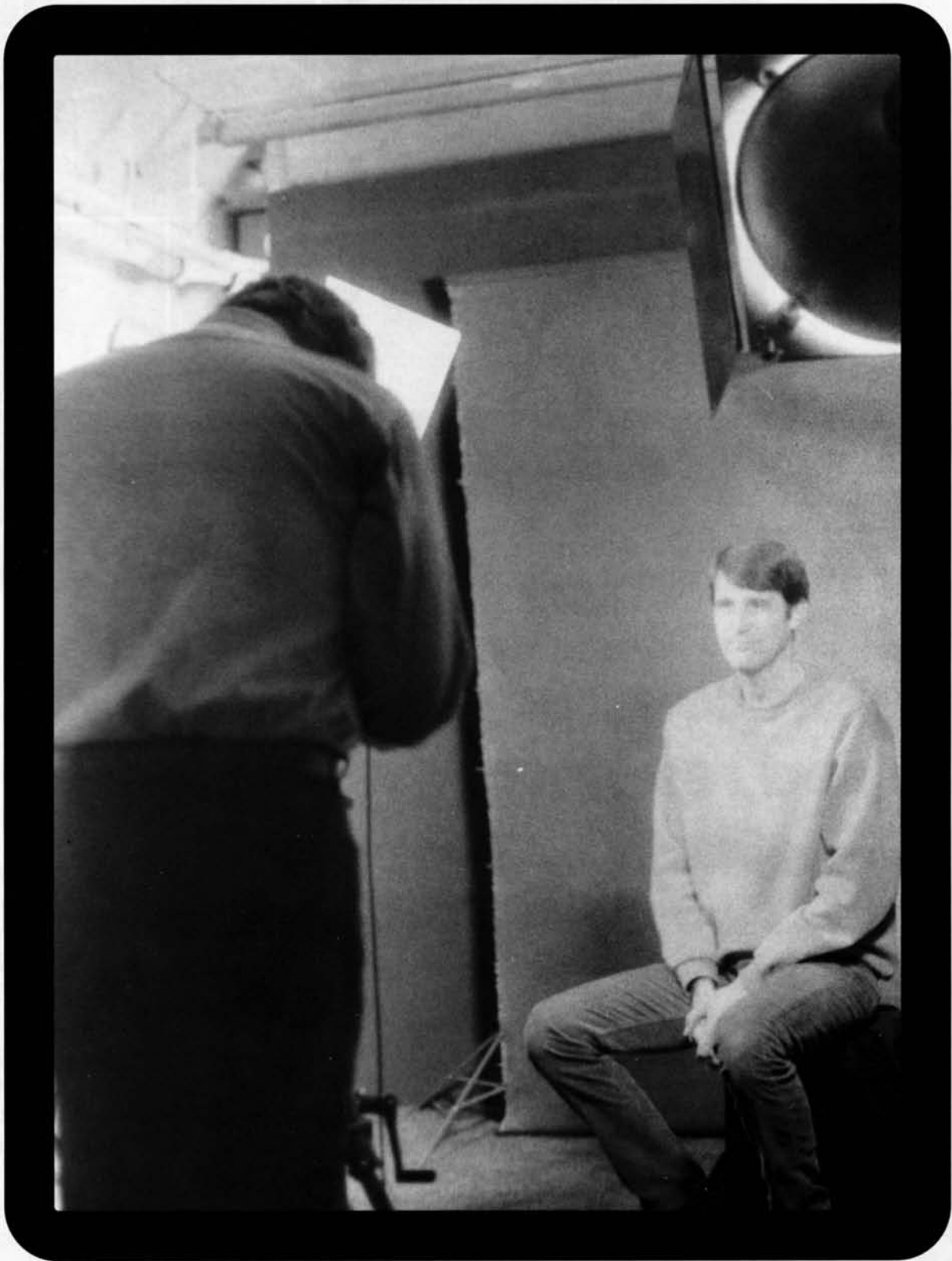

Pre-registration comes to MSU with mixed results

Pre-registration appears to be the wave of the future at Minot State University.

Pre-registration began during winter quarter 1988 in an attempt to benefit students.

"There is a flexibility provided with ongoing registration," Registrar Bill Edwards explained. "Adjustment can take place because it is hard to predict the demand for classes."

This winter quarter, students had the opportunity to pay early. They paid when they registered or they sent in their fees, using a self-addressed envelope provided to them, Edwards said.

Edwards predicted that a third of the students would choose to pay their fees early. Those students receiving financial aid had to wait until the first day of registration because federal regulations did not make aid available until the first day.

Edwards likes pre-registration and figures that

once semesters are in place it will be easier because there will be one less registration period to go through.

Financial aid has been blamed for creating long lines during pre-registration, but Dale Gehring, the student financial aids director, feels that financial aid was not the problem.

He said problems occurred when students did not fill out their applications correctly. Mistakes caused the application to be rejected by the state's central processing office. "Students have a responsibility for checking to make sure that everything is correct," Gehring said.

Federal regulations do not allow financial aid to be given out until it is ensured that the student is enrolled and is making satisfactory progress. "Fall has always been a problem for students," Gehring said, "Winter and spring are not much of a problem because everything is in place."

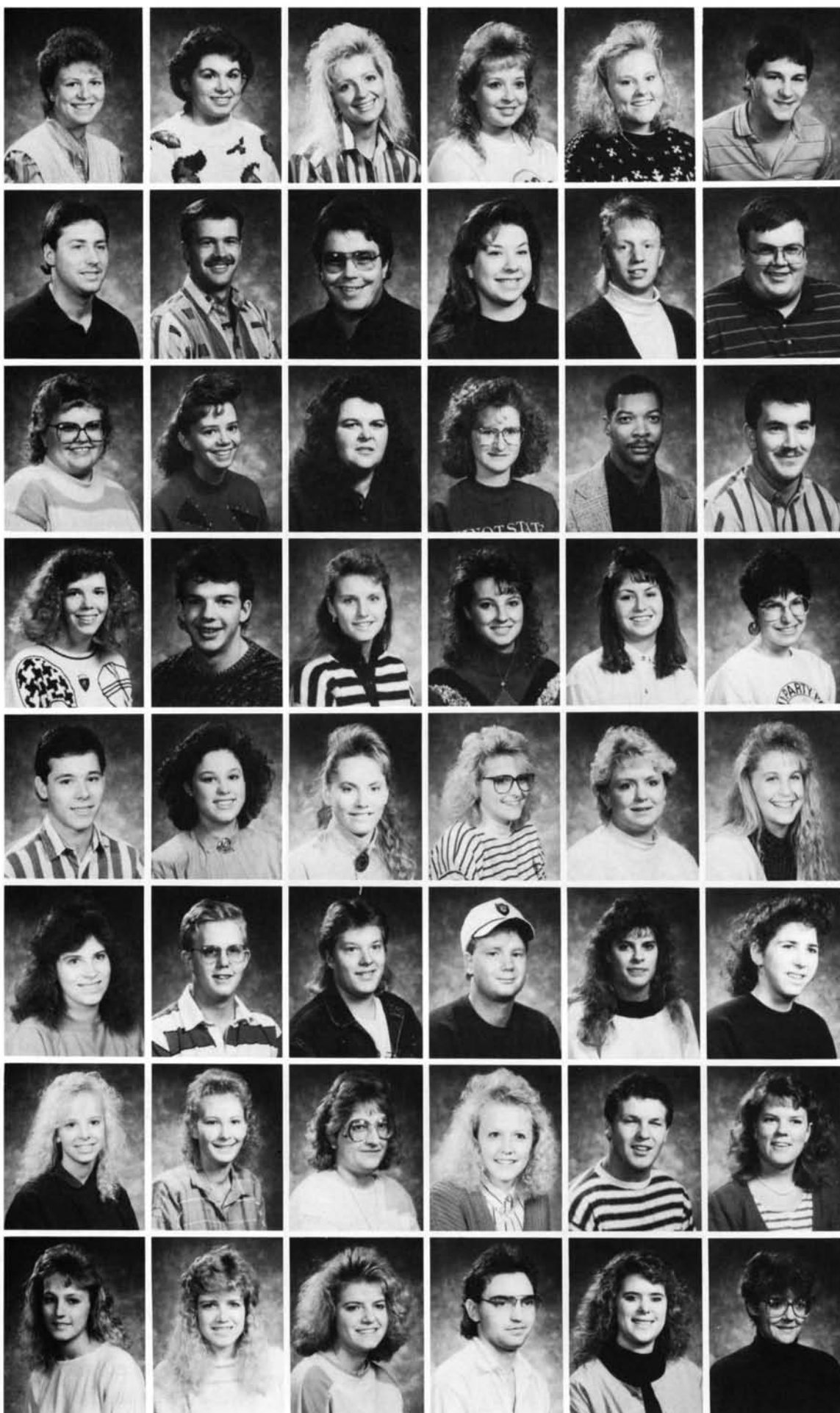

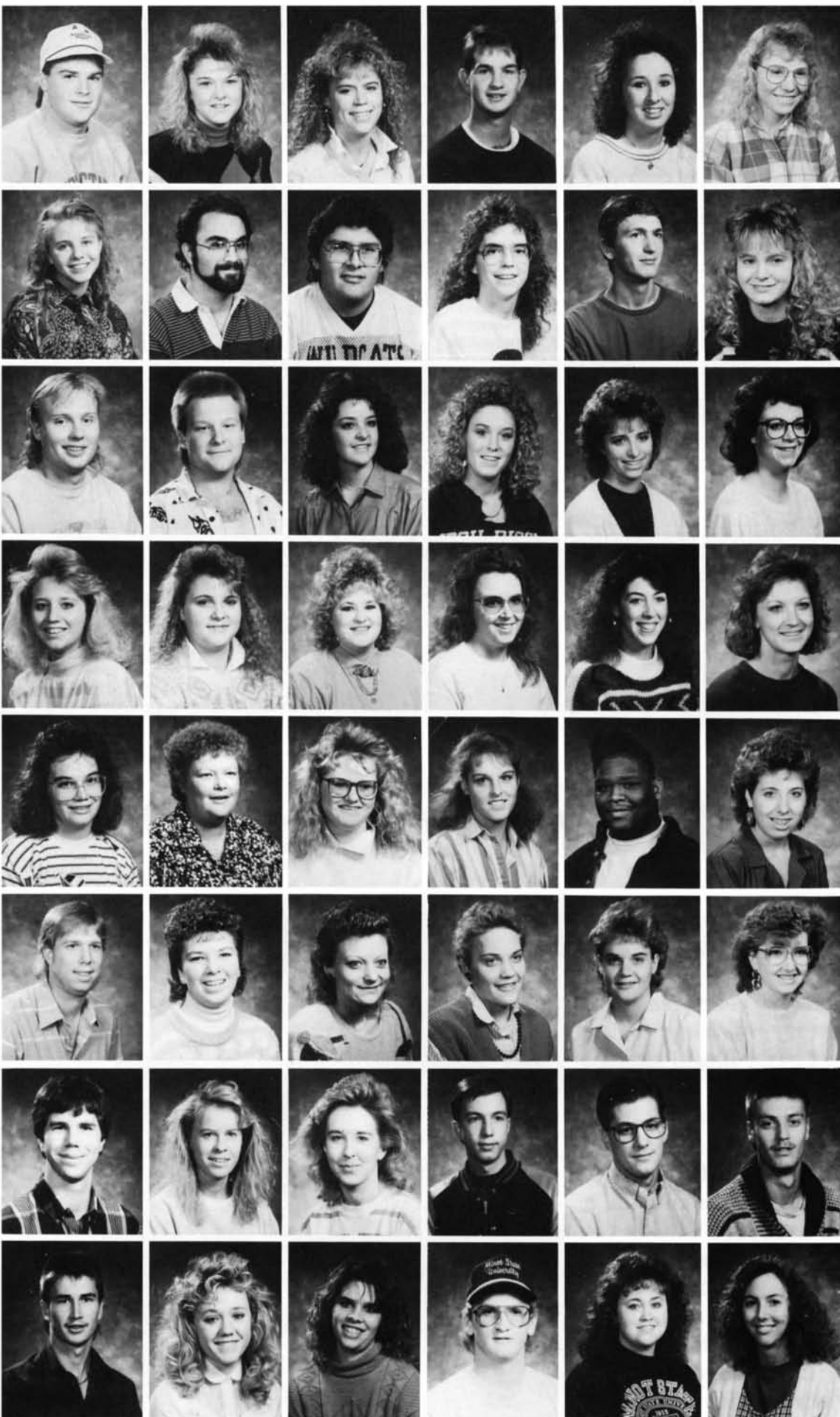

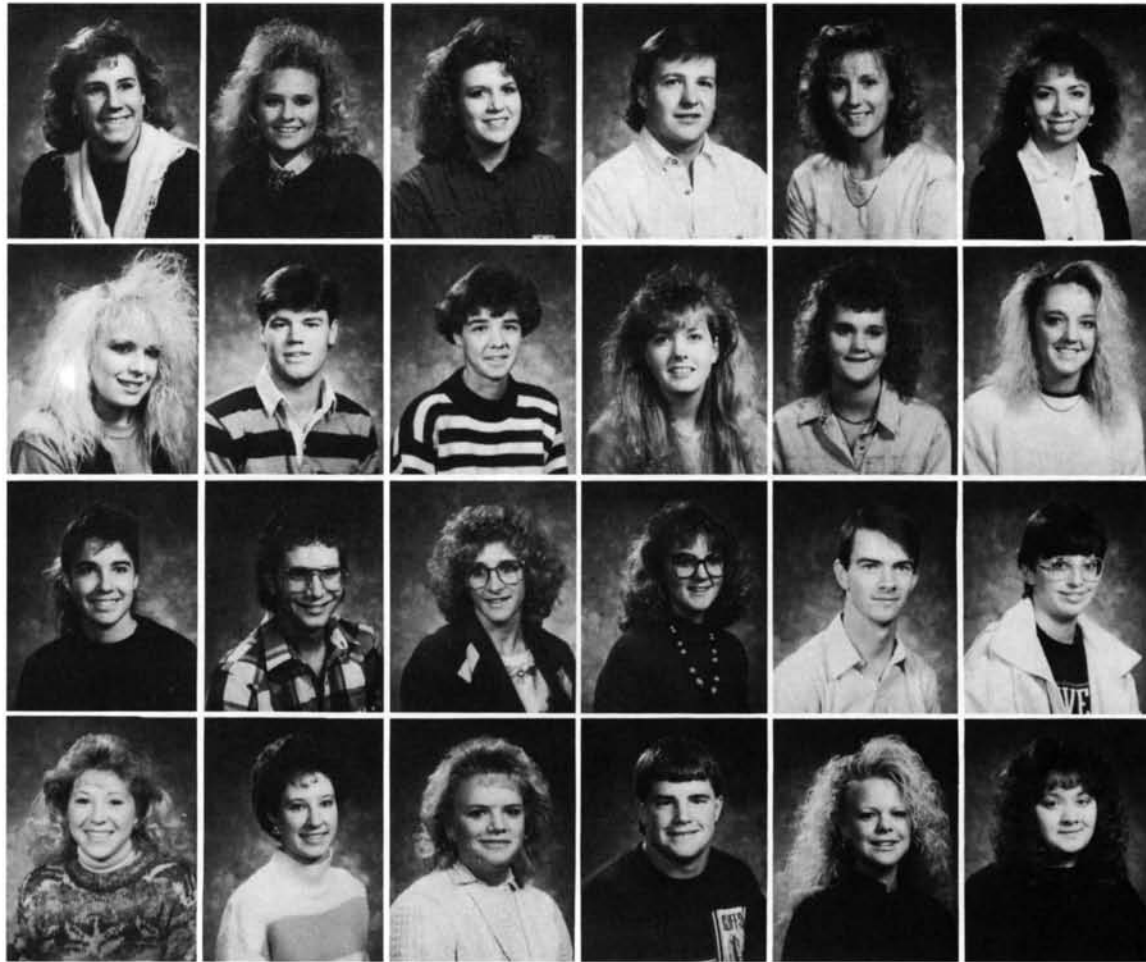

Having a problem parking???

Minot State University got tough with parking violators this year.

"It was the first change in about 20 years," said Bill Edwards, the school's registrar, referring to the increase in the fine from \$2 to \$10 for illegal student parking.

Also changed Jan.1 was the stipulation that if not paid within seven calendar days, the fine would automatically increase to \$20 without benefit of appeal.

In addition, the fine for illegally parking in a handicapped space was raised to \$100.

"The fines were raised because there are about a hundred people who chronically violate the parking regulations, get 30-40 tickets a quarter, and don't mind paying \$160 a quarter for parking," he said. Not only was the low fine not acting as a deterrent, but the accounting office was unduly burdened with keeping track of these unpaid violations, he added.

There are 2,500 parking spaces on campus with

about 2,000 students attempting to park each day. There are around 500 empty each day, Edwards said. "I've never seen the campus full," he said.

About \$15,000 is raised from permits and about \$20,000 from fines.

"Out of that money comes our expenses for chip seal, snow removal, sand and salt," he said. "To put a good seal on our campus runs from \$20,000 to \$30,000. Every time we have a major snow storm, we hire a contractor for around \$1,000.

One problem area for parking is the southeast portion of campus, where there are 575 dorm beds and about the same number of cars. Cook Hall, with 183 freshman girls, is where the shortage arises, he said.

"I don't like to see dorm girls having to walk long distances to their cars," he said. "We lost some parking when Hartnett Hall was built. We may gain some

parking next year when Campus School is closed.

There are a lot of complaints, and not enough good ideas," said Edwards about his job as parking administrator.

One suggestion was to buy the cemetery, but it isn't practical to move graves, he said. Another idea was to build a high-rise parking ramp. That idea, said Edwards, would cost \$10,000 per space. Students would have to pay \$1,000 per year for a spot.

"I would like not to give tickets," he said, "but there would be too much chaos without some type of control. Towing is also a last resort item for us, and it costs the student \$30-\$50 to retrieve his car."

"Parking is the most overrated issue on campus," said Nick Chase, MSU Student Association president. "There are spaces for those who look. Most just don't want to walk. They would have to walk longer on most other campuses."

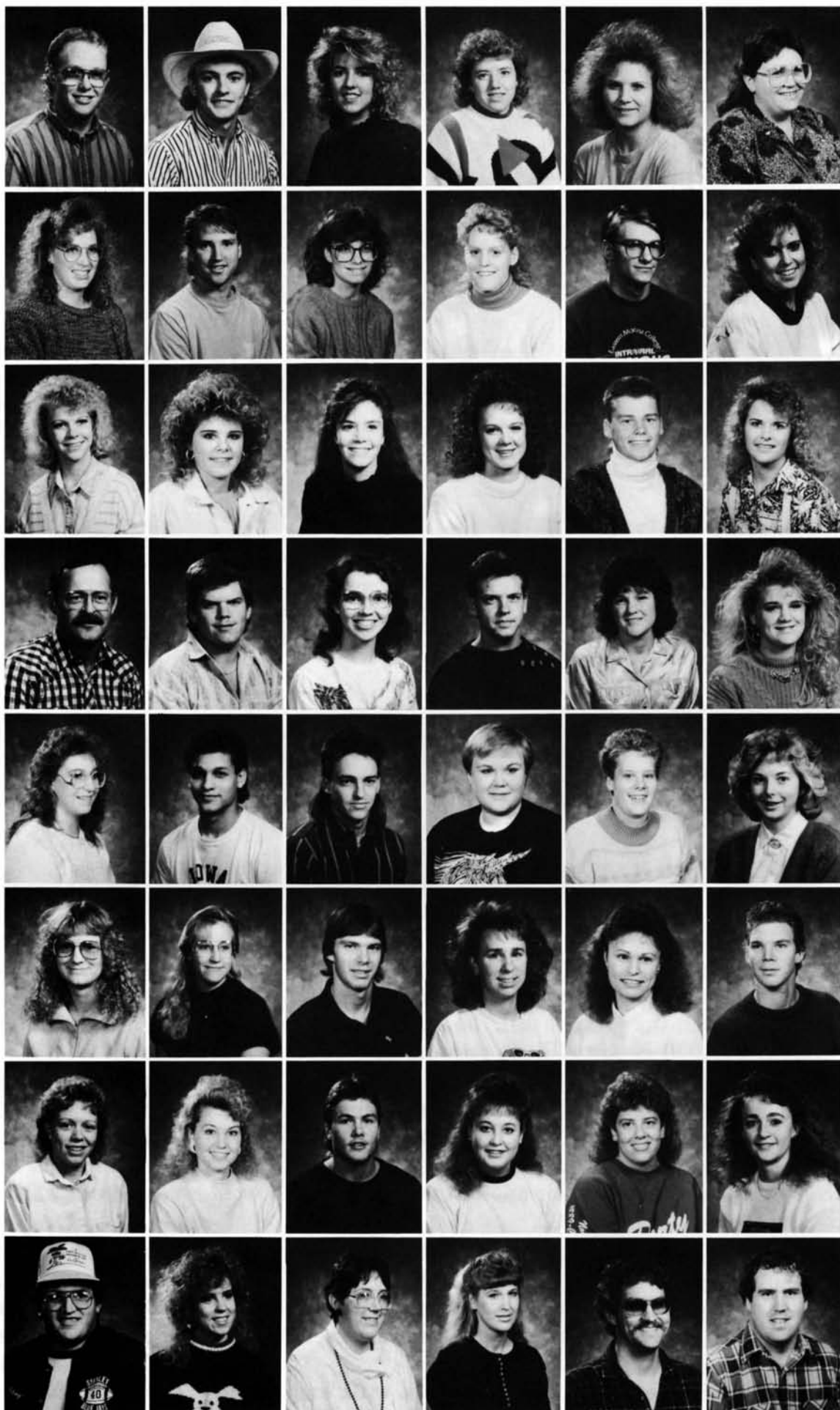

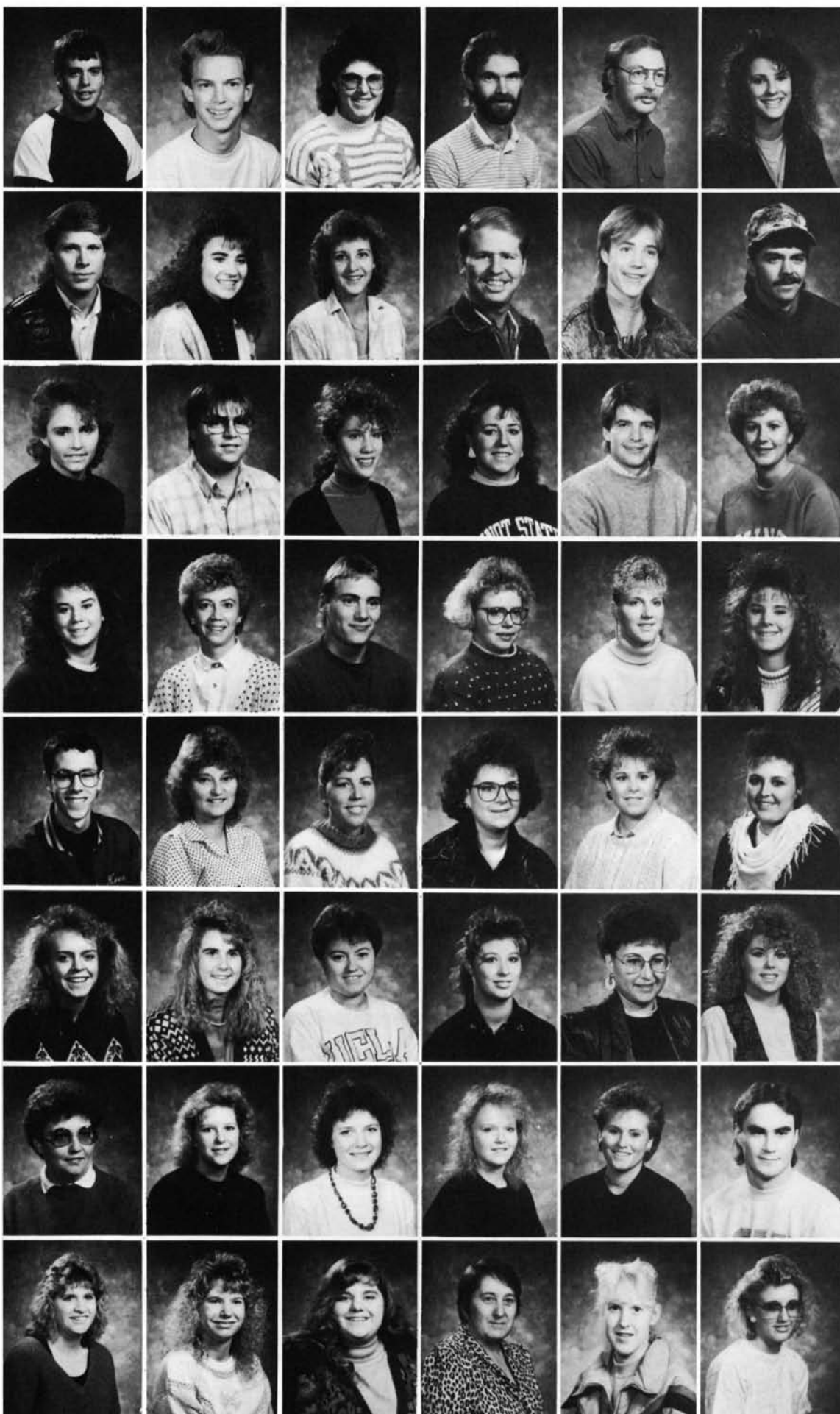

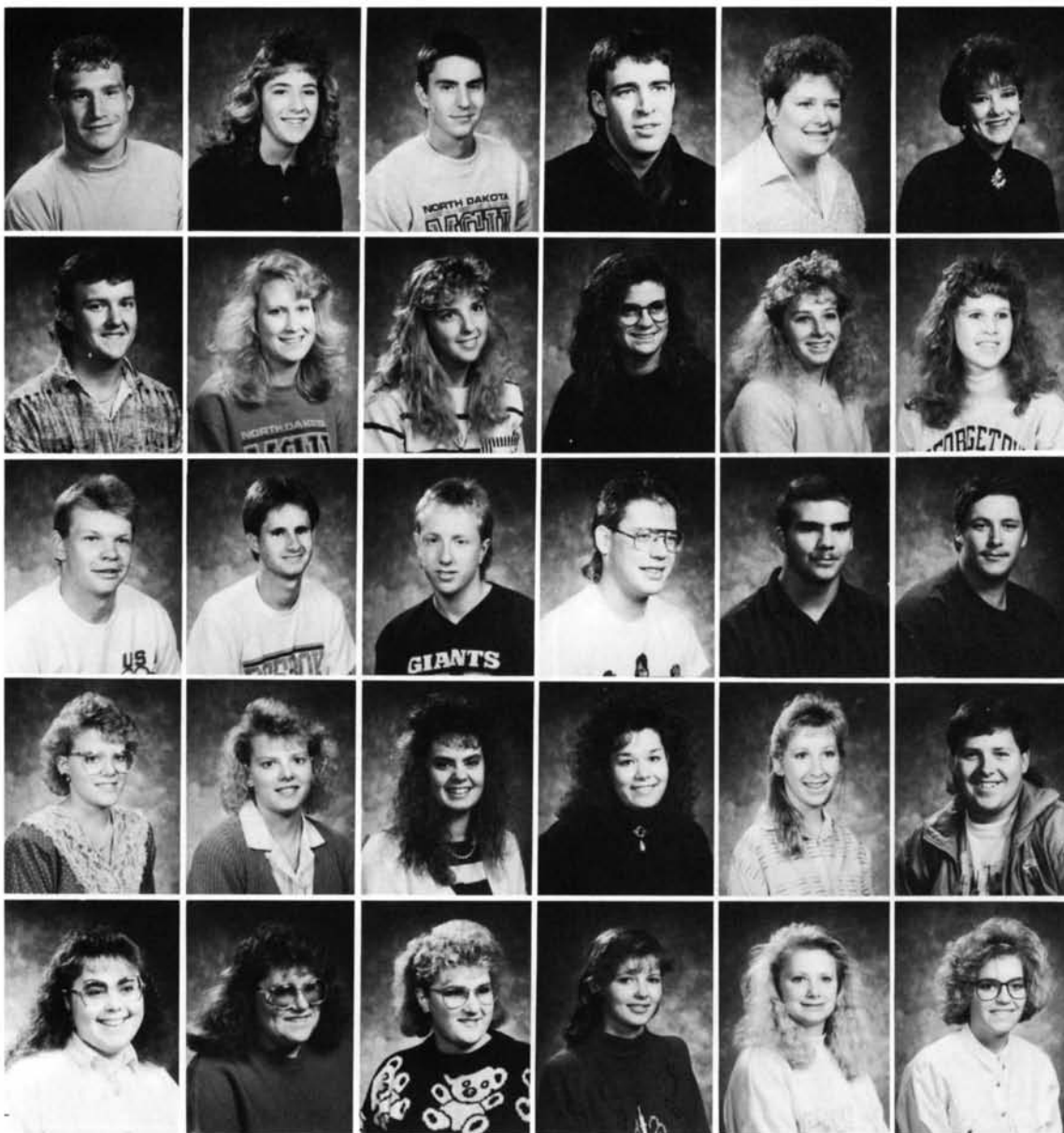


Memorial Library

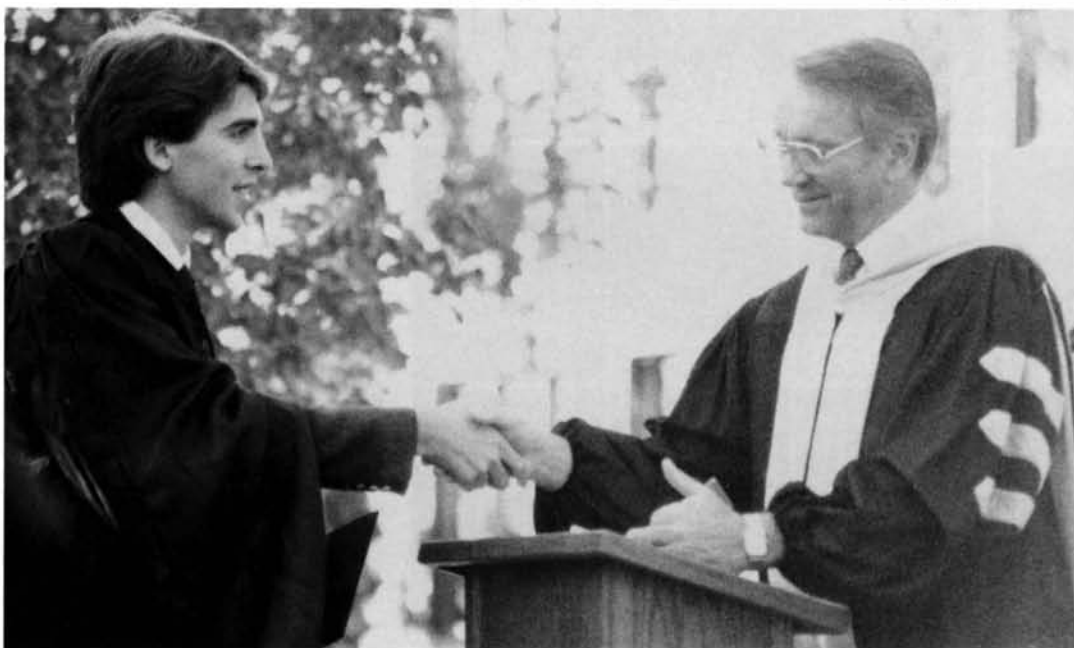

James Croonquist, Honors Program director and dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, presided over the event held on the steps of Old Main. Gordon B. Olson, president of MSU, welcomed those present.

The program recognizes student achievements and provides special academic opportunities for highly motivated students. It strives to challenge them to the maximum of their abilities and to assist them in reaching beyond traditional academic boundaries. Each student in the program pursues a course of study in conjunction with a major or minor.

Croonquist said that the scholarly study in the Honors Program will hold true to the traditions of MSU and to those so highly valued by the citizens of North Dakota. He compared the installation of the program

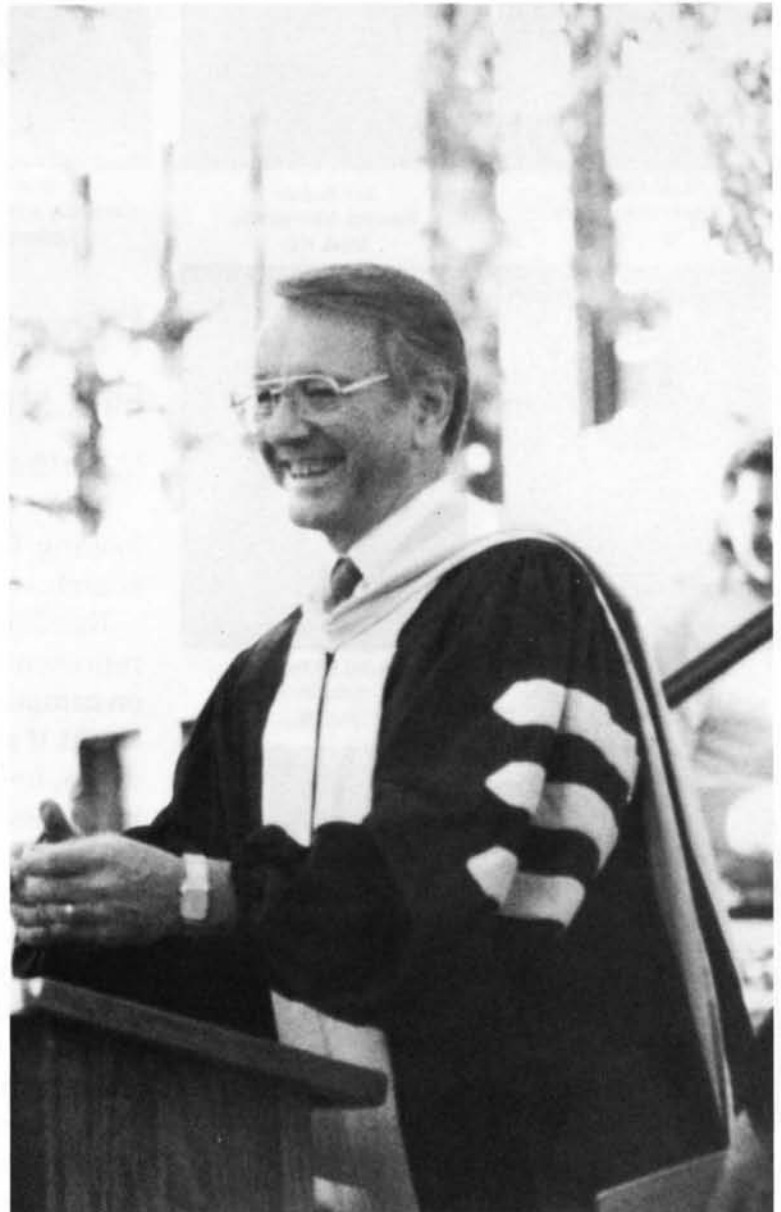

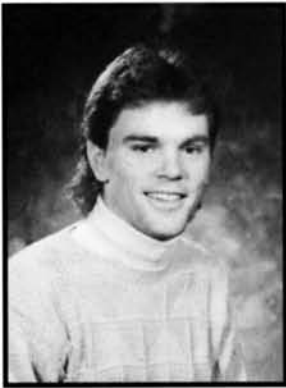
Wharton compared the students to Ulysses, always in search of adventure, and to Columbus, always in search of new worlds. "You are our state's newest explorers and pioneers," he said.

Governor George Sinner speaks to the MSU honors students at the inauguration.

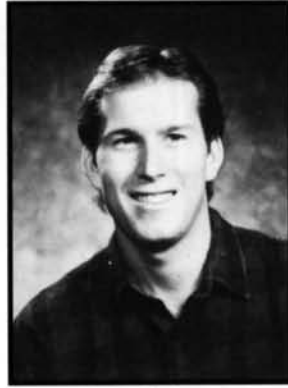

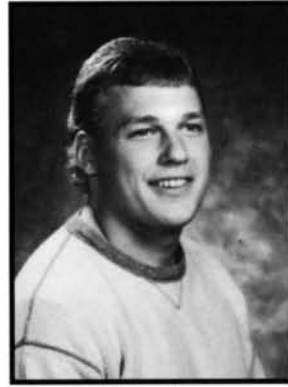

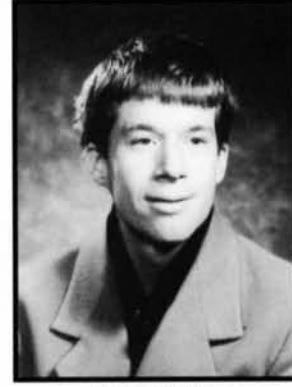

First step on the road to the future

Many students turn to the Placement Office when they are looking for part-time work or are beginning their career job search.

Ron Rogelstad, director of the Placement Office, is a full-time representative of Job Service North Dakota but works full time on campus. This is an advantage for Job Service because they get credit if students find jobs. Rogelstad works directly with students, helping them find jobs, prepare resumes and prepare for interviewing.

Rogelstad said most of the placement is in part-time jobs, an estimated 300 to 400 a year. He said he can't estimate placement for graduates because so many don't keep in touch with the university.

Richard Jenkins, vice president for student affairs, also works part time in the Placement Office. Jenkins said career placement is all in the timing: "The best time to start looking ahead at your career is right when you start college. The more you know about your job options, the better suited you will be in your career."

The Placement Office also works as a credential service. When you apply for a job, they will send out a credential package that includes a data form, reference forms and a formal resume.

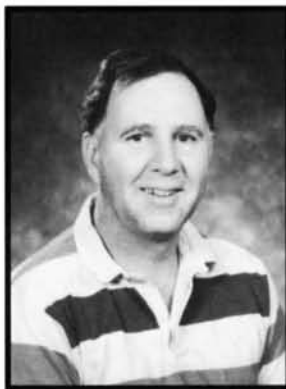

Graduate Program: growing, growing, growing

Currently, Minot State University, the University of North Dakota, Grand Forks, and North Dakota State University, Fargo, are the only state institutions of higher learning which offer graduate programs.

One goal that Carol Sue Butts, dean of the MSU Graduate School, has "is to see the graduate program go to the customer, to see MSU offer graduate courses off campus in such communities as Williston, Bismarck, and Devils Lake via the new technology."

This technology includes interactive television, satellites, computers and fax machines. Through this technology, the enrollment in the graduate program could grow, while still maintaining the high level of quality, Butts said.

MSU currently offers a masters of arts and teaching in mathematics and a masters of science in several fields, including audiology, education of the deaf, elementary education, learning disabilities, special education, speech language pathology and criminal justice.

The Weekend College has expanded graduate offerings to a non-traditional time period so that more students have the opportunity to attend. Educators

can take advantage of the graduate program during the summer months when they are free from school. There are approximately 300 students currently enrolled in the Graduate School, according to Butts.

Julie Caranicas, a graduate student enrolled in the learning disability program, said: "After I graduated with my bachelor's degree in the summer of 1989, I decided to go directly into the graduate program to learn more about the different problems that children have with learning disabilities. I got to understand the children better which will help me in the classroom."

Butts added that there is a graduate school advisory board made up of one student from each of the graduate programs. She meets with them periodically to consider problems or requests that they may have.

One such request this year was that social science and business degrees be added to the master of arts and teaching program. Butts said that request may be hard to fill. "Because of the economic strains in North Dakota, there could be difficulties in starting new programs," she said.

Butts has been the dean of the graduate program since 1986.

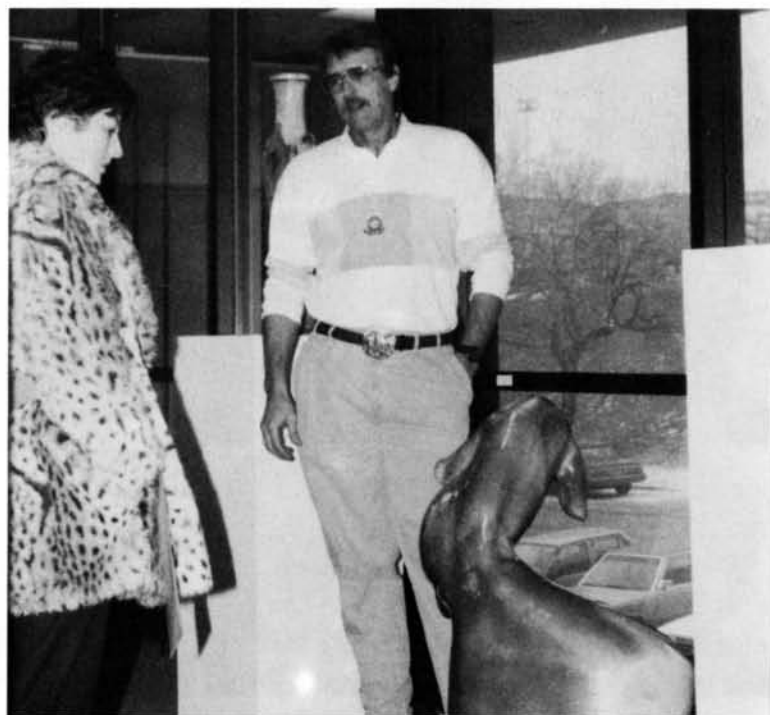
Faculty exhibit works at art show

been handicapped accessible.

Schwieger, who teaches drawing, print making and art education, showed some mixed media pieces that deal with the animal rights theme.

A sign on his work read, "... with sorrow

for all the gentle who have been harmed and/or killed in the name of national defense and vanity. . ."

One artist who caught the attention of both males and females was potter Thomas Willis, who had been on sabbatical for two quarters this year. He presented pieces from his master of fine arts degree work.

One of his works shows a naked female figure on top of a large egg. It is called "I Love My Egg."

"The woman's psyche is to procreate," he said. "This mystery called woman is revealed in the shape of their bodies. Their pelvic region is larger than a man's. Their lower torso is larger. The essence of woman is to carry and bear children. Women are more sexual, while for men it is more fleeting."

Willis received a master's degree at Fort Hayes State University, Hayes, Kansas, in 1969. He is an assistant professor of art at MSU; he teaches pottery, jewelry making, sculpture and crafts.

Humanities professor Floyd Fairweather showed four pieces at the show. "Welcome to a Street Called Obsession" was a 30-by-40 inch acrylic and ink drawing on Calvin Klein advertising paper. Said Fairweather, "I admire Calvin Klein because he does his own advertising, and his ads are good."

"Art should not be a great burden, but fun, creative, meaningful statements."

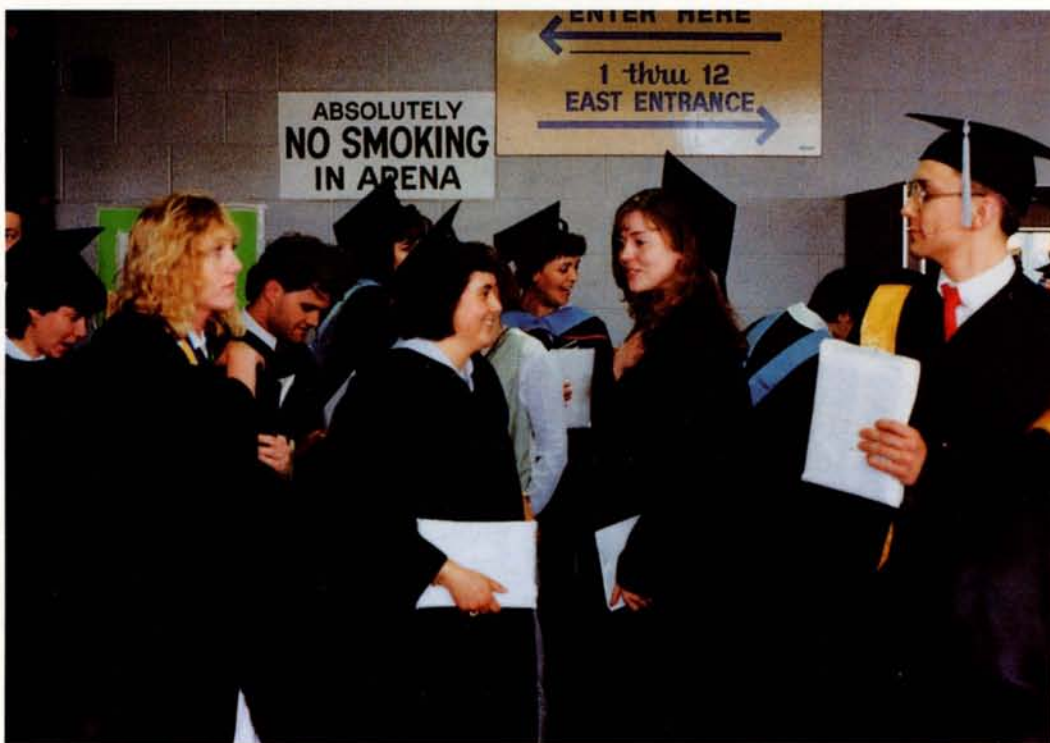

We finally made it: Graduation

"A proud heritage" and "with distinction" are phrases you hear frequently when the month of May nears its end and yet another graduation ceremony occurs. Minot State University proudly carried out its 77-year-old traditional rite of passage as it conferred degrees on 665 students. Master's degrees accounted for 64 of the degrees conferred at the commencement exercise.

Standard bearers and the largest class of graduates in MSU history proceeded into the Dome to music provided by the MSU Concert Band. Color was added to the starkness of the black gowns by the gold stoles of the undergraduate honor students. Gray gowns were worn by those receiving associate degrees.

Those attending the graduation ceremonies heard a commencement address given by North Dakota Vision 2000 Committee Chairman, William Marcil. He is president and publisher of the Forum and operates several other newspapers and printing operations in Minnesota. Marcil is active in North Dakota economic development efforts and is a past chairman of the North Dakota Chamber of Commerce. He is also a former chairman of the American Newspaper Publishers Association.

"North Dakota needs your talents," Marcil said. "We need your bright minds, we need your fresh ideas, and we need your optimism." He said the graduates can turn the state's economy around.

Marcil instructed the graduates to not leave their dreams behind as they walked out of the auditorium but to "take them with you. We simply cannot afford to sell this state short, folks, and you shouldn't sell yourselves short either."

Marcil expressed regret over the loss of the pioneer spirit that drew Teddy Roosevelt to the plains of North Dakota. He said the state is instead caught in a negative frame of mind that pits East vs. West and urban vs. rural. He then asked, "Will there ever be a North Dakota united?" and encouraged the graduating class to be the force that rekindles the competitive spirit in the state.

In closing, Marcil told the graduates, "Don't leave here with your cherished degree from Minot State University and wait for your ship to come in; build your own ship. Don't wait for others to create opportunities for you; create your own."

MSU President Gordon Olson awarded the C.P. Lura Award for Distinguished Service to Education to Bottineau Superintendent James Holwell, state Rep. Brynhild Haugland and U.S. Sen. Quentin Burdick, who was unable to attend. This award is the highest award bestowed by MSU. Olson also conferred the rank of professor emeritus on four retiring MSU professors. Those receiving this award included Lyle Fogel, Robert Lipe, Jerold Sundet, and Tom Turner. Donald Wharton, presented the Burlington Northern Foundation Faculty Achievement Award to MSU professors David Gresham and Ron Royer.

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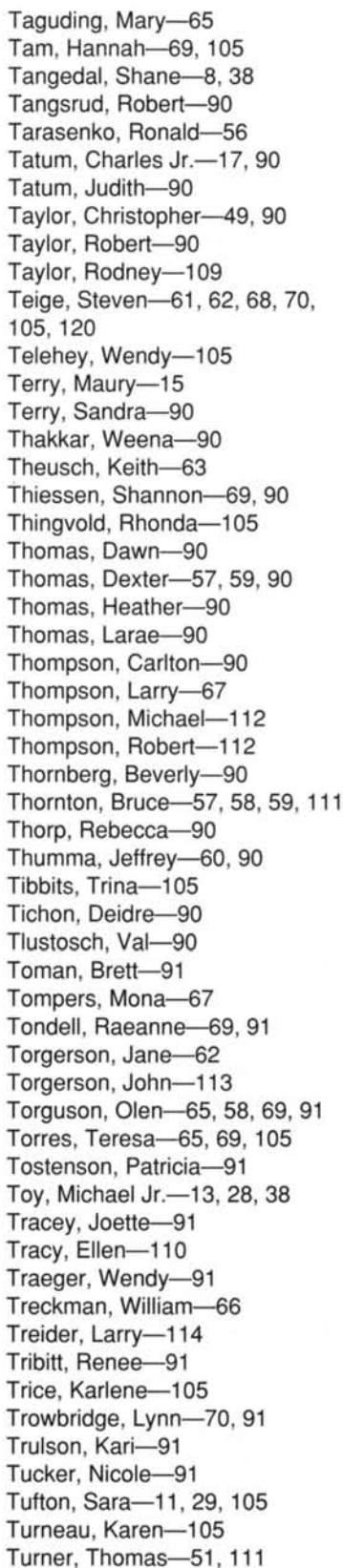
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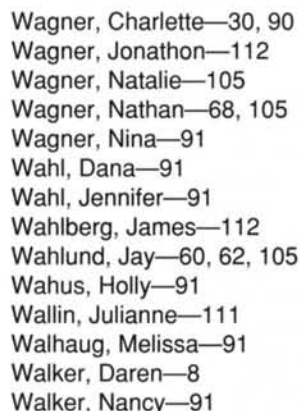
