This year the Spanish Club went to Mexico during Spring Break.

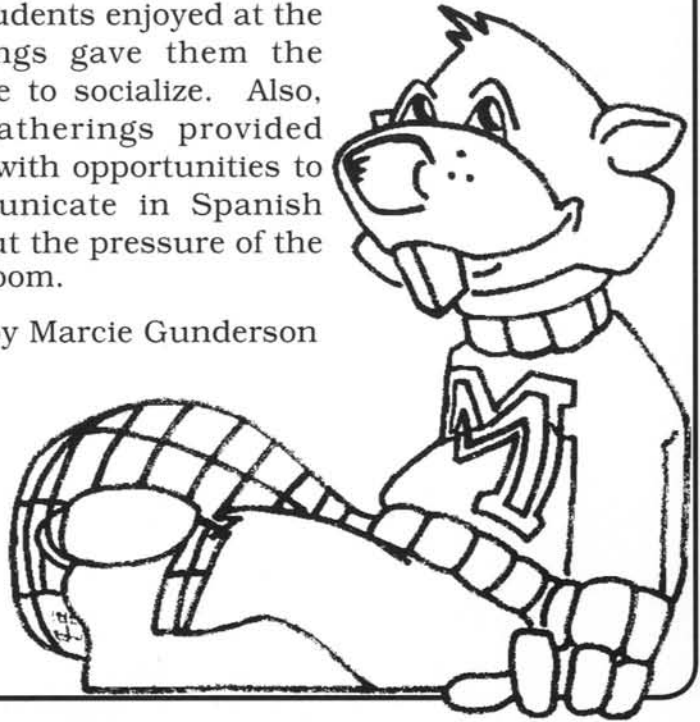
The club also helped out in the community. They worked with the Domestic Violence Crisis Center and the Department of Human Services, providing translations when needed.

Gresham and Emilia Chuquin were the advisers for the Spanish Club.

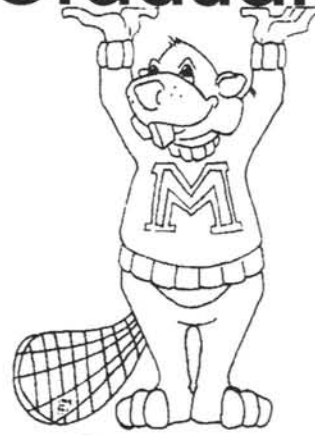

to America. Not much has changed since then.

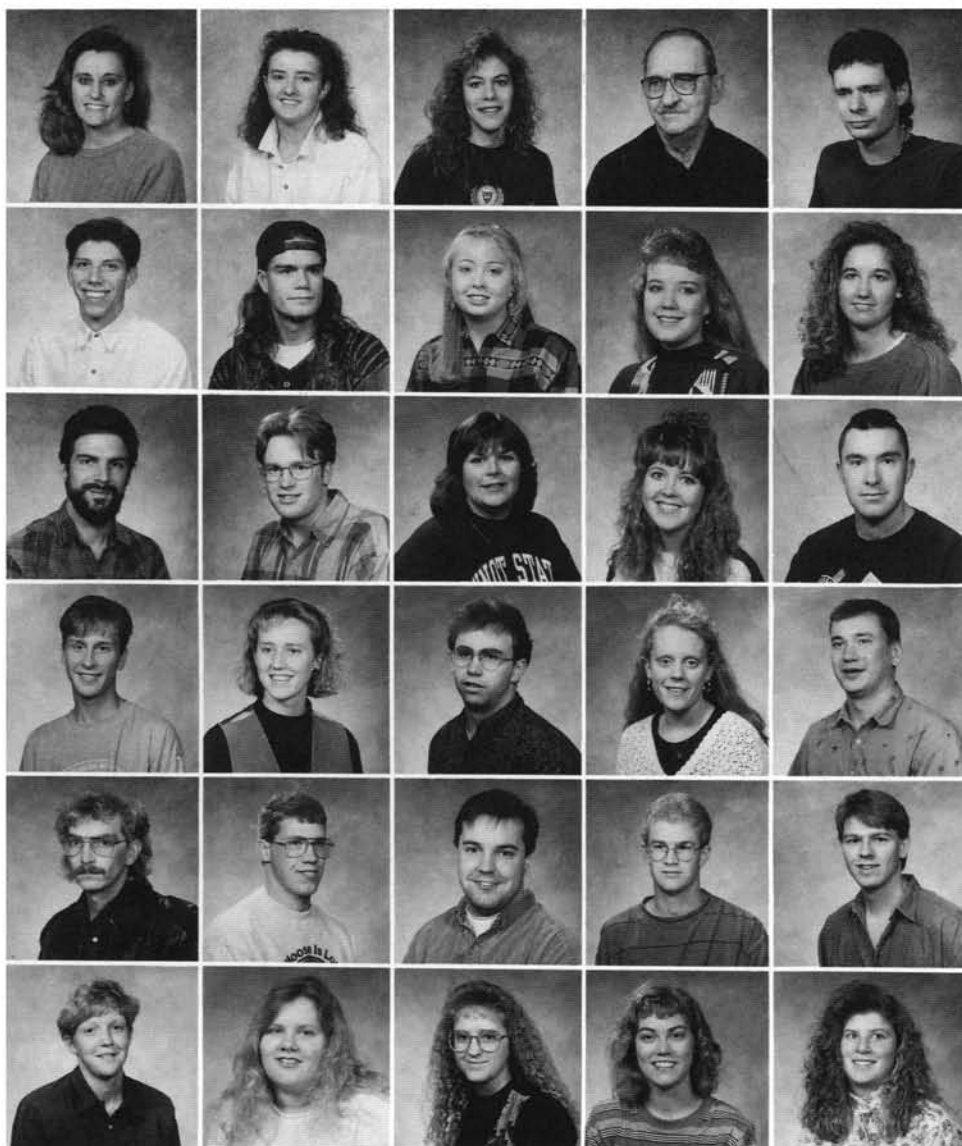

Art Club



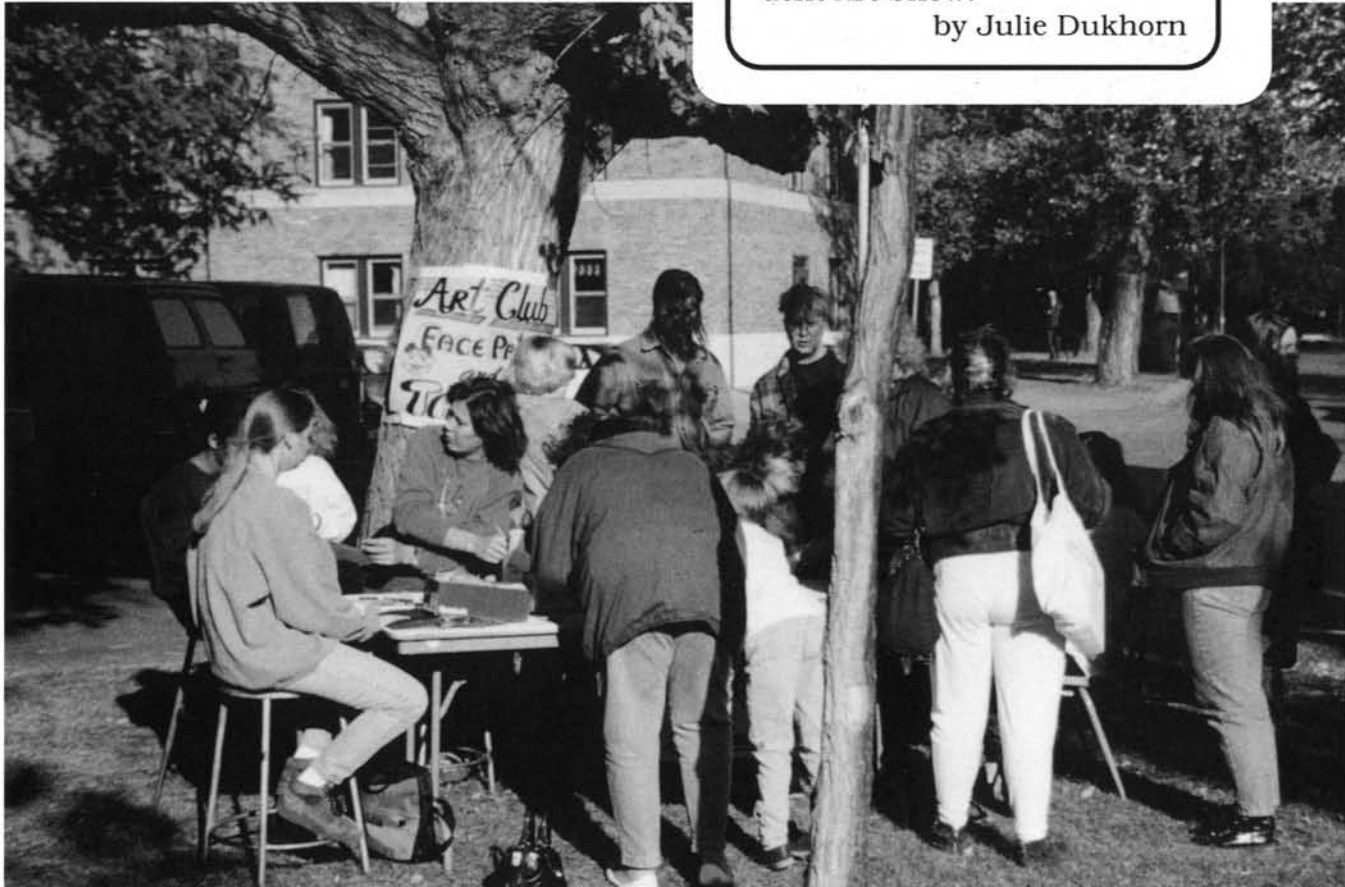

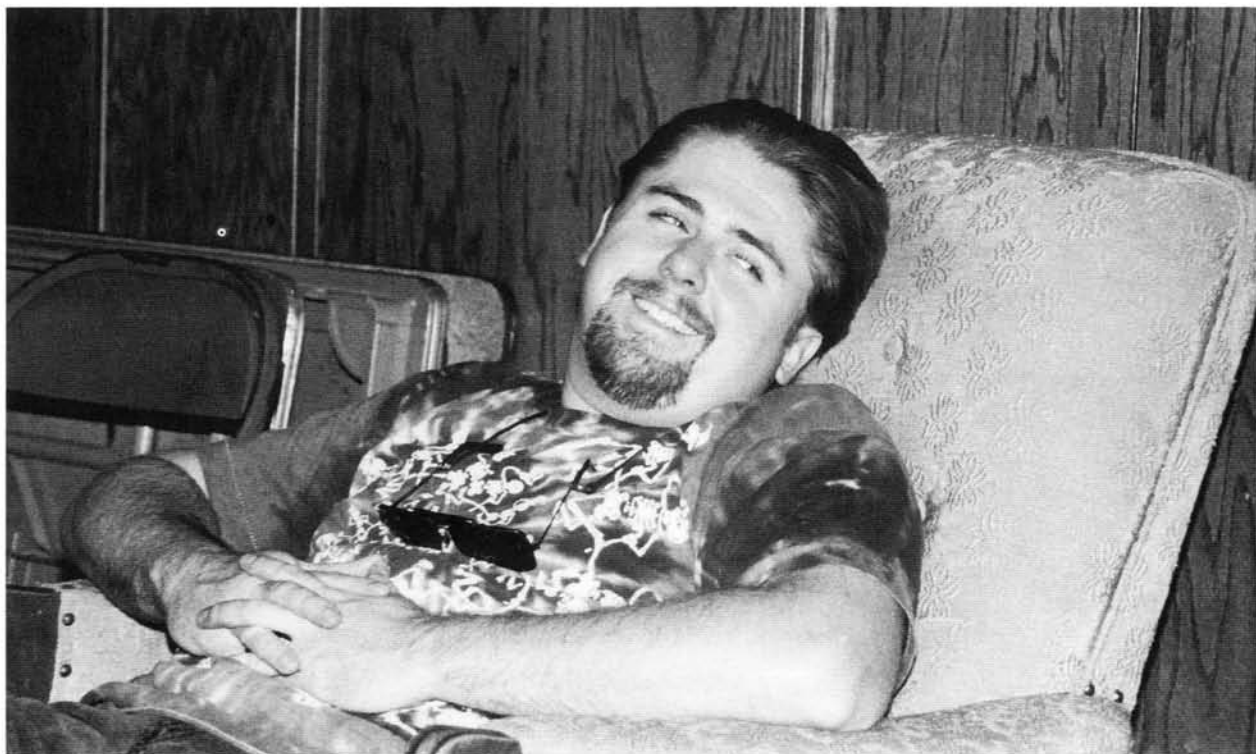

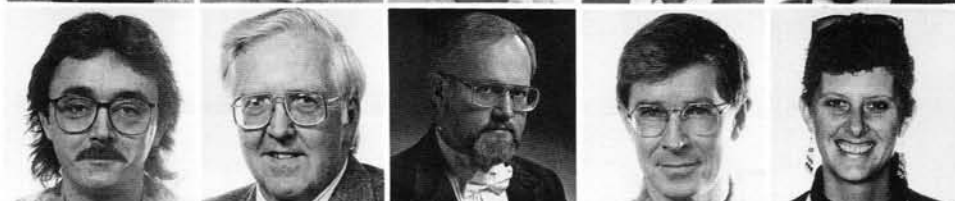

From inside the Theater Department to outside in the drama community, the fraternity was extremely busy with productions last year, Vice President Kirk Roos said. It

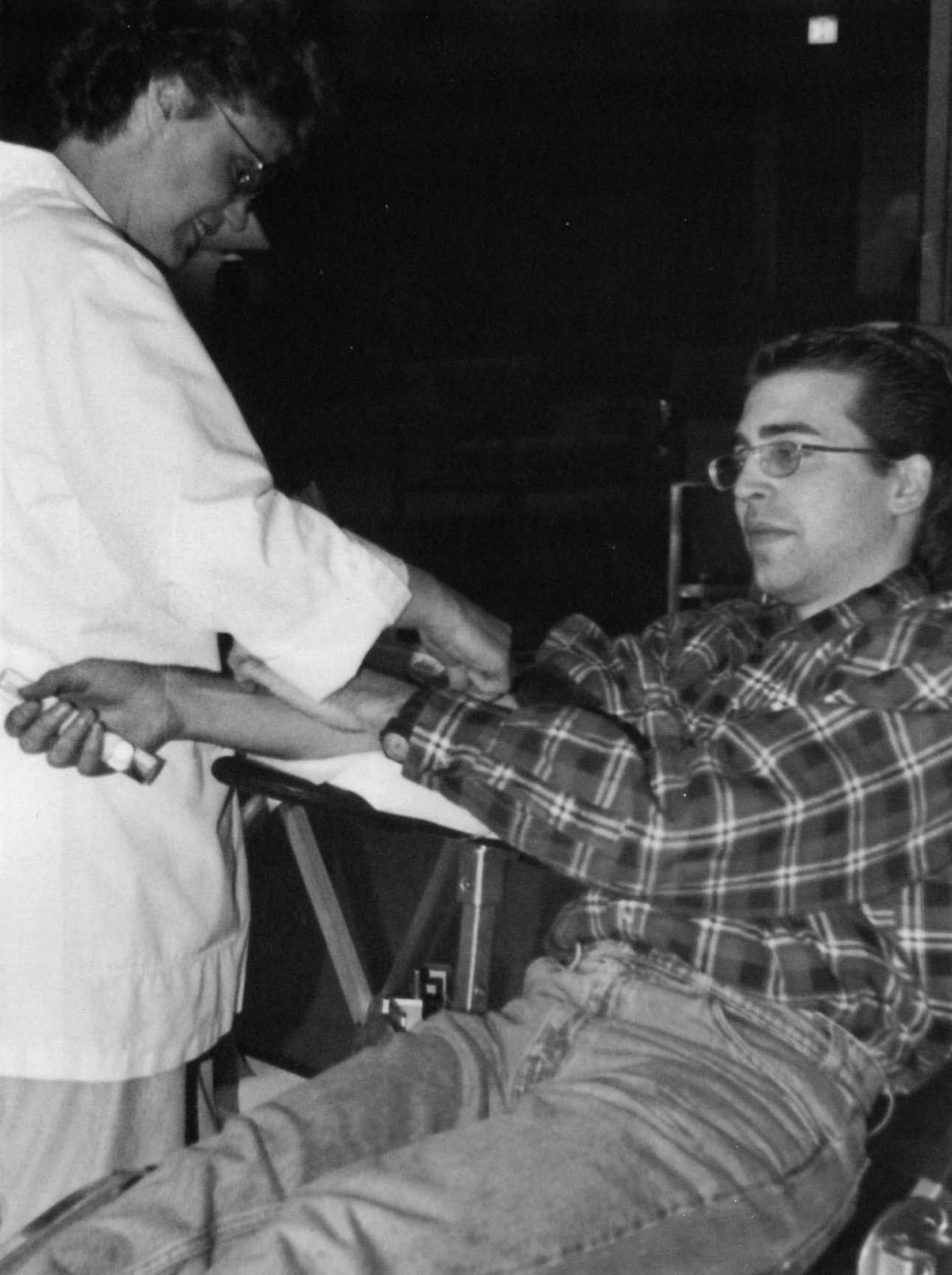

From inside a horse barn to the long, cold walk outside between Old Main and Model Hall, a former rodeo rider is studying for a degree in credit counseling.

Teri Galusha, who described herself as "an almost sophomore," carried five classes despite the fact that she has been blind since an illness 3 1/2 years ago.

"I can't just sit and do nothing. I want to get my degree and get back to work," she said.

Accompanied by her trained guide dog, Duke, a 2-year-old yellow Labrador retriever, Galusha made the rounds of buildings and classes. "I get a floor plan in my head and can get to wherever I want to go. Outside is easier. I can tell direction by the sun and the wind. Then, too, Hartnett, the Union,

Admin. and Old Main are in a square, so they're pretty easy. Model (Hall) is hard, because it's so far away, and you only have 10 minutes." Duke is still learning his job. "He knows 'go to the stairs.' Now I have to teach him upstairs from downstairs," she said.

Galusha's textbooks are on tape, and she takes her tests aurally.

So, why is she at MSU instead of UND? "I like it here. My teachers are very helpful. Everything's accessible. The faculty is wonderfully accommodating," Galusha said. "But the best thing about being at MSU is meeting all the other students. They are surprisingly thoughtful and helpful. And they are really good about asking if they can pet Duke. It's great. I like it here."

Student Educators of the Hard-of-Hearing and Deaf, or SEHHD, is an organization of 25 Minot State deaf education majors. In its first year as a recognized campus organization, SEHHD rapidly became an organizer of the Minot deaf community. Its activities included an Easter party for deaf children.

Co-president Tamela Appel said the club's long-term goals include the involvement of all deaf education majors, noting that the number of students increased to over 80 this year, up from 50 last year.

The club, whose motto is "Education is in our hands," also helped underclassmen. The buddy system involved junior and senior students assisting freshmen and sophomores with curriculum scheduling.

Other activities included assistance with the Communication Arts Department's spring production of "Mother Hicks." The play featured a deaf character using American Sign Language.

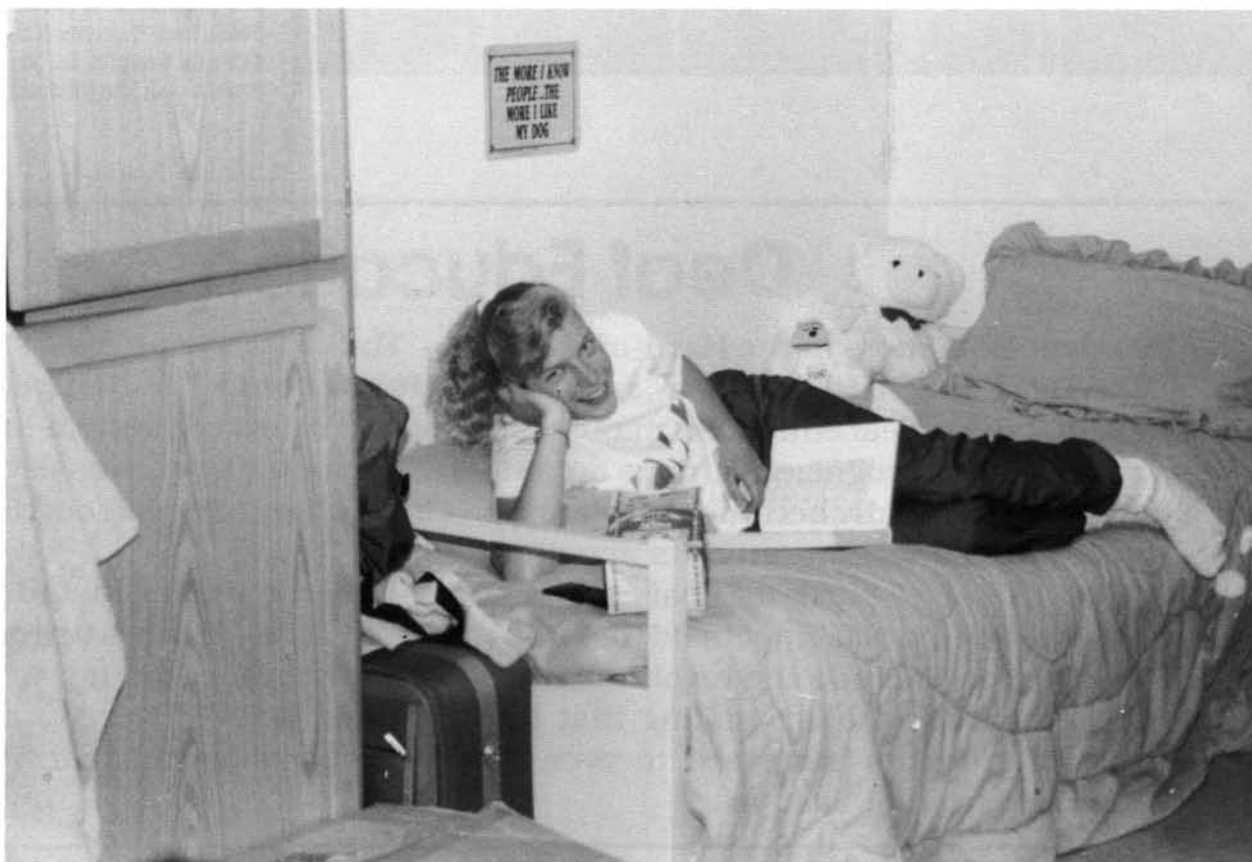

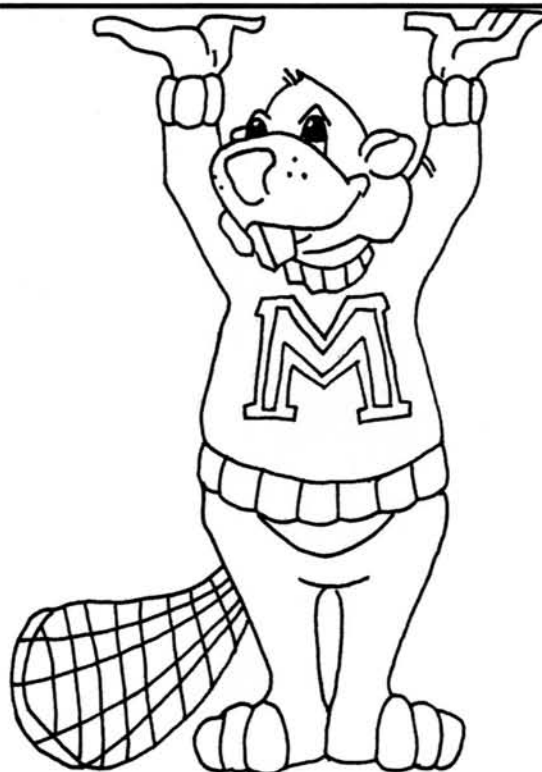


Native American Club

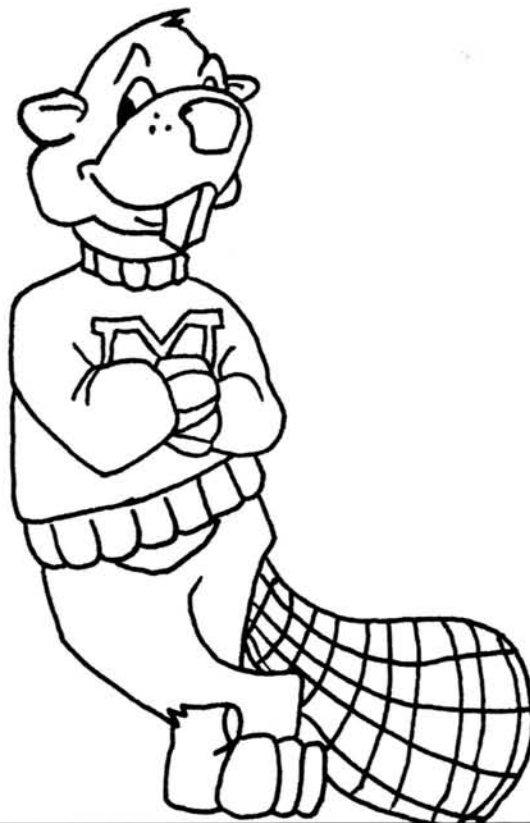
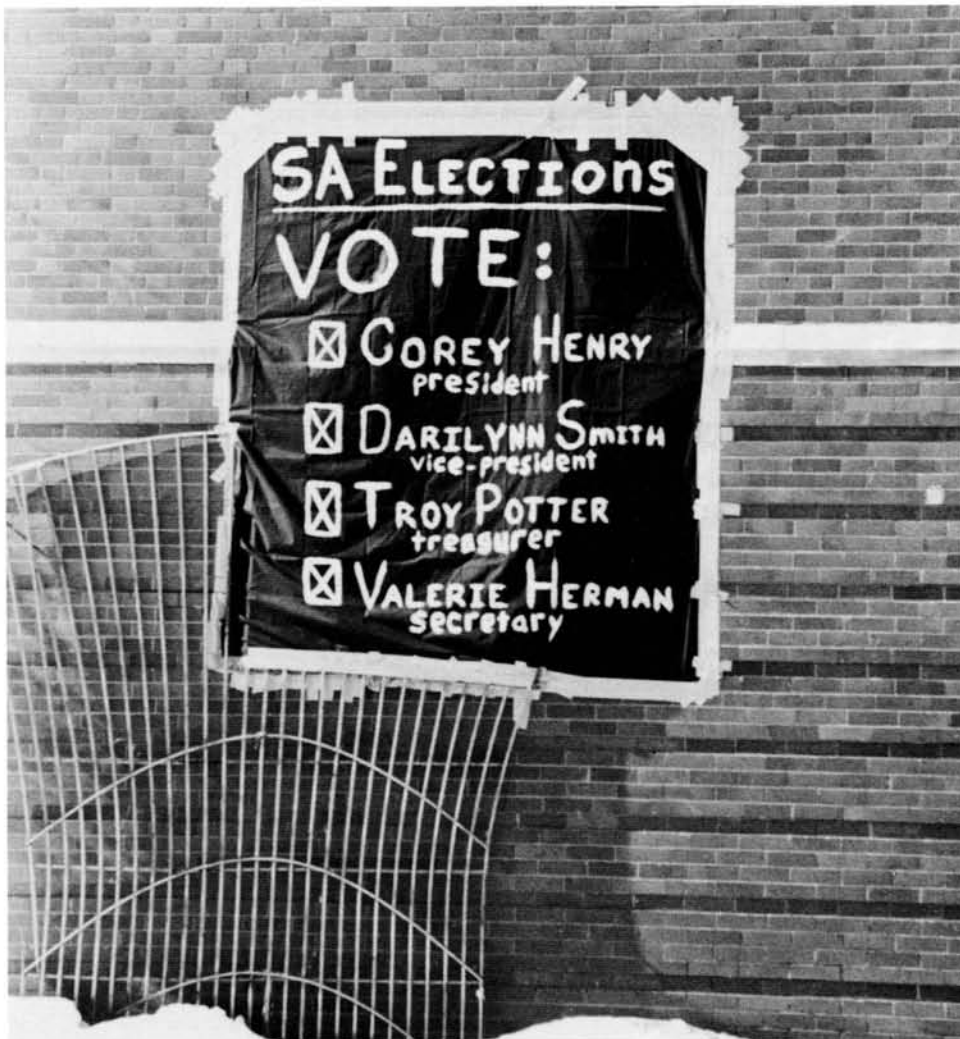

New officers are Corey Henry, president; Nathan Johnson, vice president; Valerie Herman, secretary and Troy Potter, treasurer.

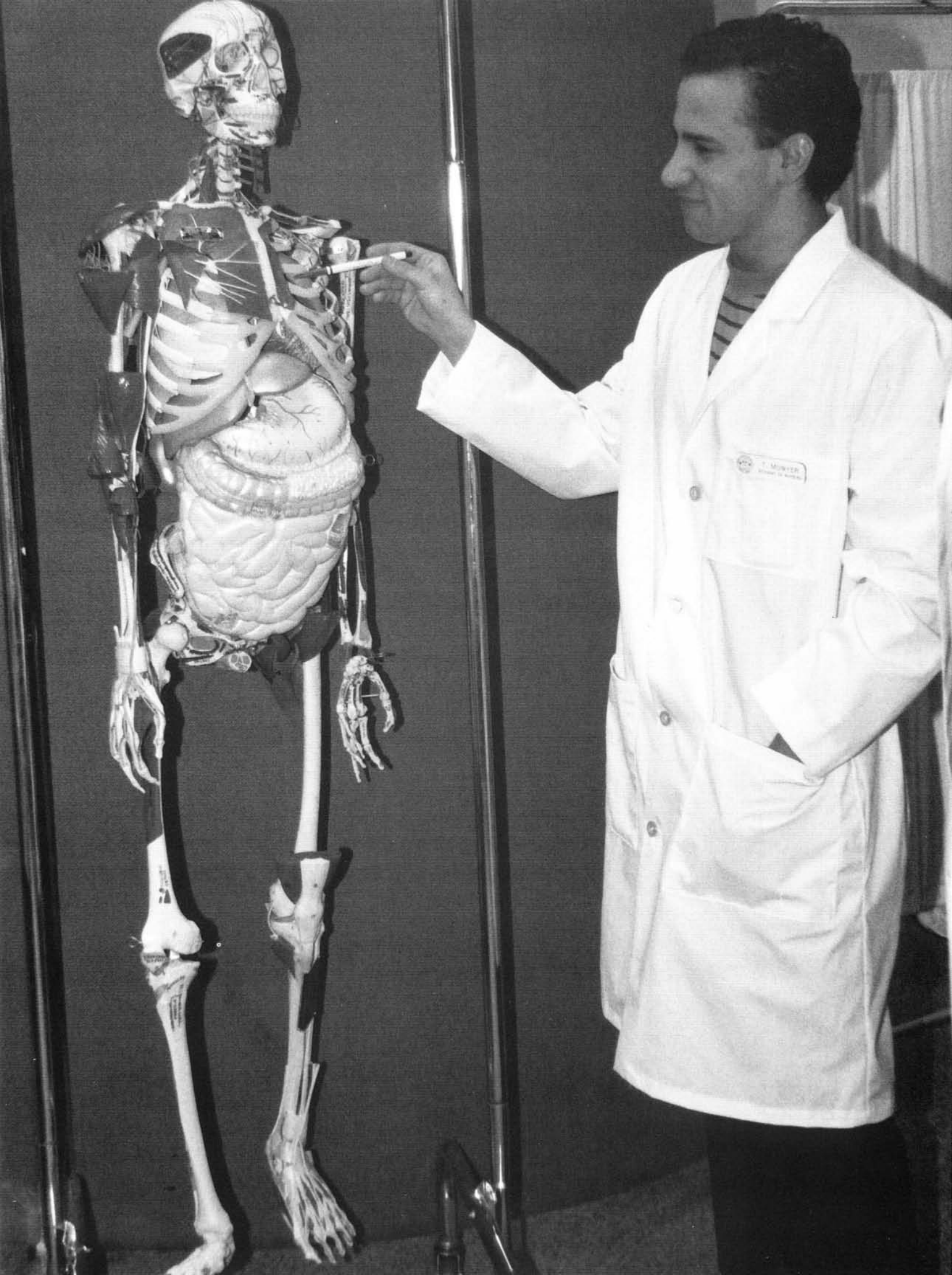
Elected to the board of governors were Darilynn Smith, publicity, and Marnee Sutton, dance/film.

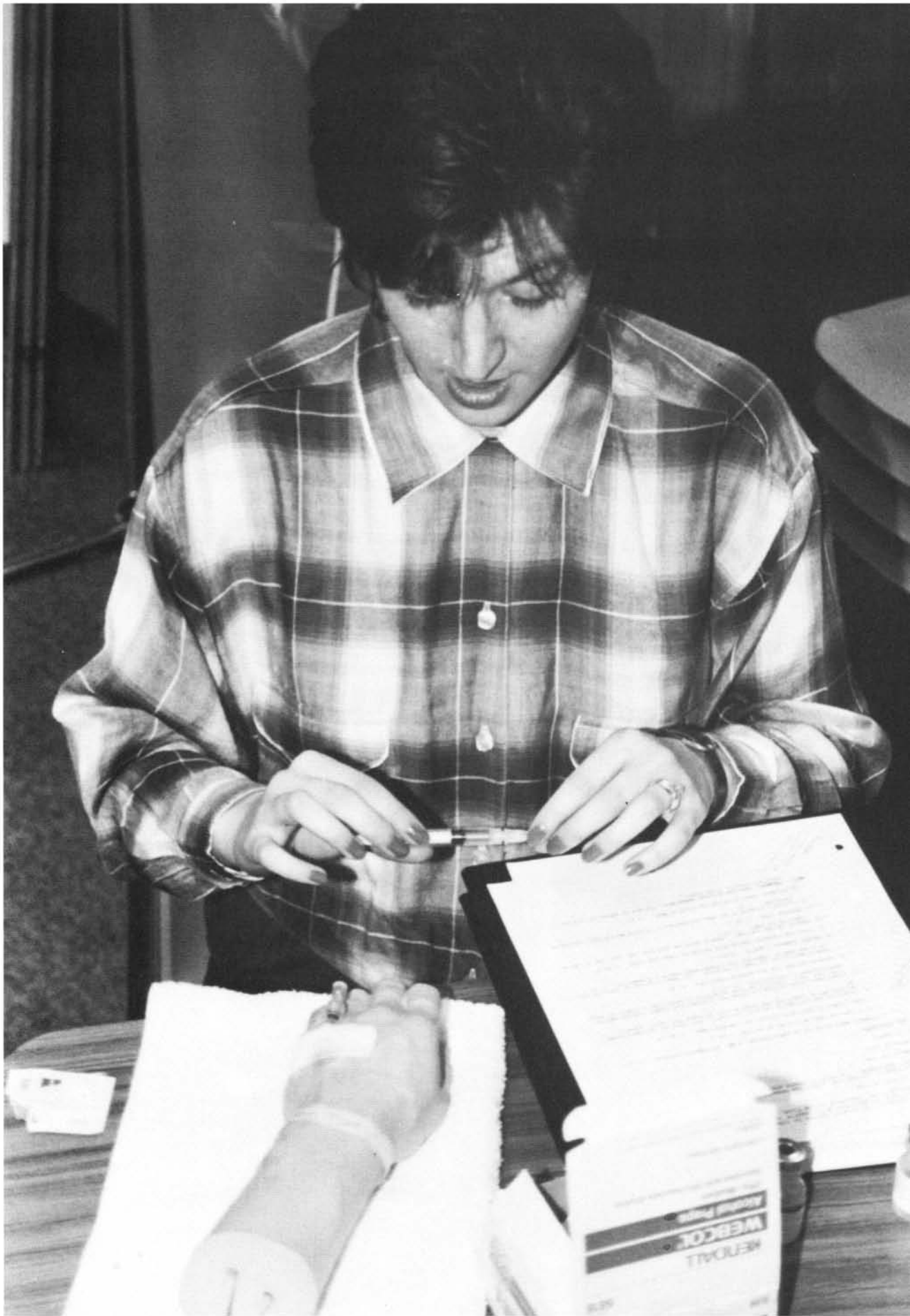

Limke was not only proud of his players' performance, but also of their outstanding work ethic. With only freshman and sophomores on the team, their spirit helped them overcome a lack of experience.

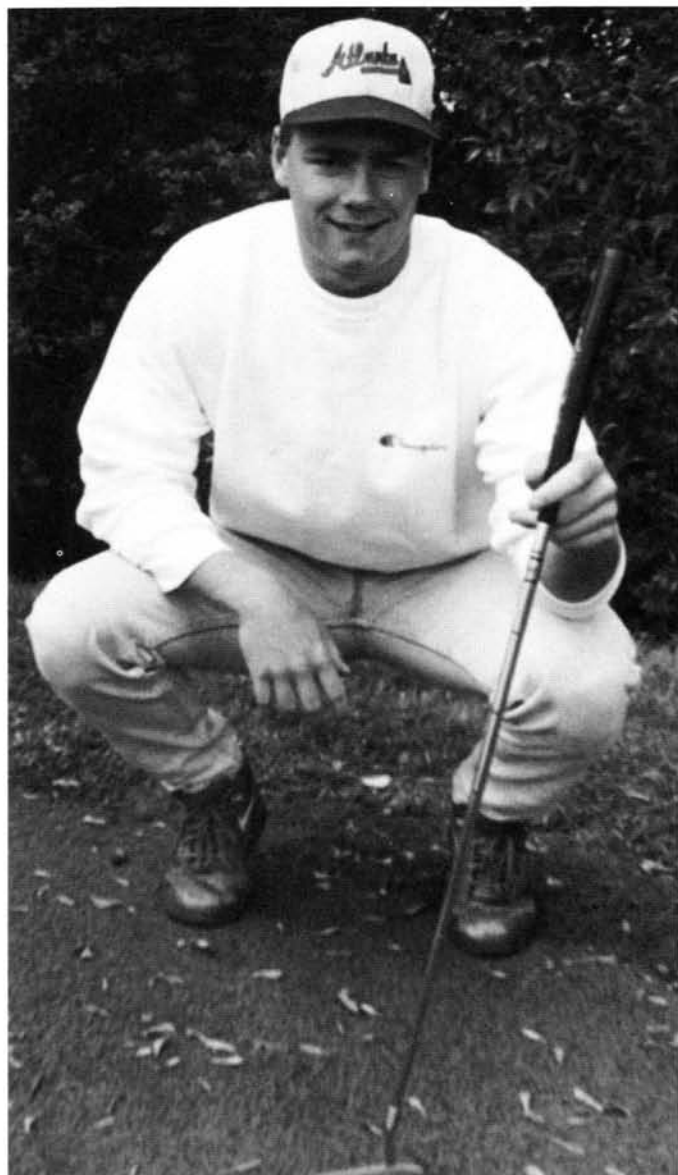
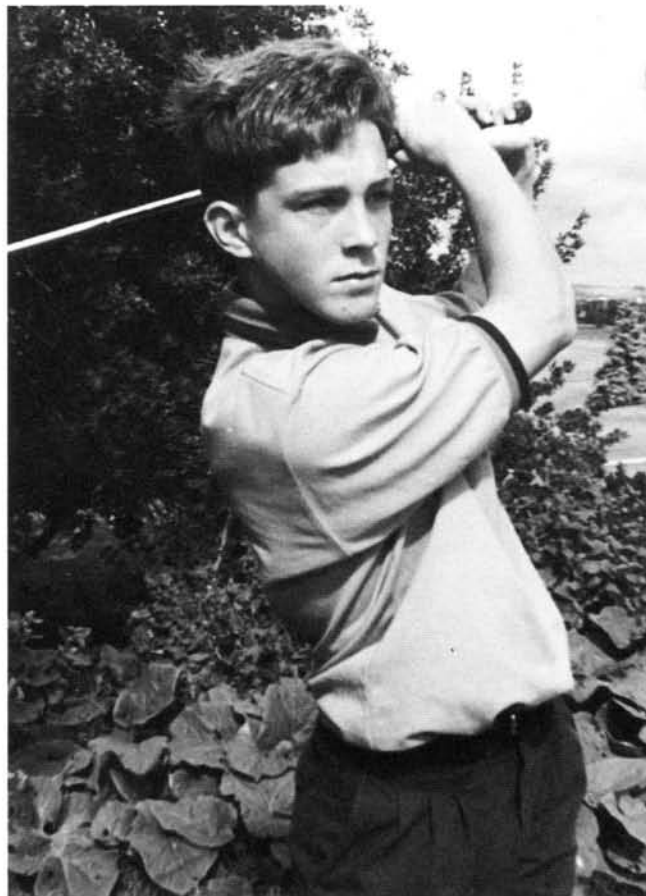

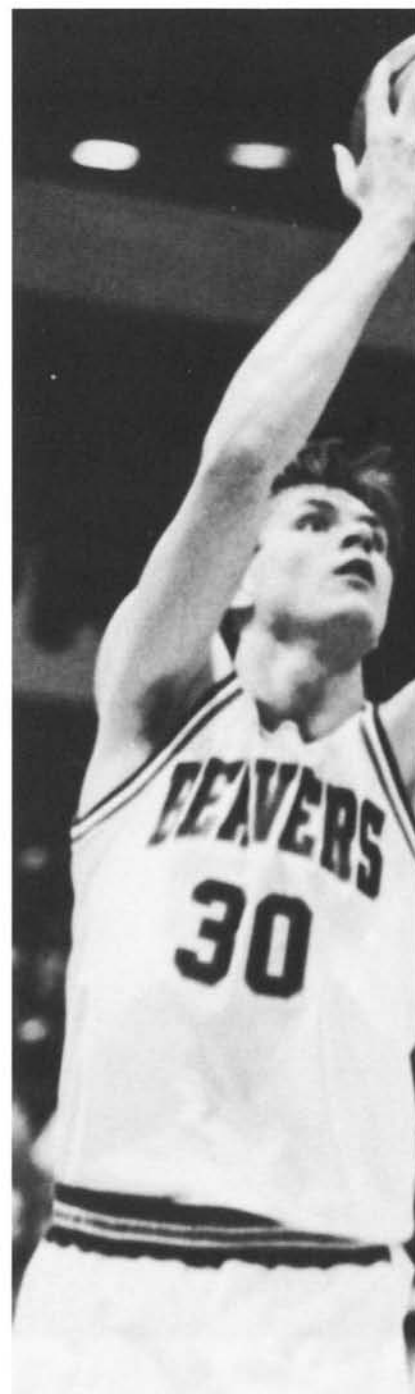

One of the goals the team set for this season was to improve its play in the conference. Each year Fiedler hopes to raise the volleyball program to a more competitive level.

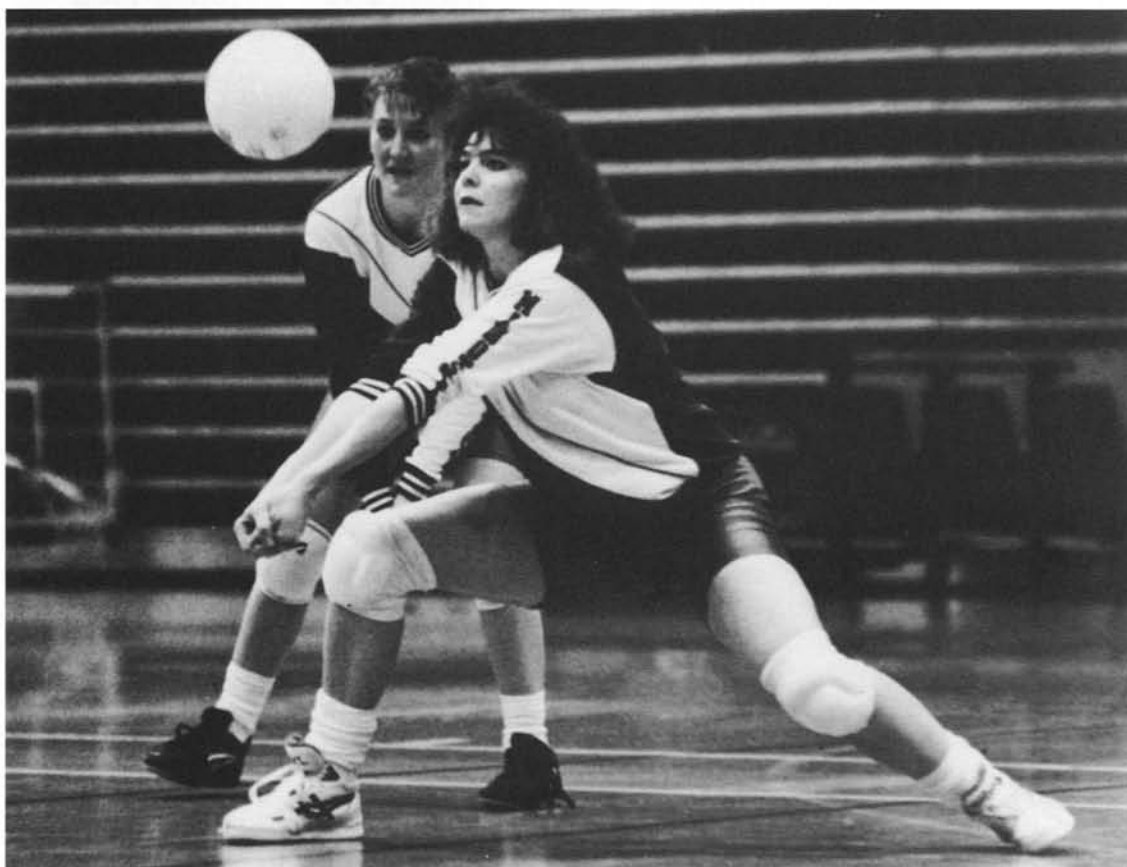
Season highlights included the Valley City and the Black Hills State tournaments, with the team claiming third-place honors at both. Individually, Jenny Brown received all-conference honors.

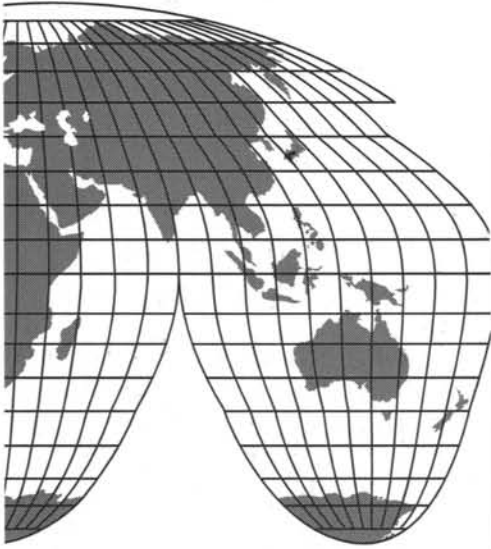
Super Bowl

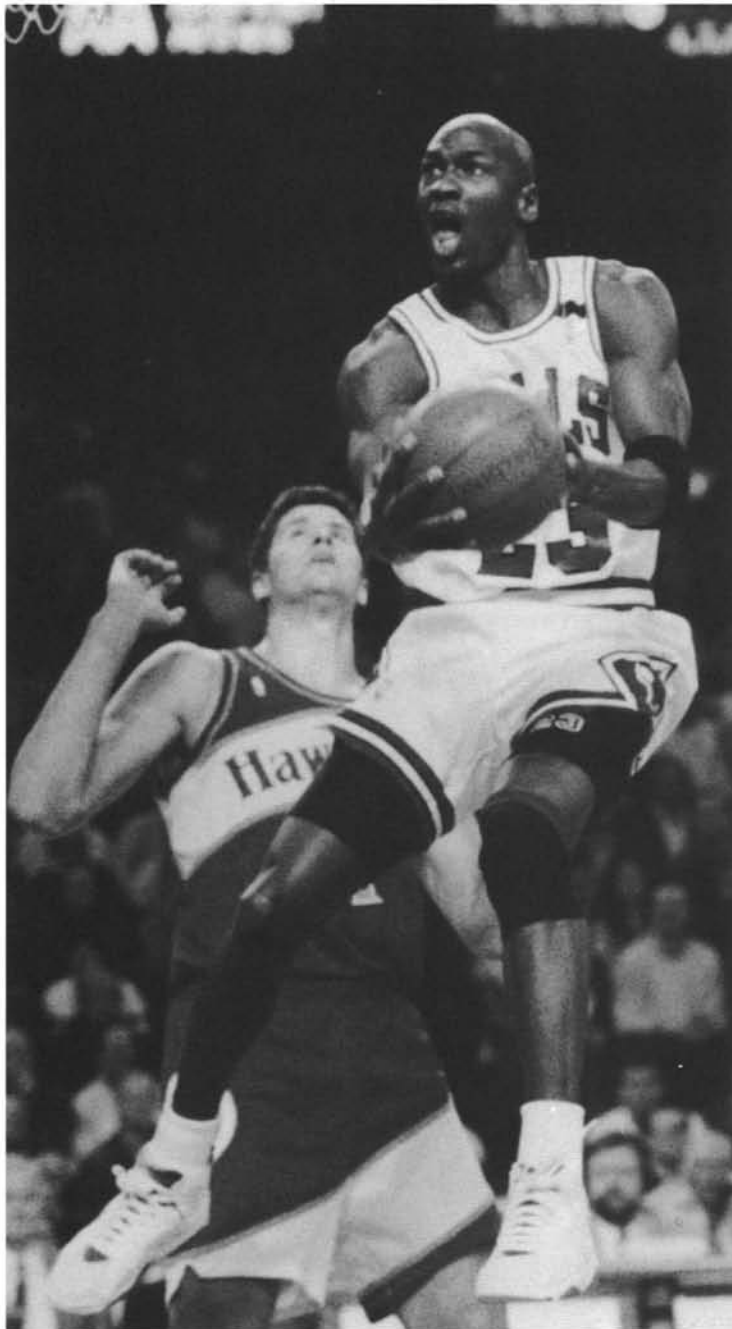

think that bungee jumping will be a good way for me to overcome my fear."

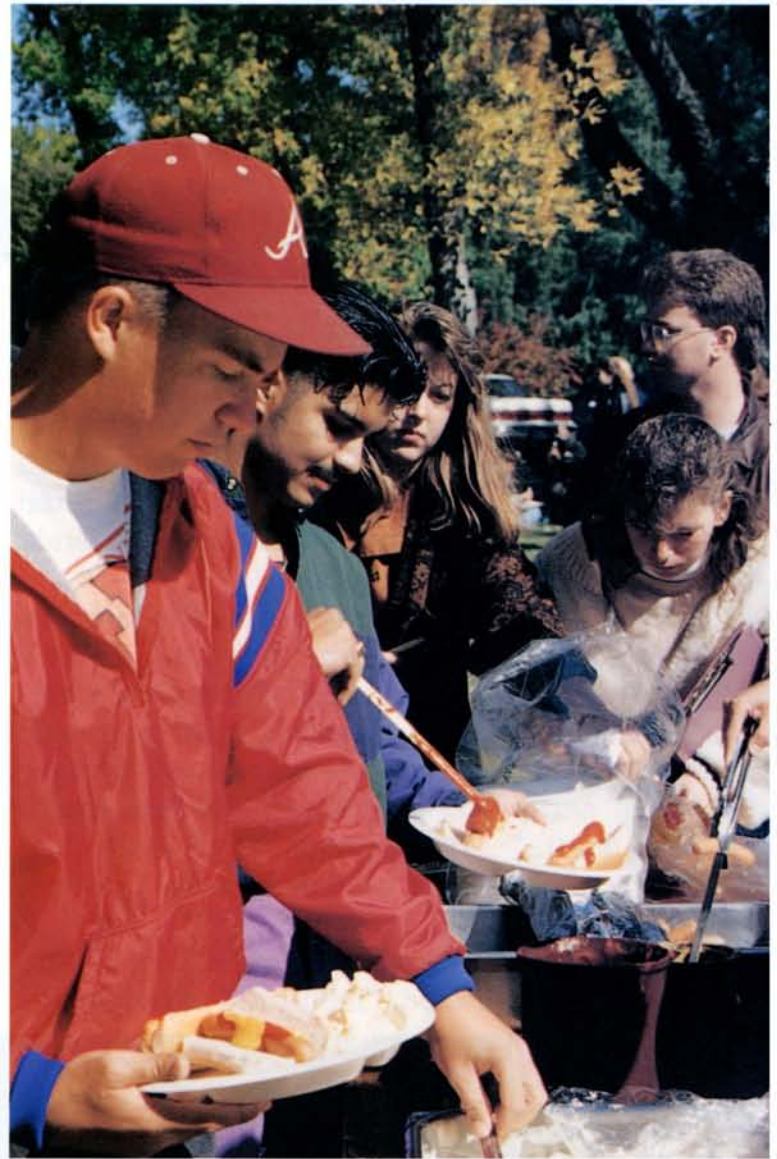
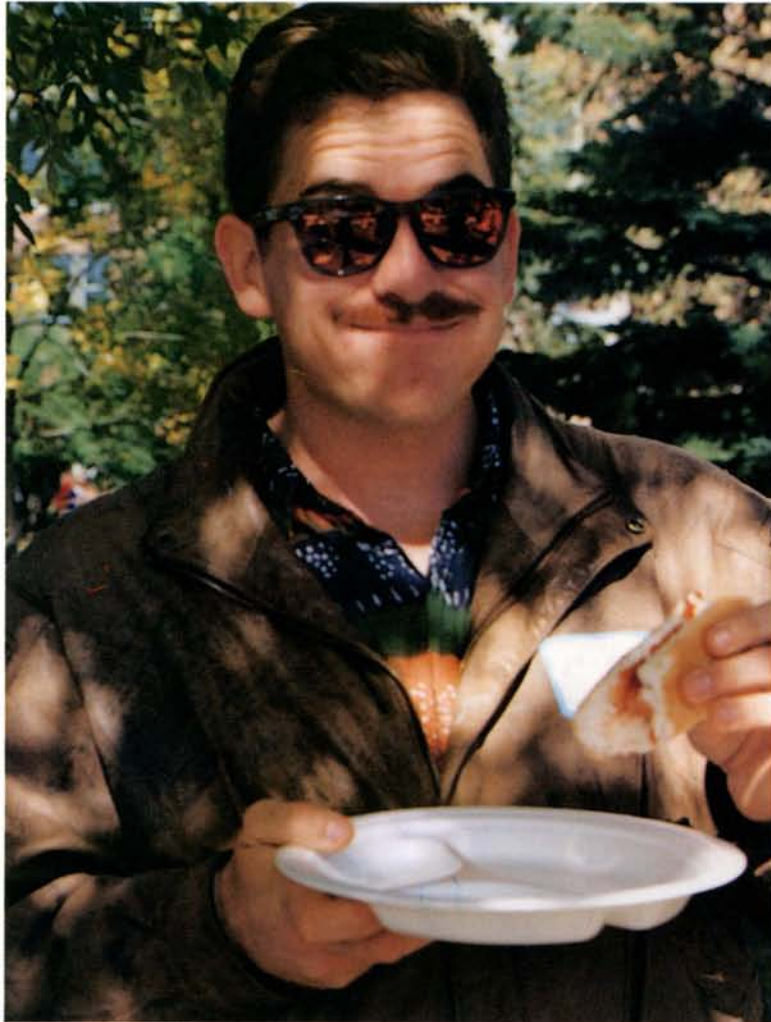
After instructions, the jumpers placed harnesses around their thighs and torsos. They joined a staff member on the platform and made the 156-foot journey into the wild blue yonder.

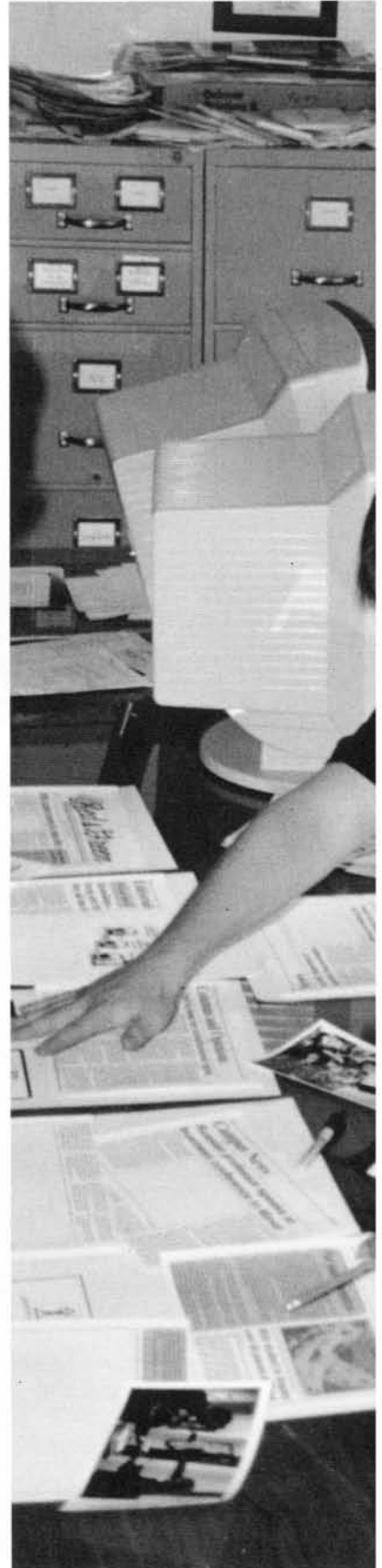
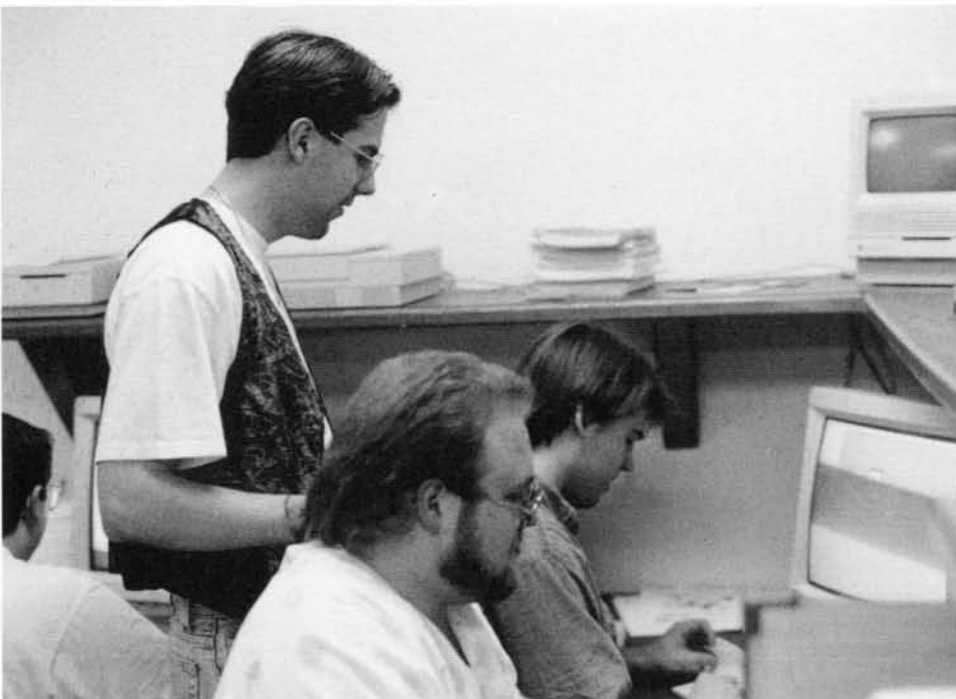
In a moment of reflection, the consistently non-punctual Frank said, "Students should remember that college is more than just attending classes, and the Red & Green is an example of that."

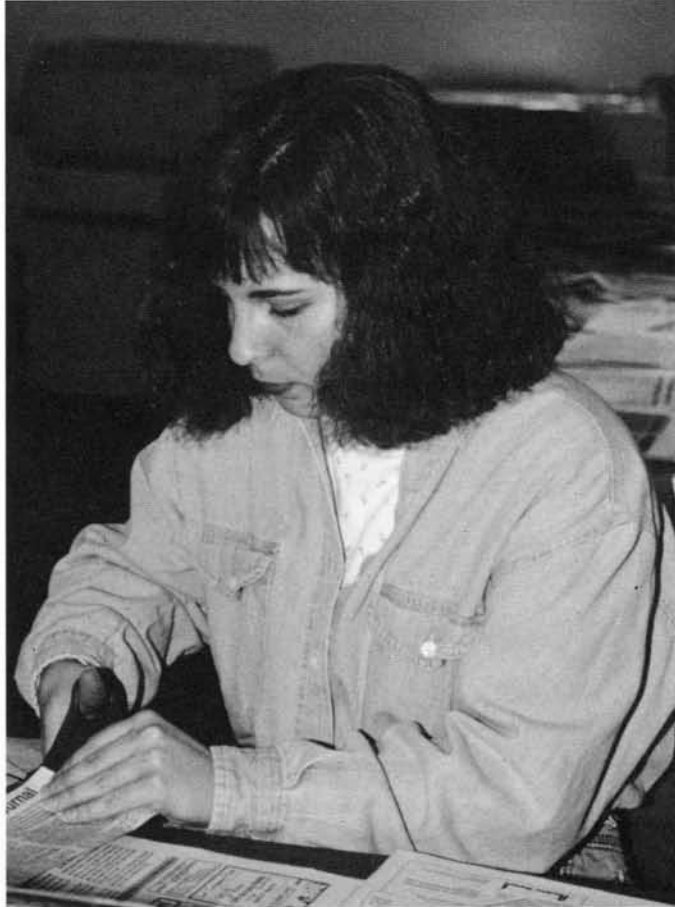

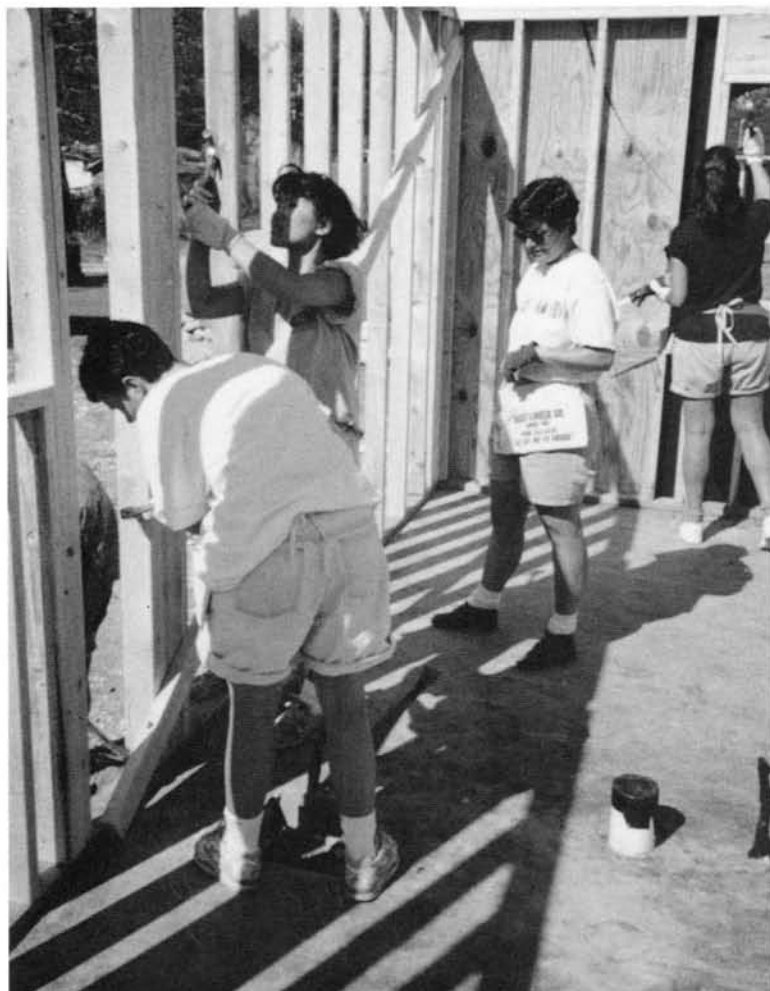

The MSU Theater Department was busy last year, producing four main stage productions, various Black Box shows and a dinner theater.

Putting together a play involved more than what the audience saw on performance nights.

First, the director read and reread the play. Then auditions were held, and the director made a cast list. Next rehearsals began, running five to six times a week. They lasted anywhere from two to four hours.

The set was designed, and every Friday and Saturday members of the cast and students in the department got together to build, paint and sand it. At the same time, the lights had to be set and the audio had to be perfected. And as if that wasn't enough, costumes also had to be designed and created.

Ushers signed up for show nights. People worked in the

Hasta La Vista Ocellus

The Ocellus, the 25-foot high, uniquely-shaped sculpture by student Dwight Hagel was a casualty of campus expansion in May, 1994. Commissioned as his senior art project, it was constructed over several months by Hagel, assisted by many student volunteers. The statue was unveiled in May, 1979.

Hagel's statue represented "growth and life. It grows from the ground and forms an eye, symbolizing vision," he said.

When it was constructed, The Ocellus was unequaled for several reasons: because of its size, its abstract design, being partially-funded by the students and because it was the only one in the state. It was a distinctive feature of the MSU campus for 15 years.

The graduates soon dispersed, heading for many other states and countries, taking with them the values and ideas they formed here.

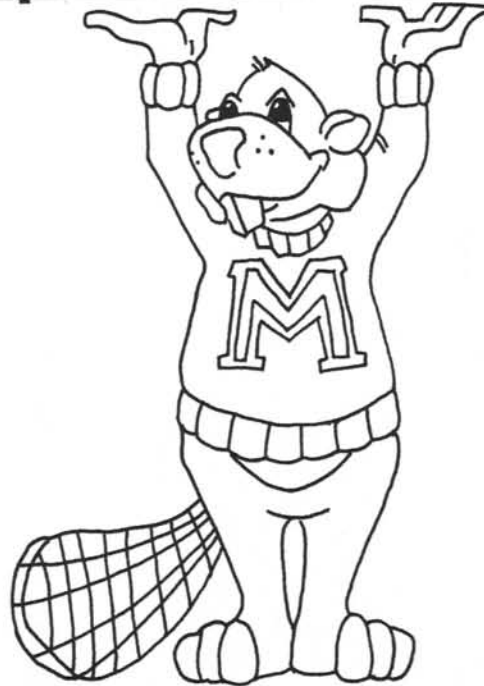

Vice President Vacancy Filled

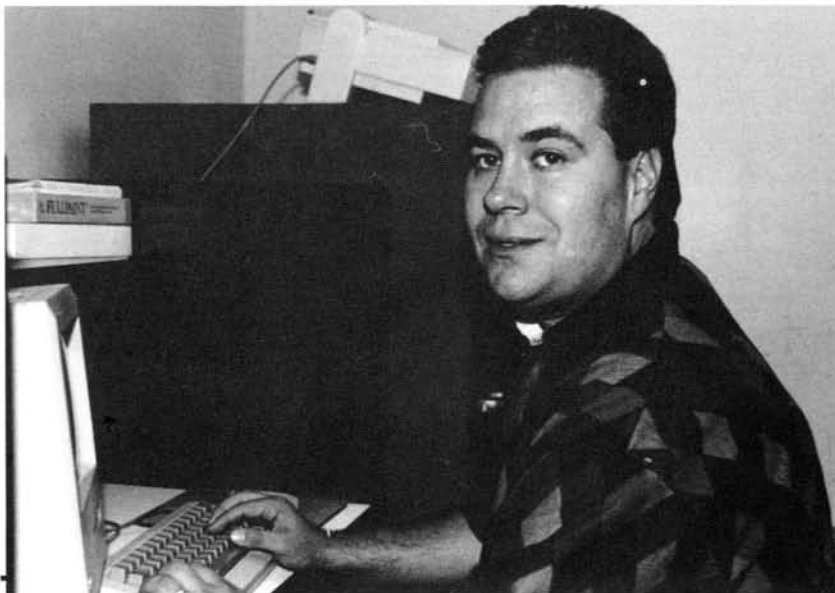

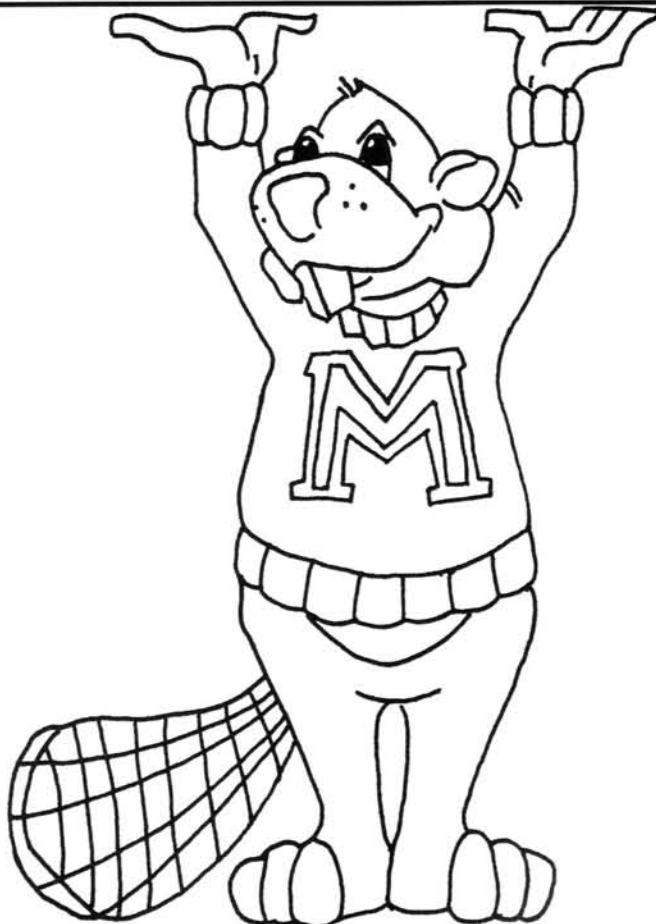


Minot State...Ever Changing

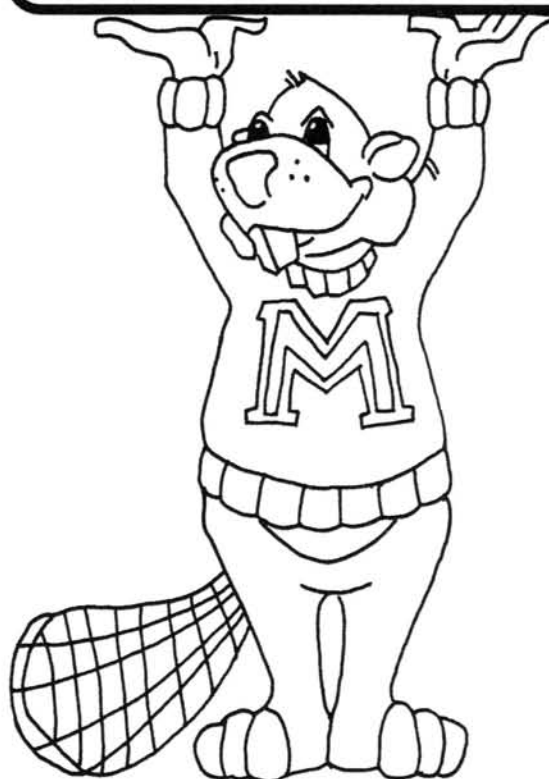
