President's open forums slated for Thursday

President David Fuller will convene two open forums Thursday (Jan. 31) from 9:30 to 10:30 a.m. and 12:30 to 1:30 p.m. in the Minot State University Conference Center. The agenda for each meeting includes discussions on several current topics and issues, including the budget, enrollment, MSU's recent legislative presentation and other legislative items impacting the campus.

Fuller will share information on the governor's proposed funding plan and Chancellor H.A. Shirvani's Pathways to Student Success project and his recently announced plan for each campus to increase its retention and graduation rates by five percentage points annually.

He will also discuss the revival of campus-wide conversations about future planning, possible new recruitment steps to replace the Grow North Dakota initiative and MSU's response to the Higher Learning Commission's "pathways" program that will require the identification of a specific strategic quality-improvement project.

All are invited to attend and join in the discussion.



Alumnus John Greenslit shares life's journeys

John Greenslit, alumnus, visited Minot State University Jan. 22 as part of the Distinguished Alumni Series. His career journey encompassed the areas of education, government service, business management, marketing and consulting and sales.

Greenslit, director of the Eaton County Parks Department in Grand Ledge, Mich., met with students in fitness and physical education classes and toured the Student Wellness Center. Within the community, he presented to the Kiwanis, a

service club, and met with Ron Merritt, Minot Park District director.

“Connections are important to success. I’m appreciative of the honor to come back, and I hope I gave something back,” said Greenslit. “I am extremely pleased with ‘my’ university and very proud.”

Rumney showcases French influence

Music professor and violinist Jon Rumney will give a recital of French music with pianist and colleague Dianna Anderson Sunday (Feb. 3) at 3 p.m. in Minot State University’s Ann Nicole Nelson Hall.



The recital will include two French works, different in style and expression, which begin and end the musical program. The first piece, written by Jean Baptiste Senaille’, is a French sonata, written in 1720, accompanied by harpsichord and cello, featuring Erik Anderson, music professor. The final selection is a French sonata written in 1875 by Gabriel Faure’ that is full of dynamics and expressive slides representing the Romantic period.

“The Baroque aesthetic of Senaille’ is based on harmonies and a variety of ornamentation, rather than vibrato and virtuoso technique,” Rumney said. “Faure’s late romantic piece is very much like vocal song, and full of passion. The contrast of the two celebrates the spirit of viva la difference.”

Sandwiched between the French works will be two short presentations that pay tribute to famous violinists of

the 20th century. Highlights include a Gershwin song, specially arranged by Russian violinist Jascha Heifetz, and a Schumann Romance, arranged by Austrian violinist and composer Fritz Kreisler.

Rumney’s celebration of diversity in MSU’s thriving musical culture is free and open to the public.

Wrestling room debuted Feb. 8

Minot State University Athletic Department cordially invites the campus and public to celebrate the unveiling of the MSU Wrestling Room Feb. 8 at 6 p.m. The ceremony, which will also honor Howard "Bucky" and Linda Anderson and Gene and Judy Krebs, begins at 6:30 p.m., on the Dome’s lower level. Hors d’oeuvres, beverages and a tour of the new Student Wellness Center will be provided.

“The Andersons and Krebs assisted in the re-establishment of our wrestling program,” said Rick Hedberg, athletic director. “Without their continued support, we would not have revived the program or created the wrestling room.”

Howard “Bucky” and Linda Anderson have given almost 50 years of service to the sport of wrestling in North Dakota. The North Dakota High School Activities Association inducted both into its Wrestling Hall of Fame in 2002.

After wrestling in high school and college, Bucky coached at Napoleon, Bismarck High School, Bismarck Century High School, Minot High School and Des Lacs Burlington, spanning the period from 1969 to 2000. From 1983 to 2000, he officiated wrestling matches. He was also named Coach of the Year in 1972, 1975 and 1983.

Linda was secretary of USA Wrestling of North Dakota from 1975 to 2000. She also organized the first Northern Plains Regional Tournament in the state.

Gene and Judy Krebs ('01) graduate, and their children, Jesse, Josh and Jamie, have been involved in Minot's wrestling scene for more than 30 years.

After wrestling in high school and college, Gene coached at Minot High School as a head or assistant coach, 1983-2008. From 1992 to 2004, Gene served as state chair of USA Wrestling of North Dakota; since 2003, he has been the regional representative for seven states at the national level with USA Wrestling. In 2001, USA Wrestling named Gene the National Junior Person of the Year.

Following the ceremony, the MSU Beavers take on Southwest Minnesota State University at 7 p.m.

MSU's Darwin Day resurrected

After a year's hiatus, Darwin Day returns to Minot State University Feb. 13-15. The focus of MSU's Darwin Day, celebrated through a confluence of humanities, science and art, is evolution's relevance to everyday life.


Heidi Richter, alumna and scientific illustrator, will open Darwin Day Feb. 13 with her presentation "Visualizing evolution" in Cyril Moore 213, 1-2 p.m.

Feb. 14, Richter will discuss "Art applied to science" in Hartnett 202E, 9-10 a.m. That evening from 7 to 8 p.m. in Cyril Moore 16, Smithsonian and North Dakota paleontologist Tyler Lyson will talk about "How dinosaurs lived and why they went extinct."

Feb 15, Richter will demonstrate live scientific illustration in the Beaver Dam, 9:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., with music provided by local bands. Josh Hoeks, ecological interactive sculpture artist, will present "Collaboration" in Aleshire Theater, noon-1 p.m. Lyson will speak about "Origins of turtles and their shell" in Moore 213, 1-2 p.m. And Andrea Donovan, assistant humanities professor, will discuss "Why Art and Science Can Co-Exist" in Aleshire Theater, 2-3 p.m.

"We're celebrating evolution's role as it pertains to many facets of life, everything from art to science," said Chris Beachy, biology professor and Darwin Day 2013 organizer. "We strive each year to make this a humanities event for the general public."

Induction into the Academic Hall of Fame honors meritorious service in an academic discipline and highlights the accomplishments of the university’s most distinguished alumni.

Nominations may be made by any individual or organization, either within Minot State or from the community. Nominees must be alumni who completed a significant portion of their education at MSU, and who went on to complete an advanced degree and made substantial contribution to the advancement of their field of study. Nominations must include a letter for support from their Minot State University academic division or department. The deadline for nominee submissions is April 1.
