- <u>Acknowledgements</u>: Thank you to the campus and community for helping make the 34th annual Spring Honor Dance & Powwow Celebration week a success! The author Diane Wilson event was very well attended, and she hosted a lunch and learn with students. The powwow program had 200+ students and teachers from local schools attend. MHA Nation Tourism brought 25 people to facilitate the teachings of their tribal nations.
- The Plum River dedication was a great way to start day two of powwow, those attending were treated to berry soup and frybread, fresh fruit (including plums) and beverages. Ruth Plenty Sweetgrass-She Kills was keynote speaker, Ruth is the Food Sovereignty Director at Nueta Hidatsa Sahnish College.
