Semrau named MSU vice president for advancement

Marv Semrau has been named the new vice president for advancement at Minot State University. A Minot native, he has been the sales manager for Lowe's Printing for 19 years. Semrau will begin at MSU on March 5.

Semrau was a co-chairman of the successful \$6 million capital campaign to build the Minot Family YMCA located in southwest Minot and is a steering committee member for the YMCA's new \$3 million capital campaign. He is also presently involved in raising funds for the North Dakota Cowboy Hall of Fame. Additional experience includes leadership roles in the \$500,000 capital campaigns of First Lutheran Church and Triangle Y Camp.

"Mr. Semrau brings with him an impressive background in community service, philanthropy, and a genuine commitment to the people in our community and to Minot State University," said MSU President David Fuller. "Marv works so well with people and will be able to bring those abilities to MSU and to strengthen our relationships with our community members, alumni, and friends of the university."

Fuller said he is confident of Semrau's ability to serve as the senior leader for advancement and that he was impressed by the new vice president's understanding of the critical role the university plays in Minot and in the region.

"The Minot community is proud of its university, and I'm pleased to have this wonderful opportunity to build on that pride and strong tradition of support," said Semrau. "I look forward to working with President Fuller, faculty, staff, and friends of Minot State University to achieve the university's new vision and strategic direction."

Currently, Semrau is chairman of the Minot Planning Commission and is a previous chairman of the Minot Area Development Foundation. He is a board member of the Minot Family YMCA and the Minot Public Schools Foundation. Other community involvement includes being a member and past president of the Minot Kiwanis Club, the Minot Y's Men's Club, and the Minot Y's Men's Rodeo.

Prior to joining Lowe's Printing in 1988, he worked for Young America retail stores for 20 years. Semrau earned a bachelor's degree in business administration from North Dakota State University.

Dick Jenkins, vice president for student affairs, chaired the search. He was assisted by an advisory committee comprised of members of the MSU foundation, regents and alumni boards and representatives from the student, faculty and staff senates, advancement office, athletics and administration.

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Warmoth named MSU dean of CEL

Kristen Warmoth, Ed.D., has been named the new dean of the Center for Extended Learning at Minot State University. Warmoth has been with MSU since 1999. She joined the university as the coordinator of professional and community education in continuing education. Other positions she has held include online instructional designer, project director of a Title III grant, and director of instructional technology. Warmoth has been serving as interim director of the CEL since December.

The CEL at Minot State University includes continuing education, online education, correspondence, dual credit programs, professional and community education, and distance education including courses delivered via N.D. Interactive Video Network (IVN) and at the sites of Minot Air Force Base, West Fargo and Bismarck.

"I'm excited to have Dr. Warmoth join the academic leadership team at MSU," said Gary Rabe, vice president for academic affairs. "Kris is exceptionally qualified, having more than 19 years of experience in different facets of continuing education in higher education. Her vision for the CEL fits closely with the direction MSU is striving for as an institution."

The position of dean of the CEL is a new direction for MSU. In the past, the unit has been led by either a director or the assistant vice president for enrollment services. Rabe said that review of best practices in higher education led to the reorganization of leadership roles.

"As we studied operations and effective methods, it became apparent that MSU needed to position the leader of CEL as a dean to realize the university's new strategic plan, Vision 2013," said Rabe.

Minot State University is also conducting a search for an assistant vice president for enrollment services and admissions.

Rabe said Warmoth will be responsible for enhancing online courses and programming, determining the best method to serve distance students at remote sites, and exploring new program options. She will also play a primary role in developing and sponsoring new professional and community education conferences and seminars at Minot State University.

Warmoth's additional experience includes 11 years as the continuing education program administrator at MiraCosta Community College, Oceanside, Calif. In that position she oversaw and coordinated approximately 120 non-credit course sections, supervised 60 non-credit course instructors, and administered an annual budget of \$400,000. From 1992 to 1995, Warmoth also served as the administrative coordinator of MiraCosta's Elderhostel program.

She earned a bachelor's and a master's degree from San Diego State University in speech communication. Warmoth completed her doctoral degree in educational administration at the University of San Diego.

Assistant VP for enrollment to interview

Renee Orlick, Falls Church, Va., a candidate for the assistant vice president for enrollment services and admissions at Minot State University will visit the campus and community beginning Saturday (Feb. 24). Interviews are being scheduled with university administrators, faculty, staff, students, and search committee members. The public is invited to an open forum with and a presentation by Orlick Monday (Feb. 26) at 11:30 a.m. in the MSU Conference Center, third floor of the Student Union.

The assistant vice president for enrollment services and admissions at MSU is responsible for the representation of all Minot State University educational opportunities to potential students. The primary responsibility of the enrollment management function is to coordinate and maximize the efforts of student recruitment, admissions, financial aid, and international student programs.

Orlick has been the director of admissions for the College of Arts and Sciences at Trinity University in Washington, D.C., since March of 2005. From 1997 to 2005, she was employed by Alfred University, Alfred, N.Y., as an admissions counselor, assistant director of admissions, and senior assistant director of admissions.

In those positions, Orlick has been responsible for implementing strategic undergraduate enrollment initiatives, recommending admission policies, developing a progressive and inclusive enrollment management framework, and overseeing territorial managers' recruitment plans.

Orlick earned a bachelor's degree in sociology from Alfred University, a master's degree in sociology from Kent State University, Kent, Ohio, and a master's degree in community service administration from Alfred University.

The position of assistant vice president for enrollment services and admissions is a change for MSU. In the past, the functions were split between the Records Office and Office of Enrollment Services. In review of best practices in higher education, the functions were combined and supervised by the assistant vice president for enrollment services. The current position description reflects further refinement and is aligned with the university's new strategic plan, Vision 2013. The assistant vice president for enrollment services and admissions will report to the MSU vice president for academic affairs.

Linda Cresap, dean of the Graduate School and Research and Sponsored Programs, is chair of the search committee.

Richman named president of North Dakota State College of Science

The State Board of Higher Education named John Richman president of North Dakota State College of Science in Wahpeton, N.D., Feb. 20.

Richman has served as the interim president of NDSCS since September 2006 and as the vice president of academic and student affairs since 2002. He will become president of NDSCS July 1, 2007, at an annual salary of \$134,000 with a vehicle allowance of \$11,000.

“We were fortunate to have several highly qualified applicants for the presidency of North Dakota State College of Science,” said John Q. Paulsen, president of the State Board of Higher Education. “The board is very pleased Dr. Richman has agreed to be NDSCS’s next president. It was clear to us during the interview process John understands the challenges and opportunities facing the college. We believe he will do an excellent job of leading NDSCS into the future. NDSCS is a wonderful college with a proud history of serving higher education, our state and this community very well. We look forward to the continued opportunity to do so under the wonderful leadership of Dr. Richman.”

Richman’s relationship with NDSCS spans 35 years as a student, parent, instructor and administrator. He was the college’s football coach and athletic director before being named vice president of academic and student affairs in 2002. Richman also served as an assistant football coach at the University of North Dakota in Grand Forks, N.D., and at Moorhead State University in Moorhead, Minn.

RCJC to host drug identification instrument training

A drug identification instrument training class, hosted by the Rural Crime and Justice Center will be held at Minot State University on Feb. 27, 1-2:30 p.m., in Moore Hall, Room 333. The RCJC and the Department of Chemistry at MSU have acquired state-of-the-art equipment to identify substances found in a methamphetamine lab.

“The purpose of the hands-on training class is to help law enforcement officers become familiar with the equipment and comfortable in using it,” said Robert Crackel, associate professor of chemistry, who will be conducting the class.

Training will be provided for three pieces of equipment including an ion scanner, a gas chromatograph-mass spectrometer, and a substance identification system named StreetLab.

The ion scanner is an instrument used to detect substances such as explosives or drugs. Surfaces can be wiped with a fabric trap; the trap is then inserted into the instrument where it is analyzed to determine what substance is being examined. Such an analysis is important in determining the contamination levels of meth labs and aids local law enforcement in narcotics investigations.

Used in conjunction with other scientific instruments, the gas chromatograph-mass spectrometer (GC-MS) identifies the ingredients of a substance. Dealing specifically with methamphetamine, many chemicals are used in the manufacture of this illegal substance. This examination of the substance is extremely valuable where investigations lead to legal action against a defendant.

The StreetLab utilizes laser-based Raman technology to deliver fast, accurate, low-cost identification of unknown substances seized in the field. The system analyzes and identifies a broad range of drugs and explosives in seconds, without sample destruction or subjective interpretation. It requires no chemicals to mix or dispose, making it safe, fast and economical.

“We want law enforcement agencies to know that we have this equipment and that after receiving training, they are welcome to use it. Both the ion scanner and StreetLab are portable,” said Rod Hair, executive director of RCJC.

Because the GC-MS is not portable, the instrument's use is confined to MSU. Crackel and chemistry students will complete the testing and subsequent analysis. A minimum amount of substance needs to be submitted for examination.
