Faculty Senate Report to University Cabinet Wednesday, 17 July 2024

Catching up from the end of the 2023–2024 Faculty Senate:

- 1. We completed elections for those Faculty Senate committee positions that could be filled by election at this point. Some positions will need to be filled by academic departments at the first of the academic year, ideally at their school or department meeting the day of convocation (Thursday, 8/22).
- 2. We filled the following office position: Secretary, Nichol Anderson.
- 3. Because no one agreed to be nominated as Faculty Senate Vice President for 2024–2025, the election was incomplete. The Faculty Senate Executive will identify the FS VP at their first meeting in August. Faculty also will need to elect the NDGEAC alternate member at fall all-faculty meeting.
- 4. This probably has already been reported to this body, but there will now be an all-faculty meeting in the hour after Thursday's convocation. Academic schools and departments also will be expected to hold meetings that afternoon.
- 5. Dr. Geller, four faculty members (Sarah Aleshire, Scott Kast, Nigel George, and myself), and Melissa Cantone (and occasionally Rebecca Ringham) have met twice over the summer to lay the groundwork for revising our General Education program. We are focusing on outlining a general education program that students and faculty see as practical and relevant to students' degree programs and fundamental learning, that is flexible to meet the needs of all students (including those transferring into Minot State), that can be easily and effectively assessed so to ensure ongoing improvement, and that truly addresses the foundational breadth of knowledge and skills that we want Minot State students to gain and develop as they earn their degrees. We have been looking closely at UND's Essential Studies program as a model, and we'll be talking at our next meeting on July 25th with Karyn Plumm, UND's Vice Provost for Undergraduate Studies and Student Success. She has been closely involved with their program, and we're going to talk with her about how that program was developed and how implementation and assessment of that program has worked for them.

Our timeline right now is for this group's work to be taken up by a Faculty Senate ad hoc committee that includes representatives from the General Education committee at the first Faculty Senate meeting in the fall. That committee will solicit feedback from academic programs about what they want General Education to accomplish for students, and they then will use that feedback along with this working group's report to outline a revised general education program, including how that program will be assessed, for Faculty Senate to review at the beginning of the spring semester. Faculty Senate will then discuss that outlined program, revise it as necessary, and then accept that revised program, ideally by the procedural meeting in April of 2025. The General Education committee will then be responsible beginning in the fall of 2025 for implementing the assessment system, identifying and approving courses, and getting everything ready for necessary submission to and approval by NDUS so that this new General Education program can be finalized by 1 March 2026 and become part of the 2026–2027 catalogue.

6. Following up on the work that Faculty Senate did last year restructuring its committees to match the new structure of academics, it has become clear to me that Faculty Senate must look at the number and composition of its committees. Additionally, the Faculty Satisfaction Survey over at least the past two years has identified issues with how we handle tenure and promotion. At the same time, the state board has mandated post-tenure review for reasons that are essentially political but certainly not unexpected.

Finally, we are faced as an institution with austerity measures that likely mean we can expect little or no growth in the number of tenured faculty members, at least for the next few years. That last is an issue in part because we have committees and positions that must be filled exclusively by tenured faculty members and rules that mandate that tenured faculty can only sit on one of those committees. Right now, we have 23 positions that each uniquely require a

tenured faculty member to fill them and five additional positions that require tenured faculty. In all, we have 92 positions on Faculty Senate committees alone when we have 134 full-time faculty members, of which only 72 are tenured. Given that by contract most full-time faculty members are supposed to spend 10% of their working hours involved in service, that faculty members and especially those who are tenured also must (or should) provide service to their departments, their schools, on institutional committees, and within their disciplines at regional, state and national levels, I don't think we can sustain this many Faculty Senate committee positions.

So, one of the things I am going to push for this next year is for Faculty Senate to combine committees and their functions whenever possible with the goal of eliminating at least three and as many as five of the current committees. As part of that, I'm going to push to revise our tenure and promotion process so that there is a single Tenure and Promotion Committee, and so that faculty create and submit only one dossier for both Tenure and Promotion. A complication is that, given that the almost-certainly forthcoming NDUS mandate that we implement a post-tenure review process that will entail doing post-tenure reviews for 24 faculty members each year over three years once that process starts, Faculty Senate will need to determine this next year how it thinks post-tenure review should be handled—whether it is by a Faculty Senate committee or in some other way.
