## 1. Senate Reports

## Faculty Senate

Senate president, A. Bertsch provided the following report:

- Continuing to monitor legislative session; attending forums on Saturdays with local legislators
- Should have the results of the ad hoc committee's analysis of the faculty senate structure sometime tomorrow
- Faculty senate submitted certain criteria to President's staff as they deliberate salary recommendations

### Staff Senate

Senate president, K. O'Keefe provided the following report:

- Tammy Wolf is the latest High 5 recipient
- The senate special events committee hosted a very successful Death by Chocolate event last week

#### Student Government Association

- Had a very successful Stand Up event with three community members presenting
- Elections will be March 25-26
- We will host the NDSA meeting on April 13-14

### 2. President's Report

- The Higher Ed appropriations bill, HB 1003, passed through the house and will now go to the Senate for their recommendations; the house has proposed a 2% salary increase each year of the biennium (SBHE had recommended 4+4 and the Governor proposed a 4+2); they also recommend a fully funded health insurance plan
- The House version is much closer to what the SBHE proposed versus what the Governor recommended

- Another revenue forecast will be coming out in mid-March and that may have an impact on final decisions
- MSU and DCB will be back in Bismarck in March to present to the Senate
- The Senate defeated the bill recommending multiple boards for higher education; they will come up with their own recommendation which is to increase the size of the current board
- HCR 3021 which called for a study to look into the possible privatization of MSU and two other universities was defeated
- Bill 1536 which would have put the authority to set tuition with the legislature was defeated and that authority will remain with the SBHE
- HCR 3016 is proposing to remove campus names listed in the constitution; if passed, it would need to go to the vote of the people
- MSU Regents hosted a legislative social in Bismarck that was well attended
- T. Mihalick's appointment to the SBHE was approved by the ND Senate

Power – annual report time – one grant report is done

Student Success – Education meet and greet is on March 26; Career fair on March 27

Student Center – SGA approved a portable feeding station for mothers and a selfie station on campus

Alumni – forward any possible names for the speaker series; thank you to all who have given through annual appeal

HR – Oracle training this Friday; system onboarding and termination processing training will be coming in March

Accreditation – may have first draft of the response to action letter completed by early summer; more substantial focus with teams working on items in preparation for the full visit will begin soon after; Gen Ed assessment day went well

Security – from March 14-16, we will be hosting the class B boys' state tournament at the Dome

CEL – no issues with the new Blackboard; working on a marketing campaign for the Grad School this fall

Veterans – conducted suicide prevention training; working on PTSD Awareness

NA/Diversity – hosted the H.E.R.O.S meeting yesterday; planning club nights during March and April; approached by community members about some NA cultural training – will be conducting this at Trinity Health and Job Corp; hosted a Black History Month event celebrating inventions from Black inventors; Diversity Council is looking for diversity advisors for the other groups on campus (Asia, Latino, etc)
