Faculty, staff and student achievements

Brent Askvig, executive director of the North Dakota Center for Persons with Disabilities, served as a federal grant reviewer for the U.S. Department of Education in the "Stepping Stones to Innovation" grant competition this summer.

Olson Library on the Minot State University campus for excellence in providing federal government document services to Minot and surrounding areas. Myerchin, Beth Odahlen, director of the Center for Engaged Teaching and Learning, **Nancy Pearson**, instructor of communication arts, and **Gary Ross**, chair and professor within the Department of Business Administration, will be panel members at the National Society for Experiential Education conference in Dallas, Oct. 19-22. Their presentation topic is "Growing Pains: One University's Journey to Implement Engagement Across Campus"

Pearson will serve as the respondent for a panel presentation, "Reflections of Teaching: Pedagogical Experience and Research in Communication Education," at the Communication Speech and Theater Association convention in Mandan, Sept. 15-17.

"Smart Grid U.S. Transmission Grid: Issues and Opportunities," by Seymour with help from **Wade Kadrmas**, was accepted by Review of Business Information Systems Journal. Seymour and students **Jenny Huschka** and **Ryan Huschka** had "Show Your 'RELATIONS' in Social Media," an eBook supplement to "How to Leverage Social Media for Public Relations Success," approved for the Organization for the Promotion and Advancement of Small Telecommunications Companies Expo and Summer Convention, Minneapolis, July 26.

Chelsea Starr, assistant professor of sociology, presented two papers at the annual meeting of the American Sociological Association in August. The papers were "Riot Grrrl 10 Years Later: Conceptualizing Social Movement Longevity" and "The Role of Social Media in the Tunisian, Egyptian, and Libyan Revolutions." Her research methods class, Sociology 278, is currently working with the North Dakota Coalition for Homeless People as part of a larger project to assess the impact of the flood and the oil industry on affordable housing statewide.
