academic affairs at MSU-Bottineau, was dissecting a fetal pig. Those looking in at Minot could see every move Brooks made in close-up, vivid detail with the new technology.

“The clarity is much superior to the old studio,” said Brooks. “That should facilitate learning.”

The technology enables an instructor to show a video or PowerPoint, a close-up of a microscope slide, a Web site or to demonstrate seamlessly over the network, all while still talking.

Jerry Rostad, director of the state Interactive Video Network, said it is the closest thing to a traditional classroom setting. High definition is particularly important for classes where it is vital that students see close-up what a professor is doing, such as the biology classes taught by Brooks. MSU-Bottineau has two of the high-definition labs; MSU has one, as well as Lake Region State College and North Dakota State University.

IVN rooms that utilize the older technology are still being heavily utilized. MSU and MSU-Bottineau offer 35 percent of the classes in the North Dakota University System held over the IVN network.

MSU first day number up

Minot State University counted 40 additional students on opening day of spring semester. There were 3,268 students enrolled on Jan. 8, the first day of the spring 2008 term, compared to 3,228 on the first day of classes last year.

Enrollment numbers for each term are not official until they are reported to the North Dakota University System Office. Previously, that was after the 15th day of classes. As per a change in State Board of Higher Education policy, official enrollment will be reported one week later. The official spring enrollment report will run the evening of Feb. 4.

SBHE approves hire of architect for wellness center

The State Board of Higher Education gave MSU the authority to proceed with the evaluation and design of a student wellness center at its Jan. 17 meeting. The estimated cost of the project from inception to the completion of construction is estimated at no more than \$15 million.

The university plans to hire architectural firm EAPC of Fargo, Grand Forks, Bismarck, and Jamestown to develop the design concept. The concept would be presented to the campus along with an estimated cost to assess campus interest in proceeding with the project. Possible locations might include an attachment of the Student Center, taking advantage of the pool and locker rooms there, or an attachment to the MSU Dome, or elsewhere on campus.

If there is an appropriate level of support, possible funding sources include an increase in student fees, a capital campaign, or a reallocation of two student fees currently being collected

that expire in August 2013. The SBHE would also have to approve any future plans before the project could be started.

This project supports MSU’s Vision 2013 strategic plan by helping to ensure future institutional viability, vitality and growth.

MSU blood drive scheduled for Jan. 28-29

The Minot State University Ambassadors and Student Government Association will host an MSU blood drive Monday and Tuesday, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. The blood drive will be held in the Conference Center of the Student Center.

“Our blood drive schedule is very light the end of December and the first couple weeks of January. Universities, colleges and high schools are on break, and businesses which normally would sponsor blood drives are short-staffed as people take time off to enjoy the holidays,” said Rich Larcombe, United Blood Services of Minot executive director.

“Generally, most healthy people who are over 17 and weigh at least 110 pounds may donate,” Larcombe said. “There are quite a few people who do not realize they are qualified to donate. People who are taking vitamins, hormones, birth control pills, diet pills, high blood pressure and cholesterol medications or antibiotics for acne may donate.”

It is a fun and convenient way to donate blood, get your blood pressure, temperature, pulse, hematocrit and cholesterol checked and save someone’s life, all in less than an hour. MSU outreach office opens at Magic City Campus

Today Minot State University opened an outreach office at Minot High School's Magic City Campus. The aim of this pilot project is to help high school students learn more about university in general and the many exciting offerings on our campus. At present, only one in three Magic City seniors attends MSU following their graduation. In the short term, we would really like to see that number be closer to one in two. During our meetings with the Magic City leadership team it was clear that many Magic City students are not aware of who we are. Unfortunately, many students think of MSU as "Beaver Tech"—we are very hopeful that by showcasing the recent improvements on campus, both academic and students affairs, that we can help change our image.

I would be remiss if I did not mention how supportive the Magic City team is of this initiative. They genuinely want their students to know more about MSU because they believe we are a great university. They want us to work together to help their students. Often during our discussions the Magic City personnel talked about "Team Minot," which I think is very positive.

For spring semester the MSU office will be open on Mondays from 8:30 a.m. to 1:15 p.m. and Wednesdays from 11:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Enrollment services staff will operate the office. If the pilot is successful we hope to expand this idea to other high schools.

Each week we will have a theme that will be published on their campus. The theme will be announced on Thursday for the following week. We believe that there are many areas of our campus that may wish to sponsor a theme. For example, the

Magic City people suggested a financial aid theme for a week in February. Other examples could be specific departments or programs, dual-credit, study abroad, student services, athletics, etc. The theme could involve more than a presence in our outreach office. One suggestion was to combine in-class visits by faculty with the office presence. For instance, if a particular academic program wanted to showcase their offerings, we could arrange to have classroom visits the same week as a program advisor was available in the office to answer detailed questions. If you would like to sponsor a theme, please contact Rebecca Porter or John Girard. We will work with you to decide the best time and to publicize the event. We ask that if you decide to sponsor a theme that you be available for the office hours of that week.

If you have any information, handouts or announcements that you would like to have in the office, please forward them to us.

We will have an official ribbon-cutting ceremony sometime in February ... watch for the announcement.

- The nominee must exhibit evidence of outstanding contributions and ongoing commitment to MSU post employment.

All nominations will be presented to the Faculty Senate for consideration. Formal recognition of any selected nominations will occur at the March 27 Employee Appreciation Banquet.

- Faculty: nominations may be made by anyone knowledgeable about the achievement and contributions of the faculty member. Self nominations are allowed. Self nominations must include an endorsement by a faculty member or supervisor. Nominations must be specific for the area of teaching, scholarship or service and must include a one-page supporting narrative.
- Staff: nominations may be made by anyone knowledgeable about the staff member. A description of the personal characteristics and accomplishments of the nominee must be provided.

More specific details are contained on the nomination forms. The forms may be found on the MSU Web site under the faculty and staff section.

The awards will be presented at the MSU Employee Appreciation Banquet, March 27.

Deadlines for spring/summer graduation applications and ordering student commencement regalia set

Faculty: Please be aware of the following graduation application deadlines:

- Jan. 25—spring and summer graduation applications are due to advisors.
- Feb. 8—spring and summer graduation applications are due in the Office of the Registrar.

Also, please note that the procedure for ordering graduation regalia has changed this year in order to follow Barnes & Noble Bookstore's procedures. Now that Barnes & Noble Bookstore has formed a partnership with Minot State University, the procedure for ordering student commencement regalia has changed. Please be aware of the following policies and deadlines:

- All student commencement regalia needs to be ordered online through Barnes & Noble's partner Herff Jones. Orders for caps, gowns, hoods and announcements will no longer take place in the bookstore—it all must be done online. Due to the new partnership with Barnes & Noble, the Office of Publications and Design Services will no longer produce commencement announcements.

- Orders can be placed beginning Jan. 15, and the deadline to have all orders placed is March 14.

MSU-Bottineau to present informational sessions on medical transcription program

Minot State University-Bottineau will hold two informational sessions on their medical transcription program Jan. 31. The first will be at 5 p.m. at the Minot Air Force Base Education Center, and the second will be at 7:30 p.m. at MSU in the Student Center's Conference Center.

MSU-Bottineau recently received national approval of their medical transcription program through the Association for Healthcare Documentation Integrity (AHDI). This new approval opens up exciting opportunities for students including the national apprenticeship program and the military spouse initiative.

The medical transcription field is expected to grow faster than average over the next decade and is a good fit for rural and mobile workers who are looking for a flexible work schedule and the possibility of working from home.

First aid and CPR training offered

Faculty and staff: First Aid and Cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) training will be available for interested staff and faculty members during the week of March 3-7. This training is provided by the American Red Cross.

Each first aid training session will be held from 10 a.m. to noon and each CPR training session will be held from 1 to 4:30 p.m. You may sign up for one session of each either on the same day or different days to accommodate your schedule. The training will cover first aid in the context of what to do while waiting for paramedics. The CPR training will cover the use of automatic external defibrillators (AED) and provide certification in the use of CPR techniques.

The cost of the first aid training and CPR certification for adults is covered by MSU. CPR techniques for adults are different than those for infants. The additional cost of \$10 for infant certification is optional expense for those who desire the certification.

There are only 12 slots available for each training session.
