Hoeven signs \$633 million higher education funding bill at MSU

Gov. John Hoeven was joined by legislators and campus and university system officials at Minot State University April 30 to sign House Bill 1003, the higher education budget bill, which increases funding for the system by \$89 million. The bill raises the higher education budget to \$633 million, with a 23 percent increase in state funding, and limits tuition increases for the next two years.





"For the first time ever, we are funding the needsbased budget of Higher Education at the level requested by the board," Hoeven said. "This legislation, which includes a range of new grant, assistance and savings programs for students and families, will help hold the line on tuition increases and keep the cost of a college education in North Dakota affordable."

"The legislation keeps tuition increases at all North Dakota University System institutions at no more than 5 percent each year for each year of the biennium. Also included in the bill was funding for raises at an average

of 5 percent each year for university employees, including faculty and staff.

The bill was closely watched by MSU officials because it contained funding for two key building projects – renovation of Swain Hall and repair of the MSU Dome floor. President David Fuller and Vice President for Administration and Finance Ron Dorn had testified a number of times during the Legislative session about the need for appropriated funding for salary increases and MSU capital projects.

Minot State University to confer degrees

President David Fuller will confer more than 700 undergraduate and graduate degrees during Minot State University's commencement exercises on May 11, in the MSU Dome beginning at 10 a.m. Commencement speakers are going to address Vision 2013, Strategy 1: Creating a Distinctive Mission Focused on Engagement and Place.

Faculty members who intend to march in the processional should dress in academic regalia and arrive at the south end of the second floor of the Dome at least 10 minutes prior to 10 a.m.

All staff members are strongly encouraged to attend the commencement. If student assistance is not available during the two-hour block from 10 a.m.-noon, offices may close to allow staff members to attend this important event.

President Fuller invites all members of the MSU community to celebrate our student's achievements and the completion of their academic programs.

State funding of \$387,000 was provided for the Dome floor, which is buckling and is a safety hazard.

The bill also contained a .25 percent cut in operating expenses for all NDUS campuses. For MSU, that translates to \$75,426 for the biennium or about \$38,000 each year. "It won't bust the budget," said Dorn.

Hoeven credited the state's aggressive economic development efforts and growing economy for providing the funding. "We are able to provide this funding, and at the same time, provide almost \$120 million for broad-based tax relief and set aside more than \$350 million in reserves for the future," he said.

Fuller thanked the Minot legislators for their hard work on behalf of MSU. Senators Karen Krebsbach and Tom Seymour and Representatives Matt Klein, Larry Bellew, Kari Conrad and Elwood "Woody" Thorpe were on hand for the press conference. Bruce Christianson and Jon Backes, local members of the State Board of Higher Education, also attended.

Native American celebration is in Dome over weekend

Native American dancers and drum groups from throughout North Dakota and neighboring states and provinces will compete during the 18th Annual Native American Honor Dance and Spring Celebration, at the Minot State University Dome Friday and Saturday. The celebration will also include special Native American attractions.

The powwow-style event, sponsored by the MSU Native American Cultural Awareness Club and the university, will honor all 2007 graduates. Two "Grand Entries," the time when the dancers enter the floor of the arena, are scheduled for 1 and 7 p.m. each day.

Following the 1 p.m. Grand Entry on Saturday (May 5) the memory of Nathan Goodiron, a MSU student who was killed in action Thanksgiving Day in Afghanistan, will be honored. Goodiron, a junior majoring in finance, was serving with the N.D. Army National Guard. From Mandaree and an enrolled member of the Mandan, Hidatsa and Arikara Nation, he had been involved with the MSU Native American club. His family will conduct a give-away ceremony. This traditional event honors the person by giving gifts to people who were inspirational, helpful or instrumental in that person's life.

The "Honor Parade," in which all 2007 graduates are invited to take part, follows the 7 p.m. Grand Entry on Saturday (May 5).

The doors open at 9:30 a.m. each day. On Friday evening at 5, a traditional buffalo meal will be provided by the Mandan, Hidatsa and Arikara Nation and the Spirit Lake Nation.

Admission to the Honor Dance and Spring Celebration is \$3 for ages 12-55; it is free to children under 12, senior citizens, and MSU students, faculty and staff. For more information, contact Wylie Hammond, MSU Multicultural Services, at 858-3365.

North Broadway renovation affects access to campus

Access to Minot State University is being impacted by construction on North Broadway. Traffic has been reduced to two lanes on the east side of the roadway, with one lane of traffic in each direction between University Avenue and 24th Avenue North.

Broadway and all intersections are open, but left turns are not allowed at the major signaled intersections. If you are traveling north on Broadway, this directly impacts your access to the campus on University Avenue and on 11th Avenue. Alternate routes for left turns onto University Avenue and 11th Avenue are marked with blue informational signs.

Left turns are permitted between the major intersections to provide access to local businesses. As occurred during the South Broadway project, there will be times when work requires an intersection to be closed.

MSU broadcasting students bring home conference awards

Minot State University broadcasting students attended the Midwest Journalism Conference in Minneapolis, March 23 and 24. Thirteen students attended to gain knowledge about the broadcasting field. Examples of conference sessions include new camera gear on the market, tips on how to get a print job, and how to get your first job in broadcasting. Each morning seasoned professionals spoke about their respective fields.

Three students and one faculty member in broadcasting earned Northwest Broadcasting News Association Eric Sevareid Awards. MSU student Corey Serr earned a first-place award for "Radio-Best Use of Audio in a News Story." Students J.D. (Black) Rudd and Andy Leraas placed first in "TV-Best Sports Play-by-Play."

"It was very exciting to receive an award," said Serr. "We also previewed other students' work, and it's nice to see what projects and ideas they come up with." Broadcasting faculty member Neil Roberts also earned an award of merit in the category "Radio-Small Market Best Series" for his programs "On Air at the Fair" produced during the N.D. State Fair.

Roberts said, "The competition gets tougher each year, so it's an honor to be recognized. It's a wonderful opportunity for the students."

DSU's Vickers to retire

Lee Vickers, president of Dickinson State University, announced Monday that he will retire from his position effective Jan. 1, 2008, or as soon as is possible to ensure a smooth transition for the campus and the new president.

"It is not easy to leave a position that has been so rewarding, both personally and professionally," Vickers said, citing personal goals and more time to spend with his family as his primary reasons for retiring. "My commitment to students and to the growth of the university remains very strong."

Vickers has been president of DSU for eight years, during which time he has been instrumental in bringing numerous initiatives to the fore. Among them are the expansion and renovation of the Murphy Hall Science Building; the opening of the Strom Center for Entrepreneurship; the expansion of the Global Awareness initiative through international exchange and the increase of extended campus offerings and enrollments. Additionally, during Vicker's tenure, efforts to increase academic rigor and improve learning have been proven effective by improved performance on student exit exams.

"President Vickers has given Dickinson State University truly outstanding leadership during the years that he has served as its president. There has really been tremendous progress made by the institution on so many fronts under his leadership." said John Q. Paulsen, president of the North Dakota State Board of Higher Education. "We wish Dr. and Mrs. Vickers great happiness during their retirement, although the task of finding his successor will certainly be challenging."

Open forums on the Campus Climate Survey final report scheduled for May 7

On May 7, open forums reporting on the Campus Climate Assessment Project will be held. Two sessions will be held in the Conference Center, from 8 to 9 a.m., and from 9 to 10 a.m. Attendees may choose whichever forum best fits their schedule.

This survey instrument was distributed last September. Participants were asked to respond to survey questions regarding our campus climate from two perspectives – "how it is now" and "how it should be" and our amount of agreement or disagreement. The survey, which was administered by a consulting firm for the North Dakota University System, is an important tool in the goal to continually improve our campus. Sue Rankin, of the consulting firm, will be providing the report on our results.

Elections for Staff Senate will be conducted May 8, 8 a.m.-4 p.m. The ballot table will be located by the Post Office, second floor Administration Building. For clarification, once a staff senate representative has completed a two-year term of service, the individual is eligible to serve another two-year term.

Mentors wanted

The MSU Mentor Program is looking for more mentors. New students for fall 2007 will be invited to participate in the program and willing faculty, staff and administrators are needed to serve as their mentors.

The MSU Mentor Program was established to help new MSU students make a smooth transition to university life. The program started in fall 2006 with 147 students and 42 mentors. Students in the program (known as mentees) are looking for someone on campus to help them with questions they may have and sometimes, when they do not have questions, they are longing for someone to know who they are.

The main part of the program is the relationship that is developed with the mentor and mentee. We also offer the students the option of earning priority registration by meeting a few goals we set for them. Students interested in this option are asked to sign an agreement which lists requirements to earn priority registration. These requirements include:

- Meeting with their mentor three times per semester.
- Meeting with their academic advisor once per semester.
- Attending two life skills workshops per semester (workshops include topics such as time management, money management, financial aid, study skills and much more).

Any full-time faculty, staff or administrator who has completed a bachelor's degree can be a mentor. Mentors in the MSU Mentor Program:

- Serve as a resource for new students (the number of students assigned to you is based on how many you feel you can handle given your schedule).
- Meet with mentees at least three times per semester (Some mentors/mentees found it helpful to meet weekly or every other week while others were satisfied with the three times per semester. You must also be willing to have students stop in when they need help because not all situations can wait until the next meeting).
- Help students identify campus and community resources to assist with problems that arise (tutoring, job searches, roommate problems, financial aid, etc.)
- Be willing to listen to their problems and guide them in the right direction
- Encourage your mentees to complete other program requirements (attending workshops and meeting with advisor)
- Communicate with mentor program coordinator regarding your students
- Most importantly-be a friend to a new MSU student.

Also, do not think you have to be an expert on MSU to be a mentor. We are a network of professionals that can help each other and training will occur at the beginning of the fall semester as well as periodically throughout the year.

Fees for parking permits increase

New reserved parking permits are required for the 12-month period, June 1, 2007 through May 31, 2008 (summer, fall, and spring semesters). The permits are available in the Parking Office, located at Plant Services. The cost for the permit has increased, due to the inflationary costs associated with maintenance/improvements, and are now \$30 annually. The monies collected are used to maintain and improve the roadways and parking lots.

Permits are assigned according to the building in which individuals maintain an office or work area. Each vehicle must display a valid parking permit on the inside rear view mirror. Each permit is numbered and must be receipted as such. Therefore, a second permit will not be issued, and if employees drive more than one vehicle, the permit must be transferred. A second permit may also be purchased if desired.

Please have in your possession at the time of purchase, your vehicle license plate numbers and your MSU Employee ID number.

Citations are to be paid or appealed within 7 calendar days. The appeal form can be found on the MSU home page. After that period, the fines will double and automatically transfer from the parking system (T2 Flex) to the accounts receivable in the Business Office (PeopleSoft). Payments for outstanding fines are to be paid at the cashier's window at the Business Office. When accounts become past due, you will receive written notification 20 days prior the account being released to a collection agency. With our new software systems, there is no distinguishing between students and staff, all are viewed as employees.

To alleviate any future balances to the accounts receivable, follow the instructions on the citation in the event you receive one. This practice will be in the best interest of all those concerned.
