HAPPY FALL! It's difficult to believe that the second half of the fall 2016 semester is underway.


There are several changes coming to CEL over the next few months. First, Mark Timbrook is retiring the end of October – but will continue to work part-time in his position until

Early Entry (Dual Credit) and Academic Testing Center

Fall 2016 semester has early entry (dual credit) enrollments of 193 students and 248 course enrollments. Participating high schools offering dual credit classes include Minot High, Bishop Ryan, Nedrose, Des Lacs-Burlington, Glenburn, and Surrey. Early Entry enrollment also includes students at New Town, Tioga, and Bishop Ryan high schools taking MSU classes online or on the MSU campus. Call 858-3990 with inquiries about the Early Entry program.

The Academic Test Center continues to provide proctoring services to students and also works with national test companies to offer professional certification and placement testing for the Minot community. Test Center hours are Tue-Fri 8am-4pm (some Monday appointments available). Appointments are needed for testing and can be made by calling 858-3830 or emailing msu.testing@minotstateu.edu. Testing is also done at the MAFB Education Center Tuesday afternoons and Wednesday mornings. Members of the military can make appointments for CLEP and DSST testing using an online scheduler at http://www.minotstateu.edu/cel/pages/mafb-test.shtml.

The ACT Compass placement test is being phased out and will only be available for testing through November 30, 2016. Data will be available via ACT eCompass through December

31, 2016. A replacement for Compass, determined by the MSU academic departments, will be available at the testing center.

Editorial TOMORROW HAS ARRIVED by Mark Timbrook

Tomorrow always arrives faster than anticipated. And it brings with it change not always embraced, but it comes regardless. The tomorrow faced by those working in higher education involves growing dependence on technology, intense data collection, student mobility coupled



with a changing student population, and revaluation of a college degree and training.

The shift in technology has been on the horizon for nearly a decade; however, some faculty and institutions have been slow to recognize the obvious. Catching up will be stressful and for some career changing. Institutions that still have mission critical processes that are paper-based are a prime example, followed by those that have not invested in their online degree programs and faculty training.

Federal and state funding sources will want clear, concise data that reflect the effectiveness of degree programs, along

with specifics on student retention and success. Institutions that are still crunching numbers by calculator will fall behind. More importantly, those institutions not following the yellow brick road of information produced by data, will have explaining to do, as will Institutions shackled by uncooperative faculty.

Tomorrow — Higher Ed will face the political forces that demand cheaper, if not free, degrees and training programs. When this happens, schools with trained faculty, tech-based enrollment, credit awarding veteran-plans, student retention and success tracking systems, and high value online degree programs will be in the lead.

My longtime view has been one of negativism toward the institution's failure to fully embrace, commit, and invest in MSU Online. In the next year, it will become even more critical for the institution to take this public stance and build quality online course and programs. The SPED department model for design and development should be implemented campus wide. Programs should be created to meet the demand of a mobile, changing student population that is seeking a quality and affordable education.

As I leave on the 11th hour of tomorrow, I wish Minot State University the very best. It has in many areas come far, but in others, it lags woefully behind the leaders in Higher Education. With the absence of an online champion and the faculty driven stalemate in modernization of our online courses, we rest on the edge, tottering between what we are and what we could be.

Minot State University @ Bismarck State College

Greetings from MSU @ Bismarck State College. There are currently 10 face-to-face courses instructed on the BSC campus for the 2016 fall semester. The 2017 spring semester will host 11 face-to-face courses.

Bobbi Jo Zueger will be attending marketing events in the months of October and November. UTTC will host their annual fall Career Fair on October 19. BSC will host a Fall Open House on October 21 and BSC GradFest/Transfer Day is scheduled for November 30.

The MSU at Bismarck advisors have been visiting the BSC classrooms, informing BSC students about the MSU degree programs offered and speaking with prospective MSU students. They have also been out in the community following up with organizations who host the MSU @ BSC students who are enrolled in Field placement courses for the fall semester.

Bismarck PASC members and advisor Dr. Markel participated in the 2016 Crop Walk on Sunday, 9 October. Brianna Martin, Psychology senior, and Dr. Markel have two research presentations accepted for UND's Northern Lights Psychology Conference, to be held Saturday, 22 October.

Mike Wardzinski, Criminal Justice Advisor/Instructor is currently advising 15 students for the fall 2016 semester. In addition to the traditional courses instructed in the class room, he has added a Criminal Justice Special Topics Course as an IVN offering and the Introduction to Investigations course has been offered online.

The Criminal Justice Program has one student scheduled to graduate at the end of the Fall 2016 semester and four are scheduled to graduate at the end of the Spring 2017 semester.

The Social Work program is advised by Dr. Jennifer Boeckel and the Co-advisor is Shelly Paul. There are 42 students currently being advised for the Social Work program. Social Work Admissions applications and Field applications have been submitted by the social work students in Bismarck.

Patty Hunt, MSU's Reference and Library Instruction Librarian traveled to Bismarck the week of August 29th and met with several classes. Patty provided valuable informational packets to students and discussed the many services the MSU library offers to MSU students.

Dr. Kristen Warmoth, MSU Dean, Center for Extended Learning hosted the annual MSU @ BSC student feedback session on September 21. The event was located in the BSC Student Union Missouri Room.

Evelyn Klimpel, MSU's Disability Services Coordinator will be in Bismarck for a site visit on November 2nd and 3rd to meet with MSU @ BSC students who are interested in their accommodation services for the 2017 spring semester.
