There was one thing that was noticeably missing from this year's Homecoming festivities — the king and queen. In fact, the race for Homecoming royalty was cancelled after a student judiciary committee disqualified seven out of nine clubs represented.

All of the clubs were eliminated for poster-rule infractions. Three were eliminated for placing signs on Memorial Hall, two for using non-standard-size posters, and the last two for putting up posters on the day the vote was scheduled.

Lani Hedberg, a broadcasting major and one of the disqualified candidates, said, "The rules were the rules, but I really don't agree with how everything was handled."

It was decided to cancel the race entirely when only two pairs of candidates remained on the ballot. Tracey Coale, this year's Homecoming co-chair, referred to the entire incident as creating "a negative prevailing atmosphere," which also aided in the decision to cancel the race and the coronation entirely.







Justin Anderson played the main character, Todd, whose mother recently passed away. The deceased mother, Norma, was played by Farrah Southam. Other actors in the play were April



*He'll Be Missed. . .*






"Those injured players that did come back were only playing at about 60 to 70 percent of their po-





*Successful season included a trip to Florida*

Coach Sheila Green was proud of her team's efforts

this year. It finished the season with 18 wins and nine losses.

Besides being co-conference champs with Jamestown College, the Lady Beavers traveled to Florida for a holiday tourney. The Beavers won against Clinch Valley, Va., 88-47, then went on to lose to Shawnee State by seven points. Shawnee State eventually went on to become the national champions.

When asked what was the toughest game to prepare for, Coach Green replied with a smile, "All of them." She then thought about it and said that the toughest games were probably the home games against Jamestown and the University of Mary. She explained that the Beavers had just recently lost to those teams while on the road and therefore had to work hard to defeat them at home. Minot beat Jamestown 66-55 and

Mary 72-63.

While all the Lady Beavers had a wonderful season, Green mentioned two players who stood out: senior Carol Hayes and sophomore Jana Olson. Hayes, along with being named NDCAC Player of the Year, also broke the school record for three-point baskets per game, had the most points per season, 576, and was sixth nationally in average points per game, 21. But her greatest honor may have been being a second-team All American, the highest an MSU student has ever achieved.

Last year as a freshman, Olson broke the field-goal percentage record. This year, she broke that record again. Among other achievements, Olson was fifth nationally for field-goal percentage at 64 percent.

# CROSS COUNTRY TEAM REVELS IN BEST SEASON EVER

**Men.** Second-year Cross Country Coach Dave Zittleman had another great season, with his team peaking at a ranking of 18th in the nation — its highest ranking ever.

The men took second at the NDCAC meet, losing by just two points to Jamestown College. Top finishers in the conference meet were Brad Tighe in first place, Tim Hanson in second and Darrell Marshall in fourth. Rounding off the point-scorers for MSU were Nate Weston in 14th and Derrick Grant in 15th.

In the NAIA Great Plains Regional Meet, MSU took second place against 10 teams, losing to Jamestown by just seven points. Four runners were named to the All-Conference team in the meet. They were Tighe in first place, Marshall in fourth, Hanson in sixth and Charles Maerk in 13th.

The men finished 21st at the national meet, with Tighe, from Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan, leading the eight-man squad by becoming MSU's first cross-country All-American.

"He is probably the best cross country runner that ever came out of our conference, and when all is said and done people will be

saying he was the best cross country runner in our conference ever," Zittleman said.

Tighe, a freshman, won six meets in a row, finishing second in his first meet of the year. His final meet was at the nationals, where he finished 27th.


"We don't lose a single person, men or women, next year. And so we are going to be real strong. Our goal for the men's team is to make the top 10 in the nation," Zittleman said.

**Women.** Although the women did not qualify for the national meet, they also enjoyed a successful season.

Teri Mawson led the 10-woman squad, with a strong enough season to become a national qualifier. She was ranked 74th nationally.

The women finished third in the NDCAC meet, behind the University of Mary and Jamestown College. The top five finishers for MSU were Mawson in fifth place, Shayla Strasser in 13th, Becky Daigneault in 16th, Vania Faul in 18th and Natalie Beehler in 19th.

The women again finished in third place at the NAIA Great Plains Regional Meet, again trailing Mary and Jamestown. Mawson finished in sixth place, followed by Strasser in 22nd, Daigneault in 26th, Faul in



31st, Beehler in 32nd and Surtees in 36th.

Zittleman was proud of his team's strong showing throughout the season and is looking forward to an even stronger season next year.

"Our recruiting is going real well, with a main focus being North Dakota and Montana," Zittleman said.

"I've got a lot of good kids that work hard. They aren't overly recruited, but we seem to get the right mix of kids with their hard work being the key to their successes."

## TRACK TEAM FINISHES WITH A RECORD-BREAKING SEASON

*Thirteen school records fell in a single indoor season*

The indoor track season was deemed a success, with runners peaking for a final indoor fling at the NDCAC Indoor Track & Field Championships at the Dome in February.

Coach Dave Zittleman boasted that the team moved up from third place last year to second place at this year's NDCAC championships.

Jamestown College came in first in the men's division, and the University of Mary took first from the MSU women.

Brad Tighe, a freshman from Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan, won three indoor conference titles by taking firsts in the 1,000-meter run, the 3,000 and the mile. Tim Hanson was also a standout, placing in all three of these events. He took third in the 1,000,

fourth in the 3,000 and second in the mile.

Curtis Armstrong, an Academic All-American, took second in both the 400-meter run and the 800.

"These guys were the real standouts in indoor track this year," Zittleman said.

On the women's side, Donelle Carter took first in the shot put with a heave of 48-7, beating the national qualifying mark by over 6 feet. Carter also beat the NDCAC indoor weight throw record by almost 8 feet with a throw of 54-3.

"We also had a lot of people place in the third- and fourth-place range, so it was a real solid team effort," Zittleman said.

Carter went on to win the shot and the weight throw in the national championships. Sarita Ellison got seventh in the weight and eighth in the shot at the nationals, which were held

in Nebraska. Tina Kirkpatrick was seventh in the high jump and ninth in the triple jump. Michelle Boyeff was 10th in the 55-meter hurdles.

"This was the highest Minot State has ever finished in the nationals," Zittleman said.

On the men's side, the mile relay team, which included Armstrong, Sinclair, Weston and Lund, took fifth place, making the All-America team.

The runners set an amazing 13 school records this season. "We broke and rebroke a few of them. Thirteen records is just a good, good year," Zittleman said.

"We get good kids that work hard. They have a passion for the sport. I guess when you get the right kids they can all stay motivated for practice and for meets," he said.


to the students' lives and to the real world so it makes sense to them," she said.

"When you take a trip like this, people have the opportunity to actually get to know each other. And in doing so, you can make a life-long friend," Bowles said.


The music performed by the MSU Choir included

Woodhouse was brought in for his talent and experi-


ence. He has played clubs and colleges from coast to coast sharing billing with Eddie Murphy and Pauly Shore.

So is it better than what he did before? "This is therapy," Woodhouse said. "I was in retail management before."





Rust decided to become a teacher not only because she likes to work with young people but also because retired MSU Spanish Professor Linda Gresham inspired her to be one.


"I didn't think I wanted to be a teacher until I took her class," Rust said. "I want to teach like her and motivate students."



MSU-Bottineau, through aggressive recruitment and specialty programs, has seen a year of growth and optimism not readily associated with a smaller school facing dropping enrollment and funding cutbacks.

Fall enrollment rose from 339 in 1994 to 447 this year. Kathleen Corak Sund, the executive dean, credits MSU-Bottineau's growth to aggressive recruiting efforts and unique course offerings, with a promise of more of the same in the future.

Ken Grosz, the director of student services, encourages students who are interested in taking a one- or

two-year program instead of a four-year degree to consider MSU-Bottineau as a good option. He also pointed out that two courses currently in the planning stages are geared

to prepare students for the technologically advanced world of business — computer networking and web-page design.

"We want to make sure that we can provide enough

classes for students to prepare them for the real world, so they can get all the information they need before graduation," he said.

MSU-Bottineau also offers such varied programs as water-technology, wildlife and pre-nursing. A small school, specialized programs, low tuition and aggressive recruiting have made MSU-Bottineau a thriving campus in the North Dakota university system.
