



Three candidates interviewing for MSU director of facilities

Three candidates from Minot will be interviewing for the position of director of facilities at Minot State University. The pool includes Roger Kluck, Jeff Meyer and Dennis Voeller. The campus is invited to attend open forums for and presentations by each of the candidates on the topic "Explain how in your position as facilities director at Minot State University you would integrate any or all of the seven strategies listed in Vision 2013, the university's strategic planning document, into physical plant daily operations and planning processes." Kluck's presentation is today at 1 p.m., Meyer will present Friday at 9 a.m., and Voeller's presentation is Dec. 5 at 1:30 p.m. All open forums and presentations will be held in the Missouri Room, located in the MSU Conference Center.

Kluck is the Ward County highway engineer and county park supervisor, a position he has held since 2002. Prior to that, he was the owner/manager of the Wold Engineering Office in Minot for 12 years. Kluck earned a Bachelor of Science degree in civil engineering from North Dakota State University. He is currently a registered professional engineer in North Dakota and Minnesota. He is a past board member of the Minot Area Chamber of Commerce, has been a member of the chamber's Infrastructure Committee since 1990, and is a member of the Steering Committee for the Ward County Emergency Resource Council.

For 15 years, Meyer has worked for plant services at MSU in the carpenter shop, and he is currently the main carpenter. He has 25 years of cabinetry, construction and architectural experience. In addition, he has operated his private business, JM Construction, for the past 15 years. Meyer earned a bachelor's degree in criminal justice from MSU and holds a N.D. State Contractor's License.

Voeller has been the operations director for the North Dakota State Fair since 1985. He is also a member of the Ward County Emergency Resource Council Committee and the Minot Area Chamber of Commerce Infrastructure and Governmental Affairs committees. Voeller has attended numerous seminars offered by the International Association of Fairs and Expositions and earned certificates related to physical plant operations, facility management, and purchasing and procurement from a variety of entities including the N.D. Office of Management and Budget.

The search profile for the director of facilities identifies the following qualifications: a results-orientated, engaged leader, an individual who collaborates effectively with students, faculty, staff and the community, a person who focuses on excellence and growth, and a strategic thinker and planner.

The chair of the search process is Dick Jenkins, vice president for student affairs. Other members include Paul Rudolph, head football coach, Chad Carr, president of the Staff Senate, faculty members John Webster and Bill Harbort, plant services personnel Dale Kephart and Tammy Pons, and student Chase Lee.

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Minot State University seeks public comment

Minot State University will undergo a comprehensive evaluation visit between March 31 and April 2, 2008, by a team representing The Higher Learning Commission (HLC) of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools (NCA). Minot State University has been accredited by NCA since 1917. Its most recent HLC accreditation period began in 1997. Its present HLC accreditation is at the Education Specialist's degree level and also includes degree sites at various other locations within North Dakota.

The Higher Learning Commission is one of six accrediting agencies in the United States that provide institutional accreditation on a regional basis. It is formally recognized by the U.S. Department of Education. While other agencies provide accreditation for specific university programs, HLC accreditation evaluates the entire institution and accredits it as a whole. Accreditation is voluntary. HLC accredits approximately 1,100 institutions of higher education in a 19-state region.

For the past two years, Minot State University has been engaged in a process of self-study, addressing HLC requirements and criteria for accreditation. The evaluation team will visit the institution between March 31 and April 2, 2008, to gather evidence that the self-study has been thorough and accurate. The team will recommend to the Higher Learning Commission

a continuing status for the university; following a review process, HLC itself will take the final action.
